SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) -**Police Chief Thomas J. Cahill** said today he expects 50,000 or more people to stage a mass ive civil rights march through his convention city Sunday to register opposition to Sen. Bar-Budget Goldwater's presidential

While expressing guarded optimism that the march will be peaceful, Cahill cautioned Republican convention delegates to avoid incidents with the demonstrators that might touch off violence.







More man half of the persor who took alvantage of the free eye tests conducted Saturday by the Lions Club, flunked the tests, testing supervisor Dr. **Richard Daugherty** reported today.

Tests were given to 54 persons from five years old to 79 years old, using the Lions Time Titmus Vision Screener, during three hours at the Lions Fun Fair celebration. The screening machine tests for visual acuity, muscle balance, color vision and hyperopia. Most of the children failed the test showed near-sightednss and muscle imbalance. "This could very definitely affect their grades in school,

particularly with relation to black-board work," Dr. Daugherty said.

Older people mostly failed the visual acuity test, which is important for driving a car Many of those who failed the tests have valid driving licenses, but should not be driving a car without correction.

"This points up the need for frequent testing of drivers to discover physical defects which make poor drivers a hazard to themselves and othrs on the road," Dr. Daugherty pointed out.

Those who failed the tests were referred to their family physician or an eye doctor for further tests and correction. Conducting the eye tosts were nurses from the Seminole County Public Health Department including Supervisor of Nurses, Mrs. Grace Fisher, Mrs. Hulda Kibbee and Mrs. Gilbert.

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Guilt About Hitler

Franz-Josef Strauss, former defense minister of West Germany, said in a speech the other day that Adolf Hitler alone shouldn't be blamed for World War II.

He was guilty of starting it all right when he invaded Poland in 19-89, said Herr Strauss, but that was not his intention. He simply did not forsee the consequences-that Bri-tain and France, having backed down so often in the past, would finally go to war.

Herr Strauss deplores the acceptance by many Germans of total blame for World Wars because it plays into the hands of those (particularly the Russians) who use the excuse of the "German menace" to keep Germany divided.

In one sense, Herr Strauss is right. Hitler was no more responsible for nearly burning down the world than a pyromaniac is responsible when he burns down a building. The difference is that firebugs are not usually placed in charge of nations.

Blame for World War II (or War I) aside, and the present-day reasons of the Russians notwithstanding. there are many in the West who wish to see a little more assurance that the Germans will never again give themselves into the hands of a Hitler before they can support German reunification.

In this regard, it is encouraging to see that Chancellor Erhard formally rebuked one of his officials who issued a fiery call for the return of the Sudetenland from Czechoslovakin to Germany.

This is one instance where history cannot be allowed to repeat itself. It is to be hoped that it will be the Germans themselves who see that it does not.

If guilt about Hitler helps toward this end, it serves humanity.

The speaker was Tokle Kawamoto of Hiroshima, Japan. The bombs she referred to were just two-the atomic bombs dropped on her city and on Nagasaki in 1945.

It comes as a shock to learn that 41 people died of radiation disease in Hiroshima in 1968 alone as a result of the bomb that fell nearly two decades ago.

The intention of Tokie was not to recriminate but to teach-to teach the too-easily-ignored lesson of what

a war means in the nuclear age. She was part of a group of survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki traveling around the world as good will ambassadors. They have visited 100 cities in the United States and will go on to Europe, the Soviet Union, and Red China.

Tokie, who was only 12 at the time of the attack, underwent 20 operations on her injuries. One thing can never be cured, though: the fear that

Permits For 6 Months Top \$5.2 Million




