Here's a salute to Art Bryant

Bryant, 69, is no stranger

to hospitals.

He's been in and out of them frequently in recent years. A diabetic, he's lost his sight and his right leg. He has also had a major heart attack.

He has retained his zest for life, however. He should all be as active as Art Bryant. He's a remarkable man with a large number of interests - most of them noble.

A recovering alcoholic, Bryant has been an alcohol and drug addiction counselor for more than 30 years. He's a member of the Blind Veterans Association, the Seminole County Sheriff's Police Athletic League Board and the Disabled American Veterans.

"Art is concerned about everything and everyone but himself," said his wife, Noreen.

Bryant gave his wife a long list of chores to do while he was hospitalized. One of the priorities is the Veteran's Day parade in Sanford. Bryant wants everyone to know the Over the Hill Veterans Band will be marching in the parade. "Tell everyone how good these guys are," he said.

Music is another of Bryant's fancies. He plays the drums. He's also the founder and a member of Post 53 Dixieland Rascals Band and a member of the Central Florida Jazz Society. Frequently, Bryant will go to the senior dances on Wednesday afternoon at the Sanford Civic Center. "We have the best music in the world right here," he said.

A Marine and Airy Air Corps veteran, Bryant was appointed to the First Governor's Council on Alcoholism in New Jersey and was elected the first president of the Alumni Association of the Florida School of Addiction Studies at the University of Tampa. He has not had a drink in 30 years.

The community is richer for having Art Bryant willing to assist those who are unable to help themselves. Even as he awaited heart surgery he was busy. "Art gave me my marching orders." Noreen Bryant said. "I don't know how he does all this."

She is praying that her husband will be coming home from the hospital next week. That would give him time to prepare for the Nov. 11 parade. He will hear the Over the Hill Veterans Band and visit with the other vets from the area. He deserves this and more.

Woman says pastor coerced sex act; he denies charge

CASSELBERRY - Pastor Mark George said he wondered what the adult entertainment industry would do next to maintain its stronghold in Seminole County. "When would it happen and how ugly would it get?" George asked.

Wednesday it happened, and it was extra ugly.

A 40-year-old Longwood woman filed a suit alleging that George coerced her into having oral sex in his office on Aug. 19, when she came to him for spiritual counseling.

George called the charge "ludicrous - there's no truth to this at all," he said. "The adult entertainment industry is totally out of control. This is their one last attack before next Tuesday's elections."

A pastor at United Methodist

Community Church, George has battled the strip clubs and championed a public decency ordinance on Tuesday's ballot. He is also running for a seat on the Casselberry Commission.

George said that he had "no recollection" of Patricia Ragan Hoehner, who filed the suit, nor recall her ever coming to him for counseling.

"I was at a Vision Orlando conference at the Sheraton Maitland on Aug. 19," he said. "I don't recall being at the church."

Winter Park attorney David Wasserman, who has many accounts with the adult entertainment industry, said he was hesitant initially to take Hoehner as a client but that after hearing her story and having her take a polygraph exam, he believed her.

"This is a very serious mat-

ter," Wasserman said. "This woman was victimized by someone she trusted. He didn't twist her arm but she gave in to his desires because she thought she had to. She was in a weakened state and gave in."

Wasserman said that his client was "afraid to go to the police," that she needed to be hospitalized and was suffering from the trauma. "She went to the pastor to discuss emotional problems," he said. "And she was betrayed."

Hoehner's name is in both the Seminole County and Orange County arrest books. She was charged with operating a car with a suspended license and leaving the scene of an accident with vehicle damage a year ago in Seminole. She also failed to appear in court on two occasions.

City Oks plans for water facility

SANFORD - The Sanford City Commission authorized final design and permit services for a new water reclamation facility on Beardall Avenue and State Road 46 in Sanford.

Final design plans will be complete in March, 1999, the commission was told by David Gierach, vice president of Conklin, Porter & Holmes Engineers Inc., at this week's hearing. The facility will include a five million gallon reclaimed water tank, capable of storing water for dry periods, and a two million gallon rejected water tank.

"This is a watershed in our development," Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said. "This can really help our community."

As the GreeneWay and the airport both expand, Sanford commissioners said they are expecting the city's population to grow. The new facility is expected to meet the needs for reclaimed water, suitable for public access spray irrigation of residential lawns, golf courses, city parks and properties, and other areas.

The facility at first will handle two million

gallons each day, Gierach said. It will in time be expanded to handle six million gallons a day.

The fee for designing and permitting of the Sanford South Water Reclamation Facility, off-site reclaimed improvements, and off-site lift station improvements is expected to be \$646,245. The fee includes \$121,245 in soil surveys and electrical consulting that will be refunded to the city under a state loan, according to

Because the facility will be located near the Orlando Sanford Airport, the rejected water tank will use closed storage facilities, Gierach said. This will reduce the presence of nuisance birds. Storing waste inside rather than outside will prevent these birds from gathering around waste water, he said.

The facility's safety features will include 24-hour remote monitoring and automatic valving. Water flows will be diverted, so the facility can accommodate Sanford's growth, Gierach said.

"Improvements will need to be made on parts of Beardall Avenue to provide for plant access," Gierach said, adding that the engineers will need to work with a soil consultant and an electrical consultant before beginning construction of the facility.

Police arrest dancers

FERN PARK - Thirteen dancers and two managers were arrested Friday night at Sassy Merlot's in Fern Park by Seminole County undercover agents for violating the county's adult entertainment ordinance.

Undercover agents observed dancers at the club performing private table dances, straddle dances, and exposing anatomical areas without utilizing the required platform or temporary stage raised a minimum of 18 inches above the floor, deputies said.

The way we were: Sanlando Springs

The Longwood development known as "The Springs" was once a delightful privately owned park open to the public. It was known as Sanlando Springs and all Seminole County old timers have fond memories of fun times spent there.

In "Early Days of Seminole County" by Arthur Franke Jr., published by the Seminole County Historical Commission, we find that Sanlando Springs was formerly known as Hooster Springs. Also that on a 1925 map the location was called Palm Springs. There were evidently two springs near each other, Palm Springs and Sanlando.

In 1892, there was a Palm Springs station between Longwood and Altamonte Springs on both the Florida Midland Railroad and the Orange Belt Railway. These two railroads crossed at that station. The present Palm Springs Drive, located between Highways 434 and 436, originally extended to Palm Springs.

About ten years ago, when I interviewed Thelma (Mrs. Robert) Williams for an anniversary program at First Baptist Church, she recalled going on Sunday School picnics at both Palm Springs and Sanlando Springs when she was a

child. Sometimes they would ride the train out there. Once when they went on the Loring's truck, Pastor George Hyman's daughter, Virgie, fell off the truck and broke her arm.

The booklet "Literary Florida", published in 1947, that I have referred to before, has a delightful description of a greatly improved Sanlando Springs.

The accompanying picture of Sanlando Springs is from 1925 and is probably what Mrs. Williams and other old timers remember.

According to this article, it was a tropical park of outstanding loveliness nestled in a natural basin where flowed one of Florida's great springs. It had a daily capacity of more than 15 million gallons of purest water, always at a temperature of 74 degrees.

Through this beautiful 100

acre park also ran a branch of the Wekiva River into which the overflow from the springs formed two waterfalls. The flow was utilized to create a miniature lake with a white sand beach which was shaded by tall, overhanging palms. Opposite the beach there was a natural approach to the main spring where a half circle of masonry and steps led to the water's edge. A great slide was kept busy by bathers of all ages.

There was also a fine swimming pool surrounded by lockers; flowing water from the spring was pumped into this pool.

In 1947, there was a new clubhouse on up the hillside overlooking the Springs; it had been erected after the War. It housed a large dining facility where special parties and luncheons were held. Also provided there was a snack bar and large amusement room.

A large section on the hill was devoted to picnic grounds. Here, under beautiful, big spreading oaks, were large tables, each with its own grill and roofed cover. A large number of groups used these facilities each year.

Also described were the various gardens and walks on the grounds. There was the jungle walk to the hidden spring deep in the forest and also a walk through the gardens in back of the Post House. There were lily pools and floral bowers, winding pathways along the river, massive stands of azaleas, camellias, gardenias and other colorful flowers.

Artists came to capture scenes of unusual charm and photographers had no problems in finding beautiful settings to shoot.

The cost in 1947 for a day's enjoyment in this beautiful garden spot and spring was only 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

My memories of Sanlando Springs go back to the 1940s and 1950s. I recall riding out there on a narrow two lane road (later Highway 434) and that you entered the property through the club house where you paid admission.

The park included the magnificent sulfur springs, always 74 degrees, in a lovely setting. The big slide is always remembers-I'm sure most can recall climbing to the top and looking down that long expanse, getting up enough nerve to go down. And when you did, what a marvelous experience! Shooting down and landing in a shallow part of the spring was exciting! Then, you'd hurry back up to do it all over again.

There was also a huge metal elephant in the lake which was a challenge to try to climb upon.


If you got tired of the spring, you could head for the large pool; completely surrounding the pool were the dressing rooms and lockers. In the late 1950s, these were torn down and the pool was then in an attractive open air setting.

There were the beautiful gardens, as described above. You could wander through them, stopping to sit on a bench to rest and just take in the surroundings.

There was even an outdoor dance floor. I recall being there with groups when some of us would dance; there was a juke box nearby.

I remember going on picnics there with all sorts of groups such as private parties, church and school socials. When I was a student at Seminole High in the early 1950s, we would have our school picnic there during the last week of school. Class Day would be held in the morning at the school and then we'd enjoy the picnic in the afternoon. The class mothers would organize it with help from a committee of students. As you can imagine, it was always fun!

Sanlando Springs was privately owned and operated and it was a sad day for those of us who enjoyed the park when it was sold to a developer. As stated above, it is now The Springs subdivision.

United Methodist Pastor Nick Thompson said "Pastor George is not capable of doing what is being said of him. I know his nature and his heart. This is not something he would do. I do not believe it is true."

County Commissioner Grant Maloy called the accusations "the lowest trick of all by the adult entertainment industry. It's difficult to think even they

would stoop this low."

George said he believed the voters of Casselberry are going to see through the lies and deceit.

There was a flurry of activity at United Methodist on Wednesday as church members

had a great pumpkin sale. The church marquee carried a message to voters: "Vote Yes For Decency in Casselberry & Seminole." Above the message was Pastor Mark George's name. A sign of the times in this town of Casselberry.





In the past, antenuptial agreements, or prenups as referred to by many, were only used by the wealthy to avoid the dilution of assets under certain circumstances. However, with statistics purporting to show that one out of every 100 families in the U.S. generated an income in excess of \$200,000 in 1997, antenuptial agreements are likely to become more commonplace.

An antenuptial agreement is a contract, entered into before marriage by the future spouses, whose purpose is to settle questions of support and distribution of wealth in the event one spouse passes away or the planned marriage ends in separation or divorce. Because an antenuptial agreement usually deals with substantial assets and/or income, as its use becomes more prevalent we are likely to see a rise in the number of challenges to them.

The Courts have established that in order for an antenuptial agreement to be valid the

agreement must make fair or reasonable provision for the spouse waiving a right or rights such as alimony and/or elective share. Naturally, whether something is "fair or reasonable" is subjective and therefore the validity of an antenuptial agreement must be determined on a case by case basis.

The Courts determine whether an antenuptial agreement makes fair or reasonable provision by considering the parties' relative situations. In assessing the parties' situations the Courts compare their respective ages, health, education, and financial status. Based on these factors, if the

Court finds that the agreement makes fair or reasonable provision, the agreement's validity will be upheld.

However, if the Court finds that the agreement does not make fair or reasonable provision a presumption arises that either there was concealment or that one spouse lacked knowledge of the other spouse's assets. In order to rebut either one of these presumptions and persuade the Court to uphold the validity of the agreement, a party may show either 1) that a full and frank disclosure as to the value of the property involved and as to the income of the parties of 2) that the parties had a general and approximate knowledge of the character and extent of the property involved sufficient to obtain a value by reasonable means as well as a general knowledge of the income of the parties.

In other words, if an antenuptial agreement making "unfair or unreasonable" provisions for one spouse is to be

upheld as valid, the parties must have been informed of the other's assets and income. This disclosure is usually in the best interest of both parties because disclosure ensures the validity of the contract if entered into and protects an unknowing or "part-knowing" party from contracting away certain rights without knowing the full extent of their waiver.

As incomes continue to rise the use of the antenuptial agreement is likely to rise with them and the Courts will more often be faced with the difficult and delicate task of ensuring that antenuptial agreements are fair without infringing on the rights of the parties to contract. In the coming weeks we will discuss other aspects of family law.



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

Dugan is best-qualified

Three candidates would like to fill the open Group 6 seat on the bench of the 18th Judicial Circuit, which serves Brevard and Seminole counties. For a number of reasons, David Dugan is best.

Mr. Dugan knew when he was 10 that he wanted to become a lawyer. At law school his specific goal was to become a trial lawyer, which is why he specialized in criminal defense during his three-year Army service.

A lawyer for 20 years, he has handled the gamut - complex civil litigation, as well as criminal, probate and family law - while living most of that time in Melbourne. Yet there has always been time for family and community.

Mr. Dugan's community service has been stellar: Boy Scouts, chamber of commerce, Rotary, church, youth sports. Through such service those who aspire to the bench come to know the many parts of their communities and those they would judge.

Two other candidates seek the same seat. Though the judge sits in Brevard County, all voters in the two counties, regardless of

party affiliation, make the choice.

Jeff Thompson has been a lawyer for 15 years, all of that time in Brevard County. He served three years as an assistant prosecutor, then entered private practice that includes the full range of legal work. He, too, has found time to serve his community in a number of volunteer efforts.

Michael Bross has practiced law for 12 years in a wide assortment of areas, though much of it has been in criminal defense.

Unfortunately, Mr. Bross was charged early this year by the Florida Bar's grievance committee with mismanagement of client trust accounts, for which the state Supreme Court has ordered his practice closed for 10 days and placed him on probation for a year. That is not conduct worthy of a judge.

Neither of the later candidates has the length or breadth of legal experience to match that of Mr. Dugan. Nor can they match his community involvement.

In short, Mr. Dugan is best-qualified. Thus, he is the *Sentinel's* choice for judge, Group 6, 18th Judicial Circuit.

Jen admits to feeling only slightly nervous about speaking in front of an audience of approximately 1,000 people. "I feel comfortable in front of a group of people," she says. "Even if this is the largest audience I've ever addressed, I think I'll do fine."

WINTER SPRINGS - I thought I knew the meaning of the word pain last week. After covering hundreds of basketball, football, volleyball and baseball games, I knew it was time to see my first cross country meet in person.

What could be more boring, I thought. I'll have to stand in the sun for a couple of hours and see absolutely no action. Sometimes I can be stupid and dumb at the same time.

In fact, I liked it so much last week, I looked forward to heading to Central Winds Park yesterday to cover the Seminole Athletic Conference championships. To the uneducated or, in other words, me before last week, cross country is a race where a zillion people take off at the same time looking like ants after a giant crumb, run into the woods and aren't heard from again for almost a half-hour before coming back out of the woods like a scene from *Field of Dreams*.

In couldn't be more unlike that. Heck, cross country is a blast as long as I don't have to try to run that far. There isn't another sport in the county where individuals get so much attention whether they are the winners or losers. The real glory of cross country, I learned, isn't in winning. But that also gives them time to separate from the rest of the pack, the ones who just desperately want to participate. There are few things you'll see more dramatic than the lonely runner, hundreds of yards from the finish line, still sweating and pumping long after the winners started accepting congratulatory hugs from people who didn't mind getting sweat all over them.

They are the real heroes. The ones who finish, as well as the folks who stand around and wait for them to finish.

If you think cross country isn't a serious sport, think again. Check out the girls after the first few cross the line. Runners screaming, crying, holding their sides, then crying again after their finishing kick wasn't enough for 15th place.

Same with the guys. Some of the best races occur minutes after the winners finish when two runners, neck and neck, come running out of the woods trying not to finish anywhere closer to last.

The victory arms fly just as high into the area and the loser is just as upset as the guy who finished second.

In basketball and football, you can always blame your teammates. In cross country, there's only yourself and a day at Central Winds Park made me believe that cross country provides some of the best there is in high school sport.

By the way, the next big meet is districts next Nov. 7 at DeLand. Even if you're still fired about Friday's football, if you want to see some real athletic heroes, make it a plan to attend.





Free Duck Hunting Workshop scheduled for November 14

ROSELAND - The Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) is presenting a free workshop for anyone interested in learning how and where to hunt ducks in Florida.
 The family-oriented event is designed for beginning through advanced duck hunters and those unfamiliar with duck hunting in Florida.
 It is scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 14, from 9 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., at the Roseland Community Center in Roseland.
 Roseland is located in the northeast corner of Indian River County just south of the Brevard County line.
 "The Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission has offered this workshop for the past three years and it's been so successful that it's becoming an annual event," said Ron Bielefeld, GFC waterfowl biologist and workshop coordinator.
 The one day workshop will be packed with just about all the information needed to get started duck hunting in Florida.

By the time it's over, participants will be familiar with what to wear, what equipment is needed, how to set up the hunting area, how to identify ducks, proper hunting ethics, where to go, how to get there, and more.

In addition, there will be a live retriever demonstration, as well as instruction on post-hunting activities such as how to legally transport birds, how to clean them, and even a few recipes on how to prepare them for the supper table.
 "Duck hunting is a great way

to get out and enjoy all the outdoors has to offer. I encourage people to take advantage of this workshop to get the most out of their hunting experience," said Bielefeld.
 The workshop will again be taught by hunters and GFC biologists Ron Bielefeld and Rick Brust.

Bielefeld has a masters degree in wildlife biology from Louisiana State University and a bachelors degree from the University of Wisconsin. His masters thesis was a study of canvasback ducks on the Mississippi Delta.

Brust has a bachelors degree in wildlife biology from the University of Wisconsin where he also took postgraduate classes in biology and wildlife management. His masters thesis dealt with hooded mergansers in Central Wisconsin and he has worked as a GFC waterfowl biologist for eight years.

Bielefeld and Brust are both headquartered at the Thomas M. Goodwin Waterfowl Management Area in south Brevard County.

The workshop has been scheduled to give prospective hunters plenty of time to get ready for the 60 day waterfowl hunting season which begins Nov. 21 and runs through Jan. 19.

It is also an excellent opportunity to prepare children for the special Youth Waterfowl Day on Jan. 23.
 Please call the T.M. Goodwin Waterfowl Management Area at 407-726-2862 if you would like to attend the workshop or need more information.





Don't fret about occasional floater

DEAR DR. GOTT: I belong to a group of elderly golfers, and we read your column every morning. Your recent article on the "floating stool" has caused us some concern. Some of us, who changed our diets in recent years, believe that the phenomenon is related to diet. Others are convinced that malabsorption of fat is the cause. Many of us have floating stools and wonder if we should make an appointment for a checkup. We would rather play golf.



When you brush your teeth, you may be stimulating the back of your tongue inadvertently, with predictable results.

Try this: When you brush, use a gentle and limited stroke, especially when cleaning your molars. Do not touch the back of your throat or the base of your tongue. This should solve the problem. If it doesn't, see your dentist.

DEAR READER: I don't blame you. As it turns out, both the views you've expressed are correct. As I stated in my original column, most instances of floating stool are the normal consequences of lighter-than-water substances in the waste material. For example, air is often incorporated into the fecal matter. Similarly, a high concentration of fiber can also cause the stool to float.

On the other hand, greasy feces (that float) frequently reflect malabsorption of dietary fat. This can lead to nutritional deficiencies and almost always is associated with other symptoms, such as gas, bloating, malaise and weight loss. Moreover, fat malabsorption doesn't come and go; it causes consistent changes in the stool.

Everybody's stools float on occasion. If, however, this pattern is chronic and occurs with the symptoms I mentioned, a medical checkup is appropriate. If, however, you and your golf buddies don't fit this profile, grab your clubs instead.



DEAR READER: No, it's quite uncommon. I doubt that the brand of toothpaste or type of brush are to blame. It's more likely that you have an over-active gag reflex.



Tiptoe through the tulips

By Phillip Alder

Some deals almost play themselves. You try to draw trumps and cash winners. Bad breaks, you're down; favorable positions, you cruise home. More often, though, you must be careful with the sequence of plays. We say that the timing is vital.

What is your initial plan in this six-spade contract? West leads the club queen.

North responded with a "normal" two-no-trump, promising a balanced 13-15 points. In the tournament world, though, almost every pair uses this response to show game-forcing values with at least four-card support for partner's major: the Jacoby Forcing Raise.

The slam looks easy. You win trick

one in hand, cash the spade ace, and play a spade to dummy's king. Bad news — you've a trump loser. And there is a potential problem in the heart department. Will the misers split 3-3? Maybe, but unlikely. And if not, the fourth heart will have to be ruffed in the dummy. How would you play from here?

If you cash the heart king before playing a heart to dummy's ace, you go down. East ruffs and returns his last trump, leaving you with a heart loser in your hand. The secret is to start with dummy's heart ace, then to lead a low heart toward hand. As it cannot help East to ruff, he discards a club. Go over to the diamond king and repeat the process, leading the last heart through East. If he ruffs, you play low. If he discards, you win, then trump your last heart in the dummy. East may overruff, but it will be with his trump trick. Your small-slam bonus is secure.
