Gov. Reubin Askew. The laws are big and little: etting out how the state will spend \$3.9 billion and repealing an egg inspection fee of four cents per 30 dozen cases; completely revising educational funding and property tax assessment procedures ad allowing the state to help pay for diseased honeybees.

Only one bill passed by the Legislature with a July 1 effective date has not been signed by Askew. It is the coastal mapping bill to allow the Natural Resources Department to establish high water marks, the boundary of state land ownership. It is controversial with onservationists. Probably the most far reach-

ing is the bill to give full rights of adulthood to persons 18, 19 and 20 including the right to drink, enter contracts, hold any job they were previously denied solely because of age and bor-

The bill also liberates their parents from the legal obligation to care for them after 18. Legislators closed the poor man's loophole to escape smoking tax by imposing a 17-cent-apack tax, the same as for cigarettes, on little cigars. Other significant laws which





### Mexico Chief Asks Birth Slowdown

President Luis Echeverria has called publicly for a slowdown of Mexico's birthrate. Without going into specifics, the chief executive told a recating of governors, cabinet ministers and labor leaders that the rapid growth must be slowed to better prepare Mexico

for future demands. "We ought to sit down in meetings like this, advised by the best technicians and in light of universal experiences to see how it is possible, with respect for the dignity of our populace and our liberties, to obtain a descent in the growth index of the population," he said.

All of Mexico's "complex national problems" will become more complicated in the next five years, he warned.

He did not have to mention them. The tasks of feeding, housing, educating, employing and providing health services to that part of the country's 50 million population living at a marginal or subsistence level loom large in the minds of all thinking Mexicans.

Internationally, greater problems will arise in the future, Echeverria said. While some countries lose their liberties and others prepare for war, "the countries of the Third World-

#### Headline Grabbing

### Other Issues Demand Attention

By EDWARD NEILAN Copley News Service

WASHINGTON - Watergate gets the headlines but there are other issues being defended, attacked and debated in the nation's capital. Women's rights, trade expansion, education, taxes,

consumer complaints and mass transit are just a few of the subjects being aired currently with scant publicity. One crusade that is virtually uncovered by the press is an international undertaking to save the kangaroo. Mariann Newman, Washington coordinator of the non-

partisan, non-rofit Fund for Animals Inc. (FFA) said "thousands of Americans" have contributed money and other thousands have written letters of support of efforts to save the kangaroo from extinction. Some supposedly larger and more improtant issues never generate that much mail

The FFA had reason to be pleased earlier this year after persistent prodding had finally pushed the Department of Interior to agree to propose that the kangaroo be added to the list of endangered species. That, plus an earlier move by the Australian government to halt the export of kangaroos, at least reduced imports of kangaroo meat and hides into the United States. As recently

as 1970, between 500,000 and 1 million kangaroo pelts were imported into this country each year, at a cash value of about Protection of the high-bounding kangaroo, which ironically is being slaughtered openly in Australia, where the

animal is the state emblem, is not an issue that affects every American. But animal lovers throughout the nation have taken up the cause of the endangered animal, according to

The Washington coordinator of FFA said she was still answering congratulatory mail praising FFA efforts to get kangaroos on the endangered species list when she read with

adherents eat kangaroo meat regularly as a means of staying trim.

Mrs. Newman went into action as if she were responding

to a five-alarm fire. First she sent a letter of protest to Mrs. Jean Nidetch, New York-based president of Weight Watchers International, protesting advocacy of eating kangaroo meat. (Its import has recently been banned in the United States but the meat is still sold in Australia and New Zealand, where Weight Watchers has many "subscribers.") Mrs. Newman wrote to the Weight Watcher president:

"I hope that you will take the kangaroo off the list of recommended meats as soon as possible, and in so doing publicize your reasons for taking this action." To a reporter's phone inquiry, Mrs. Newman said, "We have no quarrel with nor do we wish to embarrass the Weight Watchers. But I'm publicizing my letter to them in an effort

to help save the kangaroo." Mrs. Newman said she is leaving July 30 for a monthlong trip to Australia to personally "assess the status of the kangaroo on behalf of FFA." She added: "You can bet I'm goint to contact the Weight

Watchers' branches in Australia to discuss the question with It was only in April of this year that the Australian government announced a total ban on the export of kangaroo

hides, meat and any other products for the animal. U.S. customs officials have not yet been given the word to half inflow to the United States of Kangaroo-skin items because Australia has not yet fully implemented its ban.

Therefore, according to Mrs. Newman, American tourists are contributing to the kangaroo's speedy extinction by coming back from Australia with millions of dollars' worth of athletic shoes, ships, saddles, ski clothes, furniture upholstery, riding boots, golf and tennis bags, hat bands and other "frivolous commodities"-all made from kangaroo

New U.S.-Soviet \*\* pacts spell gains

> By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (NEA)

Scientific agreements signed here during the visit of Soviet chief Leonid I. Brezhnev if fully implemented will result in important gains for both nations and be of immeasurable over the long run — and here we are speaking of one or

two decades - this cooperation could mean increases in food and raw material output which could help prevent extended inflation of the type we are so nervously experiencing these Item - Agricultural research. The Soviet Union, despite its dismal agricultural record overall, has been carrying out intribuing experiments in cold weather crops and farming yu. n genetic breeding of plants and animals (how

to get more cows to give birth to twins, for one) that are of intense interest to American agricultural scientists. Northern Russia and Siberia are known to have a wide range of unusual plants and unique varieties of common vegetation. American research men are most anxious to get their hands on these for use in developing new strains with high yields resistant to extreme weather conditions and to

American scientists, in addition, want to study types of plant diseases as yet little known to this country in the hope that ways of fighting these infections can be found before they migrate here and do rapid damage to crops which may have a low resistance to these particular pests. The great worry in U.S. agriculture today, in fact, is the loreign pest with few or no natural enemies here which can attack with vicious suddenness the nation's crop of a particular food. Russia and China are the two great remaining

areas which American agricultural scientists most want to study for this purpose. Item - Transportation. Though the U.S.S.R. in many ways is backward in this field. Soviet scientists have been doing excellent work in studying ways of moving ships through icebound seas - of great importance to the United States in transporting oil from the Alaskan North Slope, whether a long-distance pipeline is built or not.

The Russians have also done some ingenious work in cold climate construction. Soviet ability in aircraft design is well

Item - Oceanography. Soviet fishing fleets have made extensive surveys in particular areas of the world's oceans, in considerable measure for military reasons to be sure, but nonetheless valuable for climate studies, for fishing and other marine activities. The contributions of Soviet scientists in this field working with Americans should make possible eventually a more effective use of the seas for food, minerals (including petroleum) and other materials. Interestingly the Soviet Union has made some important advances in oil drilling equipment and techniques.

Weather studies of course will be one important phase of the U.S.-Soviet cooperation. The Russians have been highly imaginative in this field, especially in such areas as the dissipation of fog from airfields and in the production of rain.



#### BRUCE BIOSSAT Plane passenger searches 'good'

WASHINGTON (NEA) Rigid searches of airline passengers and their carry-on belongings, in effect since Jan. 5, have cut U.S. plane hijacking attempts to zero. But they are a source of some contro-

Some passengers complain of the delays enforced by ion procedures, others dislike having their purses brief cases, hand luggage and packages riffled through by airport checkers. (An occasional random survey shows, however, that countless travelers don't mind any of this at all.) The American Civil Liberties Union is all stirred up over the inspection procedures, contending they are "unlimited" and a violation of people's rights under the Fourth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

That article says the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, except upon "probable cause." That monns, of course, cause to suspect a crime has been commuted or, presumably, is about to be. Well let's measure the fuss against the facts.

Though the very rigid searches started generally only this January, less general and more casual checks have been in effect quite a bit longer. With what results? We've already noted the total stoppage of hijack efforts this year. Possibly more striking is what the searchers have I

The FAA tells me that in an 11-month period, from June, 1972, to early May this year, the following items were taken from passengers about to board U.S. commercial aircraft: Exactly 1.826 guns, 11.956 knives, and 5.280 other dangerous articles, ranging very widely from identifiable explosives to blackjacks to cans of disabling Mace and small tear gas

That comes to just a bit more than 19,000 items, most of which could be judged menacing enough to touch off a hijacking attempt. Not in all cases are passengers permanently deprived of these articles. A friend tells me that a woman standing in the inspection line just ahead of him was found to be carrying a six-inch switchblade knife in her purse. She was given three options: Find an envelope and mail the knife, get rid of it, or stay off the flight.

Now, obviously, the stringent procedures have been both effective and "productive," in the sense of revealing and blocking any possible use of 19,000 dangerous weapons or other devices. These consequences are hardly trivial Measure the results against past events. The FAA says that from May 1, 1961, until the stiff checks took effect, there were 160 attempts to hijack U.S. planes. Of this total, 8 were successful, 32 "incomplete," and just 30 rated totaly unsuccessful. In this span, six innocent persons, including three passengers, were killed.



A spectacular match race between two of Georgia's leading short track stock car drivers has been announced with the winner getting a ride in the July 22 Dixie 500 NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National event at the Atlanta International Raceway in Hampton, Ga.

Sportsman Drivers Jody Ridley and Buck Simmons, two of the winningest drivers in the history of bull ring-type competition, will run a 20-lap match race at Dixie Speedway. near Mariets, Saturday, July 7, to determine who gets to drive Junie Donlevy's Mercury in the Dixie 500.

Besides competing regularly at Dixie, as well as winning regularly, Ridley and Simmons have also taken the checkered flag at short track events on other Georgia tracks, as well as tracks in South Carolina, Alabama and Tennessee. More than 40,000 spectators are expected for the July 22 event, which boasts a record purse of over \$102,000. Time trials start July 19 and continue through July 21.

#### Auto Racing Bits 'n' Pieces

GORDON JOHNCOCK, 1973 Indianapolis 500 winner, will have to wait at least another two months to pocket his share of the \$236,022.82 first place purse. Bankruptcy involving the Franklin, Ind. driver's race winnings were continued las week until Aug. 15. Johncock filed for bankruptcy last February, listing debts of \$365,551 and assets of \$60,000. A 50 per cent shareholding in Johncock Racing Enterprises, Inc., the corporation under which Johncock races, is listed among the assets. His winnints from the race have been placed in the company, from which he is paid a salary.

A. J. FOYT, fierce competitor in both NASCAR and USAC competition, was awarded \$75,000 by a Federal jury last week in a libel suit against Time, Inc., and its magazine, Sports Illustrated. Foyt claimed that the story about him that appeared in the April 5, 1971 issue damaged his future earning by misquoting him. Foyt testified that the article had harmed his image as well as made life difficult for him with other NASCAR drivers. The three-time Indianapolis 500 winner also saod since the story appeared some NASCAR officials have given his car more stringent inspections than his competitors. Part of the quote included Foyt referring to NASCAR drivers as "hillbillies." Foyt is a member of USAC.

BELTSVILLE SPEEDWAY'S July 13 Coco-Cola 200 Grand National East race, sanctioned by NASCAR, has been cancelled because of a county noise restriction limiting trackside moise level to 92 decibels. Officials at the Maryland track said the program was canceled because some drivers couldn't meet the noise requirements and that would make the grade of competition unfair to the fans.

DRIVER HARRY BENJAMIN and ca: owner Jimmy Shaw, who teamed up to win the United Racing Club's (URC) 1972 super spring championship, have juit the club. The surprise resignations came following incidents at Orange County Fair Speedway in Middleton, N.Y. June 16. Shaw charged two drivers with trying to "fence" Benjamin during a heat and the feature. Countering the charges, URC president Louis Kunz said he saw Benjamin pull two "bad acts" during the evening. "He was rough-riding," soad Kunz, adding, "On the last lap of the feature, he came up behind one driver and tapped and spin him.
