Editorial Comment

Democrat Drama In Center Stage

Political drama of the highest sort and of the deepest implications is taking place as the quadrennial convention of the National Democratic Party enters its final two days in Miami Beach.

Dominating this convention is the figure of Senator George McGovern of South Dakota, whose professional operation of delegate collection with amateurs (many of whom did not know enough to be afraid of historic booby-traps older ones had been caught in before) succeeded. Underlying it is the bold reform of the

political process which has, to the delight of some and the horror of others, enabled grassroot America to select and send to this presidential nominating convention delegates representative of "we, the people."

For Floridians, the most heart-warming event, was the appearance at the convention of Gov. Reubin Askew as the keynote speaker. This is an honorary post. It has usually been noted more for its "sound and fury" than for the substance of its oratory.

This time the young, forceful Askew delivered such a well-organized, skillfully prepared and soundly logical oration that the delegates responded with such approbation to make his first appearance on the national political stage one which could well be but a preliminary to other and even more important assignments.

In doing this the Florida governor added to the lustre which another Florida Democrat had already given the convention when Senator Lawton Chiles addressed the Monday evening assembly and displayed the same honest, straight-forward appraisal of the political situation which won him his Senate seat as the "walking senator" in 1970.

Yet the actors in the drama who had leading roles were not the Floridians. Indeed, it was the absence of some - such as the political master of the power-house in Chicago - Mayor Richard J. Daley - refused a seat as delegate for not conforming with the new reform rules (which are now permanent) that must be given star

Absent, also, in the political support which the McGovern forces had been able to muster was that traditional and important ally which had been lined up with the Democrats in the pasi - organized labor in the person of crusty old George Meany, president AFL-CIO.

Very much on hand, however, was that champion of the "common people" Senator Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota, who had come out of the west in '48 with the lance of a knight to tilt against the forces which were blocking full democracy.

Teachers Plunge Into Big Politics

Congressmen who attended the National Education Association's "Salute to Congress" party probably are unaware that the money raised may go toward their defeat

The \$25-per-person Washington affair in late June amounted to the kickoff of the 1.1 million teacher-member organization's first national campaign of financial support for candidates for the White House and Capitol Hill. It is coupled with similar efforts on the state and local levels by 41

NEA spokesmen said the national organization will not support candidates verbally — on the theory that if they lose, the NEA must do business with the winner - but will contribute money, personnel and time to the campaigns of those "who are proven or potential friends of education."

Spokesmen were unable to explain what a candidate has to do to be a "potential friend of education."

One spokesman said a complete report of income and contributors would be made, as well as the names of candigates receiving bounties and the amounts. But another spokesman said such disclosure would not be made unless required by law and that inquiries as to who contributed how much and which candidate got what would not be answered. Contributors will not be able to earmark funds for candidates, this spokesman claimed.

The NEA plans to issue a "political report card" listing the education voting records of congressmen seeking reelection and apparently will give grades to presidential and vice-presidential candidates.

Direct political action by such nonprofit, tax-exempt organizations as the NEA is illegal, so to skirt the law, the NEA and its 41 affiliates already have or are establishing separate "political action committees."



Pyongyang Wants West Safety Tie

North Korea's Kim II Sung is caught in a bind between Russia and China. And suffering severe economic prob-For years he has kept his country free of complete domination by Moscow and Peking only by the most nimble of dancing acts. He has shifted first to the one, L

then the other By this play back and forth he has extracted arms and economic aid, at one time from Moscow, at another from Peking-and sometimes from both at once. Up to now he has been aided by the rivalry between these two countries and by his own adroitness. There is new evidence that the pressures have now become too great. Like Mao Tse-tung in his fear of Rus-Roren's Kim needs a connection with the West to balance against the two Comm

He needs economic accommodation to lessen his dependence on Russia and China for aid-an aid which is uncertain and tied heavily with strings. He requires some sort of military accommodation with South Korea to cut back on his defense burden, which is overleading his economy and making him too dependent

on Moscow and Peking. Kim, for all his communism, has a deadly fear of domination by either Russia or China, even though he reportedly holds, or once held, Russian citizenship. Curiously enough, it is understood from contacts in Tokyo and Hong Kong that both Moscow and Peking, for reasons of their own, have also been urging Kim to make these accommodations. Russia's hope, these reports say, is that these Western contacts will weaken North Korea's relations with Peking. Peking, presumably, has the same hope in reverse.

In any event, other Tokyo contacts report the eagerness with which Pyongyang has been seeking economic deals with Japan and South Korea, and putting out feelers toward economic accommodations with the West in a variety of areas. The thinking is that North Korea would like western technical and monetary aid and closer contacts generally for the economic and fear of Sino-Soviet imperialism reasons noted above. Officials in the Nixon administration say it is not neces-

sary to put trust in Kim Il Sung to see the opportunities opening to the West offers. it is precisely the same type situation that prompted 'ugoslavia almost two decades ago to ask for belp. Now, some 20-odd years and well over a billion dollars in aid and political backing later, some of the most ardent anti-Communists in this government believe the experiment and investment were worth every dollar in halting Russian expansion in Western Europe, even though Tito remains as determined a Communist as ever. (His defense setup is directed against the Soviet Union to insure against a Czechoslovakian-type takeover.)

The theory is that every move toward independence by Communist nation, however small, is insurance against a Communist front that could endanger the United States and its allies and other nations large and small around

This is where you threaten to hold your breath until you turn blue and/or pick up your chess board and go home

A true inspiration to the youth of America, Bobby Fischer has shown us that these tactics work in this greed

The next question is, so what?

Fischer's performance, the prelude to the world chess championship match in Iceland, should not have surprised 41 us. He has, after all, never said he was sensitive, poised considerate, modest, generous, admirable or intelligent He has said only (though many, many times) that he is the best chess player around, in Brooklyn, the United States, the world and, presumably, the universe. Let us assume that he is right.

Fischer seems to be operating under the belief that because we pay our athletes and entertainers outrageously large sums of money, we should do the same for From his point of view this is reasonable, of course.

But from everybody else's it is super-arrogant nonsense. That we are foolish enough to sanction paying Tom Seaver \$125,000 a year to throw baseballs is no justification for our being foolish enough to sanction paying Bobby Fischer \$200,000 for shoving a bunch of toys around for a For one thing, there is the two-wrongs-don't-make-a-



Bombers Blast Fuel Depots, Ports

SAIGON (AP) - American fighter-bombers hit North Vietnam Wednesday with the heaviest a raids in more than a week, setting fire to fuel depots and supply and port facilities in the Hanoi-Haiphong area, the U.S. command announced today.

The command reported more than 340 strikes were flown, equalling the number on July 5, and said the closest to Haiphong was within a

North Vietnam charged that "many waves" of U.S. planes attacked areas inside and outside Haiphong, that dozens of persons were killed and nearly 200 houses destroyed. Hanoi said an American RF4 reconnaissance plane was shot

The U.S. Command as usual refused to comment on the North Vietnamese charges and made no mention of any plane losses.

POLLY'S POINTERS

African Violets

Hints on Growing

DEAR POLLY-I am answering Mildred, who wanted

to know how to care for her African violet plants. I use African violet potting soil and liquid fish emulsion for feeding (both can be bought at garden shops). When possible. I catch rain or snow water from the eaves as they give the plants more nitrogen. I heat the water, put it in a large flat pan and set my pots in this until they are well-soaked and then put the pots in clean dry dishes but never let them stand in water. Do not water too often but let the soil feel dry to the touch but not for too long. Do not handle the leaves or get water on them. The goose-necked plants are old ones. If plants grow too tall and spindly they need more light. Some (diluted but not direct) eastern and western sun is good but they do like to be kept in one spot. While confined at home during my father's long illness, I grew these violets as a hobby. Many were started from leaves and I eventually had 100 plants that friends said were the loveliest group they

ever saw.-RUTH DEAR POLLY-I use regular potting soil for my African violets and fertilize them every three or four weeks, according to the directions on the African violet fertilizer I use. Water from the bottom but do not let stand after they have absorbed all needed.

The long thick stem is natural as plants get old. Remove from pot, cut off most of this stalk and place the plant in a container of damp vermiculite until it grows nairlike roots (usually in several weeks) and then repot. Before using old pots they should be thoroughly scrubbed then baked in a 150-degree oven for 30 minutes. Mildred is probably overwatering her plants and more die from too much than from too little water. Water thoroughly but then not again until soil feels dry.-WILMA
