



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

A NAVY wife expects to do a lot of moving Helen Morgan—whose husband Ted is a licutenant presently attached to the Naval Air Station in Jacksonville—has packed, crated and shipped their belongings 22 times in the 10 years they have been married.

But to top this, she has chalked up the unusual record of having raught in 13 schools in nine states?

This term she added her first Floroli school to the list. When school opened, there she was, in command of the third grade of Veneria School, adjacent to the large aviation base and arrended by many Navy children.

Although the Morgans arrived in Jacksonville as late as mid-August. Helen had no more difficulty here than in the other nine states in getting the appointment. "There is such a terrific need for teachers!" she explained. "It's the same all over the country. In Texas, for instance, I applied one day and was teaching the next."

Without children of her own, teaching has been Helen's solution to the Navy wife's problem of loneliness while her husband is flying or at sea. She has taught in almost every Navy community where Ted has been based, from little Rhode Island to sprawling Texas. In some schools she was able to complete a full year before Ted was transferred. In two, she taught only three months.

In between times, whenever there was a college nearby, she set about getting the necessary credits required every four years by Arizona State College to keep her teaching certificate active

Inevitably Helen has learned much about the educational problems in this country. For the most part they are inadequate buildings, over-crowded classrooms and not enough teachers. In respect to the latter, she echoes the cry of all teachers, the pay is too low, unequal to cost-of-living demands.

But another problem high on her list is the lack of materials. Children should have access to well-stocked, well-selected libraries. They need construction materials, particularly in the lower grades. They need work space and equipment lack of these means boredom, she says, and boredom is the major cause of misbehavior. "A busy interested child is never an unruly child."

Although she has manuaged to hold a class of 58, she is firmly convinced that the ideal class is limited to 25. More than that means there is little time, if any, for individual attention and the entire



THEY come from All-Florida, a number of other states and even other countries—enthusiastic, clean-cut boys and girls eager to excell in academic work and campus activities—to Florida State University at Edlahessee

All of these young college students have heard about, read about or seen the University's all-student circus, Flying High Most of them want to try-out for it and become a part of it. Circus is sometimes the reason they choose FSU as their university. There is nothing just like this collegiate, self-supporting combination of physical education and fun.

Chances are more people in the world know about Flying High than any one feature of the Florida capital!

It has been featured in magazines and newspapers all over the country, including foreign newspapers where it has been featured after internationally circulated stories and pictures were sent out by wire services.

Paramount: Fox Movietone and Grantland Rice have presented shorts on Flying High, and it has been nationally televised

In seven years of making history and expanding at Florida State University, the circus has gradually become a road show as well as a campus show. Annually, it gives a show in a dozen or more Florida cities and towns and in several Georgia cities—sometimes the troup travels over the Alabama state line to put on a couple of shows.

Plans this year call for the circus traveling as far afield as Chattanooga, Tenn, the home of two of the featured performers, to put on a show. The Patten twins, Charlotte and Phyllis are from Chattanooga. Their parents came down to Tallahassee last spring to see the twins in the big home show. They were so sold on it that they undertook the necessary arrangements for the appearance in Chattanooga. Georgia and Alahama cities will be played on toute.

Some civic organizations usually sponsors the FSU circus in an out of town engagement. It has been used as a crowdidrawing attraction for worthy projects. In 1951 the circus was featured in the Jacksonville Gafor Bowl as a polio benefit, and in 1952 at the Orange Bowl in Miami as a cancer benefit.

Tentative schedule for this year calls for the circus to perform in 16 cities with Miami and Chattanooga the extremes Circus students have to maintain a Cor better average to make road trips. They travel in a special FSU Circus Bus, attention-demanding in itself with its decorations of clown, faces. Circus Director Glenn (Jack) Haskin always rides with the troupe, and on longer trips a chaperone is added. The troupe is kept together when away from campus.

Jim De Cosmo, an FSU graduate who had circus experience when earning his master's degree in physical education, is Haskin's assistant. Be is the circus contact man who travels a day ahead of the troupe on road engagements. He and about eight student riggers, plus a FSU electrician form the advance crew. They ride in a couple of cars followed by a truck carrying the circus equipment and have the heavy equipment set up when the troupe arrives. Each trouper is held responsible for any personal equipment.

History and success of the university circus hinges on Coach Baskin who came to the campus in 1947. He was brought to FSU with Dr. Howard Danford who came as head for the new department, physical education for men. Both came from Madison, Wis, and were alert to the

possibilities in circus training as part of a physical education program on a university campus


Since the first PSU circus was launched by Haskin in 1947, it has developed fast—from a first troupe of 48 members to the current troupe of over 200—from a home show, performing in borrowed costumes on makeshift equipment, to a home and road show of amateurs still, but with professional ability and equipment

An innovation in Flying High this year will be an aerial bouncing trapeze act which was inspired by a Ringling act. It will feature Sue Herndon of Chipley, an attractive junior who spent all her spare time in the hot months working on the tricky trap while attending ESU summer school.

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
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AT Florida Southern College a simple, powerful idea in education is being developed. It is an idea which may well strengthen our nation for the future; and thus provide trained and inspired leadership for the entire free world. The idea is so simple itself that it can be described in two words: "Teach Americanism!"

The goal of the Department of American Culture is simply this: To make better Americans of our young men and women by teaching them the reasons why our nation, with its system of free enterprise, has prospered through 178 years of independence.

Dr. John C. Glenn, who served as pastor of the First Methodist Church, West Palm Beach, for several years, was chosen by Dr. Ludd M. Spivey, now entering upon his 30th year as president of the college, to establish and direct the Department of Culture, Dr. Glenn who faunched this program three years ago is more convinced than ever that it is urgently needed today, because, he says, many young Americans, although surrounded by a eich and hard-won heritage, neither understand nor appreciate that heritage adequately. These young people, growing up in a time of world confusion, do not have the pride they should have in their nation's long-time progress; they do not understand how important is our system of free enterprise, nor why this system is superior to that of Socialist or Communist states; and they only ous frame of mind, rather than some sort of materialistic process.

pride in their country; our future will be safe. If they are taught the nature and purpose of our religious, educational, political and economic systems, they will throw false ideologies out of the window. But truth, to be effective, must be promulgated!

Florida Southern's new program is not one of shotgun generalities. It is based on specific courses which provide students with a groundwork in principles that have made America strong; and which prepare them for the leadership they must assume tomorrow.

Significantly, the Plorida Southern program has been twice honored (in 1951 and in 1952) by Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, Pa., "for outstanding achievement in bringing about a better understanding of the American way of life." The Department of American Culture received the first-place National College Award for '53.

"Therefore," said Dr. Glenn, the director, "with academic achievement nationally recognized, we can with consistency present this important and urgently needed program to the business and professional leaders of Plorida."

"There are three divisions to the Department of American Culture program:

1. The Chair of Americanization.

Specially chosen instructors offer courses for freshmen and seniors. "The history of American Institutions" for freshmen; and, "The History of American Culture" for seniors.

2. The Department of American Culture.

"We have brought within the framework of this Department all important American studies: viz., American

History and Government, the U. S. Constitution, American Music and Art, the Bible in American Culture, American literature and all other specific courses dealing with the nature and purpose of our economic, industrial and political systems.

3. The American Forum.

"Additional impact for the curriculum is provided by the American Forum, a plan under which, authoritative speakers on national and world problems are brought before the student body and faculty in a series of regularly scheduled addresses."

The "Education-In-Americanism" plan was inaugutated this summer by Dr. Glenn. This program is designed primarily for high school seniors and graduates. They will be invited to enter a contest for tuition scholarships. A carefully prepared questionnaire will be sent to them, together with a letter of explanation. Those who submit the best responses, will be considered for \$600 tuition scholarships.

This is a non-controversial, non-political and interfaith program. It is non-commercial, because only the

winners will be benefitted financially.

We have not tailored our academic pattern to the self-serving specifications of any group individual, Subservience to any individual, or group, would result in controls which would destroy private education," said Dr. Glenn. "We believe that private education and private enterprise are dependent upon each other; and that we have mutual responsibilities. This is an opportunity for private enterprise to make a sound investment in Americanism, thus preserving private education."


