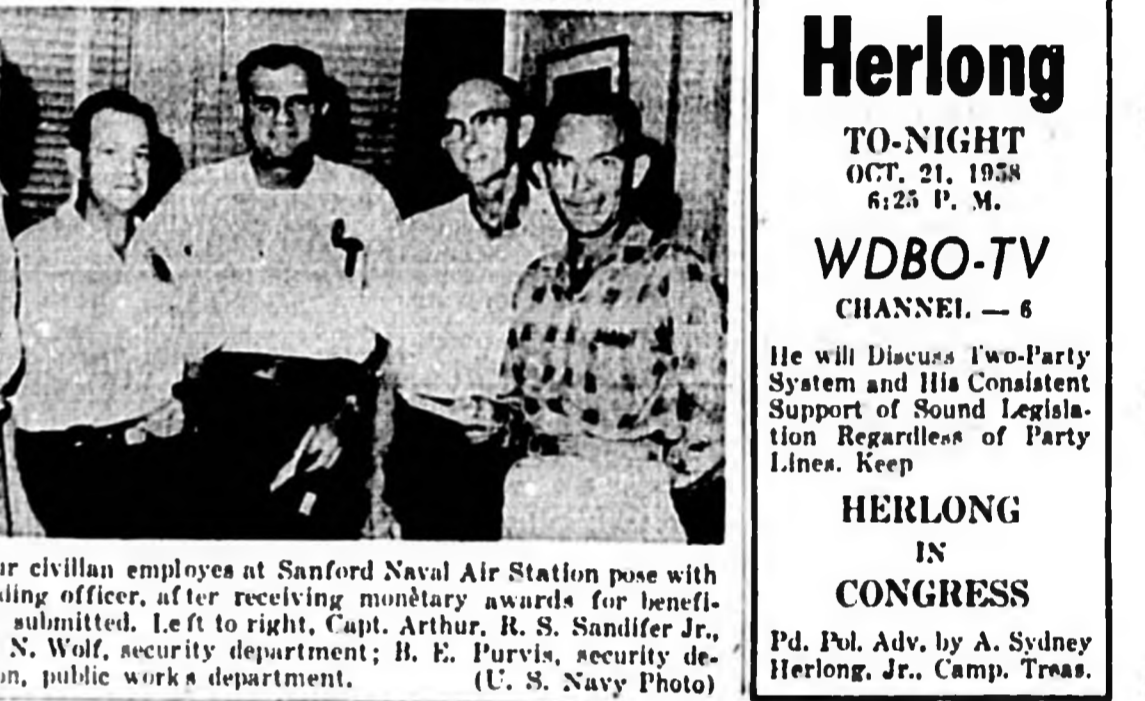

Gary Backers Plan Campaign

County politics warmed up today following yesterday's announcement that Oviedo Mayor Lee Gary had agreed to allow his name to be entered as a write-in candidate for the District 4 seat on the County Commission.

Oviedo citizens who are spearheading the Gary campaign said today that Gary did not plan an active drive for votes. Spokesman for the group, however, said they "will do everything we can to get Mayor Gary elected because we think he is the best man."

Gary's supporters are attempting to beat Vernon W. Dunn, Democratic nominee. Dunn made no statement about the move. But the man that he beat in the Sept. 9 Democratic primary, R. C. Dodd, today gave his blessings to Gary.

In a prepared statement, Dodd said that he had been asked to run as a write-in candidate and that he had considered such a venture.

"After serious thought, I feel that I should retire and take care of my business, in which I am engaged," Dodd said. "But I do think the county needs a real businessman to help run the county's business, a large and growing business. I do think Lee Gary, mayor of Oviedo, has these qualities."

The group backing Gary said that an all-out effort would be made in behalf of their candidate. At the same time, the group said "there has been no great secret" about plans for a write-in campaign.

A spokesman today said the group "was shopping for a good candidate" when it ran two advertisements in the Sanford Herald, advising the voters to get ready for a write-in campaign.

"We went shopping for a good, solid candidate and we found one in Mayor Gary," the statement said. "We believe Mayor Gary has the stature needed on the County Commission. He does not plan to campaign, but we will campaign for him, actively and openly."

In his statement, Dodd thanked the voters for allowing him to serve for 12 years. He said the "decision to retire to my business should and the rumors that have been circulating about my intentions."

Several hours before the Gary announcement was released, Dodd had denounced the write-in movement as "illegal and back-handed."

Workmen started the solicitations on Monday, the campaign director said, and he was "much encouraged" not only by the prompt way in which the captains went to work, but the response that was being given them by the various business firms.

Got family problems that an experienced counselor might solve, or ease? This service now is available to Sanford residents.

A Family Counseling Service headed by Mrs. Sidney Lee III, is available for those who wish to discuss such problems as family relationship, marital difficulties, parent-child problems, individual personality adjustments, unmarital parenthood and many others.

Mrs. Lee, former student counselor at Seminole High School, has had much experience and training in this field, according to the Rev. W. P. Brooks Jr., a member of the group's advisory committee.

"We now have a very fine family counseling service," Rev. Brooks said. "It has been in operation for some time and is rendering a very fine service to the entire community. Mrs. Lee is very efficient and well-trained."

There is no charge for the counseling service, Rev. Brooks said. The head field of the service "covers just about any difficulties that any person may have."

Rev. Brooks said 18 cases were serviced last month. A total of 19 new consultations have been requested thus far this month.

Overman was hired by the county board on recommendation of the zoning commission approximately 12 to 14 months ago. For this reason, Swafford said, the zoning commission release him from his duties.

30 Persons Dead In Air Collision

ANZIO, Italy (UPI) — A Naples-bound British European Airways Viscount airliner collided with an Italian jet fighter plane over this world war II battlefield today. All 30 persons aboard the airliner were killed.

BEA spokesman in London said all 25 passengers and the five crewmen were killed. The plane was destroyed.

The pilot of the Italian air force Fiat jet parachuted safely into the Mediterranean and was picked up by a motorboat.

American Tourist Arrested By Reds

BERLIN (UPI) — George S. Milroy, 29, of Ann Arbor, Mich., a tourist, was arrested by the Russians Friday while traveling through the Soviet zone of Germany, the U. S. State Department announced today.

The U. S. mission here said Milroy was turned over to East German police Saturday on a charge he had photographed a Soviet military installation.

The United States denied the charge and in a protest sent Saturday demanded Milroy's release. Milroy was en route from Copenhagen to Berlin at the time. He was arrested at the town of Neue Strelitz, 70 miles north of Berlin, while driving his automobile.

American efforts to win his release were complicated by the fact he was traveling on an East German visa. The United States does not recognize East Germany and it warns tourists they travel through the Communist zone on East German visas at their own risk.

Milroy's arrest became known because an officer of the U. S. Division military mission to the Soviet armed forces in East Germany was in Neue Strelitz when he was arrested.

Family Wiped Out By 6 Pistol Shots

BUFFALO, N. Y. (UPI) — Two officers checking Tuesday night to see why Patrolman Edward J. Biddleman failed to report for duty, found all four members of his family shot to death.

Six bullets fired by Biddleman's wife, Mildred, 36, from his 38-caliber service revolver wiped out what neighbors said was a quiet, home-loving family.

Biddleman and two children, Ed, 14, and two children, Ed, 14, and Maureen, 8, were found in bed. Mrs. Biddleman, who had saved the last bullet for herself, lay dead on the kitchen floor in her nightgown and pink housecoat.

Detective Chief John J. Whalen said Mrs. Biddleman who had suffered a nervous breakdown early this year following the death of her father, apparently went berserk in the tidily kept dwelling about 2 a. m. Tuesday.

Whalen theorized the woman slipped out of bed while the rest of the household slept and went to a closet to remove the revolver from where it hung in a holster belt. She then returned to the bedroom, shot her husband in the head and killed her children by shooting each twice in the head.

Medical Examiner James F. Benedict called it a case of homicidal and suicide.

Army Will Launch Explorer; Could Be Seen With Eye

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, Army missile chief, said today that the Army will attempt to launch its fourth Explorer satellite tonight.

He said the satellite will carry an inflatable sphere.

Medaris, who is chief of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, confirmed reports of a new satellite effort to newsmen at the annual meeting of the Association of the U. S. Army.

He said he was "sorry" that the scheduled attempt became known but the report was "correct." He would not give the exact time the launching is scheduled except that "I wish it was earlier."

That was a reference obviously to the fact that the launching will come late tonight and Medaris like many others will have a vigil into the early morning hours while awaiting word on its success.

The Army has previously attempted to launch five satellites and has succeeded in putting three of them into orbit.

Tonight's effort will be to put a shiny 12-foot balloon into orbit to test atmospheric density at an altitude of about 400 miles.

The launching will be made from Cape Canaveral, Fla. The aluminum balloon, which should be visible to the naked eye if it goes into orbit, will be thrust into space by a Jupiter-C rocket with booster stages, and inflated after reaching orbit height.

The total weight of balloon and carrier is about 60 pounds.

When the carrier reaches its highest altitude after it has completed about half an orbit, a small extra rocket will be fired to kick it out higher and farther. The purpose is to assure a long life in the balloon.

It will be the first satellite launched under the auspices of the National Aeronautics and Space Agency.

Home Buyer Gets 'Payment' Break

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A government-authorized reduction of down payments on medium-priced homes financed through federally chartered savings and loan associations, helping counteract any tightening of credit.

The Home Loan Bank Board announced Tuesday night that the associations may write mortgage loans up to 90 per cent of a home's appraised value. The limit had been 80 per cent.

This, a buyer who is financing a \$15,000 house will be able to borrow up to \$13,500 instead of \$12,000. The down payment may be, therefore, as little as \$1,500 instead of \$3,000.

The amended rules become effective Thursday. The new ceiling will apply on loans up to \$18,000 in an effort to funnel money into financing of low and medium priced housing.

Harold P. Brannan, managing director of the National League of Federated Savings Associations, hailed the ruling and said it "could result in expansion of home construction by 10 per cent or more annually."

Boy 'Confessing' Killing Parents To Get New Home

NEW YORK (UPI)—Melvin Dean Nimer, the 8 year old boy who once said he stabbed his parents to death, will leave the Bellevue Psychiatric Ward Thursday to be taken to Utah to live with his grandparents.

The child's attorney, Harris B. Steinberg, said Tuesday that psychiatrists at Bellevue found Dean had "an emotional disturbance that requires close psychiatric supervision" and the condition apparently pre-dated the Sept. 2 double murder of his parents.

Editorials

3,000 In Two Years City Growth Estimate

Has Sanford gained 3,000 new residents in the past two years? The officials who direct the canvass for the city directory think so.

As canvass takers get set for the task of compiling the information for the directory, officials predicted that some 3,000 persons will be listed in the 1959 version of the directory for the first time. The last directory was published in 1957.

A population growth of 3,000 in two years is little short of astounding. This figure is an estimate, not an actual count. But neither is the figure a wild guess. Before making the estimate, directory officials checked around with the utilities department of the city, the Florida Light & Power Co., Chamber of Commerce and a few other places which keep figures on population.

Should this estimate be only "close" to the actual growth, Sanford would have been increasing its population by 1,500 persons yearly, more than 100 each month.

Business, government and civic leaders agree that Sanford is growing rapidly. There is no accurate method of measurement, except when the U. S. Census Bureau, the directory or some other organization makes a canvass.

It will be most interesting to look over the Census Bureau figures for 1960. At the rate that Sanford is growing, it wouldn't be surprising if the city population had increased to more than 30,000, the county population to more than 50,000.

Write-In Ticket Set

Seminole County voters will be asked to decide Nov. 4 between Vernon W. Dunn, Democratic nominee, and Oviedo's Mayor Les Gury, who will campaign on a write-in ticket.

The announcement concerning Gury's entrance into the race was made yesterday afternoon. A spokesman for some 70 Oviedo citizens said the mayor had agreed to run at the request of many voters in Oviedo and surrounding area.

Dunn was nominated in the Sept. 9 Democratic primary election. He won over incumbent District 4 Commissioner B. C. Dodd by 37 votes. Dodd today gave his blessings to Gury.

Under Florida law, voters have the privilege of a write-in vote, even if there is no announced candidate. It is a little early to evaluate the chances of the two candidates.

The entry of Gury into the race assures Seminole County of some interest in the election. Just how much of a stir this will create remains a question mark.

Dulles Could Have Gone To Moon, Back

WASHINGTON (UPI) — When Secretary of State John Foster Dulles arrived in Formosa Tuesday he had logged more than enough air miles during his six years in office for a round trip to the moon.

The unofficial total for America's jet-age foreign minister when his plane touched down at Taipei, Formosa, read approximately 522,236 miles of air travel since January, 1953.

Of this 447,553 had been abroad and 74,673 within the United States.

A round trip to the moon, even at the farthest point of its orbit from earth, would measure only about 303,000 miles.

America's traveling 10-year-old statesman, who is called an unguided missile by his enemies and a dynamic peace-maker by his friends, chalked up another first on this trip when he flew over

the North Pole region in an all-jet transport on the England-Alaska leg of his flight.

Dulles, who made a speedy and apparently complete recovery from a major abdominal operation for cancer in November 1956, has shown no sign he intends to let either advancing age or infirmity dull his zest for roaring off into the wild blue yonder.

His absence from Washington takes little difference to his top aides, who receive almost as heavy a stream of messages and memoranda from him as when he is seated in his fifth-floor office in Washington.

The secretary defends his wide travels on the grounds that personal diplomacy is more effective than long range communication. He also has confided he enjoys the flight periods for calm, reflective thinking that is difficult in an office besieged by callers.

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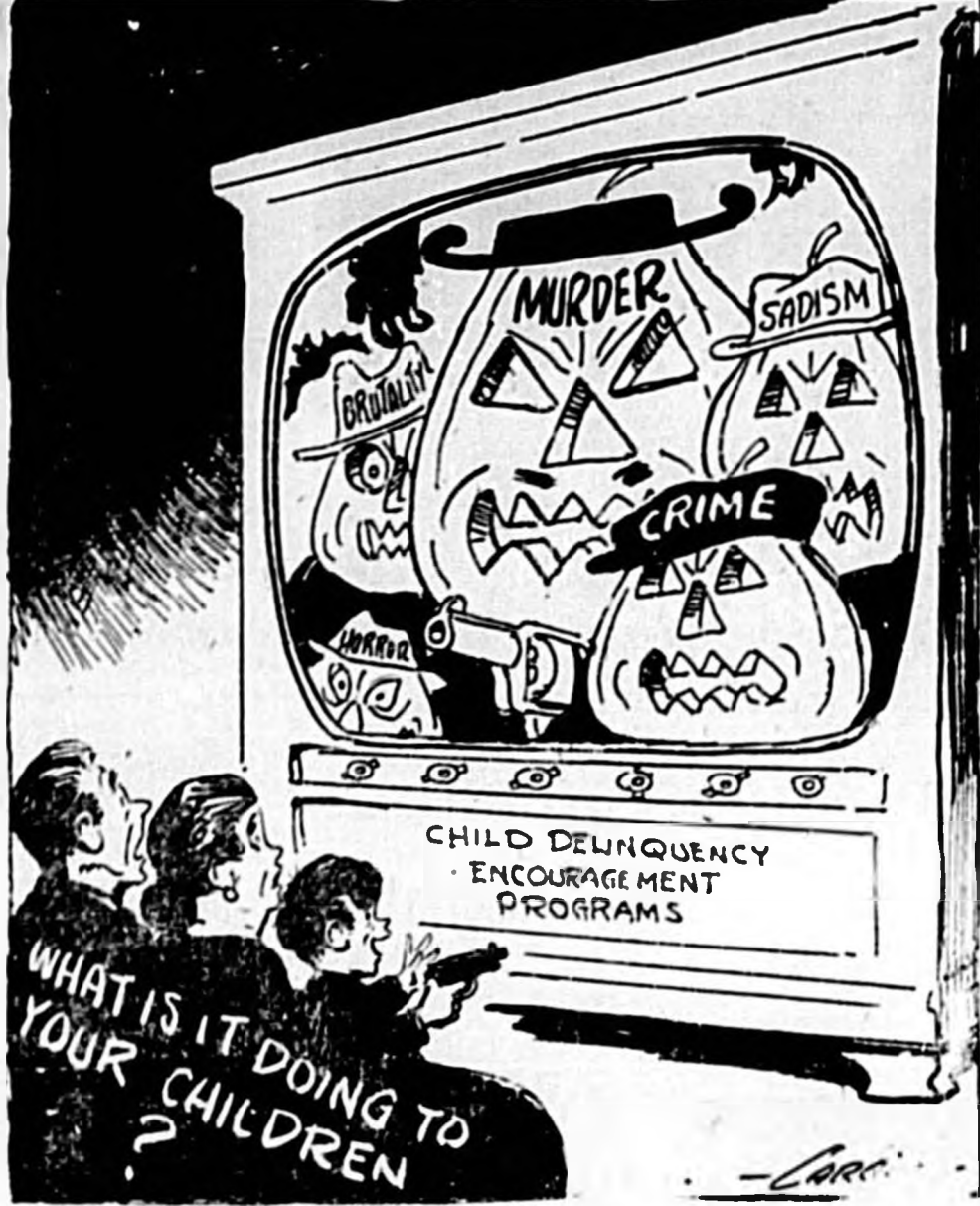

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The political activities of Big Labor in Michigan are financed by a six-cent-per-month levy on AFL-CIO members. This gentle head-tax on Michigan union members raises about \$200,000 in good times but will gather in only \$80,000 in this year of Michigan recession and unemployment. The fund supports all activities of the Michigan AFL-CIO.

Even so, the end political result of this levy on union members should arouse the envy of Republican campaign fund raisers, perhaps causing them to wish they could lay a head tax of even a nickel a month on sunbathers. They cannot do that.

Neither can the heads of the great corporations lay a head tax of even one cent per month on their stockholders, or employees, a device which, if feasible, would raise funds beyond belief to be available for expenditure for purposes of political education.

State "Kidnaped"

The Republicans and some of the managers of the great corporations are accusing Big Labor of having politically kidnaped the state of Michigan. Specifically, they charge that the kidnap was Walter P. Reuther. The man in charge of Big Labor politics in Michigan, however, is August Schoole, president of the Michigan AFL-CIO Council. Schoole has Reuther's active support, of course, else he could not be so sure of collecting that head tax.

Four Dead, 3 Hurt As Nitro Explodes

UNIONTOWN, Pa. (UPI)—Officials today sifted through the debris of a building in which nitroglycerine was manufactured in an effort to learn what may have touched off an explosion that killed four men and injured three others.

But there was little hope that a cause of the blast would be uncovered since the structure was reduced to rubble. The explosion occurred at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday in the gelatin cartridge plant building of the Liberty Powder Defense Corp., six miles north of here.

The dead were identified as Robert Trimble, 49, Morrell, Pa., father of five children; Leonard McGee, 39, also of Morrell; Len Burns, 41, Uniontown, and John Houli, 25, Dunbar, Pa.

John Morris, 48, Uniontown, and David Caffey, 30, Footdale, Pa., were admitted to Uniontown Hospital. Morris suffered face cuts and Caffey is being treated for shock. A third worker received a face cut but was not hospitalized.

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Sergeant Guilty Of Trainee Abuse; Second Trial Set

FT. JACKSON, S. C. (UPI)—A second non-commissioned officer of a Ft. Jackson training company faces a court-martial Thursday on charges of mistreating recruits, similar to those that brought conviction Tuesday to the company first sergeant.

Sic. Charles L. Moman, 29, of Empire, Ala., will be tried on charges of forcing indignities on trainees of Company B, 4th Battalion, 1st Training Regiment. His attorney, William H. Townsend, was expected to ask a delay to prepare the case more fully.

M. Sgt. George R. Sovie, of Ogdensburg, N.Y., was convicted Tuesday of charges that included forcing a recruit to eat a dollar bill and ordering three recruits to dunk another's head in a slimy mess hall grease trap. He was sentenced to a reduction in grade to sergeant first class from master sergeant and fined \$75 a month for six months.

His conviction is subject to automatic review.

Lt. Gerald M. Wheatley, 24, of Bridgeton, N.J., commander of the company, will follow Moman in facing the court-martial.

Both Wheatley and Moman were in the courtroom of the court to slap Sovie on the back when he emerged after the sentencing.

"I still think I was in the right," Sovie told United Press International. "Every one of the trainee witnesses was a problem child in the company."

Sovie also was convicted of forcing a trainee to hold a 34-pound duffel bag in his arms and of forcing the man to hold the bag with his teeth when his arms began shaking with fatigue.

Max Factor Faces False Advertising Charge By U. S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Trade Commission today accused Max Factor & Co., of Hollywood, of falsely claiming that its "natural wave" spray would make straight hair naturally curly.

The FTC complaint cited as false advertising a television commercial claiming that the spray "penetrates through the hair, changing the structure of each individual hair... giving you a natural curl."

The complaint said "natural waves" will not change the structure of the hair nor change naturally straight to naturally curly hair. The company has 30 days to answer the charges. The FTC scheduled a Dec. 16 hearing on them.

George admitted strangling the girl in an argument over her other boy friends.

14 Known Missing As Typhoon Hits; 50 Feared Lost

MANILA (UPI) — A baby typhoon with 45 mile an hour winds sank one boat with 14 persons aboard and may have sunk another carrying 50 persons, the Philippine navy said today.

It said the 45-ton fishing vessel Guesan V went down in mountainous seas whipped up by Typhoon Kathy off southeast Antique Province and that U. S. Navy and Air Force planes had joined the Philippine warship Negros Occidental in a search for survivors.

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New Pope May Pick Any Name He Likes

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — The man who becomes the new pope will be free under church laws to assume any name he wishes.

Even if the next pope confines his choice to a name already used by one of his predecessors, he would still have 89 names to examine.

But in practice, no pope has adopted a new name since 914 A. D., and only five names—Benedict, Clement, Leo, Gregory and Pius—have been in use in the past two centuries.

Of the last 11 popes, seven have chosen Pius as their name. Church chronicles show that a total of 83 different names has been used in 20 centuries by 421 legitimate popes and 19 of the so-called "antipopes" (false popes).

The name most used was John particularly popular in the centuries when the see of the papacy was at the basilica of St. John's in Lateran.

There were 23 popes named when Antipope John XXIII was deposed by the Council of Constance. The name has not been used since.

Second in popularity was the name Gregory, used by 16 popes since St. Gregory the Great, who was elected in 590 A. D. and first evangelized England.

Fifteen popes were named Benedict between 572 and 1922. There were 14 Clements, the first of them in 84 A. D. and the last in 1724.

Church annals list 13 Leos, from 440 to 1903, and as many popes named Innocent between 401 and 1721.

All of the 12 popes named Pius were Italians. Three of them—Pius I, Pius V, and Pius X—have been canonized. Pius IX, 59 at present a candidate for sainthood.

Foremost among the names used only once is, of course, that of Peter. None of his successors ever named himself after the prince of the apostles.

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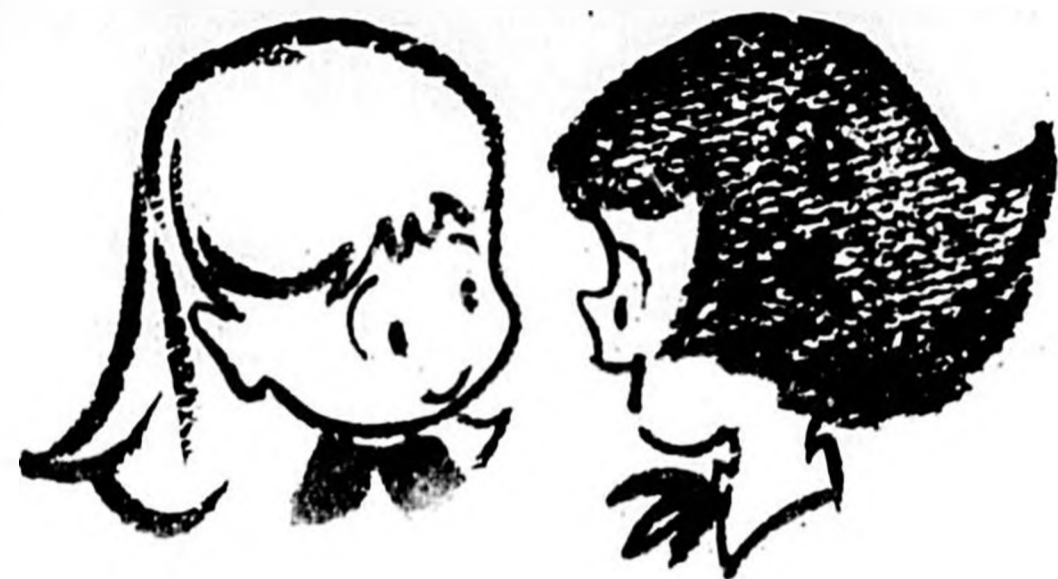
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
