Punch Infant Dies Sunday

Robert Punch, 27 months old, died in the Gainesville Medical Center, Sunday, after a short illness.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Punch, Sanford, the child was born in Dallas, Texas, on July 10, 1946, and has lived here with his parents for the past year.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a brother, Gregory, 15 months, grandparents Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Kinkaw, Sanford and Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Punch, Gainesville, Wash.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a. m. Wednesday at Holy Cross Episcopal Church, with Father John W. Thomas officiating. Interment will be at Oak Lawn Memorial Park, Sanford. Burial services will be in charge of the arrangements.

Speaking before the group on the subject of just how the Soviets go about taking over a country, Baltrusis described how Soviet Russia "liberated" Lithuania from Poland.

He said that after Soviet troops had marched into Lithuania on their "liberation" mission they charged the minister of external affairs with allowing Lithuania civilians to "attack" their "liberators" and said that it would be necessary to send in more troops to defend themselves against the civilian population.

The president of the country fled to Germany, Sweden and later to the U. S., and Soviets "appointed" a new president.

Arrests began immediately, Baltrusis said, with all government, army, teachers, professors and police officers being charged with various crimes and imprisoned, many executed.

New officials were "appointed" to fill all the vacated posts and the arrested ones were denounced as "enemies of the working people."

An election was held with everyone forced to vote, but

the vote was only yes or no. Baltrusis said that everyone he talked to said that they had voted "no," but with the Communists counting the votes, they announced that it was unanimously "Yes."

Soon after the election, Baltrusis, a delegate of the "new Lithuanian Government" went to Moscow and "thanked the Soviets for saving their country and begged to be admitted to the Soviet Brotherhood of nations."

In Lithuania, arrests continued, and anyone with any property or goods was denounced as a "capitalist" and his lands and goods taken away, and divided among other people. Immediately, high quotas were set up for the people to donate to the government and when the cartloads of grain and supplies began to arrive at the government warehouses, pictures were printed showing how the "grateful people of Lithuania had voluntarily delivered their grain in gratitude for their liberation."

Recognize Cuban Exiles - Herlong

Castro has been so downgraded and humiliated by Russia, that now is the time to recognize a Cuban government in exile, and give them every possible assistance, Congressman Syd Herlong told the Herald today, before his meeting at the Chamber of Commerce.

The congressman declared, "If we recognize the Cuban exiles now, we need not expect the same result as the Bay of Pigs, because now the Cubans are hungry."

Cuban Arms Blockade 'Lifted' By U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States at dawn today lifted its Cuban arms blockade for 48 hours while United Nations Acting Secretary General Thant will be in Cuba arranging for removal of Russian missiles.

Thant and a party of UN military and diplomatic experts were due in Havana today to work out with Premier Fidel Castro plans for admitting UN observers to verify dismantling of the Soviet weapons which produced a near-war crisis last week between the United States and Russia.

The United States halted aerial surveillance flights over the island for a two-day period at the request of Acting UN Secretary General Thant.

Castro, his angry demands to the contrary, appeared to have little choice but agreement with any plan approved by Russia. The Kremlin seemed unimpressed by Castro's insistence that the United States would have to give up its Guantanamo Bay naval base.

The naval blockade was suspended by the White House at Thant's request. No mention was made in the White House announcement of aerial surveillance which continued through Monday.

Adams Sticks Neck Woy Out

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Secretary of State Tom Adams defied the experts Monday and predicted that three-quarters of Florida's two million eligible voters will be at the polls Nov. 6.

His prediction of 1.5 million turnout, if it comes true, would provide the biggest off-year vote in Florida history.

India Troops On Offense; Reds Meet Heavy Artillery

NEW DELHI, India (UPI)—Indian troops went on the offensive today for the first time since the Communist Chinese stepped up their invasion of the border regions 10 days ago.

A government spokesman announced the switch in Indian tactics by saying the New Delhi forces had moved into a limited offensive action in the Northeast Frontier Agency.

"In the NEFA our troops are probing forward in the vicinity of Jang and have engaged the Chinese positions with artillery fire," he said. "Jang is about five miles east of the important town of Towang, which fell to the invaders last week."

The spokesman said that in the Lohit division of the NEFA "our troops engaged Chinese positions with heavy mortar fire."

This was the first mention of Indian forces using heavy mortar fire since the undeclared war started.

The spokesman also announced that in the Siang frontier division in the central NEFA Indian troops withdrew from one forward post following a third Chinese attack. The outpost had withstood two previous assaults, but was forced to yield on the third.

Elsewhere in the NEFA and in Ladakh on the northwestern border, the spokesman said, "There has been no change in the situation since Monday."

Previously, the Indian army chief of staff told his embattled forces that the invaders were being held "on all fronts."

In a special order of the day, Gen. P. N. Thapar promised the hard-pressed front-line troops:

"You will get everything necessary to resume the offensive."

The order was India's first official announcement that its troops have been able to stop the Chinese Reds in both the eastern and western sectors since their mid-October breakthrough. It also contained the first promise of stepped up firepower along with a pledge to take the offensive.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru suspended his neutralist policy Monday long enough to send the United States an urgent plea for infantry supplies that could be rushed to the northern border area.

Officials in London said two Royal Air Force Britannias loaded with small arms were dispatched to India during the weekend. Reliable sources said Nehru also appealed for arms from France and Canada.

An embassy spokesman said Monday that U. S. military equipment would be flown in before the end of the week.

Thapar's special order said: "In the last week, forces guarding our mountain frontier have been attacked by a treacherous enemy. You have been greatly outnumbered by an opponent who was able to bring more firepower on you than you could muster. In spite of this, you have all recovered quickly from the first shock and rallied."

Kerr 'Shocked' At Mayfair Sales Talk

Everett Kerr, manager of the Mayfair Inn on East First Street, said today he was taken completely by surprise by the New York Times notice that the hotel, motel, country club and baseball installation were on the verge of being sold.

He pointed out that over \$50,000 is currently being spent to remodel and redecorate the famous hotel, and "you don't spend this kind of money if you are going to peddle the thing."

New Violence Hits Oxford

OXFORD, Miss. (UPI) — Mississippi University of Mississippi students, shouting "Yankees go home," Monday night threw soft drink bottles, eggs, and firecrackers at the soldier guards of Negro student James H. Meredith.

No one was hurt and there were no arrests in the demonstration which began at the university cafeteria while Meredith was eating dinner and later spread to the Negro dormitory where it continued well into the night.

It was the worst demonstration on the campus since the bloody rioting, touched off by

Meredith's admission Sept. 26, that killed two persons and injured several hundred others.

There was no apparent attempt to harm Meredith. He emerged during the melee in front of the cafeteria and went virtually unnoticed back to his dormitory, Baxter Hall.

The later demonstration outside Baxter Hall occurred at the opposite end of the dormitory from Meredith's apartment.

Several soldiers and U. S. marshals chased a few of the students who hurled eggs, bottles and firecrackers at a jeep-load of soldiers outside

the cafeteria.

They were unable to catch the youths, however, and the crowd of about 200 students broke up after campus police chief Burns Tatum jokingly told them to "let them (the soldiers) go on now. I've run the jeep off."

But students later began harassing soldiers standing guard outside Baxter Hall by tossing firecrackers and loud-popping "cherry bombs" down dormitory windows. A group of several hundred students gathered in front of a dormitory across the street from Baxter Hall.

Dean of Students L. L. Love was talking with students inside Baxter Hall while the disturbance went on outside. There have been reports of consistent harassment of Meredith, such as slamming doors, shooting and fireworks, by students in Baxter. Student sources quoted Love as saying he had advised against housing Meredith on the campus but that he had been overruled by Justice Department officials.

Love later walked over and urged the students to return to their dormitories and the group began dispersing.

Priest Shoots, Kills Knife Wielding Killer

CHICAGO (UPI) — A Roman Catholic priest today shot a knife-wielding burglar who had stabbed to death the housekeeper of his rectory and critically wounded the cook.

The Rev. Stephen O'Donnell pastor of St. Patrick's Church, wounded the assailant and held him for police after being roused from bed by the screams of the women downstairs in the rectory.

The victim was Miss Bridget Walsh, 48, who was pronounced dead at Cook County Hospital. Also stabbed was Miss Margaret Walsh, 35, who was taken to Presbyterian St. Luke's Hospital. Both were natives of Ireland who came to this country 14 years ago and had worked at Chicago churches for most of that time.

Police said the burglar, identified as Larry Vernon, 22, San Antonio, Tex., entered the rectory by smashing a front window, reaching through it and then opening the door.

The women, whose bedrooms were on the first floor, awoke and he attacked them with two butcher knives he had grabbed in the kitchen.

They tried to run for help, Betty Bell unconscious at the foot of the stairs leading to the second floor, and Peggy collapsed halfway up them.

Father O'Donnell and the curate, the Rev. Daniel Hollan, came downstairs to find the killer ransacking the sitting room of the rectory, located behind the church just west of Chicago's area of factories and warehouses.

The priest shot Vernon in the leg with a .45 caliber automatic pistol when the latter rushed at him with a knife. Hollan called police, who took the attacker to the hospital at the city jail.

Local Parole Office Reports Heavy Load

The Sanford District office of the Florida Probation and Parole Commission has completed a total of 104 investigations of various types during the first nine months of this year, Supervisor James Lee has reported.

These included pre-sentence investigations, a detailed and analytical case history and investigation of the defendant and the offense made prior to sentencing for local judges having criminal jurisdiction.

Pre-parole investigations, which are case history studies for the parole commission as an aid in determining possible future parole consideration and other special investigations, including studies for the Pardon Board, reciprocal investigations for other states and those concerned with the re-location of probationers and parolees were made.

During this nine months period, parolees under supervision earned in the course of productive employment, \$144,537, supporting an average of two and one half dependents each and paying more in taxes than the cost of operation of the local office, Lee pointed out.

During this same time, \$912.25 was paid as restitution and support to victims of original offenses or to meet

Eisenhower Praises JFK Stand

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, stumping for Republicans in New York, has praised President Kennedy for his stand on Cuba but charged his administration is staging a "give-away program."

In a speech at Syracuse Monday night, Eisenhower said the Democrats "seem confident that a majority, in even a sovereign state, can be largely influenced by the innuendo that one candidate has no access to federal funds and his opponent has free entry through all doors in Washington."

"Unhalted in their ways," Gov. Edmund Brown returned to California from Washington and called his department heads together to congratulate them because the Republicans had been unable to find any scandal. "After 13 months they haven't been able to find a glove on you," he said.

Brown and former Vice President Richard Nixon appeared to have come up with a new campaign issue out of the Cuban crisis. Brown says California is among the leaders in state civil defense preparations.

But Nixon, speaking to workers in Sacramento, said California lags far behind New York in civil defense because New York has a Republican governor.

Sen. Alexander Wiley, R-Wis., met with Eisenhower in Washington to discuss Cuba. Wiley said he plans to go back to Wisconsin to resume his campaign for re-election "in a few days."

His opponent, Gov. Gaylord Nelson, continued to criticize him for not spending more time campaigning. Wiley called Nelson "stupid" for such criticism and once called him a "nitwit" when Nelson criticized the senator's Medicare vote.

Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey said he thought Democratic prospects were good and getting better in Wisconsin, Minnesota, his home state, and South Dakota.

But he said the gubernatorial fight in Michigan was difficult to judge. Gov. John B. Swainson, running for re-election in that race, got help today from New Jersey.

Gov. Richard J. Hughes of New Jersey planned to fly to Flint to give Swainson a boost.

Jacoby On Bridge By Oswald Jacoby

Here is a hand which presents several lines of play, but there is only one right one. That is to take East's king of spades with the ace, lead a club to dummy and play either the jack or nine of diamonds. If East covers you win the trick. If East ducks you let the card ride, repeat the finesse, cash your king, go back to dummy with the other high club and run off the rest of the diamonds. This gives you 11 tricks with a possible 12th if West is careless in his discarding.

The play is a cinch for an expert, but most average players will overlook it. Some will start by ducking the first spade and even a second if

the suit is continued. If West continues with a third spade these players will lead the king of diamonds, concede a diamond trick to East and make only 10 tricks. If West shifts to a heart these declarers will probably go down two tricks.

Better players will see the heart danger and will win the first spade. They will also note that they cannot afford to let East in with a diamond, but they will overlook the need to leading the first diamond from dummy.

The mistake is to lead the three of diamonds at trick two. West will show out and the declarer will have no way to run more than three diamond tricks.

CENTRAL CIRCLE
By Mrs. E. W. Turner
Now is the time to be thinking of planting a few bulbs. The Easter Lily is one of the most popular garden bulbs in the Peninsular State. Some gardeners take the bulbs up in July, when they die down, and rest them for two months.

Preparation of the bed, before planting, is a very important phase of bulb culture. The first thing to be considered is drainage, as most bulbs require a soil that is not boggy. The soil should be prepared by turning in a three or four inch layer of peat, sewage, sledge, manure or rich woods soil, fortified with super phosphate at the rate of five pounds per 100 square feet.

Ask your county agricultural agent to help decide which chemical treatment will free your soil bed of harmful organisms such as nematodes etc. Plant the bulbs in the earth so that they are covered with about twice their own thickness of soil. They may be planted in neat rows or in naturalistic drifts for informal garden effect. After planting is completed, run the sprinkler to firm the soil and no more care will be needed until growth is above the ground.

Reasonable after care is needed if your garden produces blooms. After care includes fertilization during growing weather. If the dry variety is used to be sure to run the sprinkler a long time to put the chemical into solution and wash it down through the organic material. Unless bulbs are dried off at the end of growing season, keep moist at all times.

Amaryllis is another one of the most beautiful bulbous plants in this area. They may be left in the ground, but when lifting is needed, now is the best time to do the work, while the root action and foliage growth are at a minimum. A rich well drained soil with partial shade is best suited for amaryllis.

Watsonias, cornus plants, are lovely in the garden. They are natives of South

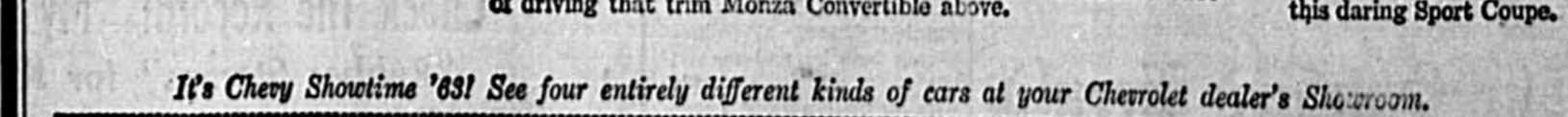

Overshadowed Conflict

China's massive advance into India on two fronts make one thing clear: This was no sudden "escalation" of the border skirmishes that have flared along the China-India border for the past three years. It was a well planned, timetable-executed invasion.

The Indians have now been forced to see the Red's true character as it is seen by others who long ago became disenchanted with Mao Tse-tung's "agrarian reformers."

It is unlikely that an all-out attempt to conquer India is in the minds of the Chinese — right now. Their strategy is apparently of the familiar "salami" variety.

Having readjusted the border line closer to their desires, and having taken over many extra thousands of square miles of Indian territory in the process, they are at the moment satisfied.

Thus their new offer of negotiations, preceded by a 12-mile withdrawal by both sides from the present line. This would still leave them well inside India.

Even if India were to accept this

as the status quo, how long would such a truce be observed by the Chinese? India is a large mouthful even for China, but not impossible to digest if she lets herself be nibbled a-way bit by bit.

China's ultimate intentions aside, India is still in somewhat of a predicament. She could buy peace by agreeing to exchange the Ladakh area in the northwest, much coveted by China, for Chinese recognition of the old McMahon Line in the northeast. China has suggested this before.

Or India could refuse to negotiate on this basis and continue to fight, with no clear hope of forcing the Chinese back to where they were in September.

Neither side can look for much outside help. Both Russia and the United States have other problems on their hands. Russia, while wooing India to the extent of selling arms to her, does not want to alienate China completely and is urging negotiations.

As of now it is between India and China. It could be a long, bloody affair.

Campaigns Shaping Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The 1962 election battles for Congress and governorships moved into the final campaign week today under clouds for both major political parties as a result of the Cuba crisis.

Decisions made by millions of voters on Nov. 6 will test President Kennedy's mid-term popularity and help decide the political futures of his 1960 Republican opponent and at least two prospective 1964 GOP foes.

But the campaign reached its final with Kennedy on the sidelines so that he could devote full attention to the Soviet missile threat in Cuba. And Kennedy dulled the edge of one of the GOP's sharpest issues—Cuba—by declaring a naval blockade against further Russian arms shipments there.

The campaign began last month with Kennedy as the Democrats' biggest traveling star and major hope in areas where Republicans appeared to have gained ground in at least early skirmishing. In some cases, GOP candidates made Cuba one of their major lines of assault, accusing the Kennedy administration of failure to block mounting Soviet threats from that island.

To use one of Kennedy's favorite clichés, the Cuban crisis was fraught with peril. But it also was fraught with political irony.

For Kennedy tried through some one-shot speeches in September and two jam-packed weekends of campaigning in October to play down Cuba as an issue. He hit hard on bread-and-butter issues — the minimum wage, Social Security financing of medical care for the aged, new jobs for the unemployed and more compensation for the jobless.

Only once, at Indianapolis, did he swing his hardest punch at the Cuban issue.

And then it was to denounce GOP campaigners, particularly Indiana's Republican Sen. Homer E. Capehart, for demanding such strong action as a blockade or even invasion.

"This is a time for men who speak softly and carry a big stick," Kennedy said by way of echoing former President Theodore Roosevelt. And Kennedy assailed "those self-appointed generals and admirals who want to send some one else's war to war."

Capehart and other Republicans who slugged the administration about Cuba, have lined up now in support of the President's arms blockade and his other policy actions in this field. They also are adding a clear "I told you so" to their expressions of support—but there is less political excitement to this than to their previous "do nothing" charges.

Kennedy's cancellation of campaign trips to a number of states this weekend and next added still more irony to the political drama.

By embarking on a barnstorming schedule which was to have taken him 19,000 miles from coast to coast and from the nation's northern border states, Kennedy put his prestige squarely on the line even though he was not a candidate himself.

His mission was to stir up interest wherever he went, to diminish spathy among the voters. Democratic leaders felt that if people could be gotten to the polls on Nov. 6, there would be enough members of their party to turn the threatening tide.

As soon as he finished his radio-television address Monday night on the Cuban problem, Kennedy announced he had called off further campaigning. So did Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, who had a similarly large sched-

ule. And at Kennedy's direction, so did all members of his cabinet.

But Democrats now were hoping that the Cuba situation of itself would end voter spathy. And they were hoping for a general feeling among the voters that at a time like this they ought to stand behind the President at the polls.

Possibly sensing this, former President Dwight D. Eisenhower—the Republicans' opposite number to Kennedy in the fall campaign—emphasized at a political rally in Gettysburg, Pa., this week that while Americans should rally behind the President on Cuba they still were open to oppose him on other points and at the ballot box.

During the period of his own campaigning, Kennedy faced a situation different from his own electioneering in 1960, when he appealed to Americans to elect him president so that he could "get this country moving again." This year, as President, he urged voters to send more Democrats to Congress "to help us finish the job" that he began in his first two years in office.

At the same time, he had hoped to go to California—one of the visits he called off—to lend his presidential glamor and prestige to Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown in his tough contest against former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, Kennedy's Republican adversary in 1960.

Kennedy already had been to the home states of two Republicans included among those considered most likely to succeed Nixon in 1964 as the GOP standard bearer. In New York, he campaigned on behalf of Democrat Robert M. Morgenthau, waging an underdog fight to unseat Republican Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, or at least make him look less popular than before.

And in Michigan, he spent almost a full day campaigning with Democratic Gov. John Swainson who is fighting a powerful challenge from Automobile maker George Romney.

Before bowing out of the campaign, Kennedy also carried his political fight to Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia, Minnesota, Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, and—if a theoretically "non-political" Columbus Day speech can be included—New Jersey.

Against Rockefeller as against other Republicans, Kennedy's job as a coattail dragger was in many ways tougher than his job as a candidate in 1960. This year as in 1960, he hailed his own party as the one that has fought for social and economic advancement since the 1930's and could push proposals of that sort through Congress if there weren't so many Republicans there.

But in 1960, Kennedy was fighting Nixon a political enemy both he and the voters could see, in a conflict with all the drama of a man-to-man encounter.

In 1962, Kennedy was fighting an invisible foe. And he was championing himself only indirectly, while brandishing verbal cudgels on behalf of other candidates for office—men running for the House and Senate, and for governorships.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — It is now admitted by even the most conservative United States intelligence sources that the big Russian military build-up in Cuba began last July. For three months considerable reports showed only defensive and short-range anti-aircraft missiles were being delivered. This apparently lulled American officials into a false sense of security on Cuba.

For all this time, Cuban refugee sources were reporting far heavier shipments of Russian arms to Cuba and the arrival of far more Communist "technicians" than official sources could verify. Early in October, however, the refugee reports began to check out.

Confirmed now by United States air reconnaissance photos taken over Cuba, they indicate that American intelligence services—in their cautious desire not to fall for exaggerated rumors—may have seriously underestimated the build-up.

If this in any way delayed the Kennedy administration in making its decision to blockade shipments of offensive weapons into Cuba, it was another serious intelligence blunder.

As an example, the Cuban Student Directorate—a former underground resistance unit now operating from a Miami headquarters—reports 87 ships brought over 800,000 tons of Communist supplies to Cuba, July to September.

It puts the number of people from Communist countries arriving in Cuba at over 9,000 — double official estimates. The number of armed men in Cuba, including Cubans, is put at 300,000. All are said to have automatic weapons.

The command is under Russian generals, operating from three top floors of a large building in Havana, with field headquarters in central Las Villas province. Even the Cuban militia is now said to be under Russian officers. A five-page list of camps and installations is given. Cubans are barred from major bases. Many underground installations are reported throughout the island for storage and concealment of weapons, including IJ-28 aircraft. The number of Russian MIG jet fighters is put at 185—nearly double United States official estimates.

American intelligence estimates of Russian arms in Cuba are verified by aerial photographs.

They show: Twenty-four missile bases, 23 of them already operational for medium and intermediate range ballistic missiles. They are widely dispersed and really blanket the whole island.

There are at least four launching pads at each site. In some cases there are two and three missiles at each pad. Medium range missiles are all mobile field units, with portable erectors. They are apparently unloaded from ships at dockside and moved on trailers directly to the launching sites.

No nuclear warheads have yet been detected, but they are small and easily concealed. One recent aerial photo shows construction of a bunker with arched roof earth-covered. It could provide underground storage for nuclear weapons. A port facility for their unloading has been spotted. It is surrounded by double fencing.

Two aerial photos taken 24 hours apart show, on the first shot, 45 vehicles assembled at a site where grading has been started for the launching pads. No tests are shown.

The second shot made a day later shows four erectors in place on the pads, seven missiles on trailers, 100 motor vehicles including rocket fuel trucks, 37 big tents capable of sheltering 300 men. The missiles have been identified as mobile 1,000-mile-range rockets of a type shown in Moscow May Day parades for several years past.

The second type of fixed site, identified also with four pads, shows heavier erector construction to handle 2,000-mile intermediate range rockets. Two vertical bunkers have been built between each pair of pads. The areas are heavily fenced.

Air photos of Russian freighters approaching Cuba show the crates lashed to the deck. These crates were later spotted at an airfield, being unpacked. Each crate contained an IJ-28 advanced jet

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet press and radio Monday portrayed Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's decision to dismantle and withdraw his Cuban missile bases as an overwhelming contribution to world peace.

The Communist party newspaper Pravda said Khrushchev's "peaceful step" had evoked a "lively response in the hearts of millions of people."

At the same time it quoted a Soviet worker's warning, "Let nobody take our peacefulness as a sign of weakness."

6 County Project Stressed

Congressman A. Sydney Herlong Jr. today made public the report of a task force committee evaluating the impact of the activities of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and other government agencies on the community resources of the six-county area in the vicinity of Cape Canaveral.

The six-county area consists of the counties of Seminole, Volusia, Osceola, Indian River, Orange and Brevard.

The task force, known as the Cape Canaveral Joint Community Impact Coordination Committee was made up of representatives of the State of Florida, the com-

munities involved and the United States Air Force and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The studies covered roads, schools, higher education, housing, health, hospitals, water supply and conservation, labor and recreation.

The recommendations of the task force were:

"1. That each of the municipal and county governments in the impact area, under the leadership of the Six-County Regional Planning Council, and with assistance from the Housing and Home Finance Agency, develop a workable program for community improvement.

"2. That NASA and the Air Force coordinate and develop more complete and specific information on plans and time schedules for new access roads and causeways to Patrick Air Force Base and Cape Canaveral.

"3. That an effort be made to activate sanitary districts in Brevard County so as to provide adequate public water and sewage facilities in non-incorporated areas and thereby eliminate the need for small privately-owned systems.

"4. That the several communities in the six-county area be encouraged to prepare complete engineering

and architectural plans for needed public works under CFA's interest-free Program of Advances for Public Works Plans.

"5. That the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers be asked to review and update its plans for conservation of water for industrial and domestic use in the Upper St. John's River Valley.

"6. That additional recreation areas be acquired to meet the needs of an expanding population.

"7. That the National Park Service be requested to consider the long-range possibility that Cape Canaveral be established as a national monument."

'Septic Tank County'

Water Situation Called Frightening

By LARRY VERNEIL
 Nobody saved me but, flags in the city and county should fly at half-mast tomorrow for Terry Cordell... What was it Hemingway said? That words like courage and heroism don't mean much next to the names of places where men were killed... Will anyone remember Viet Nam in five years?

Declaring that the Seminole County water situation is "deplorable and frightening, to say the least," Assistant County Engineer Guy Stenstrom Jr., today pointed out that 7,700 homes in this county are using well water of highly dubious purity and that 10,132 residences are served by septic tanks. Echoing the forecast of the County Commission that

Seminole County will become a "septic tank county," Stenstrom said this condition is already here, and, combined with the quality of the private wells in use, the water in this county is becoming worse and worse. In comparison with the number of homes using septic tanks, Stenstrom said there were only 11 sewage plants serving 1,100 connections.

Most of the water used in Seminole County, said the engineer, comes from three sources, an aquifer under Lake Mary, a Polk County source and the Green Swamp aquifer. However, Stenstrom pointed out, there is a strong intrusion of salt water which has its source on the coast. This latter has already put

many private wells in the Geneva area on the unuseable list, and the intrusion is steadily spreading into other areas of the county. Another thing that adds to the water danger is the number of uncontrolled wells, artesian wells with no valves for control purposes and irrigation wells used by the farmers that are causing more salt intrusion and

contaminating many wells in the agricultural sections of Seminole County. In some places the intrusion of salt in the water is so bad the pasture grass is being killed. Several wells that serve the city of Sanford are being slowly contaminated by salt, and the city uses control mechanisms that tend to hold back the salt, otherwise, said

Stenstrom, there wouldn't be enough water to provide drinking water in the event of a big three-alarm fire. Stenstrom pointed out that Orange County now has in use some wells that go a quarter of a mile deep and draw water from a aquifer originating in Northern Alabama, and he said this might become necessary for Seminole County unless something

is done to provide an adequate supply of good, potable water. Stenstrom said, "For the most part the incorporated municipalities that have their own water have a satisfactory water source," but emphasized that the danger is very present and even these sources will go bad in a few years and need deeper wells.

Reds Moving Weapons Out

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Russians are hurrying to carry out Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's promise to remove his weapons from Cuba, according to strong indications today reaching the U. S. government from a variety of sources.

Construction work on Cuban missile launching sites was believed to have stopped last Sunday when Khrushchev in a message to President Kennedy announced that he had ordered out of Cuba Soviet arms which the country regarded as weapons for offense.

The next big step would be the shipment of the missiles and bombers back to Russia. U. S. officials have heard indirectly that the Russians are talking of being able to start actual shipments out of Cuba this week. American experts regarded such estimates as being on the optimistic side and that more likely, the shipments would not start until sometime next week.
