Retailers And Chain Stores Agree On Tax

House Votes To Kill Sales Levy, 47-15; Appropriation Bill Studied By Senate

TALLAHASSEE, May 15.—Independent merchants and chain store operators, whose differences about tax legislation have produced spectacular debates in the Florida Legislature for many years, finally have agreed upon a tax law applying to both classes.

In return for repeal of the one-half percent gross receipts tax, retailers have endorsed Governor Sponard L. Holland's recommendation for a stock inventory tax of 10 on each \$1,000, with the first \$1,000 of stock exempted.

Rep. H. E. Quisenberry of Miami, legislative spokesman for the independent merchants, reported the agreement today. He predicted the Legislature will pass the tax law.

A sales tax was swept out of the picture when the House voted 47 to 15 to sustain the finance and taxation committee's unfavorable report on a 2 percent general levy proposed by Rep. Commander of Holmes.

The Senate began the study of a \$11,500,000 appropriations bill which provided increases totaling \$1,200,000 for the general operating cost of the State government.

After two days of almost continuous debate, the Senate yesterday killed 93 to 12 a bill to set up under the State Supreme Court a new system of regulating, suspending and disbaring Florida attorneys.

To make certain that it would not come up again, opponents immediately reconsidered their vote and killed it again, thus shutting off the bill's sponsors who had hoped to have the bill reconsidered at a later date but who are prevented by the rules from bringing it up again.

The bill, which passed the House easily, was designed to require that every lawyer be a member of the Florida State Bar and that he pay an annual fee up to \$5, thus raising funds to be spent under direction of the Supreme Court in policing the members of the bar.

The real fight came on an amendment by Senator Beall, Pensacola, to remove from the bill all provision that a fee be charged. It was successful, 22 to 18, in this fight and then led in keeping the Senate in session until the final death blow had been dealt.

Senator Whitaker, Tampa, said the bill would have been a landmark in Florida, its provisions could be so strictly applied, and would have kept from the Florida Supreme Court the late Fred H. Davis, who asked judge who ever presided over any court.

Answering an assertion that the State Bar Association had Mr. Shames also planning to attend, Senator Dye, Bradenton, read a letter from Ed E. Bentley, of Lakeland, executive secretary of the association, saying he had accepted temporary employment by the bar to help with the bill.

German Planes Land In Syria

Nazi Aircraft Speeding To Help Iraq, British Announce

LONDON, May 15.—(AP)—Britain lost a total of 54,200 men in the campaigns in France and Norway last year the House of Commons was told today by Richard K. Law, financial secretary of the war office. Forty thousand were taken prisoner and the rest, presumably were casualties.

A violent two-day assault on the Isle of Crete, seat of King George's second Greek government, was reported today as Britons learned that Churchill had decided to postpone the statement he had planned to make today on Hess' flight from Germany.

Authoritative quarters in London spiced the Hess riddle by declining to confirm unofficial but news-passed reports that Hess, in defiance of Hitler's orders, flew to Britain as a self-constituted apostle of peace.

Churchill told the House of Commons he would report at the first opportunity on the Hess incident but that he would be guided in the selection of that opportunity by the public interest.

Labor Minister Ernest Bevin said he believed Hess flew to Scotland with the full knowledge of Hitler but doubted that Hess came 'out of mad sympathy for the British people.'

The British announced that German planes had landed in Syria, while other reports said units of the Luftwaffe were enroute to aid Iraq. A German U-boat was credited with sinking a British auxiliary cruiser in the battle of the Atlantic.

Rudolf Hess broke away from Germany as a hopeful dove of peace, it became known today with the British disclosure that his unauthorized flight from Germany was aimed at a rendezvous in Scotland with his old English sports acquaintance, the Duke of Hamilton.

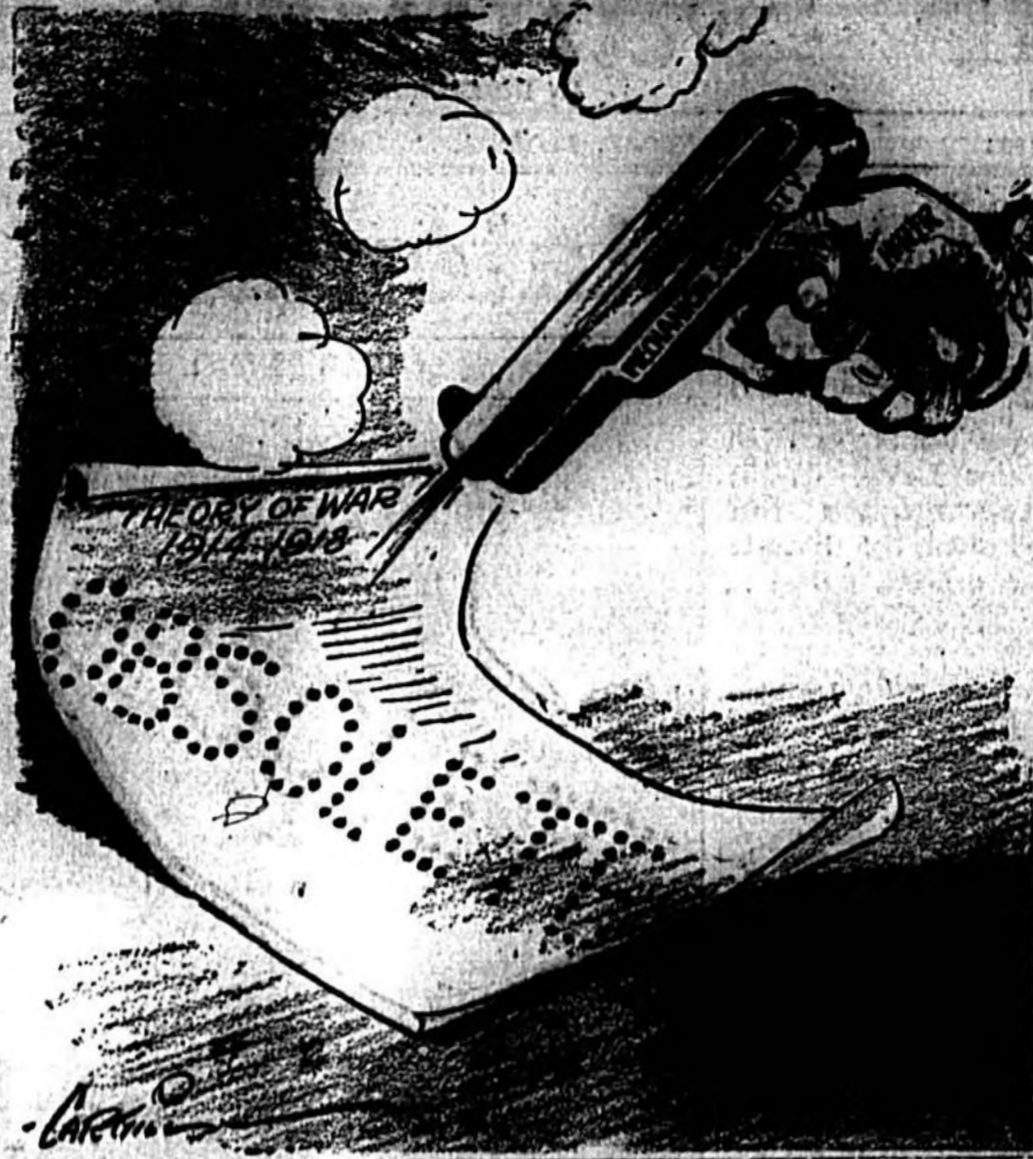

Modified Rations Meet Approval of Blanding Soldiers

CAMP BLANDING, May 15 (Special)—A week of "modified A field rations" as apparently met the appetites and approval of the Dixie (31st) Division's 12,000 enlisted men. It consisted of flowing through the various company and battery streets can be relied upon. This system of rationing became effective by order of the War Department May 1 following five months and five days of the garrison ration system.

To get a clearer insight into the officer of the 106th Quartermaster regiment, a St. Augustine new feeding method, Colonel Jacob H. Spengler commanding man who knows rationing from A to Z was interviewed. The quartermaster regiment has charge of food distribution. "The 31st Division went on what is called the 'modified A

field ration" May 1, he said. "Under the 'modified A ration' every unit in the Division serves the same items of food at the same meal. If Company A of the 106th Quartermaster regiment has string beans, rice and steak for supper, every company in the Division has the same thing. 'Modified' menus the government allows; each company commander two cents per day per ration (a ration is the food required to feed one man for one day, to purchase extra foodstuffs to keep his various sectional tastes satisfied. It takes about \$5,000 a day to feed the Dixie Division."

Col. Spengler described the garrison ration. "Under that system the government allowed a certain amount of money per day per man (usually between 40 and 50 cents) and the company commander could order the food wanted. Consequently menus over the division were not necessarily uniform."

The Colonel stated the division would probably stay on "modified A" until it departs for the maneuver area about next August, when the straight A or B field ration will be used. Under the straight A ration no money would be allowed to cater to

sectional tastes. "B field rations are usually issued only in actual field service," Col. Spengler explained, "and is composed entirely of canned and preserved foods. There is a 'C field ration' which is six cans of meat bread, etc. issued daily to the individual soldier, if necessary."

field rations May 1, to "test" the modified A ration. Under the modified A ration every unit in the Division receives the same items of food at the same meal. If Company A of the 106th Quartermaster regiment has string beans, rice and steak for supper, every company in the Division has the same thing. Modified menus the government allows each company commander two cents per day per ration (a ration is the food required to feed one man for one day, to purchase extra foodstuffs to keep his various sectional tastes satisfied. It takes about \$5,000 a day to feed the Dixie Division.

Col. Spangler described the garrison ration. "Under that system the government allowed a certain amount of money per day per man (usually between 40 and 50 cents) and the company commander could order the food wanted. Consequently menus over the division were not necessarily uniform."
 The Colonel stated the division would probably stay on "modified A" until it departs for the maneuver area about next August, when the straight A or B field ration will be used. Under the straight A ration no money would be allowed to cater to

sectional tastes.
 "B field rations are usually issued only in actual field exercises," Col. Spangler explained, and is composed entirely of canned and preserved foods. There is a "C field ration" which is six cans of meat, bread, etc. issued daily to the individual soldier, if necessary.

the authenticity with which she follows his thought and dialect, these are accomplishments instantly recognized in her work. And beneath the surface one is aware of two forces which inform her fiction: first, her very Southern attachment to lost causes, and then the nobility of standard with which she reverts the past and scrutinizes the present.

Asa Timberlake, the leading character in her new novel, "This Our Life" is a lost cause from start to finish. You are told at the outset that he, a relic of an old family, is a failure in his job and a misfit in his surroundings; from that point the story revolves about his ability to save something from his personal defeat and to supply some order to the muddled careers of his children. Asa Timberlake's is a success story in reverse.

No novelist of our time can tell a better story in briefer compass than Robert Nathan. He is indeed a master of economy, and to anyone interested in the technique of writing, it is a joy to see with what power of suggestion, what fleeting touches of humor and tenderness, what flashes of irony and skillful transitions, he achieves his effect. The author of "One More Spring," "The Enchanted Village," and "Portrait of Jennie" is at his best in "They Went On Together," a novel-story which will haunt many an American mind this Spring.

When asked for a forward to his novel, Mr. Nathan said, "I've tried to write a book that wasn't simply an escape from what was going on, and at the same time didn't just give in to it. In other words, a book that wasn't either a wishing well or a pit of desolation." He takes for his story a reality which has already left its mark in our minds—the story of how people are driven from their homes by the crushing, ruthless power of an invader, the story which we see when we remember the road to Bordeaux. Suppose this were to happen in the United States; and suppose there really was an invasion. What would it feel like to our women and our children? So the story begins with a naturalness and a sympathy so engrossing that within a few pages you have identified the neighborhood as your own.

Paul is sorting out his treasures as the book begins. He has room in his pockets for only a few. The suffed french fish, the watch with the broken minute hand, an old medal which had belonged to his father. He had five or six keys he didn't want to leave; there was nothing for them to fit into, but they might come in handy some day. Suppose he came to a house and the door was locked. Probably one of them would open it. Then his mother calls; they store Marie Rose into her baby carriage with her doll, a few bits of food, and a blanket, and start trudging away from the sound of the guns. It is as simple as that. What makes the story ominous, what gives it death and pity, is the accuracy of the evocative. He was held on to their hobnobbing before the rising tide of "plaster." "It was such a nice little home," says Mom to herself.

"How am I going to get through?" That's your lookout sister. "You can go fishing with me when we get to the river," says Paul to her, who has lost her folk. And the author adds, "To children, grief is a catching trouble; they go around it if they can." It is the truth of that observation which turns this story into something more than a simple account of a family's flight, which gives it its shine and shadow. The absurd irrelevance as Marie Rose talks to herself, the inexhaustible resource with which Paul picks himself up after the bombing, "You're there, he thought, talking to the men in the street— you think you're smart. You think you're smart because you go around hurting people, so they'll do what you want. Well, they won't; they won't."

read this to be held in your heart the tender, infinite pity of the helpless and the innocent. "Up at the Villa," by W. Somerset Maugham, stands on the border line between a long short story and a vest-pocket novel. We prefer to call it a long short story, having in mind that the action is confined to forty-eight hours and that the characters are determined primarily by their reactions to a single situation. "Ole Diz" Is Left Speechless By Retirement Refusal

CHICAGO, May 15 (AP)—The inimitable Dizzy Dean tried to quit baseball yesterday but wound up by moving from the Chicago Cubs' bench to the club's coaching lines—at double pay.

In a surprise move which climaxed a day of Dean's engagements and actually left the great pitcher momentarily speechless, the Cubs refused Dean's request for voluntary retirement, gave him his unconditional release and signed him as a coaching aide to Manager Jimmy Wilson.

"Boy, has this club been good to me," said Dean when the Cub general manager, James Galloghery, announced Dean would remain with the team. That short remark summed up Dean's case. For the Cubs gave Dean a new contract as coach, starting his pay today, and will also give him the remainder of his reported \$10,000 player contract at the end of the season.

"This ends—for at least a year—the playing career of one of baseball's great pitchers, one who won 20 games and lost only seven for St. Louis Cardinals in 1924 and who in six seasons as a Cardinal averaged 22 wins a year.

"That was before 'Ole Diz' whose colorful personality, associations and salary holdouts made him the 'newest' figure in the game, came to Chicago in April, 1928—costing the Cubs \$185,000 cash and three players.

"That year Dizzy played a part in the Club's pennant winning drive, winding up with a seven-and-one last record. But the next two seasons when he could win only nine games

18 Men Required In Factories For 1 Man At Front

CLEVELAND, May 13 (AP)—Insisting that today's wars will be won in the factory, the National Machine Tool Builders Association calculates the present complex, mechanized warfare requires 18 men to maintain just one soldier on the firing line. In 1918 only five men backed up every man at the front.

The modern soldier fires a rifle three times as fast as in the first World War. He can travel completely equipped, 10 times as far in a day. The tank, introduced by the British in the first World War but a limited factor until the closing stages, now is vital. And the airplane's capacity is 32 times that of the last great conflict.

Therefore, the association calculates, the real contest today is not on the firing line but on the factory production line where the defense equipment is built. "The great army of men behind the army at the front today includes steelmakers, shipbuilders, metal workers, farmers, parts assemblers, inspectors and a long list of others. But none is of greater importance than the country's operators of machine tools—an army of over a million men."

R. A. F. Smashes At Germany's Forces In French-Ruled Syria

Nazi Planes Are Attacked By British; Reich Units Land At Syrian Airports Imperial Troops Re-occupy Salum French Role In War Causes Comment In England And U. S.

Berlin, May 16—(AP)—"Positions from which the next blow will be struck have been occupied," the well-known German news agency said today in a special communication. The German high command said it had "obviously pointed to Nazi infiltration into Syria, and Iraq."

The significant sentence in the well-known news communication was part of an inspired German utterance on the German air force. The German high command said that it had taken "positive attitude" in the recent laboration conference.

LONDON, May 16—(AP)—British airpower is smashing at the Germans in French-ruled Syria where Nazi planes and Panzer forces are reported making a swift infiltration further along the Syrian route to Suez, nearer Britain's Middle East oil fields.

The first British blow was delivered on this potentially crucial battlefield yesterday when the German planes were attacked by the R. A. F. at Damascus, Rayan and Palmira.

Fleets of German long-range bombers and troop carriers were reported landing on Syrian airfields.

Salum has been re-occupied by British troops. It was officially announced today in Cairo. The British said strong columns of tanks and armor were reported on the Egyptian border outpost just across the Libyan frontier.

Also again in British hands were Hailaya, Pantala, and the British government will continue to have assembly with France against further collaboration with Germany, especially in view of the developments in the Middle East.

U. S. To Guard Her Commerce, Roosevelt Says

President Offers Reminder To Nazis Pointing To Historical Examples

NEWPORT, R. I., May 16—(AP)—President Roosevelt today "repeatedly" asserted that the United States will guard her commerce and her ships as she has done in the past.

Washington, May 16—(AP)—President Roosevelt injected today into the discussion of Germany's declaration that the Red Sea will be a danger zone for foreign ships a pointed reminder that twice before the United States had used her warships to protect her commerce and obtain freedom of the seas.

He asserted freedom of seas is an historical American policy, but would not indicate just what the United States might be prepared to do about the Red Sea.

The United States seized a dozen or more French ships in American ports last night and President Roosevelt at the same time appealed to France over the heads of its leaders not to deliver herself up to a Germany bent on the utter destruction of liberty.

Ships, on which the U. S. Coast Guard put armed guards, included the luxury liner Normandie at New York.

The President, in his appeal to the French people, characterized as "incomprehensible" the willing acceptance by the French of alliance demands by the Nazis.

These steps were Washington's swift reaction to dispatches from abroad indicating that they were throwing in their lot with the Nazis. The British were virtually accusing the French government of acting as a German ally by permitting Nazi planes to cross Syria to Iraq.

In a surprise statement from the White House, President Roosevelt implied that France was about to enter an alliance with Germany which involved "the peace and safety of the Western Hemisphere."

After a long conference with Secretary of State Hull and Undersecretary Walter A. Reuther, the President decided that the American people could hardly believe that the French government would lend itself "to a plan of voluntary alliance which would deliver up France and its colonial empire."
