Doh! Suspect in Homer Simpson slippers turns himself in

An Orlando man apparently watched the video of him holding up an Oviedo gas station on the evening news and decided to turn himself Wednesday into Seminole County Sheriff's Office deputies.

Authorities responded to the convenience store located at 2970 W. State Road 426 at about 4:15 a.m.

Tuesday after a report of a robbery. The suspect was identified as smaller build Hispanic male that was wearing plaid pajama pants and Homer Simpson slippers.

The store security video from the robbery was made available to media outlets and the incident received extensive coverage on television. The suspect, realizing this, reportedly set out to make things right, according to Steve Olson, spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Wednesday afternoon, 26-year-old Adalberto Rosa Escalera reportedly returned to the gas station with a money order, apparently to repay the money that he took and to turn himself in. The business called the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. The suspect was arrested and charged with robbery.

Sanford eyes beach project

City seeks state funds to rebuild beach on Lake Monroe

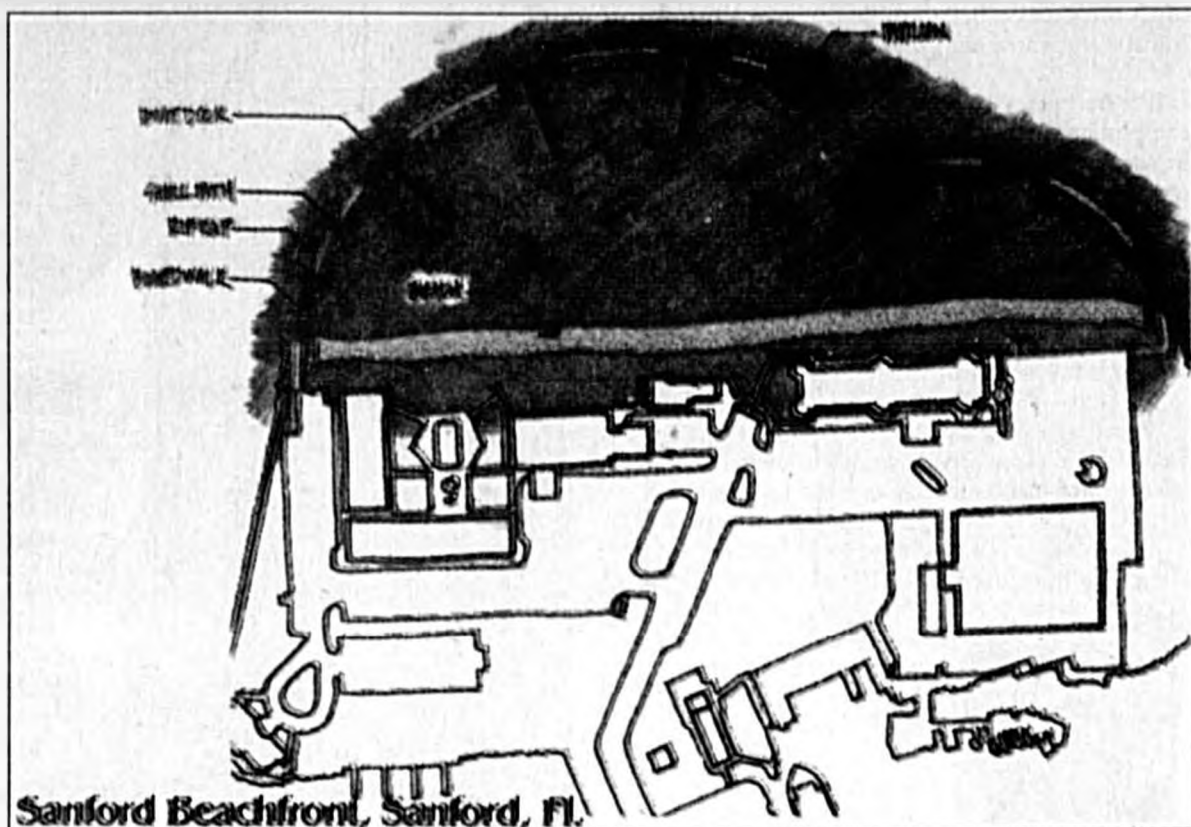
SANFORD — Water enthusiasts may soon be able to enjoy recreational activities on the north shore of the city's Marina Isle.

City officials are proposing a plan to rebuild a beach that could be used to launch small sailboats and other recreational watercraft into Lake Monroe. Such a beach existed, but constant erosion forced the city to abandon the beach in favor of large rocks and concrete in an effort to protect the shoreline.

"They were fighting a losing battle," said Chris Smith, manager of capital projects for the city. "Every time they dumped sand, it would flow north to DeLand."

Smith said the erosion was caused by two factors: constant wave action from Lake Monroe pounding the shore combined with frequent fluctuation of the water level. Smith and city staff, along with experts from CPH Engineers, think they have a solution that could limit erosion.

The plan involves creating a protected shoreline by

building two breakwaters out into the lake. Rather than constructing a solid breakwater, the city's plan would involve a series of rock structures that would allow some

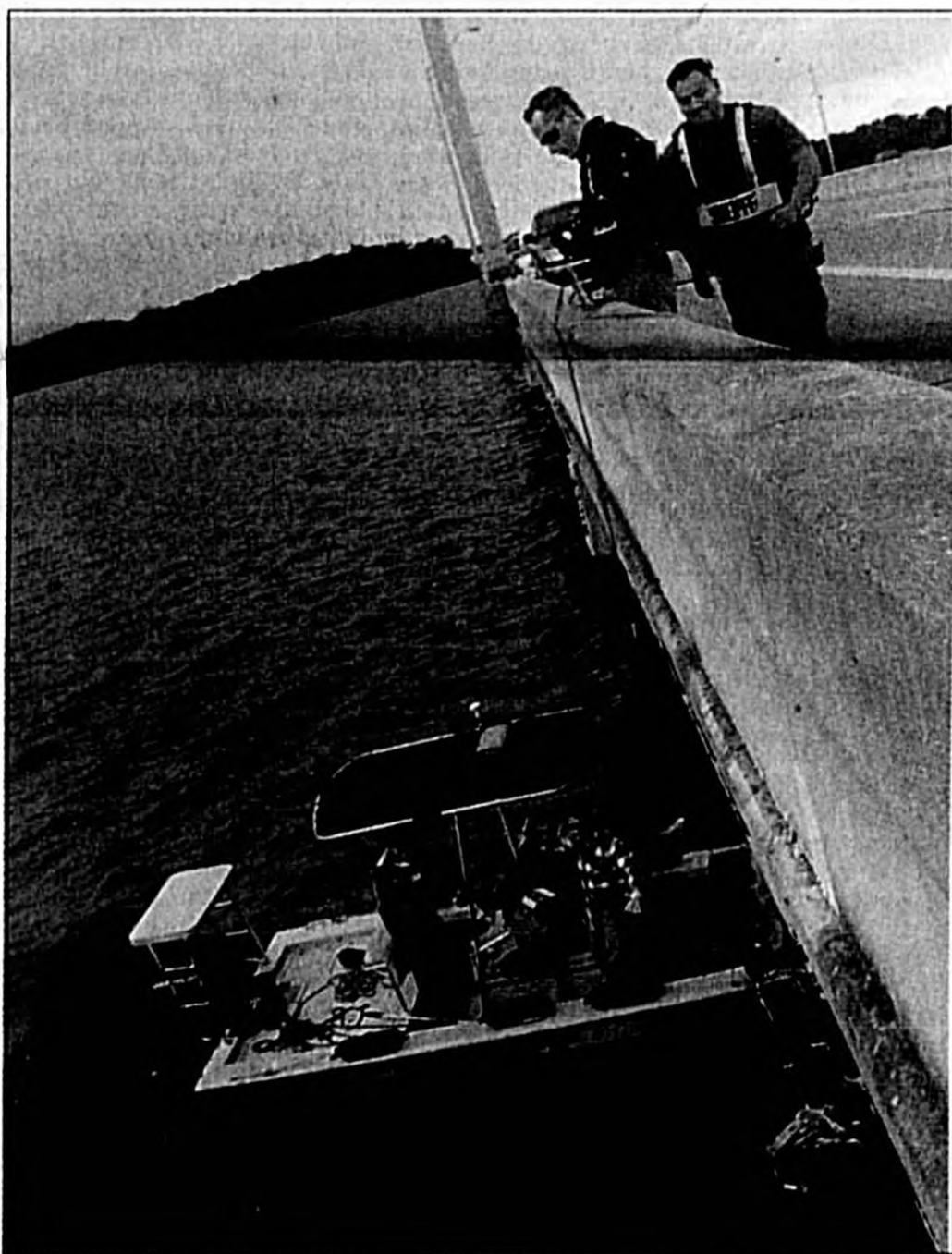
water to still flow through. A boardwalk would span the structures allowing sightseeing or fishing.

"We need to create a lagoon that is protected from

the wave action," Smith said. A solid breakwater would provide that protection. However, the St. Johns River

Fishing for Motorcycles?

Authorities net stolen frames at bottom of Lake Jesup

LAKE JESUP — With vehicle identification numbers etched on motorcycle frames, they're often the most difficult part for bike thieves to dump.

One Oviedo man had thought he had found the perfect hiding spot for the stolen frames that can be easily tracked to theft records, but that wasn't until when one of his associates snitched about the heap lying at the bottom of Lake Jesup.

For the past week, investigators with the City-County Auto Theft Bureau (CCAT) have gone fishing to recover some of the bikes that Michael Christopher Carr, 26, allegedly threw over the State Road 417 bridge.

Using two boats that dredge the bottom of the lake with ropes and hooks, the bureau has recovered almost two dozen motorcycle frames and parts of a Ford Mustang. Carr was arrested shortly after Valentine's Day for trying to steal a motorcycle. He is currently being held in the Seminole County Jail on

Nightclub incident triggers shooting

SANFORD — A shooting last weekend at a Sanford-area nightclub sparked a second wave of violence that ended with three arrests and one suspect still on the lamb.

Investigators in the Major Crimes Unit of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office made some progress Tuesday with the early Sunday morning shooting at Wavies' Nightclub, located near the intersection of 18th Street and Southwest Road.

According to Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokesman Steve Olson, investigators arrested Mario Jerome Hicks, 18, of Sanford, for principal in the first-degree

Family returns to honor early pioneer

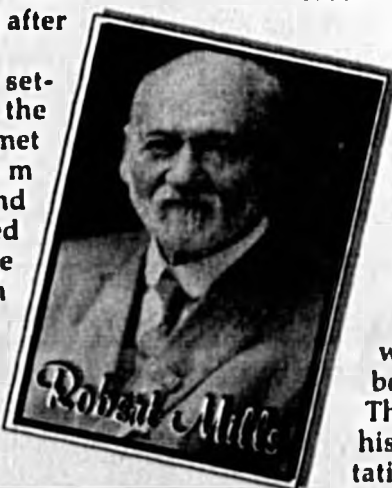

Relatives of the Robert Mills family will be gathering in Seminole County this weekend. They will be flying or driving in from all over the United States. Many of the family members will be meeting for the first time.

Robert A. Mills, or R.A. Mills as he was known, was an Orange County Commissioner in the 1800's. He served on the school board and platted the community of Chuluota in 1886. He donated the property for the cemetery in Chuluota

and Lake Mills is named after him.

Before settling in the area, he met Abraham Lincoln, and once shared a carriage ride with Lincoln the year he ran for office, stopping and checking on election returns along the way.



R.A. Mills name appears on the corner stone that was saved from the old court house in the lobby of the Orange County Regional History Center and he was great friends with Mahlon Gore. He had three wives and lived to be 102 years young. The last 20 years of his life was spent dictating his memories to his granddaughter in California because he

was legally blind.

Larry L. Kolber, one of the family members, has written a book on R.A. Mills, with assistance from the Museum of Seminole County's coordinator Karen Jacobs.

Jacobs is very excited about showing the family members the area where their great grandfather lived and worked. While the group is here, they will be visiting Lake Mills Park, the Chuluota Cemetery, the Museum of Seminole County History and the Orange County History Center.

What has my District I City Commissioner done for my district lately?

SCSO readies for next citizens academy

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Community Law Enforcement Academy's next session is set to begin Wednesday, April 21, with expanded offerings, with traffic and DUI enforcement added to the course outline.

The purpose of the Community Law Enforcement Academy is to educate the citizens of Seminole County in the concepts and procedures of law enforcement.

It is now a 15-week course, with the addition of traffic and DUI enforcement added to the mix. It uses scenario-based training, which will allow students to participate in

important problem solving that is vital in law enforcement and crime prevention.

The course also includes; riding on patrol with a deputy; observing telecommunications personnel in the communications center; and a morning on the gun range, using some of the sheriff's office weapons.

The class meets each Wednesday evening from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Members of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office teach it. It is free and there are no physical requirements to participate.

There are, however, some terms and conditions. Participants must

live or work in Seminole County, must be 19 years old or older, possess a valid drivers license, and never have been convicted of a felony. They must file an application with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

is slow to wash sediment and debris down river, so a man-made lagoon protected by a solid breakwater would soon become stagnant.

"You got to remember the water level on the St. Johns only drops three feet from Melbourne to Jacksonville," Smith said. "It flushes very, very slow, particularly where the river is wide like it is in Lake Monroe."

Under the city's plan, the segmented breakwaters would create a hydro-break that would slow the water down but still allow natural wave action to flush out the lagoon.

Specifics such as the size of the beach or how far out the breakwaters would extend into Lake Monroe have not been finalized, Smith said. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) must approve the project and would provide many of those specifics. Smith said DEP officials are enthusiastic about the city's conceptual plan.

"DEP is strongly in favor of this project," Smith said. "They understand that we're trying to make the environ-

ment better and recreate a safe public recreational area that once existed."

The project would cost "between \$300,000 and \$400,000," Smith said. The city will ask the state on Monday to fund up to \$200,000 of the project. The grant would come from DEP's Land and Water Conservation Fund, and though there is rigorous competition for the grant money from other communities, Smith believes Sanford has a good chance of securing state dollars.

"It's a priority based system and you're evaluated on how well the project meets several areas of criteria," Smith said. "We fit quite a few of their points."

An announcement on the grant should come in June, Smith said. Both the Sanford City Commission and the Seminole County Commission have approved resolutions supporting the project.

"It's always good to get the county's support," Smith said, "and, of course, we're contacting our state representatives to bring them on board, too."

\$50,000 bond for grand theft auto.

As the investigation widened for the auto theft bureau comprised of officers from the Seminole and Brevard county sheriff's offices and local municipal police departments, one of Carr's associates alerted authorities to the dumping site, said Anthony Berrios, CCAT commander.

"It's an organized criminal ring," said Berrios, who declined to elaborate further as the investigation continues.

He did say most motorcycles are stolen and then stripped of its parts, which are resold over online auctions such as eBay. A bike engine can bring as much as \$2,000, and other accessory parts, including fins and taillights, bring high dollar on the open market.

Authorities recent exploration of Lake Jesup is the historical portion of the investigation and also the hardest part, Berrios said. By recovering the frames with the 17-number vehicle identification numbers, they hope to match the frames to the sold engines, which is the only other part of the motorcycles labeled with an identification number.

"They were down playing how many there were," said Berrios from the Greenway toll road bridge Wednesday morning. "We've found 11 so far and we know there's more."

What's most puzzling to investigators is the recovery of the "neatly chopped up" 1993 Ford Mustang reported stolen from Orange County and a 1998 Harley Davidson reported stolen from Orlando. Both vehicles are not considered to be connected to Carr, said CCAT Investigator Paul Herx from the Sanford

Police Department.

"Apparently these guys did not invent this," Berrios said.

Investigators largest find came earlier in the week when they pulled — with the help of a wrecker — a whole motorcycle from the lake.

With high-winds and choppy waters,

police were only able to recover one frame Wednesday morning, but that didn't discourage them.

"Sunday they got seven. Monday they got four and today they've got one so far so they might have to move to a different fishing hole," said Steve Olson, Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokesman.

Among the top concerns, were protecting a recent capital investment that is eroding away under the heavy weight of unwanted tractor trailers. Commissioner Butch Bundy suggested the document provide better signage alerting truckers not to use the district's newly bricked streets. He said the city stands to lose millions of dollars as Church Avenue — a popular cut-through to avoid the intersection of Ronald Reagan Boulevard and State Road 434 — is already showing signs of crumbling bricks.

"I appreciate the need to protect the streets," said Mayor Dan Anderson. "My

concern was to allow the delivery of goods."

Bundy contends that businesses can request smaller trucks to make deliveries for no extra cost. Delivery of goods to commercial businesses in the district has long been a debated topic. The document requires that all deliveries must be stored away by 5 p.m. of the same business day of which they are received. Bundy sought to narrow the window to only a couple hours.

Another much-debated concern of city leaders was the penalty of demolishing historic structures. According to the code book, if a property

owner tears down a building in the district without following the proper steps of notifying the city, they can be issued a fine of \$100 per square foot. Some commissioners viewed the amount as too lenient.

"We only get one chance to keep these buildings," Bundy said. "Once they're gone — they're gone."

City staff was directed to contact other historic districts to see how they deal with penalizing demolition of historic structures.

While the Longwood Historic District Code Book is a new document, in many cases it doesn't reinvent the wheel. Some of the informa-

tion is borrowed from other unique downtowns in the state, including Ybor City and Celebration, and others outside of Florida such as Charleston, S.C., and Savannah, Ga.

Chris Lathrop of Dix Lathrop and Associates developed the code book. With a vested interest in the historic district as their office is located on Jessup Avenue, Lathrop said the document is important as it will guide the "district in the right way."

"We felt what the city of Longwood is (in its downtown) is what so many new communities are trying to achieve," she said.

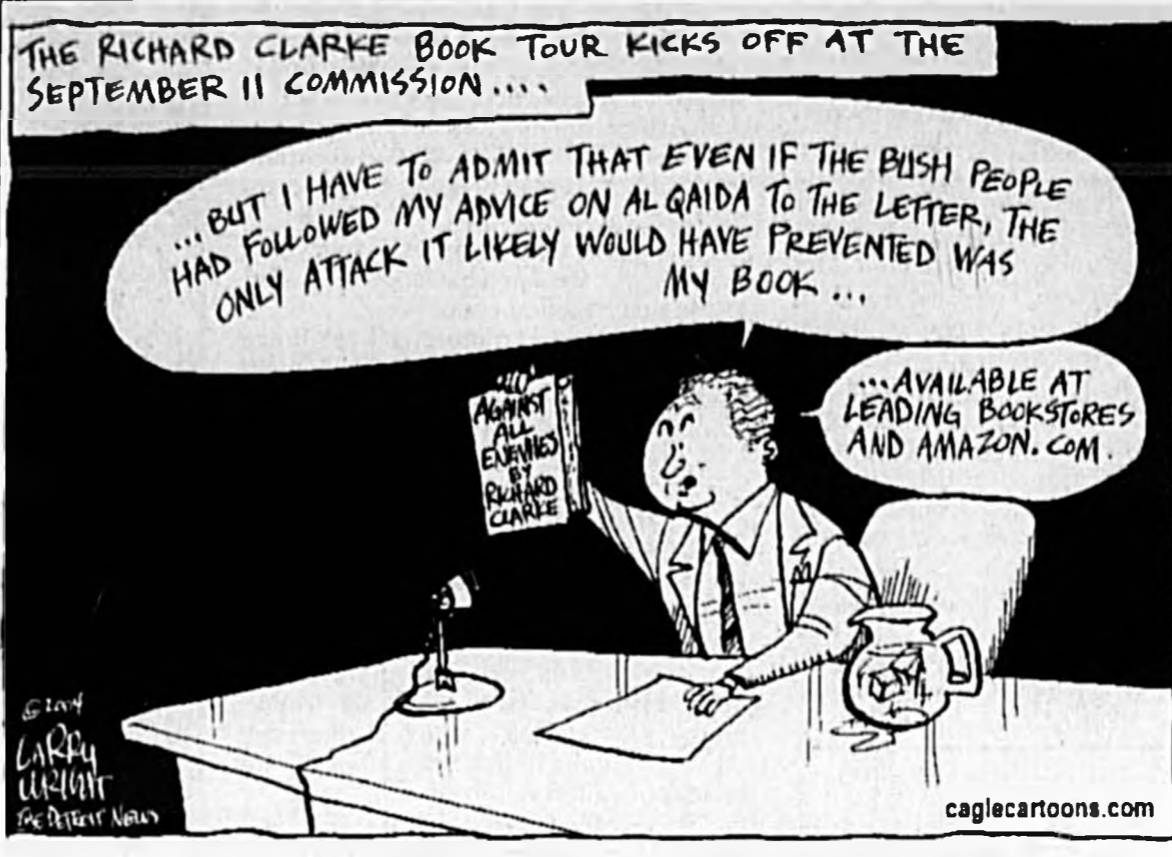
You can also see neighborhoods or city blocks where people want to keep everything clean and neat. These are the places where visitors enjoy driving through.

Television trash talk: Mourning in America

History will remember the 2000 presidential campaign as the one decided by an activist and openly partisan Supreme Court. Now, four years later, we are almost certainly going to see the longest and perhaps angriest campaign in American history — one that may persuade many voters to stay at home and pretend it never happened.

Time, a lot of it, will tell whether the Democratic Party, specifically the chairman of the Democratic National Committee, Terry McAuliffe, made the right decision in compressing the party's selection process into a few winter weeks.

So far, it has worked the way he wanted it to: The Democrats have their candidate almost eight months before the November election, rather than the usual three months or so — and that man, Sen. John Kerry, has ample time and then some to introduce himself to the nation, raise enough money to challenge the rich party and find the nastiest things he can say about President Bush.

But how much mean spirit can the nation take? How much Kerry can we take? How much Bush can we take? How much innuendo?

How much trash? How much lying? And just how much politics do we need or want? In an age of chain reaction information — act and react, slur and rebut minute-by-minute — eight months could be the event and information equivalent of years in earlier, slower times.

The idea, for instance, of candidates taking real vacations, clearing their heads, is not an option anymore. Charges made must be answered immediately; there is no such thing anymore as "tonight's" news or "tomorrow's paper" in the game of slug and slime. It's all now, all the time.

On one day, Wednesday, the Republican speaker of the House, Dennis Hastert, used his high office to attack Spain and its voters because he (and many Americans) did not like the election results there after last week's Madrid bombings. At the same time, Kerry said that Bush's failures in war and diplomacy "have left the real

interests of our country and of the world in tatters across this planet." Then the prime minister-elect of Spain, Jose Luis Rodriguez Zapatero, did his bit for cable news around the planet by jumping in to say he hopes Bush will lose in November. Meanwhile, Bush's attack commercials were already running in several states, distorting the run-up to war in Iraq and saying that Kerry "wanted to delay defending America until the United Nations approved."

Then C-Span released a poll taken for its 25th anniversary indicating that American cable-television watchers, presumably more politically aware than non-viewers, felt that they really had very little to do with the political process, a system they saw dominated by large corporations and big political contributors. The *Washington Post* headline on that one was: "Most Americans Feel They're on the Sidelines of Political Process ..."

Bush has told friends that he believes Kerry won the Democratic nomination in just a few weeks by being most adept at mobilizing the part of the Democratic Party that "hates me" — probably because of the post-election

Get over your squeamishness and get tested for colon cancer

It has been 20 years since he died — how can that be! — and I miss him still. He left our lives too soon.

Among his four children, he missed a medical school graduation, two marriages and the birth of his only grandchild. He would have adored her, with her mop of sandy curls and bright brown eyes. He would have set aside the standards of discipline with which he reared his children — no idle hands, no impudence, no acting out in public (and very little in private) — to spoil her hopelessly.

My father's death in March 1984, at the age of 57, taught me something about courage. When he learned his colon cancer was terminal, he said his goodbyes. He gave final instructions, asking my mother to bury him in a blue coffin. A deacon, he tended to a few left-over church affairs.

As he lay dying, he told my mother he had dreamed about a huge, brilliantly colored pink rose, and we imagined him forever tending a beautiful rose garden.

Even now, we leave bouquets of pink roses on his grave. My father's death also taught me that he might have lived longer had he had a simple test to detect colon cancer. By the time he was diagnosed in January 1984, the cancer had metastasized to other vital organs, including his liver; he died a mere seven weeks later.

But had he undergone regular colonoscopies starting at age 50, it's quite likely his life —

indeed, his vigorous health — would have been spared. Colon cancer is among those rare malignancies in which early detection usually ensures a cure. According to experts, if the cancer has not spread beyond the colon, 80 percent to 90 percent of patients are alive after 10 years.

Nevertheless, cancer of the colon or rectum is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the country, the Cancer Research and Prevention Foundation says. While women's advocacy groups have given the battle against breast cancer a glamorous prominence and men have overcome their macho qualms to have tests for prostate cancer, both are in denial about the bigger threat: colorectal cancer. It manages to kill so many — nearly 57,000 Americans are expected to die

from it this year — because less than half of the 80 million Americans at risk for the disease get screening tests.

In collaboration with other health advocacy groups, the Cancer Research and Prevention Foundation has designated March as National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, urging Americans to get screened. But the prescription is not so easily swallowed. While 91 percent of men aged 50 and older know they should be tested for colorectal cancer, only 54 percent actually do so, according to a recent survey by the College of American Pathologists.

Compliance is complicated by the fact that Americans remain embarrassed by those particular bodily functions. While we long ago conquered our aversion to public discussions of sex — witness the spec-

tacular six-year run of HBO's anything-but-prudish "Sex and the City" — we remain squeamish about uttering the words "colon" or "rectum." That goes double — no, squared — for our reaction to the screening tests, especially the colonoscopy, which is considered the gold standard.

I have friends with a family history of colorectal cancer who have had to be dragged, kicking and screaming, to their screening tests. (Julie and Martha, you know who you are.) And I'll admit that I didn't greet my first colonoscopy with a champagne toast. But, having had two, I can tell you they weren't nearly as bad as I'd feared.

My mom and dad had planned a healthy old age together. He'd quit smoking by his early 40s. He exercised. He cut back on greasy Southern cooking. He got annual check-

ups. And he looked vigorous and healthy until shortly before his death. In a family album, there's a treasured photo of him standing on his head at a backyard barbecue, delighted that he still could. He was already in his 50s.

But he didn't know that colorectal cancer is a crafty and subtle enemy that can sneak up on you, betraying no hint of its invasion until it's too late. He didn't know he needed to be screened.

You know, so get screened. Don't leave your family too soon.

The Way We Were: Speer family instrumental in developing Sanford area industries

This is a continuation of information on the Dr. Algernon Sidney Speer family edited from a history by Thomas A. Speer, which appeared in "Memories of Seminole County Families." This book was published by the Seminole County Historical Society and can be purchased at the

Memories of Dr. Algernon Speer and his family
By 1858, a new and central location as needed for the Orange

County seat, and several communities vied for the position. These included Mellonville, Jernigan (later named Orlando), and The Lodge (later named Apopka). The election contest came down two: Mellonville and Jernigan.

The Mellonville and Fort Reid residents championed hard for Mellonville, while Dr. Algernon Sidney Speer's first cousin, Judge James G. Speer, pushed hard for Jernigan at Fort Gatlin. The final choice was left to a public vote and Jernigan was selected.

The residents at Fort Reid and Mellonville were bitter because on election day, Judge Speer had invited a troop of soldiers stationed at Sumter County to Jernigan for a picnic. They were eligible to vote anywhere they happened to be on election day and their votes put Jernigan over the top. Mellonville and Fort Reid never forgave Judge Speer and he failed in his bid for higher office.

Arthur and Mary Ginn, grandparents of Dr. Speer's oldest children, raised their grandchildren in their home in Fort Reid. They were educated in the local schoolhouse nearby and attended the local church. Arthur Ginn took possession of all the property of Dr. Speer and protected it on behalf of the grandchildren. When they became adults, they were able to inherit the Speer Grove and all the adjoining property of nearly 100 acres.

Arthur Ginn developed 40 acres of orange groves across and on the east side of the government road, which became very commercially profitable. He served as justice of the peace as well as clerk of the court at Mellonville. He also served as state senator from Orange County 1868-1872.

During the 1870s, Arthur Ginn's orange groves were very successful, but all were lost during the freeze of 1895. He sold oranges at Jacksonville for \$1 per bushel; one acre of trees produced 200 to 3000 bushels of fruit, which was packed in barrels.

In 1868, the Florida Improvement Company had the Mellonville area surveyed for land development. This was to entice visitors to purchase lands in Orange County. The company requested State Sen. Arthur Ginn to testify about the availability of property in the county. Ginn wrote to Edwin A. Studwell, vice president and managing director of the Florida Improvement Company, the following:

I have resided at Mellonville, one mile from Lake Monroe, and near the

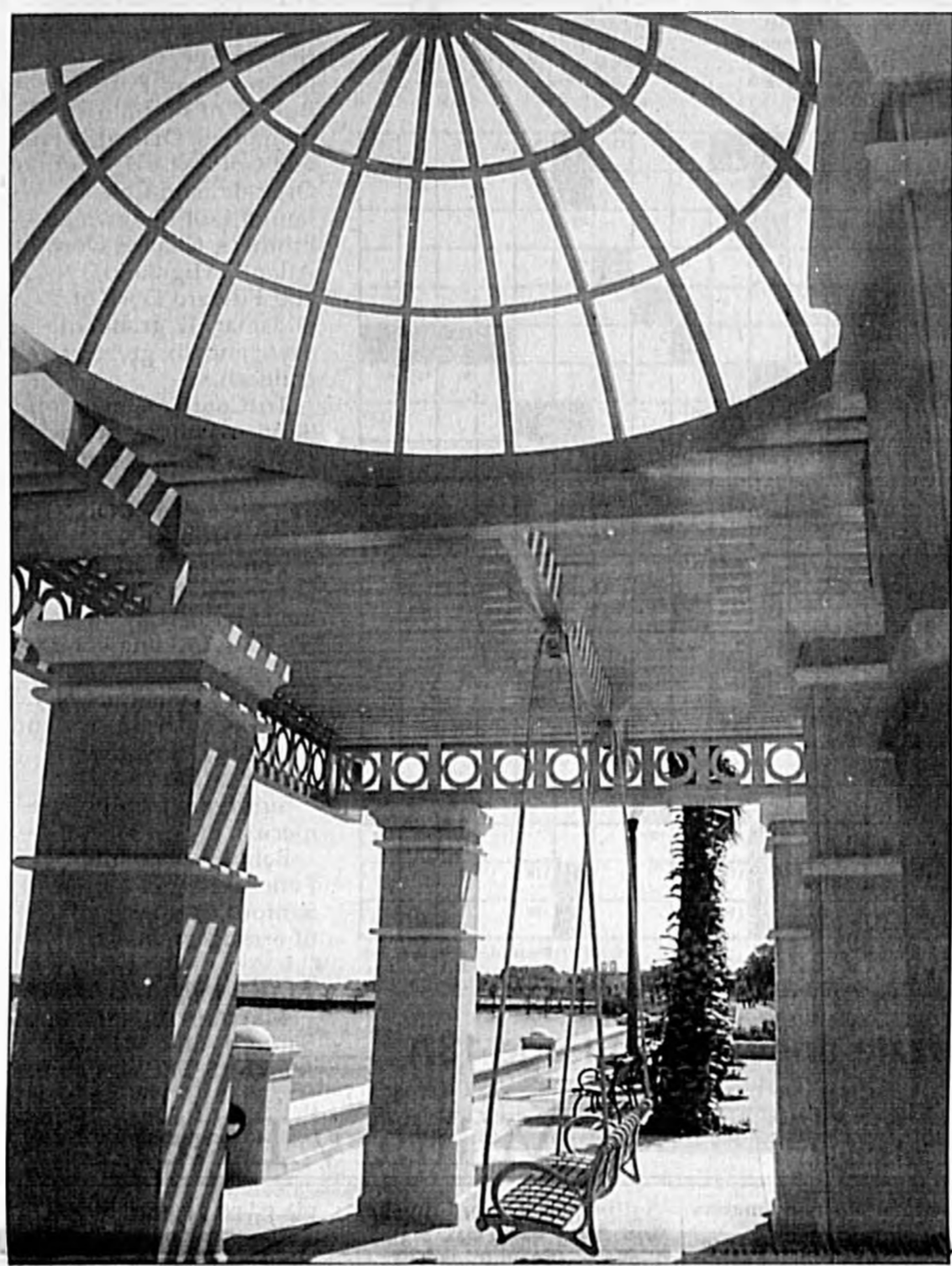

Geneva Methodist church receives historical marker

The Seminole County Historical Commission dedicated their most recent historical marker, Tuesday, March 16, at the First United Methodist Church of Geneva. A small crowd gathered under threat of rain to unveil the plaque on church grounds and to celebrate the history of the 128-year-old place of worship.

Following a prayer by church Pastor Jeanine Spangenberg, Seminole County Commission Chairman Daryl McLain spoke briefly before removing the cover from the plaque.

"It's great to be here in Geneva today," he said. "I am a fifth generation Seminole County resident ... what a great place we have. It's nice to be able to come out and recognize historical places like this church here."

McLain also thanked the volunteers of the historical commission who have donated their time and efforts to recognize all of the loca-



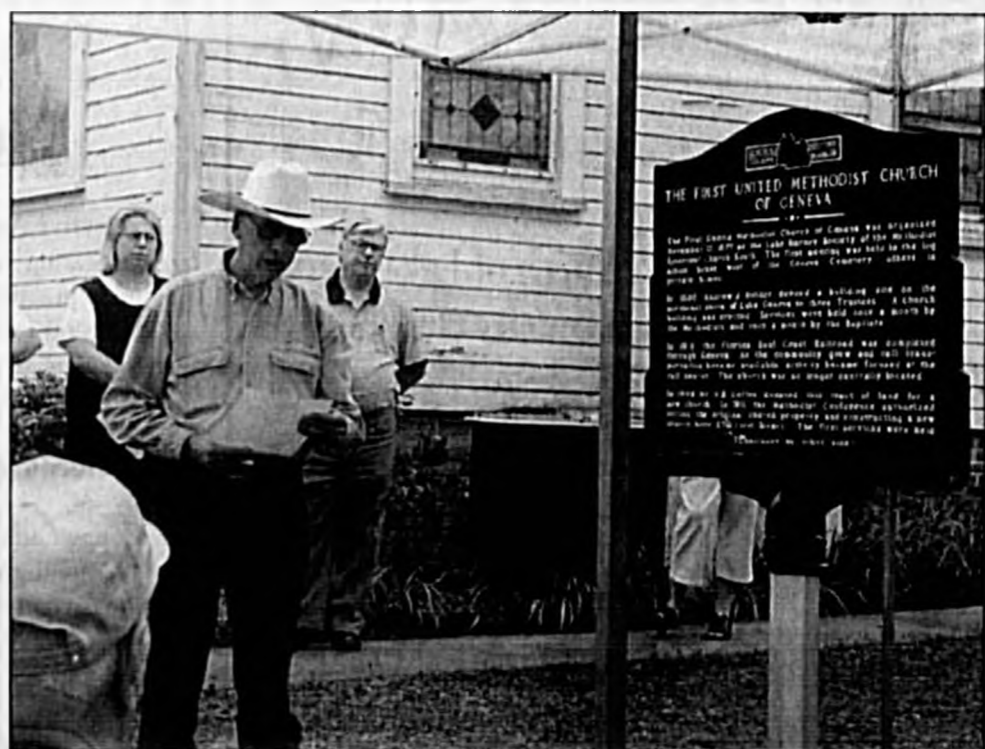

held in the log schoolhouse west of the Geneva Cemetery, others in private homes.

In 1880 Andrew J. Holder decided a building site on the northeast shore of Lake Geneva to three Trustees. A church building was erected. Services were held once a month by the Methodists and once a month by the Baptists.

In 1912 the Florida East Coast Railroad was completed through Geneva. As the community grew,

and rail transportation became available, activity became focused at the rail center. The church was no longer centrally located.

In 1909 Mr. H.B. Coffee donated this tract of land for a new church. In 1911, the Methodist Conference authorized selling the original church property and constructing a new church here — 270 First Street. The first services were held in 1912. The building was dedicated in November 1913, debt free.

The church had difficulty surviving after the freezes of 1894-1895, and World War I when many people moved away.

The Great Depression caused the few remaining members to sell two lots on the N.E. corner of the property. When Alice B. Coffee, daughter of the land donor, learned of the sale, she bought the lots, and decided them to the church with a reversion clause.

1951 — Four stained glass

memorial windows installed.

1959 — Fellowship Hall built west of the church.

1967 — Sunday School rooms added on the north side.

1967 — Parsonage constructed on the property.

1976 — Ward Hall constructed on the property.

1983 — Seven stained glass windows completed project.

The churches, school, post office and stores built near the rail center are still in the center of town.

Historical commission and church member Lorraine Whiting, spoke later about the origins of the church and the fact that some of the building's furnishings date back as far as 1877, having been brought from the original location of the Lake Harney Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church South on the northeast shores of Lake Geneva.

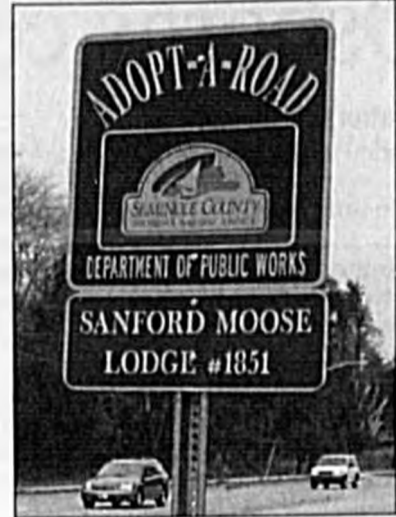
Church member and long-time Geneva resident,

Imogene Yarborough, also commented that the marble steps leading up to the rear of the church were brought from the original Seminole County Courthouse when it was dismantled and a new one constructed.

Also present at the dedication were Karen Jacobs, coordinator of the Museum of Seminole County History, J. Suzy Goldman, director of Library and Leisure Services in Seminole County, historical commission member Cecil Tucker and members of the Geneva Historical and Genealogical Society and the church congregation.

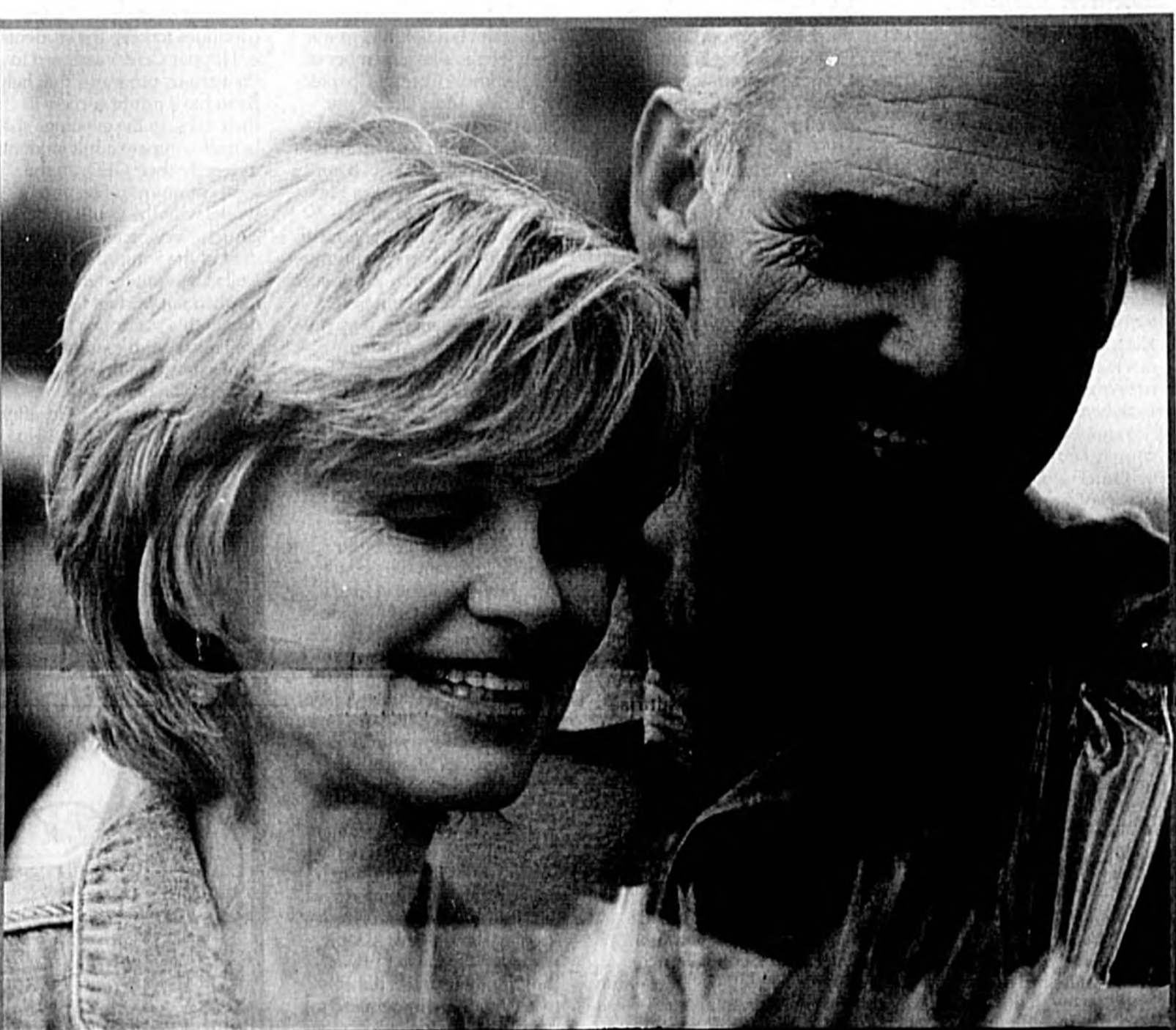

town of Merritt, since the Seminole War, over 30 years. ***** The summer is the best season for invalids. ***** I am well acquainted in other portions of the state. ***** I look upon the site selected four your town as one having all the advantages, with none of the disadvantages. The high rolling country in the interior of Orange and the adjoining counties is, (although little unknown until recently,) the most healthful, picturesque and fertile region in the state. Settlers are flocking by hundreds, and ere many years I trust every sufferer from consumption and kindred diseases will know, what I discovered 30 years ago, that nature has provided a remedy in a permanent and judicious change of climate. ***** I have never known the mercury rise above 92 degrees in the shade. ***** For the orange crop off 10 acres I have realized over \$10,000.

In 1862, Dr. A.C. Caldwell came to Fort Reid, ill with pulmonary consumption. He spent one winter there and went to back Carolina, but returned to Fort Reid and made it his permanent home. He later purchased the Indian Mound grove from Dr. Speer and budded wild orange trees.

Dr. Caldwell's daughter, Annie Louise, married Joseph N. Whitner. In 1895, Dr. Caldwell's widow conveyed the Indian Mound property to Whitner. Mrs. J.N. Whitner would later write a historical paper entitled "Tale of a Mosquito."

The early pioneer families living in the Fort Reid area after the Civil War included General Finnegan, John Hughey, John Wiley, J.N. Whitner, Captain Brock, W.W. Woodruff, A.J. Vaughn, B.F. Whitner, Moses Lyman and Henry Randolph.

Prior to 1870, Arthur Ginn's wife Mary had died and she was buried in the Speer cemetery behind their home place. On Feb. 28, 1872, Arthur Ginn married Mary Caldwell Garrett, a widow; she was the sister of Dr. Andrew C. Caldwell.

In 1878, at the age of 78, Arthur Ginn died at his home at Fort Reid. He was buried in the Speer family cemetery beside his first wife. Later some of the headstones and remains of the deceased were removed to Lakeview Cemetery in Sanford. The headstone for Arthur Ginn is located in the family plot of Georgia Algernon Speer, Sr. in Evergreen Cemetery.

Algernon and Christiana Speer's son, Arthur Alexander Speer, served as a private in Bullock's Company of the Florida Mounted Volunteers during the Third Seminole War, 1856-1857. He was 17 years of age.

In October 1861, Arthur Alexander Speer joined the Confederate Army under Florida's First Infantry. He was severely wounded during the only Civil War battle in Florida, the Battle of Olustee near Lake City. In Lake City, there's a granite monument honoring the

Confederate soldiers who died or were wounded in the battle and the name of A.A. Speer is for Arthur Alexander Speer.

The second child of Dr. Algernon Speer was Mary Christiana Speer, born at Fort Reid in 1843. She married Michael J. Doyle, an Irishman, who was born in 1837. In 1862, he operated a mercantile business at Enterprise. Later Doyle Road was named in his honor.

He served as second lieutenant in the Florida Infantry and was captured in Murfreesboro, Tenn., in December 1864. He was released from a Delaware prison in June 1865.

Michael and Mary C. Speer built the finest home in Orange County on the government road (now known as Mellonville Avenue) at Fort Reid near the Speer and Caldwell homes. The Doyles raised their eight children in this home.

Doyle was a shrewd businessman who had extensive real estate holdings. He owned M.J. Doyle and Company, which sold dry goods and grove supplies, and also Doyle Wharf on Lake Monroe. He also planted a large orange grove around his home, which produced annual crops for shipment to northern markets. The Doyle family took trips in the summers to St. Augustine, the only beach resort on the Atlantic Ocean at this time.

Dr. Speer's third child, Algernon Sidney Speer Jr., was born at Fort Reid in

October 1845. He married Sarah Brantley and they had five children. After her death, he married Carrie W. Rider and they had two children.

Since Algernon Speer Jr. was too young to enlist in the Civil War, he traveled with his brother, Arthur Alexander, into battle as a water boy for the troops. Near the end of the war he enlisted and served in the First Battalion Special Cavalry.

Algernon Speer Jr. was an outdoorsman, commercial fishermen and hunter. He and his first wife, Sarah, were buried in the Speer family cemetery at Fort Reid.

Ella, the fourth child of Dr. Speer, was born in 1852. She married George C. Brantley who owned and operated a trading post on the north shore of Lake Jesup called Brantley's Wharf. He also had other business interests in Tuscawilla, Gabriella and Lake Brantley, which was named in his honor.

He and Ella built their home near the shore of Lake Monroe, east of Mellonville. Brantley and Michael Doyle became general managers in Doyle's store and wharf.

In 1878 at the age of 41, George Brantley died unexpectedly in New York City while on a buying trip. Before he died, he had purchased more than 100 acres of fertile lands along the shore of Lake Monroe.

After his death, he and Ella married John E. Pace who had clerked for the Brantley-Doyle partnership.

John and Ella Pace later developed the fertile lands near Mellonville. Because of the hard-panned soils, the artesian water supply and the mild winter weather, the lands made excellent winter vegetable farming after the Great Freeze of 1895 destroyed most of the groves in Central Florida.

Many of the dead orange trees around Sanford were quickly cleared away and vegetables were planted, particularly lettuce and celery.

J.E. pace shipped the first lettuce from Sanford during the winter of 1896-1897, thus paving the way for the vegetable industry that sprang up after the Great Freeze. Other farmers followed and in later years Sanford became known as the "Celery Capital of the World."

The Speer family was one of the earliest pioneers in the area and contributed great to the industries that began here.



Physical activity and nutrition habits are the two most critical factors when providing a base for future behavior.

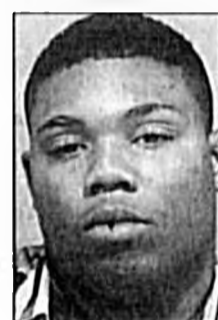

attempted murder of Timothy E. Thomas, 33, of Sanford. An arrest warrant was also obtained for James Roosevelt Lee, 28, for attempted murder in the nightclub incident.

The shooting occurred as the nightclub was closing and violence apparently erupted as two parties argued over a cell phone. Lee reportedly shot Thomas near his right eye with a handgun. His injuries were not considered life threatening, but doctors told authorities he would probably lose his eye.

Olson said the cell phone was the "trip wire" that led to the shooting as tensions were probably building between the two parties for some time.

In what is speculated as retaliation for the nightclub incident, Hicks was shot Sunday while standing in front of a home on the 1000 block of Mangoustine Avenue.

"(Before) we could arrest Mario Hicks, well later that day (Sunday) Mario Hicks got shot," Olson said.

According to a Sanford police report, it's inconclusive on who initiated the violence first on Mangoustine Avenue, but Hicks apparently chucked a brick at a vehicle passing by with two men inside. As the brick shattered the back window, one of the vehicle occupants — Roger Derrell Williford, 22, and Leandra Rodraques Hooks, 25, both of Sanford, — shot several times at Hicks hitting him once in the hand and again in the neck.

Sanford police investigators interviewed Hicks at Central Florida Regional Hospital Sunday and he identified the two suspects in the car as Williford and Rodraques. The two men reportedly heard about the investigation and turned themselves into police that evening.

They were arrested and charged early Monday morning with attempted murder. After sheriff's office investigators arrested Hicks Tuesday, Sanford police added the charge of throwing a missile into a vehicle for his part in the Mangoustine Avenue incident.

Despite the three arrests, authorities are still seeking Lee, the first shooter at the nightclub.

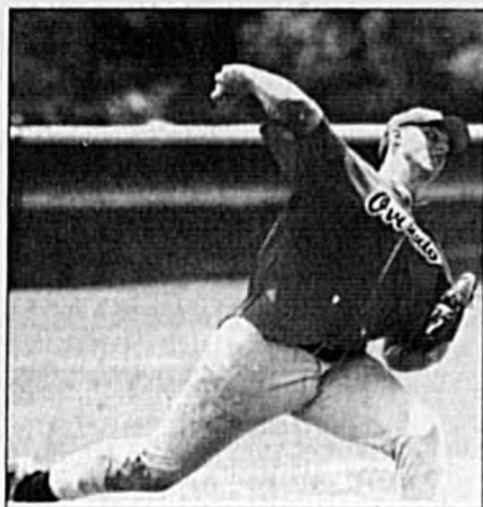

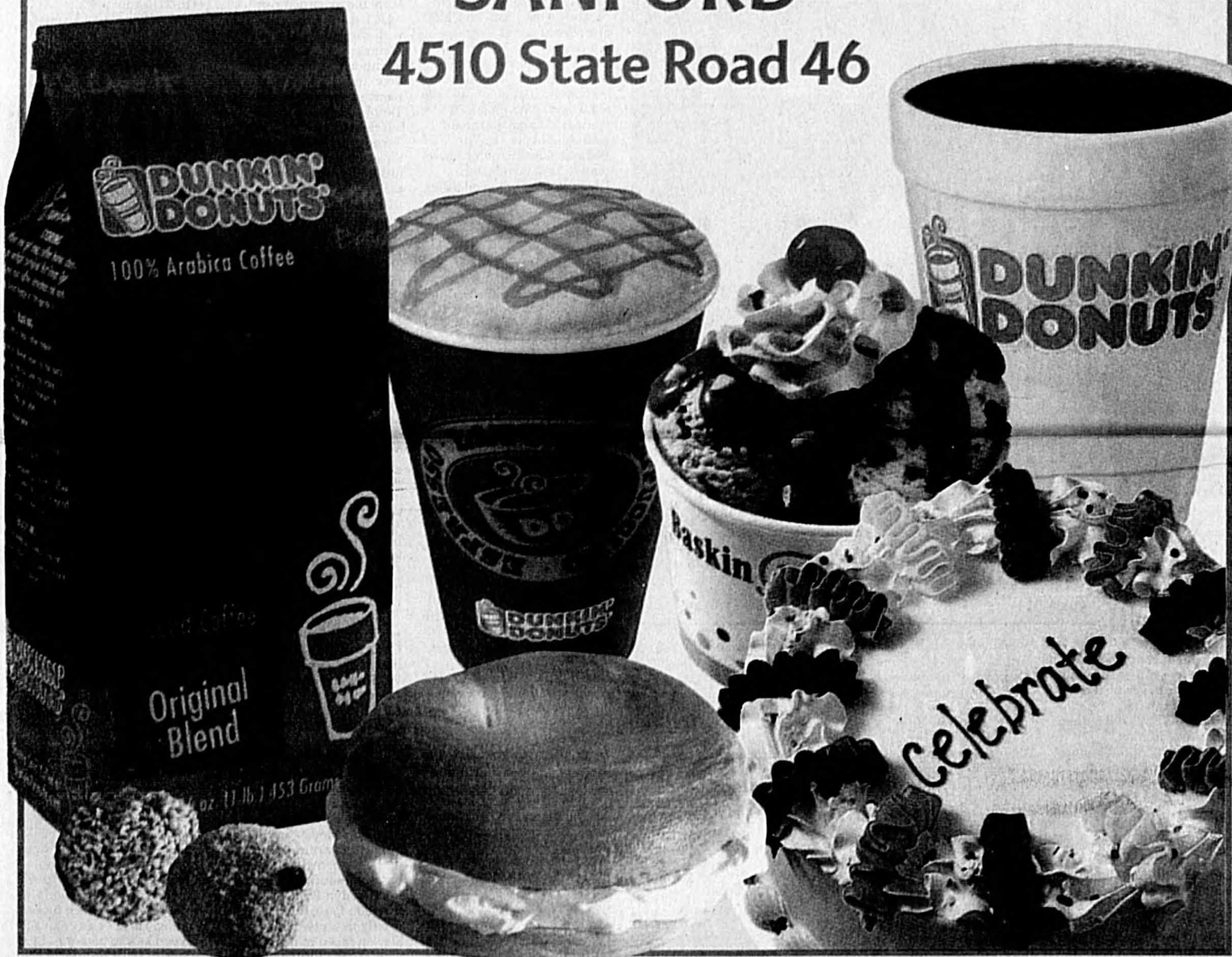

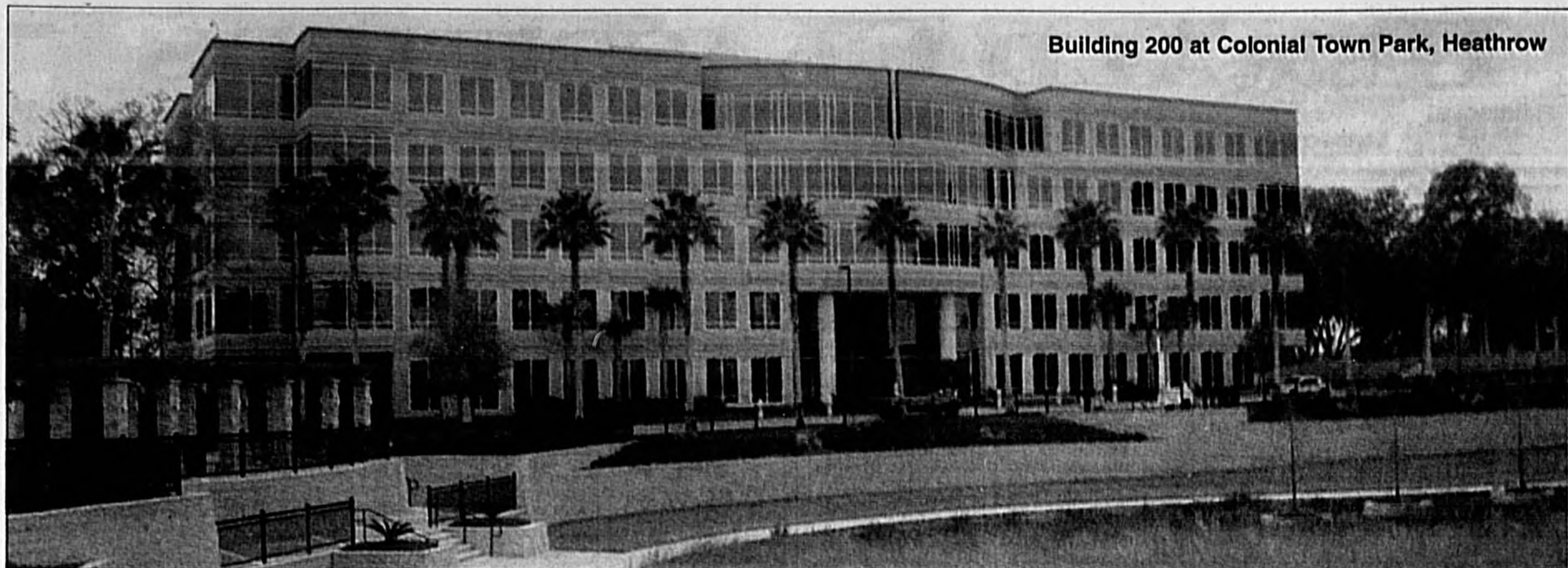

Lake Mary may limit school sites

LAKE MARY — The clash between the Seminole County School Board and Lake Mary continues today as city commissioners will consider creating a high-tech corridor along Interstate 4 that forbid future public school sites.

City leaders continue fight with school board with new high-tech corridor plan

The local planning agency voted 4-1 last Wednesday to recommend denial of the entire plan to the city board. The majority favored the high-tech district, but

frowned upon dictating where schools can be located primarily because a lawsuit filed by the school board against the city is still pending.

Seminole County Public Schools purchased a building last year in Technology Park off Lake Emma Road with intent of establishing an alternative school for trou-

bled students. Lake Mary balked at the plan and stepped up its fight in February with the introduction of its comprehensive plan amendment that bans schools from the district. John Omana, community development director, says the plan does not prohibit

Mica requests change in plans for airports

With the threat of long lines and unnecessary delays facing airline passengers in airports throughout the nation this summer, the Chairman of the U.S. House Aviation Subcommittee is calling on the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) for the immediate creation of a "Summer Security Congestion Plan" to address problems associated with federal aviation security programs.

U.S. Rep. John Mica (R-FL) outlined the need for a new security plan during a press conference with airport officials at the Greater Orlando International Airport. Mica noted that Las Vegas McCarran International Airport, where passengers are sometimes subjected to four and five hour lines, is a prime example where TSA has poorly planned passenger security needs.

On Thursday, March 26, Mica held a roundtable discussion in Washington, D.C., with the Transportation Security Administration and managers of major airports throughout the nation to discuss problems with federal aviation security.

In a letter sent to Admiral David Stone, the Acting TSA Administrator, Chairman Mica explained the need for a new airline passenger security plan.

"Since TSA has not shown the ability to handle current passenger loads, the growth in summer traffic could disrupt our recovering industry. As the economy continues to recover, commercial airline passengers are returning," Mica stated in his letter to Stone. "We can expect long lines and delays at security checkpoints if no action plan is developed as soon as possible."

Mica noted, for example, that at Orlando International

House fire call turns gruesome with murder plot

A fatal fire investigation in Longwood Tuesday turned for the worse when officials determined the incident was a planned murder-suicide attempt.

At about 9:31 a.m., the Longwood Fire Department responded to a residential fire at 970 Lormann Circle. Upon arrival, fire fighters discovered Philip

Steinbruchel, and Susana Steinbruchel. The fire department extinguished the fire which was located in a bedroom in the home and Philip was transported to South Seminole Hospital with apparent self-inflicted lacerations and burns. Susana was pronounced dead at the scene.

A subsequent investigation by the Longwood Police Department revealed that Susana had multiple stab wounds in addition to severe burns from the fire. This case is being investigated as a homicide and Philip is the suspect in this case. The investigation is ongoing and no charges have been filed against Philip at this time.

It has been determined that Susana resided at the above location and was currently separated from her husband Philip. A check of police department records does not show a past call history for either party or the listed address, with regards to domestic violence. The exact cause of death and start of the fire is to be determined.
