Our attention has been called recently to persons in Sanford being fleeced by itinerant solicitors of one kind or another, selling anything from a refrigerator to a magazine subscription. The usual approach of these strangers is to offer what is claimed to be a little more at a lot less than can be bought at any bonaffde local store or reputable concerns in neighboring cities.

The desire among us all to make a dollar stretch as far as possible often makes some people succumb to the blandishments of fly-by-night salesmen with the result that instead of the dollar being stretched it is frequently wiped out completely.
