## MAGNOLIA IS BUSINESS STREET DESTINED TO REACH THIRD STREET WITH NEW BLOCKS

NEW GARAGE BUILDING STARTS TODAY, BISHOP BLOCK NEARING COMPLETION

### OPENS MUCH NEW BUSINESS

And Demonstrates That Sanford Is Not a One Business Street City

A city with one business street or a business square or a "Main Street" hardly ever grows as rapidly in the business sections as it should. The idea that a business must be on "Main Street" or the public square has a tendency to discourage business expansion and sews up the business of a city around one particular location to the detriment of the business and the business men who want to open up new enterprises.

Fortunately for Sanford this city has never been a "one street town." It has scattered its business houses from the first days of the city building and while First street has always been looked upon as the principal business street there were other streets in the early days and Sanford avenue for instance has always been one of the busy streets of the city. With the growth of the city the business blocks were extended to the side streets and Oak avenue, Park avenue, Railroad way, Second street, Commercial street and several adjoining thoroughfares have been building new business houses and are now building them so rapidly that First street will have to look to her laurels to hold her title as the most thriving thoroughfare. Sanford avenue extends the farthest south in business blocks of all the side streets but Magnolia avenue is running a close second and today the foundations are being started for another big building. Contractor Shinholzer has the contract for the new building and Walter Hand is having it built for the Sanford-Bulck Co. for a sales and show room and garage. It will be fifty-five feet wide and one hundred and seventeen feet long and will be a duplicate of the two big garage buildings recently built by Mr. Hand for Wight Bros. Company. Another new building just opposite this new building is the Bishop Block of three store rooms south of the new Milane Theater and business blocks will soon extend on Magnolia to Third street. This prediction was made by the Herald in 1910 when the Herald building was erected—among the first on Magnolia and while the building boom did not materialize at that time it has come slowly but none the less surely. With the great possibilities of this city being brought to the attention of capitalists Sanford will have at least twelve good business streets opened up in the next five years. In addition to the business houses on the down town streets there are many stores on Ninth street near the A. C. L. station, on Celery avenue, in the suburbs and the nearby territory for many miles around Sanford and it would be difficult at this time to predict where the business streets of Sanford will begin or end in this city in the next quarter of a century. It all shows remarkable growth, steady growth, substantial growth of the City Substantial.

### FRENCH REPLY TO RECENT NOTE FIRM AS EVER

Refuse to Withdraw From Ruhr Until Reparations Paid

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, Aug. 22.—The French reply to the recent British reparations note asserts that France refuses to withdraw from the Ruhr except as she is paid and rejects any plan of international re-estimate of Germany's capacity to pay. France offers to consider the easiest method of exacting payment from Germany when resistance ceases and expresses a willingness to continue the recent discussions with great Britain.

### MEDALS WON BY FLORIDA GIRL.

The following article from the St. Petersburg Times will interest many people here, where Miss Mary Buhner has visited many times and has a host of friends:

The art of the medalist is perhaps, one of the least recognized in this country. It may be because so comparatively few artists take up this difficult branch, as one who does successful has-reliefs must be a combination of painter and sculptor, and must have a comprehensive knowledge of form and light and shade.

The best known workers in this line have been Augustus St. Gaudense, Charles Grafley and John Flanagan. The great war has brought out many things, and perhaps the beautiful medals and decorations of the foreign countries have done much to raise that branch of work in this country.

Miss Mary Buhner, of this city, has had presented to her for bravery three excellent examples which, in themselves, form an interesting collection. The best known is the Carnegie medal. It is three inches in diameter, of gold bronze, and has a bas-relief of Andrew Carnegie, with the words, "Carnegie Hero Fund, Established April 15, 1904," on the front. The reverse is a beautiful example of elaborate low relief work. A finely etched map of the western hemisphere covers the entire surface, and the border is composed of the words, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for a

friend." Surrounding a plaque, which has the words, "Awarded to Mary Buhner, who attempted to save the life of Dorothy McClatchie from drowning," are the coat of arms of the United States, England and Canada.

The decoration—it would hardly be called a medal—given Miss Buhner by the United States Coast Guard, shows a gold eagle's head coming from a wreath of laurel, and hung from a red ribbon the eagle's bill holds a circular medallion on which is shown a rescue at sea. A life-saving boat is being rowed through a storm. In the prow a standing figure is casting a rope to a drowning person, and on the edge are the words: "United States of America, Act of Congress, June 1874." The reverse side is circled with "In testimony of heroic deeds in saving life from the perils of the sea." A second eagle spreads its wings over a shield on which the words presenting it to Mary Buhner are cut, and at whose feet are an anchor, pulleys, masts and other rigging.

This gift is especially valuable, as it has only been bestowed upon 24 persons since the government awarded it.

The smallest medal received by Miss Buhner, but perhaps the one dearest to her heart—since it was the first of its kind given out—is from the Amateur Athletic Union, Southeastern Association. It is very simple, but beautiful. A laurel wreath encircling a ribbon scroll has the single word, "Honor," and on the reverse side, "Awarded to Mary Buhner for heroism displayed."

Apart from being rewards of valor, these three gifts are beautiful examples in the field of the medalist's art.

### "DRIVEN" IS TRIUMPH OF SCREEN ART

Powerful Universal-Jewel Scores Sensational Success at the Princess Last Night

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





FIRPO AND WILLS ARE TO BATTLE NEXT APRIL

NEW YORK, April 22.—Luis Angel Firpo, Argentine heavyweight challenger, late yesterday signed with Tex Rickard to fight Harry Wills, the New Orleans negro, next April in Buenos Aires, regardless of the outcome of his title match with Jack Dempsey at the Polo Grounds September 14.

Shortly after Tex Rickard announced that he had signed Luis Angel Firpo to fight Harry Wills, negro heavyweight, in Argentina next April, Paddy Mullins, Wills' manager, declared that he "would not even think" of signing up with the South American unless the latter took the title from Dempsey on September 14 at the Polo Grounds.

"There wouldn't be the slightest point," said Mullins, "in fighting Firpo in Argentina unless he held the world's heavyweight championship. Wills wants a fight with the champion, whoever the champion is, and not with an ex-contender. If Firpo knocks Dempsey out on September 14, Wills will be ready to sign up for a bout; not otherwise."

The negro fighter's manager declared he had received no word from Rickard concerning the proposed match, nor had he heard anything about it, except through the newspapers. He stated he would not consider the plan announced by Rickard of signing two contracts, one to hold in case Firpo gained the championship and one for use if he lost.

Tex Rickard, when told of Mullins' statement, said he was not surprised. "I've been offering Wills a fight with Firpo for months past," he said, "but Mullins doesn't seem anxious to match him."
