Lightning rods stolen from school roof

GENEVA — Police are searching for whoever stole twenty lightning rods off the roof of Geneva Elementary School.

The school's head custodian, Lisa McLaughlin, told Seminole County deputy sheriffs that 20 lightning rods had been removed from the roof of the school over the weekend.

McLaughlin told deputies that on Monday when she returned to school from the weekend she noticed two broken lightning rods on the ground near the rear of the school. She then called the Sheriff's Office, and an inspection crew was sent out.

The crew found 20 lightning rods removed from the roof of the school.

Kathy Phillips, principal of Geneva Elementary School, said that she has no idea who stole the lightning rods. Because the rods are made of brass and copper, they may have been stolen for the re-sale value.

"I suppose it's possible that someone stole the lightning rods to make money," Phillips said. "That's as good an explanation as any I can think of."

The school still has many other lightning rods left on the roof. Phillips does not believe computer systems or other sensitive electrical equipment will be jeopardized by the loss.

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Deputies search for mail thieves

LONGWOOD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating mail stolen in the Sabal Point and Sweetwater area.

Richard Pyburn, 43, called the Sheriff's Office Wednesday to report that he had found a 17 pieces of mail in a traffic island across from his home on Timbercove Circle at about 4:30 p.m. Some of the mail had been opened.

The mail was addressed to five different people at four different addresses in

the Sabal and Sweetwater areas, according to the incident report.

"Bear in mind that it's tax time," said Steve Olson, spokesman for the Sheriff's Office. "This is the time of year when people are waiting for refunds. There is always a possibility that people could be going after the mail at this time of year."

Deputies went to the homes listed on the mail. During the inquiries, residents mentioned seeing a suspicious looking green van, which appeared to be a recently made Dodge or Plymouth.

Residents reported seeing a green van in the Spring Valley subdivision, driving down the street, turning around in the

cul-de-sac, and driving off quickly. The theft of mail is not a new problem in Central Florida. Deputy sheriffs found missing mail on Christmas Day in two different Seminole County neighborhoods, one south of Oviedo, and the other south of Chuluota.

"It's difficult to say if this mail theft is related at all to mail thefts in December," Olson said.

In Woodland Estates, south of Oviedo, mail belonging to at least eight different residents was found on the roadways.

Three principals honored for accomplishments

The elementary, middle and high school Principals of the Year in Seminole County share a common commitment to their schools.

Ron Nathan, the principal of Goldsboro Elementary School, has seen a great deal of change at the school. In 1998, Goldsboro became Seminole County's first elementary magnet school for math, science and technology.

The implementation of the magnet school curriculum was accompanied by the construction of a two-story classroom building, three fully equipped math and science labs, and a multi-media Technology Center having four computer labs with Internet access.

The most unique project just completed on Goldsboro's campus is the Kids Space Center, which includes a mission con-

trol room, space shuttle area, and planet scape, all designed to simulate activities in space.

"Through the space lab, it's a lot easier for students to learn reading skills when it has meaning for them and it is interesting," Nathan said when the lab opened in February. "It makes more sense than learning reading by itself, in isolation. The same thing goes for learning math skills."

Meanwhile, Principal Richard Mossman has been active in starting a remedial reading program for students at all grade at South Seminole Middle School.

Students reading two or more years below grade level are placed in the remedial reading program for at least one semester. Results have been encouraging, as three out of four students improve their reading comprehension by one or more grade levels.

Volunteers needed at theater

SANFORD — Volunteers are needed to help prepare for the May opening of the Helen Stairs Theater.

On Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., a volunteer work day will be held at the newly renovated theater. Grand opening ceremonies for the former Ritz Community Theatre, located at 203 Magnolia Avenue, are set for May 6.

"We need to get dirt off of chairs and mop the floors," said Ron Rose, executive director of the Sanford Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. "We also need to paint the fire escapes. We're just looking for people

that can volunteer some of their time. The more people that come, the quicker this will get done."

A reception will be held at the former Ritz Community Theatre May 6, kicking off a mini-season featuring a play and two concerts.

The main season will begin in September, and last through April, 2001. The season will include three plays and three concerts.

Nearly \$2 million in public and private funds have been used toward the renovation of the theater, located at 203 Magnolia Avenue.

Members of the non-profit Ritz Community Theatre Inc. have gathered \$978,000 in pub-

lic grants and \$800,000 in private funds to renovate the theater.

The theater, also previously known as the Milane Theater, was constructed in 1921. It housed a state-of-the-art theater with a 30-by-60 foot stage.

The downstairs area will have a total of 331 chairs when the theater opens. Another 641 padded, folding bleachers will be placed in the upstairs balcony area until additional theater chairs are purchased.

Programming at the theater will include touring stage productions, children's theater, film series, music performances, meetings and training sessions for businesses, and community events.






Mac is Sanford's salt of the earth

When A. A. "Mac" McLanahan was 11, he saved his money from doing chores to buy a bicycle. He lost his wallet, however.

Extremely disappointed, the boy braced himself to start all over again.

A Kiwanis Club member in his home-town Minnesota showed up a day or two later with a surprise that taught McLanahan to be hopeful even in the darkest hours.

"He brought me a bike," Mac said Thursday. "And it's something I'll never forget."

Today, we do not have a bicycle or a car or a truck for Mac McLanahan. All we can offer is our gratitude for countless good deeds and service to the community that he has called home for 50 years. Sanford without its Mighty Mac would be no place at all.

To begin with, hundreds of youngsters may never had had their own bikes if it hadn't been for the man who remembered his Kiwanis Club gift. As soon as he joined the Sanford Kiwanis, McLanahan helped start a Christmas bike program for the needy.

When I think of Mac, whom I have known for five years, I see him smiling over bikes at the Sanford Fire House — working with the firefighters to repair

those donated or discarded. I also see him in his Navy dress uniform on Veteran's Day. Mac served in World War II and retired as a Lt. Commander. And, I see Mac of Sanford City Commission meetings. He missed only five in 16 years — and deeply regrets being absent at the last four. Mayor Larry Dale has opened each of the four meetings with a prayer that Mac be back soon.

Mac's having another dark hour, as those close to him know so well.

Candie McLanahan, his wife of 53 years, sighs over her Mac's failing health and the accompanying anesthesia. "He's just been playing with our five-year-old granddaughter," she said. "This was good for him — good for both of us."

"When he got sick, I started praying," said Pastor Mary Smith of the Sanford Christian Worship Center. "He's been like my daddy, my right hand. All through the years, if you needed help, Mr. Mac was there to help."

Longtime Sanford resident Ned Yancey recalled when his wife, Martha, ran and lost to McLanahan in a city commission race.

"She scared the heck out of him," Yancey said. "He didn't know if he was going to win or

not. He told that to Martha. 'You scared the heck out of me.' That's Mac. Fiercely opinionated, saying whatever is on his mind. He's a good individual. I hate to see him not physically able. We're all getting older."

Sanford Commissioner Velma Williams said that McLanahan lends "invaluable wisdom" to the city commission.

"As I've become more familiar with Mac, the more I've grown to respect him and to like him," Williams said.

One of McLanahan's recent contributions to the city was serving on the special committee to reorganize the Sanford Police Department. If there was one constant at the meetings it was Mighty Mac pleading not to disband the SPD — not to turn it over to the Sheriff's Office. Every SPD cop who can count to three ought to be grateful.


McClanahan's failing health prevented him from being at the city commission meeting that delivered a definitive motion on the Fourth Street soup kitchen. Truly, the anchor man for the commission, Mac McLanahan is eager to help solve the dilemma.

"I'd like everyone to make this work," he said.

How long will it take for Mac to be back?

"Pray with me that it won't be too long," he requested.

Father Hughes celebrates 25 years in the priesthood

CASSELBERG — Dempsey and Bowser are going to have the St. Augustine Church rectory to themselves next Wednesday. Father Michael Hughes, the church pastor, is going to be in downtown Orlando to celebrate his 25th anniversary in the priesthood.

Dempsey and Bowser are Father Hughes' pet boxers — blessed pals.

Father Hughes recently came back to St. Augustine after serving as principal of St. John Neumann High School in Naples and as pastor of the Church of the Resurrection of Our Lord in Dania Beach.

On the occasion of his 25th anniversary as a priest, 58-year-old Hughes and ten other priests in the Diocese of Orlando will renew their vows at St. James Cathedral. They do this at what is known as a Chrism Mass, where

sacred oils are blessed and consecrated for use during the following year.

Hughes, a native of Philadelphia, was ordained on May 24, 1975, by Bishop P. Joseph Gommern at Our Mother of Consolation Church in Chestnut Hill, Pa.

"That's awhile ago," said Father Jack Flynn, the Associate Pastor at St. Augustine. "Father Hughes has been a good priest, serving wherever he has been called."

Father Flynn said Father Hughes was a member of the Augustinian order, one of the earliest in the church. "The Jesuits," Father Flynn said, "call themselves the Society of Jesus. But the Augustinians were before them."

This is Father Hughes' second call to St. Augustine Church. He served there as an associate pastor upon his arrival in Florida 20 years ago after being the principal at St. Nicholas of Tolentine High School in the Bronx. He returned

to St. Augustine last year. "I'm especially glad that Father Hughes is back," Father Flynn said Thursday. "He's a good cook, especially at barbecues."

St. Augustine became a parish in 1969 and now serves 1,800 families. Two former pastors — Father Dennis Harten (11 years) and Father Joseph Genito (5 years) are returning for a number of celebrations at the church for Father Hughes.

Good economy doesn't mean people are happy

Are we kidding ourselves when we — and the politicians — speak of the good times in which we are living? True, more people have jobs than ever before, but are we really happy?

We have more luxuries than our parents and grandparents ever dreamed of, but we are coming to appreciate what that person meant who said, "Until you have a new house, a new car or a new refrigerator, you can't possibly imagine how little they are going to mean to you."

Jesus was hinting at the same idea when he said, "What doth it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" Could this be happening to us?

A headline in the newspaper the other day read, "Pessimism growing in U.S." We are coming to realize that

having things and being happy are not the same things. The other day, I heard a young mother say that her family's next house is not going to have an electric dishwasher because their children are "missing the wonderful experience of doing dishes."

While children are likely to consider it a chore and grumble about it, doing dishes with someone else can be fun and enjoyable. The conversation is easy and relaxed, and in some ways it is better at bringing two people closer together than sitting at the dinner table.

Prosperity has also deprived us of the virtue of thrift. We have not learned that the satisfaction that comes from self-denial cannot be matched by self-indulgence.

"You would think that

economy would be one of the easiest habits in the world to break, but it isn't," said Norman Vincent Peale, in relating an incident when he chose to lug three suitcases off a train even though he was surrounded by redcaps.

Before he had left home, his wife had told him explicitly, "Norman, be sure to get a red-cap to carry your bags." He said he would. So why didn't he?

"Some faint voice from the past," said Peale, "some echo of the rigid economy taught to me in childhood, spoke up sternly in the back of my mind, asking if it were really right to pay for a service you could perform just as well yourself."

Ah, yes — a voice from the past. I know exactly what Peale meant.

I recall getting a shoeshine once downtown. My father walked by, and I remember being just a little afraid he might look in and see me.

I was 30 at the time, a grown man earning my own

living, but still I could imagine my father saying, "What are you doing having someone else shine your shoes? We have plenty of polish at home under the basement stairs."

Radio helped keep people's spirits up during the Depression in the 1930s. Eddie Cantor sang "Happy Days Are Here Again" and Ben Rigmie began his weekly program by asking, "Is everybody happy?"

Well, a lot of them must have been happy, because when they look back on those lean years (speaking Wall Street parlance), a wave of nostalgia washes over them. They can explain it in only one way: "We had everything but money."

Nobody wants to say, "What this country needs is another Depression," but it is ironic that more people are suffering from depression in these "good times" than they did when we spelled the word with a capital D.

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
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Wife wants to cut off chapters from tales

The thefts apparently occurred the day before Christmas, investigators said.

In Pickett Downs, south of Chuluota, mail from several mailboxes was found scattered in wooded areas and side streets. Investigators believe that these thefts also occurred on Christmas Eve. Some of the mail had been opened.

Previously, on Dec. 21, three additional mail thefts were reported in the Bear Lake area of Seminole County.

In two of the cases, the victim said their outgoing mail was taken before the postal carrier was able to pick it up. One of the victims stated two

checks were included in the stolen mail.

The third victim said his mail was stolen during the weekend, and a neighbor found some of the Christmas cards he mailed strewn across a yard.

There were mail thefts reported periodically throughout the month of December in the Bear Lake, Pickett Downs and Longwood areas of unincorporated Seminole County. Orange County has also reported mail thefts.

Investigators in December identified at least one suspect they believe was involved in the

outbreak of stolen mail. The suspect's name has not been released since no arrest has been made, authorities said.

Federal authorities and the U.S. Attorney are investigating the mail thefts.

The thefts were first reported Dec. 9 in Seminole and Orange counties. The Bear Lake, Chuluota and Longwood areas were also hit by thieves who take outgoing mail from residents' mailboxes.

Cards and letters that have no value to the thieves were discarded in the road, investigators said.

Students at South Seminole Middle School this year placed first in the Regional Youth Eastern Consortium of Minorities in Engineering Competition.

Mossman is the Middle School Principal of the Year for Seminole County.

"It's certainly a very nice honor," Mossman said. "I'm kind of overwhelmed by it. A lot of great things are happening at South Seminole. We have a great group of kids."

At Lake Howell High School students have made significant progress on the High School Competency Test. Scores improved from 77 percent passing in Communications in 1997-98 to 92 percent in 1998-99. In math on the HSTC-T, the passing rate improved from 76 percent to 86 percent during the same period.

Lake Howell Principal Don Smith is the county's high school principal of the year. "It's really a tribute to the school," Smith said. "The teachers, students and staff are working so hard. I have the easy job."

In Communications Lake Howell scored the highest in the school district and second highest in the district in math. Participation in Advanced Placement courses has grown from 199 candidates in 1997-98 to 399 candidates for this school year. For the 2000-2001 school year, 231 students have requested AP courses.

In addition, Lake Howell has focused on a comprehensive alternative education program. Lake Howell is the only high school in the school district to initiate the concept of a ninth grade counselor who works exclusively with freshmen students.

This counselor holds orientations for students in small groups and seminars in such areas as time management, study skills, and stress management.
