LAKELAND, Apr. 3.—The first annual conference of retired railroad men is scheduled here for April 3-8, and invitations have been extended all retired railway men and their wives who are now residing in Florida, as well as those in northern centers who may have the opportunity to attend the get-together.

In addition to several business sessions, at which matters of importance will be discussed concerning pensioners, an elaborate program of entertainment has been planned. A partial list includes a motorcade to Florida Cypress Gardens, Bok Tower, and a tour of the railway colony homes, which have been built for the exclusive use of the retired "rails."

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High Court Says Tampa Suit Club Not Against Law

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 3.—(AP)—The Supreme Court yesterday decided that a suit club operated in Tampa by Andre Vostre did not violate the state's lottery laws, as charged in Hillsborough county, and reversed a former decision which upheld Vostre's conviction in county criminal court.

"It now appears to us that the evidence is not sufficient to support the verdict and judgment," said yesterday's 4-2 opinion written by Justice Rivers Buford.

"It is true that Vostre and William Vaughn were partners in a business which engaged in the sale of suits and that Vaughn conducted what is known as suit clubs in which he would sell suits to be paid for in advance installments of one dollar per week, and that with some sales he would issue a ticket to the customer with the understanding that if a number identical with the number on the ticket should win in Cuban lottery in Tampa before the full price of the suit had been paid and when the customer was not in default in his weekly payments, then the holder of such ticket would get his suit without further payment.

"There is no sufficient showing in the record that Vaughn knowingly participated in such transactions or that he had any knowledge in regard thereto which would render him criminally liable for the criminal acts of his partners, although such criminal acts may be accomplished in the conducting of the partnership business."

Vostre and Vaughn were given suspended prison sentences of one year and Vostre was fined \$300.

Attorneys for Vostre contended he financed the business and had no knowledge of the suit club activities.

Justices Thomas and Whitfield dissented from yesterday's ruling. Chief Justice Glenn Terrell and Justices Armistead Brown and Roy Chapman concurred.

The first opinion was written by Justice Chapman and Justice Whitfield. Brown and Terrell then agreed in the conclusion that the sentence should be affirmed.

56 Young Men Are Enrolled In CCC From This County

JACKSONVILLE, Apr. 3.—Seminole County's interest in the quarterly CCC enrollment, which begins in Florida today and concludes on Apr. 10, is highlighted by figures received from this source.

During the month of February, there were 56 young men enrolled in the CCC from Seminole County, and these received in cash compensation the aggregate sum of \$1,680.00, which is in addition to sustenance, or a total for a 12-month period, using the February figures as an average, of \$20,000.00. The enrollees are paid a monthly wage of \$30, all of which they must return to dependents at home with the exception of a maximum \$8.

On the basis of February allotments, the CCC is bringing \$1,770.00 into the state annually, in addition to an even larger amount paid for the maintenance of the 16 camps in the state and for non-enrolled personnel.

The State Welfare Board is the selecting agency for the CCC, working through Jack Horne, its director of this department, and the social personnel of the twelve welfare districts.

April enrollment was announced by Horne as 689, which will recruit the total enrollment to an excess of 4,000 janitors.

Critics Of Bullitt Rebuffed When Hull Okeys Return

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull yesterday rebuffed congressional critics of Ambassador Bullitt by refusing to delay his scheduled departure for his Paris post today.

Hull had been requested by Representative Fish, Republican, New York, to keep Bullitt in this country until some action is taken on his resolution calling for a House investigation into charges in the recent German white paper that the envoy had welcomed American war aid to Poland.

He wrote Fish that Bullitt had denied the accusations and that "the executive department has accepted the denial without question. Furthermore," he added, "Ambassador Bullitt has been delayed by the illness of his daughter from returning to his post where he is needed."

"In the foregoing circumstances it is not felt that the public interest would be served by delaying more or less indefinitely the departure of Ambassador Bullitt as planned."

The latter was dispatched shortly after Bullitt bade farewell to President Roosevelt and following an informal senatorial luncheon at which the ambassador again repudiated the German allegations. He will fly to Europe aboard a clipper plane.

Reynolds earlier yesterday introduced a resolution calling for examination of both Bullitt and Undersecretary of State Welles.

Photographs of Eclipse Will Be Taken From Plane

JACKSONVILLE, Apr. 4.—(AP)—American Museum of Natural History scientists have assured themselves of a clear vision for taking motion pictures of the eclipse of the sun Sunday by arranging to go aloft in an airplane.

Prof. William Barton Jr., executive curator of the Museum's Hayden Planetarium in New York, will head the expedition of scientists who will make a movie of the annular eclipse, which will be observable in its entirety in a 150-mile wide strip across the southern edge of the United States.

The scientists will take up their equipment here in a 21-passenger Eastern Air Lines plane. Thus, they will be able to go above any cloud formations and also will not be troubled by changes in light caused by it passing through the atmosphere immediately above the earth's surface.

The eclipse is annular and the moon will not completely blot out the sun, even in the 150-mile strip. In this area of the full effect of the eclipse, there will be a ring around the moon. The eclipse will appear as if a dime had been placed on a penny, center to center, and 14 percent of the sun's surface will be in the outer ring not covered by the moon.

In sections of the United States above the 150-mile strip—which will run from Del Rio, Tex., through San Antonio, Austin, New Orleans and Jacksonville—the eclipse will appear as if a penny was being partly covered by another penny. The eclipse will range from 35 percent in Seattle to 68 percent in New York City and 82 percent in Raleigh, N. C., on a diameter basis.

DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING DOGWOOD

1. Dig hole 24" wide, 18" deep.
2. Add 50% good compost, peat, rotted leaves, or well rotted raw bone-meal.
3. Place tree in center of hole, one to two inches deeper than it grew originally.
4. Spread roots to natural position.
5. Use plenty of water and puddle in the prepared soil making sure that there are no airpockets left around the roots.
6. Mulch with oak leaves.
7. Water twice each week until plant is established.

The LEGEND Of The DOGWOODS

At the time of the crucifixion, the dogwood attained the size of the oak and other forest trees. So strong and straight was the wood of it that it was chosen for the timber for the Cross. To be thus used for such a cruel purpose greatly distressed the tree, and Jesus smiled upon it, sensed this, and in His gentle pity for sorrow, said to it: "Because of your regret and pity for My suffering I make you this promise:

"Never again shall the dogwood tree grow large enough to be used for a cross. Henceforth it shall be slender and bent and twisted, and its blossoms shall be in the form of a cross—two long petals and two short petals, and in the center of the outer edge of each petal there will be nail prints, brown with rust and stained with blood. And in the center of the flower there shall be an image of a crown of thorns and all who see it will remember that it was upon a dogwood tree I was crucified, and this tree shall not be mutilated or destroyed, but cherished as a reminder of My Death upon the Cross!"

DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING AZALEAS

- 1.—PREPARE beds carefully, making sure no roots from neighboring shrubs or trees lie underneath.
- 2.—SOILS—Any rich acid soil is satisfactory if it has good drainage. Light sandy soils must be improved by mixing in 50 percent peat, sand, or oak leaves.
- 3.—FERTILIZERS—Mixing cottonseed meal or low measure of lime of planting is helpful.
- 4.—BEWARE OF LIME—Measure from barns where lime has been used is harmful. Be sure there is no lime in soil when planting around foundations. Lime is deadly to azaleas.
- 5.—PLANTING—Set plant at same depth it grew in nursery. Do not put fresh dirt on top of outside ball. Pack dirt tightly around roots.
- 6.—MULCH—Put three or four inches of oak leaves on top of soil.
- 7.—WATERING—Water generously with fertilizer solution once or twice a week during first year.

Chinese Shrub Is Viewed As Likely Cash Crop In U. S.

Sino-Jap War Has Prevented Supplies From Entering Here

BROOKINGS, S. D., Apr. 4. —(AP)—As a result of the Sino-Japanese war, America's farmers may get another cash crop—ephedra sinica. Ephedra is a Chinese shrub whose stem yields an alkaline drug, ephedrine, which is used in the treatment of such respiratory ailments as hay fever, bronchial asthma and head colds. The war cut off America's supply of the crude drug.

Dr. L. D. Hiner, professor of pharmacy at South Dakota State College, who has been experimenting with the plant, first brought a dozen seeds here in 1929 to investigate the shrub's possibilities as an anchor for wind-swept soil. Test plots were planted and it was discovered that with proper care plants could be developed to furnish ephedrine in considerable quantities. It was found that naturalized plants could produce as much as 1.64 percent ephedrine as compared with the Chinese-grown shrub content of 1 percent.

Though known in China for thousands of years as Ma Huang, the plant and its drug were scarcely known here 10 years ago. It is a large species of nearly leafless desert shrub found only in a wild state on the dry plains of China. It grows low to the ground and is harvested in much the same manner as hay. Department of Commerce statistics show that imports of ephedra sinica in crude drug form reached nearly 2,000,000 pounds annually before 1937. It formerly sold for two and a half to three cents a pound, but in 1939 was listed as being worth 10 to 15 cents in bulk form.

February Sales Increase Over February 1938

JACKSONVILLE, Apr. 4. —Continuing series of unbroken gains for the 14th consecutive month, Florida sales of independent retail merchants in February increased 12.8 over February, 1939, the Florida State Chamber of Commerce reported today. Increases were reported for the month in all of the city-size groupings, while in classifications of business lumber and building material dealers showed the greatest gain, 20.8 percent, the State Chamber said. Dollar sales were totaled at \$4,129,134 for the 263 Florida firms reporting, a gain of 12.8 over the same month last year and a loss of only 0.3 percent when compared with the preceding month of January, 1940. Cities and their percentages of gain were: St. Petersburg, 22.6; West Palm Beach, 18.5; Tampa, 18.3; Jacksonville, 13.6; Miami, 13.4; Pensacola, 12.8; and Orlando, 7.1. Business classifications and their rates of increase: lumber and building material, 20.8; motor vehicle, 20.3; furniture, 16.6; department stores, 12.6; drug, 12.4; filling stations, 8.7; grocery and meat, 8.3; dry goods, general merchandise, 3; and hardware stores, 1.6.

German Bombers Strike At English Shipping Through Air Raids

When German bombers attacked a British convoy in the North sea, 10 planes were reported lost.

Enemy planes attacked convoys this afternoon and dropped 18 bombs without hitting any ships or inflicting any damage, the admiralty announced, without mentioning locations. "The planes were driven off by the fire of escorting warships. One Heinkel attacked another convoy but was driven off by three fleet air arm planes."

Standing close behind the podgy but volatile figure of the first lord of the admiralty in the figures emerging from Prime Minister Chamberlain's third government shift of the war are two other key men—Sir Kingsley Wood and Sir John Simon.

Reporting with Churchill to Chamberlain as heads of war committees, they form a war cabinet in fact if not in name.

Sir Kingsley, who traded his air ministry with Sir Samuel Hoare for the latter's post as lord privy seal, will head the home policy committee.

He will direct, discuss and advise on social and domestic problems of wartime, including food and agriculture—vital to this importing heavy-eating nation of 48,000,000 "shopkeepers."

To Sir John Simon, silver-haired and silent veteran of finance, remains the staggering task of presiding over the cabinet's economic policy committee.

As chancellor of the exchequer, he directs Great Britain's mighty offensive of pounds, shillings and pence.

With the nation quickening to the increased tempo of aerial warfare and with Germany, "Goring declaring the Reich will strike on the west, Chamberlain bowed to public clamor to 'fight the war' by making the 64-year-old Churchill head of the vital service committee. He remains first lord of the admiralty, as well.

not only the highest executive of the admiralty, Britain's chief instrument of blockade, but Britain's chief strategist as well.

War Is Seen As Threat To U. S. School Progress

Fosdick Reviews Activities Of Rockefeller Foundation

NEW YORK, Apr. 4.—Because of the fundamental unity of the intellectual life of modern civilization, the present cataclysm in Europe contains a grave threat to progress in the universities and laboratories of the United States, Raymond E. Fosdick, president of the Rockefeller Foundation has warned.

In his annual review of the activities of the foundation, made public in part, Mr. Fosdick disclosed that grants made by the foundation in 1934 approximated \$9,500,000 and enabled cooperative work to be carried on in forty-seven lands, including Java, Fiji and Australia.

The four fields of public health, medical, social and natural sciences each received grants of about \$2,000,000. Mr. Fosdick disclosed that \$1,000,000 was spent for activities in the humanities, and nearly \$500,000 for a program of rural reconstruction in China. He reported the income of the foundation in 1934 was \$6,627,450, supplemented by the principal fund of \$18,450,000 transferred from the principal fund. Twenty-five percent of the total expenditure was in foreign countries and 75 percent in the United States, the foundation's president disclosed.

Mr. Fosdick challenged the statement that the trend of intellectual leadership is westward across the Atlantic and said that those who assert this and support it by referring to certain specific fields such as neurosurgery, anatomy, dentistry and orthopedics, overlook many other fields.

"In physiology, for example, it

would be difficult to determine whether the leadership lies in Europe or in the United States," Mr. Fosdick said. "The same is true of anatomy and pathology. In fields like pharmacology, tropical medicine, ophthalmology, legal medicine, social medicine and dermatology—to mention only a few—leadership is unquestionably still in Europe or was in 1934.

"In mathematics the English are indisputably pre-eminent in analytic number theory; the Russians are making important contributions in topology and probability, the French in algebra. America cannot match the group of European scientists in the important fields of enzyme chemistry and the organic chemistry of natural products.

"Nowhere else in the world can one duplicate or even approach the coordinated and cooperating Scandinavian group which is focusing so many precise techniques of chemistry and physics on problems of biology.

The most dramatic scientific development of 1934, the splitting of the atom of the heavy element uranium and its transmutation into barium and other light elements, was based upon results obtained in 1934 by the Italian physicist Fermi, and the disintegration products of uranium first directly observed by Hahn and Strassman in Berlin in 1939. Mr. Fosdick pointed out.

"America needs to be humble about this question of intellectual leadership," he continued. "In spite of the anxiety and insecurity abroad during these recent years, of the six Nobel Prizes awarded in science in 1934, five went to Europe and one went to the United States. In countless ways we are dependent upon Europe for stimulation and leadership in relation to many segments of our intellectual and cultural activity.

"If, because of war-exhaustion or chaos the universities and laboratories of Europe should be forced to suspend their fundamental activities for even half a decade, the consequences to the intellectual life of America would

be immediate and disastrous." At the present time scientific growth "is almost invariably the result of cross-fertilization between laboratories and groups in widely separated parts of the world," Mr. Fosdick said. Most often the start comes from some isolated or timid voice making an inspired suggestion or raising a stimulating question that echoes through the laboratories of the world until the voice becomes decisive and authoritative, he added.

"Thus, in the case of the breakdown of uranium during the past year, the early tentative questionings came from Rome; they were caught up at Berlin, were eagerly heard at Paris and Copenhagen and then spanned the Atlantic and were seized upon here so enthusiastically that literally within hours, rather than within days, the critical experiments had been checked and extended at Columbia University at the Carnegie Institute of Washington, and Lawrence's laboratory at the University of California," he said.

Sulfanilamide is similarly a product of international collaboration, the analysis of the drug produced in connection with the commercial dye industry in Germany; the isolation of the potent factor now known as sulfanilamide from the rest of the protosol molecule at the Pasteur Institute in Paris, and the subsequent experiments at Queen Charlotte's Hospital in London, at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine in Baltimore, and in other laboratories and hospitals on both sides of the Atlantic.

"Achievement in science, more often than not, is the result of the sustained thinking of many minds in many countries driving toward a common goal," Mr. Fosdick concluded. "The creative spirit of man cannot successfully be localized or nationalized. Ideas are starved when they are fenced in behind frontiers.

"The fundamental unity of modern civilization is the unity of its intellectual life, and that life can-

French Women Are Proving Valuable Help In Factories

PARIS, Apr. 4.—(AP)—Raoul Dautry, minister of armaments, continues to pay glowing tributes to the women of France who are working in munitions plants.

This correspondent visited some of the factories in which hundreds of women are helping to keep war production at its maximum.

The women are working in almost every industry—automotive branches, shells and munitions, airplanes and clothing. They have filled the places left vacant by men who now guard the Maginot line. They are doing all the light work where deft fingers are needed, and where painstaking care is essential. In a land where for centuries the women made lace, artificial flowers, dainty clothing, and where they created and executed the world's styles in dress, it is natural for them to turn to the innumerable tasks where patience and precision are required.

In the big industrial plants, a few women operate small lathes and automatic machines, but for most part they work where only the hands and eyes are needed. In one big tank producing factory, one of the largest of its kind in the world, there are scores of women engaged in the quietest and most important. They were testing, packing and grading roller bearings, from sizes almost too small to be seen with the naked eye to big, polished cylinders and spherical bearings large as marbles.

Whitehair charged that no gov-

ernment has ever progressed under a system whereby such a great portion of the national income is required for governmental service, and promised to remove "a lot of the dead wood and red tape" in Florida's government if he is elected.

Whitehair left Ocala following his address last night for Orlando where he was to be honored all day today at a mammoth political rally and barbecue given by his Orange county friends and enthusiasts.
