Sheriff Is Indicted .In Prisoner Death

TAVARES, Fla. (AP) — The sheriff of Lake County has been arrested on a charge of second degree murder in connection with the death of a black prisoner who a grand jury said had been kicked, beaten and forced into a small, windowless cell where he spent six days.

A grand jury in neighboring Orange County, following its probe of the April 23 death of Tommy J. Vickers of Miami, also indicted Sheriff Willis McCall on charges of aggravated assault and aggravated battery.

> McCall, 62, was arrested Monday by Florida Department of Law Enforcement officers and was booked at his own jail. Bond on the charges was set Vickers died in a hospital 11 days after he was jailed in Tavares because he could not post a \$26 bond for a minor traffic violation.

In its report, the grand jury said 37-year-old Vickers was forced "with the aid and use of a slapjack" into a six-feet-six inch square cell and "lay on the metal floor of the creech tank in his own excrement and uneaten food without a mattress or pad The jury said Vickers was in the tank from April 13







Education Notebook

A Difficult School Year Is Ending

COPLEY NEWS SERVICE

Public and private schoolmen will sigh with relief when schools throughout the nation close for summer vacation. It's been a difficult year

The historic grandiose promises of many educators have been dashed against the reality that those needing an education the most are not getting it and others are being

Federal and state courts have ruled unconstitutional the use of local property taxes as a sole means of supporting public schools. Fiscal experts are trying to determine how to refinance schools and it is likely that statewide property taxes to provide money for state distribution to local schools will emerge. State and high-ranking federal officials are talking about z. 30 to 40 per cent increase in federal school expenditures, compared to the current 7 per cent, about \$3.2 billion. States spend about \$16 billion, 37 per cent of total costs, and local districts about \$24 billion, or 56 per cent.

Public schools today spend an average \$929 per pupil. Taxpayers have shown their dissatisfaction with schools that seem to provide less education for more mone, byrejecting 53 per cent of bond issues and levies, a 22 per cent

increase in defeats over last year. Some school officials hint at tax relief through new financing methods. The money may come from a different pocket and pass through different and more hands, but school taxes will still be here. Those concerned about how children will be educated are being told that increased state and federal funding does not mean a decrease in local control.

Time will explode that myth. Other federal and state court rulings struck down aid to nonpublic schools, but the Nixon administration promises

Courts have rejected the payment for secular services concept and a type of cash voucher, creating a narrow gap between "excessive entanglement" and state support of religion through which aid to nonpublic school advocates must steer to win constitutional approval. Tax credits for parents show considerable promise and bills in Congress to allow them may make headway after the presidential

Legislatures in nearly a dozen states, including California. Ohio, Maryland and Florida, have adopted state assessment programs in cooperation with state education departments in an effort to build accountability into public school systems. There have been fewer teacher strikes this school year as instructors concentrated on consolidating gains. The National Education Association virtually will eliminate management - supervisors, principals and above - from its ranks if its new constitution is adopted in June. 

DEAR POLLY-A rolling platform attached to a straight dining-type chair can make a hard task effortess for a person who is not able to lift his own weight rom a chair to shove it easily under a dining table. Such chair can wheel anywhere in the home with another

person pushing on the back. Cut two pieces of one-by-four-inch boards so they are one-half inch longer than the distance from the front to the rear of the chair legs. Cut a piece of one-fourth-inch plywood one inch longer than the outside distance of the our legs. Drill two one-fourth-inch holes in the two-byfours and screw the bottom of the chair legs to them with 11/2 inch screws. Drill a one-fourth inch hole in each corner of the plywood and screw narrow boards, with the attached chair, to this platform.

Buy a set of rollers, such as used for furniture dollies. adjust to exact length of platform from front to back of chair and then bolt to each side. Drill one-fourth-inch holes through the metal for the bolts, after first checking to be sure the bolts will not interfere with the two sets of screws already in the platform.-K. F. B.
