If that is so, one can only wonder what facts he found and what he reported to the President upon his return. About the only statement the President has made is that Mr. Welles found "scant immediate prospect for peace." And it is the prospect for peace, whether immediate or remote, that Mr. Sullivan sees as the determining factor in the President's desire for a third term.

If there were an immediate prospect for peace, the President naturally would like to have a hand in it. He would like to make sure that the kind of world peace which he envisages as the salvation of mankind would result. In short, when the representatives of the nations of the world sit down around the council table to work out a new Versailles Treaty, he would like to see his New Deal expanded into a sort of World New Deal.

Naturally if hostilities were to end in the immediate future, it would be impossible to conclude any such peace terms before Mr. Roosevelt goes out of office next January. If he is to have any voice in the formation of the kind of a world which is to result from this war, he would have to run for a third term and be President not only next January but for several years to come.

On the other hand, if there is no immediate prospect for peace, if the war is to be fought on until millions have been killed, until cities have been destroyed, until governments throughout the entire world have toppled, there there would be little if anything which Mr. Roosevelt could He lifted clouds of hay and musky do, even if he remained president, foward establishing his World New Deal, for many years to come, if ever.

Chinese Shrub Is Viewed As Likely Cash Crop In U.S.

Sino-Jap War Has Prevented Supplies From EnteringHere

BROOKINGS, S. D., Apr. 4. —(A)—As a result of the Sino-Japanese war, America's farm-ers may get another cash crop phedra sinica. Ephedra is a Chinese shrub whose stems yield an alkaline drug, ephedrine, which is used in the treatment of such respir-

atory ailments as hay fever The war cut off America's sup-ply of the crude drug.

Dr. L. D. Hiner, professor of pharmacy at South Dakota State College, who has been experi-menting with the plant, first brought a dozen seeds here in

1929 to investigate the shrub's

possibilities as an anchor for wind-swept soil.

Test plots were planted and it was discovered that with proper care plants could be decloped to furnish ephedrine in usuable quantities. It was found that naturalized plants could pro luce as much as 1.64 percent phedrine as compared with the hinese-grown shrub content of
