

### **Rescue rides:** City takes a long, hard look

LONGWOOD - City officials were urged to take a long hard look at the pros and cons of providing ambulance transportation to area hospitals Monday night before opting to provide

Under a contract with the county, LifeFleet Atlantic Ambulance has provided emergency medical services and transportation since 1991. Casselberry is the lone municipality which has provided ambulance transportation services to its citizens, rather than having LifeFleet transport patients. The city pays for the service through their property tax.

Longwood Fire Chief Charles Chapman noted the city has a certificate of necessity from the county to provide the service now, but has chosen to go along with the program in operation for most of the county.

LifeFleet's exclusive franchise ends in January but county commissioners have said they will thoroughly study the matter before making any decision. LifeFleet has offered to extend their service up to another year beyond the terms of the contract to allow time for study.

An executive committee comprised of fire chiefs in the county are lobbying to end the current two

# Pat Boone, others used in rip off

**Associated Press Writer** 

TALLAHASSEE - Singer Pat Boone was one of the celebrities used in a scheme that left starry-eyed investors swindled out of more than \$300,000, authorities said.

Calvin Lee Habern, a former movie producer, was arrested Monday in Lake City and charged with multiple counts of fraud and other white-collar felonies that could send him to prison up to 30 years.

From 1989 to 1993, he told investors their money would be used for a variety of projects, including drive-through video rental stores, a medical videotaping service, auto dealerships and TV and motion picture productions. He promised fabulous returns and money-back guarantees.

Instead, investigators said he used the money to buy houses, vehicles and pay operating expenses for his business office in Lake City. Investors never saw a dime.

In all, he took more than \$336,000 from 20 investors, including three doctors in Central Florida and residents of Michigan.

"He's very convincing, very charming, the quintessential con man," said assistant statewide procedutor Gina Smith.

Habern, 62, was charged Monday with 25 counts, including racketeering, organized fraud, money laundering and the sale of unregistered securities. He was being held In the Columbia County Detention Center on \$500,000 bail. If convicted, he also faces a fine up to \$150,000.

Over the past two years, investigators pieced together a complex acheme fueled by the celebrity names dropped by Habern and promises of huge returns on a variety of business deals that never happened, a 36-page arrest warrant says.

One of his favorite celebrities was Boone, who had worked with Habern more than 20 years ago on television specials and maintained contact over the years.

Boone told an FBI agent in February 1994 he had arranged a meeting between Habern and potential investors, including a Kansas businessman who loaned Habern \$150,000 in 1992. He gave Habern the money after hearing his pitch for drive-through video

claimed was about to go public.

Boone. 61. said he received one million shares of stock in one of Habern's companies but told Habern not to use his name to attract investors.

Smith said Boone would not be charged with any crime.

"We had no reason to believe Mr. Boone had any idea that any of those things were going on," she said. Boone was in northern California Monday

and could not be reached for comment, his office in Hollywood said. Investors said Habern also named showman David Copperfield and former talk show host Mery Griffin as celebrities who

had invested in his business deals. Agenta for Copperfield and Griffin told investigators their clients knew nothing

about Habern or his deals. After receiving a complaint from a disgruntled investor in mid-1993, the Columbia sheriff's office, the state attorney's office, the state comptroller's office

and the office of statewide prosecution retraced Habern's paper trail.





# Visit your local YMCA

In today's News Digest Briefs on Page 1 of the Sanford Herald, there is an article about the intersession programs presently being offered by the Central Florida YMCA. Other Y programs are also listed.

One thing about the YMCA organization. It hasn't had the kind of problems which draw everyone's attention. It's probably one of the smoothest operating community service organizations locally as well as nationally.

As a result, people often take it for granted. We fail to realize that the YMCA needs our financial and personal support. We forget how much it does for our youngsters, and what it does for adults as well.

Originally, YMCA stood for Young Men's Christian Association. There was also the YWCA for women. Nowadays, both are combined under one acronym. Actually, it's a total people organization, not just dealing with young men or young women.

We are lucky in this area. There is the Seminole Family YMCA located at 665 Longwood-Lake Mary Road in Lake Mary (321-8944), the Eastside Extension at 1750 W. Broadway Street in Oviedo (359-9622). and the Deltona YMCA at 840 Deltona Blvd., (574 - 7888).

They are not so large in number to allow one to be within bike riding range from everyone, but these locations are certainly within easy driving distance.

Our point here is to suggest that everyone visit their local YMCA facility. It doesn't matter if there are young children in the family or not. If there are only senior citizens, or a group of friends. There are programs conducted by the Y which have been

specifically designed to meet your needs.

In many cases, if there is a need which possibly could be fulfilled but may not be active, a program can be arranged.

Naturally, there is a cost. The YMCAs don't operate free of charge. There are staff personnel, facilities, equipment, property, buildings, and many other needs which have to be financed.

That brings us to the second suggestion. Whenever possible, consider making a donation to the local YMCA.

Drive out to the Y soon. Take a handful of pamphlets which are available for courses and classes being offered. If you have questions, ask them of the staff members.

Among the reactions to the O.J. Simpson verdict was Andy Rooney's contemptuous offer of a million dollars to anyone who can find the real murderer. "I hope," said a member of the defense team, "that he has that money in the

rungs of the control of the control

Rush Limbaugh, more in sorrow than in anger. told his millions of listeners that from now on. there will have to be black juries and black judges for black defendants, and black policemen for black neighborhoods.

A well-spoken woman, calling in to New York's most popular talk-show host. Bob Grant, said that she had seen the Simpson jury on television and their average IQ was just about 75. Grant heartily agreed. A reporter, a longtime liberal, told me that the

verdict proves once again that a murderer with enough money can buy his freedom. On television, blacks in various settings were

shown cheering the acquittal while whites, in their separate enclaves, told of their fury and disgust.

The nearly all-black jury -- according even to usually thoughtful columnists -- had been mesmerized by Johnnie Cochran into "giving a message" to the Los Angeles Police Department and to white justice in general. "Payback time."

It was said, as in a mantra, that those jurors could not have seriously considered the evidence

in so short a time. They were either dumb or racists in reverse -- or both.

Then, forgetting their place, some of the jurors began to speak - on television. Among them were Lon Cryer and Sheila Woods. They spoke in a way that those who savaged the verdict could not have imagined. These black jurors explained their judgment with clear intelligence and attention to the evi-

The jurors who have spoken denied that their being black foreordained the outcome of the case. It is a measure of the large-scale white stereotyping of blacks that this assertion has been so derisively mocked. Rush Limbaugh speaks for more whites, including journalists. than even he may realize.

Barry Scheck, a brilliant illuminator of reasonable doubt, summed it up: "The case taught us a lot about race, about the police, about science and its limitations, and maybe it taught us a lot about each other.'

It taught us, for example, about how little respect many whites have for the thinking capacity of a predominantly black jury. That Andy Rooney and Rush Limbaugh should share such a canard tells us a lot about how commonplace this form of dinner table race prejudice is.

BOSTON — Nobody has ever accused Newt Gingrich of lacking nerve. Any politician who uses a one-month-old baby as a political photo prop gets my badge of courage.

But ever since the speaker held Elizabeth Waldholtz in his arms as he celebrated the first anniversary of the Contract With America, I've been wondering about the line between nerve

Gazing down at the 104th Congress' firstborn child - the daughter of Utah Rep. Enid Waldholtz - Uncle Newtle swore that everything he'd done so far was really for Elizabeth. He informed the babe that she was born into this world owing \$187,000 in interest on the national debt. Then he insisted that he was making a revolution for her sake.

"Our goal was to say to all the children of America: There's finally a generation of elected officials who care enough about your future to endure some change now and to endure some pain now and to take some risk."

At that point, I wanted to snatch the tot away from him, lest she be permanently imprinted with Capitol cynicism. But Elizabeth did what babies often do when grown-ups tell them fairy tales, She cooed.

Well, I don't like the debt that has come attached to Elizabeth's cohort group like twenty-pound diaper pins. I don't want to be part of a nation that drives down a highway bearing the infamous bumper sticker that reads, "We're spending our children's inheri-

But the very idea that this Congress has made budget cuts like a responsible collection of family elders who "care" about the young and are willing "to endure some pain" is enough to make any infant burp up her Similac. As his profile in The New Yorker puts it. Uncle Newtie is a consummate "con artist serving as speaker of the House.'

I don't want to worry you, Elizabeth. Things are going to be just fine for the Waldholtzes. Your momma earns \$133,000, there's a nice bassinet for you in a Capitol hideaway, there's workplace childcare when you're older, and the best medical plan that money can buy. (When you start talking, luv, remember not to call this a government handout.)

Indeed if Uncle Newtie has his way, your folks will not only be getting an additional \$500 tax cut just for having a child, they'll be getting the middle-class tax break. In any case, you won't personally have to worry about school lunches, and if things get really bad, the folks can afford private school.

But the man's a better spin doctor than pediatrician. For one thing, the way his cadre is planning the future, you better get used to

growing up in a generation with a gap between the rich and the ever-poorer children.

At least they are not taking candy from bables, luv. The sugar subsidy has been saved.

Now frankly, you maynotbe personally affected by many of these changes, unless you

grow up to have a bleeding heart. (How kids will rebel!) But there is a big piece of Uncle Newtie's plan that you won't be able to avoid. There's the attack on the environment. Perrier notwithstanding, water and air and soil are things that we all still share.

### Medicare: Ouch! goes a long way

Just thinking about Medicare can make a person need to lie down. The numbers are so complicated, the rhetoric so blinding.

I don't trust Republicans not to let elderly ladies perish from lack of medical attention. But I don't trust Democrats either. Oh, they talk about being so humane and concerned for the aged. But where were they when the Republicans were selling our needlest children down the river? We all know where

they were: They were marching lock step beside the Grand Old Party, voting to end Aid to Families with Dependent Children. our nation's only means of guaranteeing basic support for poor kids. Actually, the Democrats have been pretty useless ever since the Republicans took power last fall. allowing most of the radical GOP agenda to sail through Con-

Only when the Medicare debate came up did Democrate bare their teeth. The problem is,

The rationale behind all of these reforms, of course, is to balance the budget. This is essential to our country's future. The national debt is just about to reach the \$5 trillion mark, and 15 percent of our budget is earmarked solely for paying the interest on that debt. The money taxpayers put into financing the debt is only going to grow unless we take some bold and decisive actions.

For many people that means welfare reform. It's true that the current welfare system is flawed -- for example, it encourages single-parent families by penalizing welfare recipients who marry. But the proposed reforms to send block grants to states, rather than checks to individuals, will do nothing to solve that. States will receive less money but will also be saddled with a requirement to eventually find work for their welfare recipients. That might sound good on its face, but, as those slimy politicians well know, work-for-welfare costs more, not less, than direct subsidies.

Ending AFDC will surely cause suffering. but it will do little to reduce the debt. For all the bellowing our leaders did about welfare queens, the fact is that welfare only comprises about 2 percent of the budget. So even if we managed to wipe out welfare completely, the savings just wouldn't be that great.

By contrast, Medicare is 10 percent of the federal budget - and it's growing at the astronomical rate of 10 percent a year, double the rate of inflation. Republicans want to cut the rate of growth to about 6.4 percent a year. Democrats say that's cruel and inhumane?

It's not hard to see where the Democrats' burst of compassion came from. Unlike the nation's poor, the nation's elderly are a large and powerful interest group, and tampering with Medicare has long been considered political suicide.

Here the Republicans have shown remarkable courage, and many of their proposals to cut spending are eminently reasonable. Encouraging seniors to use cost-saving managed-care plans is a good idea. So is requiring Medicare recipients who make \$75,000 or more pay higher premiums.

That doesn't mean the Republicans are right to propose tax cuts. It's ludicrous to trim \$270 billion from an important social program and then give away \$245 billion in tax breaks. It's fair to ask Medicare recipients to make a sacrifice in the interest of balancing the budget. It's not fair to ask them to make a sacrifice at the same time that other constituents are getting a tax cut.

#### a serious citrus pest leafminer

The citrus leafminer was found, for the first time, in the spring of 1993 in Homestead. Fla. Late in 1993, it was found in many counties in Central Florida. Adults of the citrus leafminer are very small moths, 5 mm. long (an inch is 25.4 mm.) while resting with wings folded. Adults generally are too small to be noticed, and are active during the day and evenings. Citrus leafminer is most cognized by the mine produced by the larvae, usually on the ventral aide of the leaf. Larvae are about 3 mm. long and can be seen inside the leaf mine. The insect is native to Asia, where it is also a serious pest of citrus

Eggs of the citrus lesiminer are laid singly on the underside of the leaves. Eggs hatch within 2-10 days, and immediately the larvae enter the leaf and begin feeding. As larvae feed, leaves curl and become deformed due to the uneven growth of the leaf tissues. Leaf mines are usually formed on the underside of th leaf. Usually only one leaf mine is present per leaf, but under extreme heavy infestations. more than one can be found per leaf. As with other leafminers. larvae are protected within the leaf tissues during their feeding cycle, from predators and some pesticides. A generation of the insect (from egg to adult) can take as little as 15-20 days to

complete under ideal conditions. In Florida generations are produced about every 3 weeks.

Adults emerge about dawn and are active in the morning. other activity may be at dusk or night. Females lay eggs evenings and at night. Adults live only a

Symptome: Leaves with zigzag mines, mainly on lower side of leaf, curiting of leaves. epidermis film over leaf mines. Heavy damage can cause leaf drop.

Heavy infestations can retard growth in young trees and may reduce yields of bearing trees.

Control: The strategy for control is to protect the main flushes. The reason for this strategy is that the insect only affects newly forming leaves. Chemical control is difficult because the larva is protected by the leaf cuticle. Insecticides are expands or new flush develop after the spray.

Spraying must be done in the spring and early summer to be effective, timed to the flush

periods of the trees. The current recommendation for control is to spray citrus oil at the rate of 1-2 tablespoons per gallon of water. Two applications, 10-14 days apart are necessary to protect each flush cycle. It may be necessary to apply a systemic insecticide to the oil to achieve a better control of this insect pest. Malathion plus citrus oil has shown good control of the citrus leafminer in some south Fiorida trials. Also. Agri-Meck plus citrus oil have

produced similar results. Biological control: Native parasitic wasps have been found

reaching 40 percent are reported in some areas. This situation is very encouraging because naturai controls are already present in the area and can be expected to produce some control of the insect without the use of insecticides. How efficient they can be is only a matter of speculation since the observations made are only preliminary.

Cultural practicos: There are

other practices that have been less effective as the young flush suggested and can help minimize the damage of the citrus leafminer and probably reduce the amount of pesticides that may be necessary to control this insect.

· Limit fertilization and irrigation during the winter to maintain trees in good conditions, but not in excess to avoid flushing.

Wait until about Jan. 15 to initiate fertilization and irriga-

• When the trees show new flush, start looking for the sumptoms of damage. To avoid damage, start spraying the citrus oil to protect the new flush.

• If leaves on small trees show symptoms of damage, cut the leaves and dispose of them to avoid reinfestations.

• Controls are more effective

treated and affected leaves are removed. Make sure that your neighbors know about this problem.

• Jaamine, mock orange and other plants in the Rutaceae family are potentially host to this pest. Report any symptoms similar to those in citrus to your local Extension Service.

• Use recommended pesticides.


It must be remembered that. heavy leaf damage will result in reduced bloom as well as reduced growth of the trees. The amount of damage will be approximately equal to the percent of reduction of photosynthetic

More research is needed to develop a sound control program for this insect pest. The use of biological control as the most economical way to approach this problem is promising. There is much to be explored in this area. and maybe, with the introduction of more efficient parasites. we can control this pest in the future.

### It's time to break nicotine gum habit

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife was a two-pack-a-day smoker until she kicked the habit 11 years ago, with the help of Nicorette chewing gum. Although 1 am proud of her for quitting cigarettes and grateful that she is now avoiding the health pro-blems of smoking, I fear she may have traded one bad habit for another: She chews 10 to 20 pieces of the gum daily. Now I am concerned that there may be serious effects from the gum itself. Are my fears justified?

DEAR READER: Despite reassurances to the contrary by tobacco-company executives. nicotine is clearly addictive.

I am glad to hear that your wife has stopped smoking. because the health risks of cigarettes are substantial, and include heart disease, cancer, stroke, and other serious allments. These consequences are believed due to the non-nicotine ingredients in tobacco smoke -principally tars, carcinogens and carbon monoxide.

Nonetheless, as you suspect, nicotine is far from harmless. The drug causes hypertension. constriction of arteries (thereby worsening various vascular disorders), rapid pulse, and chemical imbalances in the body. Acute nicotine withdrawal produces a wide array of symptoms. including craving, nervousness, sleep disturbances, anxiety, swings in mood, and weight

Because of the effects of nicotine. Nicorette's manufacturer advises that the gum not be used by people with heart disease. angina, hyperthyroldism, peptic ulcer, hypertension, or peripheral vascular disease. In addition, the product should not be used for longer than aix months.

To wean patients off Nicorette. the manufacturer recommends the following steps:

1. Reduce the number of pieces chewed by one a day every week. 2. Decrease chewing time with

each piece from the customary 30 minutes to 15 minutes. This releases less nicotine.

3. Replace standard Nicorette

gum with the half-strength variety, containing two milligrams of nicotine, instead of the usual

four milligrams. 4. Substitute sugarless gum (one a day every week).

I agree that your wife has chewed too much Nicorette gum for too long. Since the product is available only by prescription. your wife's physician should be




