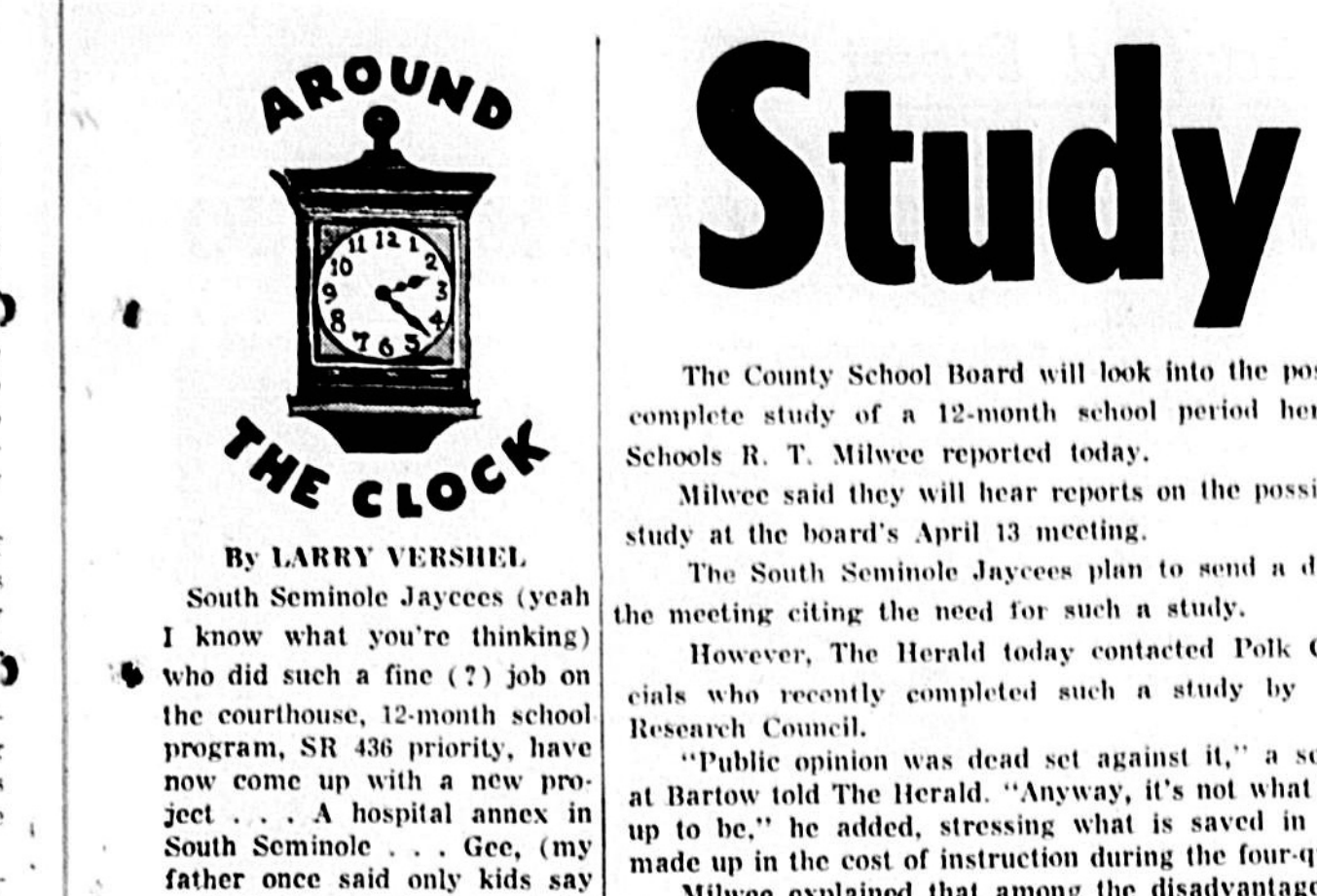

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Kirk Message Brings Rumbles From Demo Legislative Leaders

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk has called for immediate work on constitutional revision and help in fighting the war on crime in a legislative speech which urged bipartisan action.

The Republican governors first state-of-the-state message drew audible rumbles from some of the legislators Tuesday night as Kirk declared that legislators would be on record against property tax relief if they delayed consideration of the new constitution.

"If you vote to give our people this new constitution now, you are voting against the property taxes," Kirk said. "And you are voting to continue steadily increasing ad valorem taxes on property for at least two more years."

He did not explain the state's debt.



Democratic leaders of the Legislature who have recommended that constitutional revision be taken up after the regular 60-day session, disagreed with the governor.

"I cannot agree that there is anything in the proposed constitution to help ad valorem taxes unless he resorted to issuance of bonds," said Senate President Vepe Pope, D-St. Augustine.

Pope said the still continuing constitutional revision is a "mistake," but still feels it should be taken up after the session.

House Speaker Ralph Turley also disagreed with Kirk's statement and said his mind remained unchanged on scheduling of work on the constitution.

"I do not have any information which would cause any shifting of my feelings on this matter," said the Gainesville Democrat.

Republicans praised the speech, but Rep. Ferrell Serna, chairman of the House ad valorem tax committee, charged that the governor was "designed to scare some legislators into going along with his proposals."

Tax Payments In Installments Recommended By Senators

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A Senate subcommittee today recommended enacting laws allowing county taxpayers to make installment payments and to more adequately air their "grievances and growls" about taxes.

The subcommittee, headed by Sen. Ralph Tost, D-Miami, said that a recurring theme throughout his group's study had been the discovery that "the public in Florida did not feel that the tax system as we currently have it is fair."

The committee came during a meeting of the Senate Ad Valorem and Taxation Committee, which is preparing proposed legislation for the 1967 Legislature. It will hold one more meeting before taking a final vote on the committee report.

VC Deserters Growing In 'Open Arms' Plan

SAIGON (AP) — An all-time high of 5,857 Viet Cong deserters last month and came over to the United States, U.S. officials announced today.

The record surge of deserters was nearly double the previous record of 3,017 Viet Cong who deserted in February under the South Vietnamese government's open arms program.

The mounting wave of enemy defections was announced as the ground war in South Vietnam seemed to small, scattered patrol clashes and had weathered.

U.S. Capitol Needs Repairs

WASHINGTON (AP) — A team of architects who provided the U.S. Capitol building from top to bottom say it needs plenty of repairs but isn't at the fall-down stage yet.

The inspection team urged a restoration job, noting that none of the defects in the 138-year-old sandstone walls "appear to indicate that danger of collapse is imminent."

Death Penalty Fight Continues

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Rebuffed by a state court, civil rights lawyers are taking to federal judges their war against Florida's death penalty.

The American Civil Liberties Union and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People asked U.S. District Court in Jacksonville to order the state to stop its use of capital punishment.

Rep. Bob Man, D-Tampa, said Kirk was not unlike past governors in "talking in generalities at this point."

Pope, Tarlington and other Democrats, however, said they agreed with much of the Republican governor's 30-minute talk. "I think he indicated a willingness to work together for the benefit of the state," said Pope. "I will assist him in any way possible."

Kirk asked the legislators to forget political parties and work together in harmony.

Though Democratic lawmakers generally were critical of the lack of specifics in the message, they said they would await subsequent messages from the governor. They pledged to work with him on all programs designed to benefit Floridians.

All of the leaders that were selected last year before legislative terms were cut short by court-ordered reapportionment were unanimously re-elected during the traditional opening day ceremonies.

Organizational committee assignments started shortly after the completion of the ceremonies and other committee meetings were to be held today.

The House completed its reorganization during the morning session and the Senate swore in its members and re-elected officers during the early afternoon.

If you will go West this year for the best hunting season of your life, you had better start preparations now. Non-resident big game permits normally go on sale Jan. 1 and if you have not applied by the 15th of that month, well, you just won't get one for the state of Wyoming.

Wyoming, non-resident antelope permits go on sale Jan. 1. All applications are on a first-come, first-served basis. The non-resident big game license for Wyoming costs \$125. This includes one antelope, one deer, one bear, game birds and fishing.

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Business Shuns Pope's Message

NEW YORK (AP) — Pope Paul's encyclical on the development of peoples, though it contained some pointed criticism of capitalism, has evoked very little public reaction from American business interests.

Some of these same critics had been made from within the country, a pointed and predictable roar would have been heard, in the past, at least, this has been the response to criticism from certain elements.

The present silence could be for several reasons: One of out of controversy, out of lack of concern, out of necessity to assimilate the material before reacting.

The Pope, in discussing the disturbing and explosive reality of the rich nations becoming richer and the poor poorer, suggested that free trade itself might be contributing to this and suggested price regulation.

When did six-year-old Mary have her last diphtheria-tetanus-whooping cough shot? And her 10-year-old brother his tetanus shot? And the baby her last polio vaccine? As any hard-nosed parent knows, it's virtually impossible to keep children's immunization records straight without writing them down.

Knitting's Back

Knitting's back in style. In fact, it's enjoying its greatest popularity since the late 1950's when the rage was "knit" for Britain."

Part of the upsurge is due to the increasing interest in all types of do-it-yourself crafts . . . and part of it stems from fashion's new emphasis on the knitted look. Knits turn up in every type of garment these days . . . from cocktail dresses to beachwear.

For the woman who knits, the age-old craft has taken on a new dimension thanks to the improved varieties and types of yarns. Newest of these are the all-cotton yarns with built-in textures. They knit up into garments with a frothy, fragile appearance. Completely washable, the all-cotton knits keep their shape beautifully and are comfortable for year 'round wear. The yarns come in a wide range of colors — from deep shades to delicate pastels.

If you're a novice at knitting, here are a few tips to insure best results: Buy all of the yarn needed for a garment at one time because dye lots may differ.

Follow knitting instructions as closely as possible. Pay close attention to the stitch gauge given at the beginning of the instructions since this is an important to the size and fit of your garment. It's a good idea always to make a swatch at least two inches square with the yarn and needles specified before starting an actual garment.

Block it and then measure to see if the number of stitches and rows to the inch are the same as those given in the instruction gauge. If they're not, then your knitting is either looser or tighter than the average.

This can be corrected by changing the size of the needles to obtain the proper gauge. For example, if your knitting is looser than average, you will have to use smaller needles. If tighter, use larger needles.

Express Covers Mileage And Varied Customs

MOSCOW (AP) — Direct New York-Moscow flights are in the offing, but for railroad buffs en route to the Soviet capital there's a Northwest Express.

It runs from Holland to Moscow. The 1,300-mile trip is approximately the same distance as New York-Omaha or San Diego-Salt Lake City.

The trip takes two days. Passengers moving through some of the most politically sensitive areas in the world sense the distances that historically have cut Russia off from the West.

Sharp contrasts in living standards begin at the start, when passengers can compare the single Russian car with those of other nations on the train.

A Russian conductor named Dmitri, wearing a brown fur cap, greeted an American couple boarding his car at the Dutch port named Hook of Holland.

Dmitri's friendly "Dobry vecher" — good evening — and his help with the luggage did not quite compensate for the unfavorable impression the Russian sleeping car gave.

The cramped first-class sleeper compartment hardly had room for two small suitcases. In contrast to the airy modern cars of the Dutch and West German lines, the Russian one was dimly lit, stuffy and decorated with dark red velvet curtains.

"This car will be replaced by a new one next year," Dmitri said. Over a good meal in the Dutch dining car, the American couple had one of their last looks at Western prosperity as the train passed bright, new apartment buildings in Rotterdam and Utrecht.

By 4 next morning the train had crossed West Germany to the Communist East German town of Martenborn. Later that morning the train entered West Berlin, an enclave of modern buildings, busy streets and bright lights, then began crossing through the wall into East Berlin.

Pregnant Lion
Junk Piled Up
At National Zoo

WASHINGTON (AP) — A round the clock maternity watch of the National Zoo's ranking lioness has flopped. She isn't pregnant.

The lioness, Princess, was mated four months ago to Caesar. Simultaneously, the National Zoo initiated a program to televise zoo births and create a library of animal birth on video tape.

Princess was a natural for the pilot program. She is 14 years old and has had 24 cubs. She's familiar with the lying-in den and her keepers. Last week the 105-day period of gestation was almost up. Zoo officials organized. Thirty three friends of the zoo — including Mrs. Nicholas Katzenbach, wife of the undersecretary of state — volunteered for a 24-hour watch in the lion house.

They sat in a nearby office with a television monitor beamed on Princess. At the first indication of labor pains the volunteer was to flick on a recording device, then notify the zoo police who would call the zoo veterinarian.

Some of the volunteers thought it was a little spooky sitting in the lion house at night. They read. Some played crossword puzzles. There were two false alarms over labor pains.

"Just when it seemed the most peaceful at night," said Mrs. Peter Grogan, "one of the cats roared." She and Lydia Katzenbach shared a 4 a.m. to 6 a.m. watch.

"I spent part of the time playing with Livens and putting two chebats," said Warren J. Illiff, 30, an airline executive. Dennis is an orangutan.

After eight days of focusing in on Princess' every move, the zoo's animal department head, Donald H. Dietlein, has called off the watch.

"She's just a mishapen lion," he said. "She's not pregnant."

Junk Piled Up
For 40 Years

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — George Burkart was a recluse — and a string saver.

For 40 years, he lived in the seven-room frame house where he was born, at the point where Northeast Creek enters Back River in Baltimore County.

For 40 years, he collected all manner of things and built shelves for his treasures. Officials said "everything was an asset as a pin."

When the house was filled to the roof, he moved into one of his cobwebbed rooms. He was found dead there March 6, of hardening of the arteries, at age 66.

After his death, vandals made a junk heap of his place on Choptank Avenue, which had no gas, electricity or running water. Housing court issued an order to remove a health menace and a bulldozer moved into one of the rubble piles this week. The Sanitation Bureau has hauled away more than 30 truckloads so far. There were tons of newspapers, hundreds of pieces of lumber, a barrel of bones, old numbers of cans and bottles, jars of match sticks, five-gallon cans of fish scales, empty match books, balls of tinfoil and thousands of other things.

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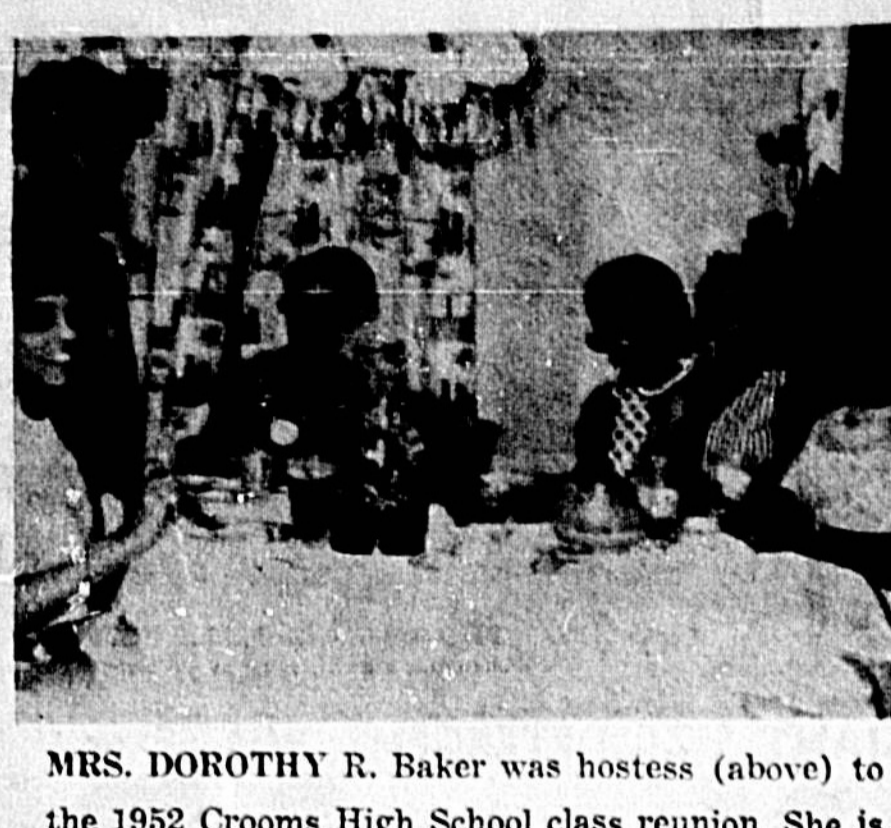

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Critics Score President On Social Security

WASHINGTON (AP) — Critics of President Johnson's proposed massive overhaul of the Social Security System claim he wants to turn it into a welfare program.

The administration discounts any such aim, but it's certain that questions raised by witnesses before the House Ways and Means Committee will concern the panel in closed session next week as it works over the legislation.

Both parties favor some increase in benefits, but liberal Democrats are eyeing a higher level than many conservatives of both parties.

Johnson may have voiced in connection with the legislation.

The cost of the proposed 20 per cent average increase in benefits and whether such an outlay can be financed by the traditional "self-supporting" pay-as-you-go method.

Some of the "fine print" provisions of the proposed act which critics interpret as departing from the principle that Social Security benefits are paid as a matter of right — because of contributions to the funds by employees and employers — and not on any charitable basis determined by need.

Johnson may have contributed to the uneasiness expressed by some witnesses when he submitted a budget message discussing Social Security in the general context of plans to aid the poor.
