





Such a statement is often just an excuse, although it may have its merits. Judgment in such a case is God's to give and not our's. The ideal for all of us is to worship and to work not just one or the other. To praise God in worship and to praise God in works of mercy is a goal to strive for, no matter who else falls short of that ideal. This is

In Matthew 9:13 Jesus tells a group of listeners "Go and learn the meaning of the words: It is mercy I desire and not sacrifice! I have come to call, not the self righteous but sinners." He is quoting the prophet Osee and giving us a starting reminder that our love must strive to be constant, to be visible in good works, this, not empty ritual is true

Neither passage from Osee or Matthew seems to be spoken in a context of worship. But actually the prophet Osee is offering a sacrifice of praise. With beautiful images he is busy proclaiming the love of God, when God seems to break in with his own commentary, as if to say, "all well and good, but words without deeds of love will not be an acceptable

The message of Christ comes in a discussion with the problems - divorce, for her 15-year-old son, who Pharisees, who were the first to insist on the prescribed rituals and washings and temple worship. And also the first, unfortunately, to protest at any inclusion of the outcast and the cirmer, the despised and the unclean. It is to these lovers of ritual that the warning of Jesus comes, that their ritual becomes a judgment upon them, the very opposite of a saving word, unless they learn the first lesson of God's glory, that he desires mercy to be shown to all men.

There is nothing wrong with rituals of worship, or symbols and expressions of beliefs, unless they become ends in themselves. And this has threatened religion in every

What starts out as an external expression of inward faith, an outward sign of man's yearning, contrition and desire, becomes nothing but an external expression, an outward sign. The vital course of a man's life is not altered; the loving, thinking center of a man becomes armor-plated. He says the holy phrases but they do not pierce the armor. They

We do need things to help us think and pray. In Christian worship, in the Mass, the verses of prayer, the signs we now call sacraments, the gesture which our earliest brothers in the Faith named the breaking of the bread, the cup and the loaf themselves - all these are an immense help to us, and Jesus himself used them. There are so many wonderful signs - the cross against the sky, the uplifted hands, the body bowed down and raised up, the mighty surge of music and song, the suddenly discovered depths of silence - it is all these elements of ritual and worship that lift our minds and hearts, that enable us to "cross over."


There should be no disquieted feeling, no argument here.

The key is to see these elements of worship as signs that point in many directions, and that do not deliver us from the esponsibilities of earth. If we find God through our prayer the God we find will dwell in highest heaven but also in the ordinary world. God says through Osee he desires the known? Not just in high mountains and high moments of contemplation, but also in the depths of human life, in the mystery of suffering and love.

How do we keep worship, then, from the awful divorce, the sterility of rite without righteousness, word without witness? There is some safeguard if we try to understand the symbols that worship uses. Most frequently they are words gestures, bread broken and shared, a cup filled, poured out and given. These symbols contain a reality but point beyond to new reaches of that reality. WE SHOULD TRY TO AD-VANCE TO GREATER COMPLETION, an integration of word and act, church and outside-church, worship and world.

If Christ is found in the breaking of the bread, then continue to break it to feed man's hunger. And you will continue to find him. Indeed, you will be doing it to him. If the words you hear have been a comfort or a challenge, then try to convey this in daily relationships. We are invited to be not merely receivers but conors, and do-ers. You hear of love, and hold out your hands to love - but the signs of love don't just happen; make them! Show the mercy and understanding you feel you have received. You hear a word many times

over in worship. What happens then? Do we understand the meaning of the person who wisely wrote, "Unless the Word takes flesh in us, it remains only an echo, a promise?" A promise, and a haunting, melancholy echo of what might have been.

Catholic Schools Survival Fight

Copley News Service

Catholic schools' fight for survival will have a major effect on the education of all children, but few public school parents fully realize it.

Large - scale closing of parochial schools assuredly would require more taxes. Because of their structure, nonpublic schools have a greater ability to improve organization, curricula, methodology and instruction than do public schools mired in the 20- to 50-year lag between inspiration and implementation.

Nonpublic schools also provide what little competition exists in education. Few schools are as accountable as nonpublic ones. Public school officials engaged in endless debate over accountability need only look at a system that has been accountable and decentralized for years to learn what it means. In urban areas, many inner - city Catholic and other nonpublic schools provide a better education than their public colleagues and they also help to keep whites in cities.

Most people, Catholics included, see dollar signs when they think of the parochial school problem. One of the studies for the President's Commission on School Finance explains, "Popular opinion notwithstanding, the dilemma of Catholic schools does not derive simply from a shortage of dollars and cents . . . Though serious and extensive, the financial difficulties. . . are more properly identified as symptoms than as

causes of the crisis. Many Catholic schoolmen and theologians believe the crisis is within the church, not the schoolroom. For the first time, Catholics are able to choose a parochial or public

Rev. John F. Meyers, executive secretary of the Department of Chief Administrators of Catholic Education. says, "My own hypothesis is that people never wanted the schools. The bishops and pastors mandated them and convinced people that they needed them and wanted them. And should persuasion fail, they legislated attendance under pain of eternal damnation. Bisheps, pastors, it seems, are tired of persuading people. And legislation is a thing of the past. The task then falls to us. We must make the schools so effective

that parents will want them." Rev. C. Albert Koob, president of the National Catholic Education Association, says, "To assume that every Catholic child wants a Catholic education is sheer nonsense." From his explanation, Catholic and public education face similar

There is conflict because of parents' conception of their schooling campared to what they view as current classroom permissiveness. What to teach and how is as much a question for Catholic religion teachers as public school science instructors. The problems of managing schools more effectively and rapid changes that confuse older teachers and administrators accustomed to more authoritarian, doctrinaire times are intertwined with deciding how much

"Parents never had a choice to make as to what Catholic education is all about. This questioning is a purification process and Catholic education will improve as a result,"

"The survival of the schools," explains Father Meyers, "hinges on . . . the perceived quality of the schools. And the perceived quality of the schools depends upon the principals

If the South Vietnamese fight aggressively, and continually force the invaders to use up great amounts of artillery shells, petroleum, and other key armor and supplies month in and month out, and if the bombing of North Vietnam continues unabated with bridges and oil line pumping stations knocked out as rapidly as they are repaired, then this anvil and hammer action will inevitably oring a shortage of supplies, a shortage so significant that heavy, sustained conventional battles will temporarily be impossible for the North Vietnamese.

This could take say four to seven months, depending on the intensity of the fighting. But for this plan to be successful, the South Vietnamese must go on the offensive whenever the North Vietnamese regroup and wait for supplies. In a slow-paced action the North Vietnamese may well be able to get what they need, slowly but surely, despite the

bombing and the mining. If the South Vietnamese slack off, if the bombing halts or if the mines are deactivated, the North Vietnamese, quickly or after an interval, should be able to begin

Notice that the bombing and the mining, in any event, would not be sufficient to prevent Hanoi from returning to sustained vigorous guerrilla-type operations and carrying on such lower-key war for years to come. But note this. If the South Vietnamese do fight a hard, tough action whenever the North Vietnamese attack conventionally in the months to come, this will force Hanoi's troops to mass their forces in ways highly susceptible to U.S. bombing strikes.

Now it may be true as some experts say that Hanoi is able to take these very heavy losses in men. However, one thing is clear. When casualties are as great as those Hanoi has been sustaining in this invasion, the price must be heavy in experienced sergeants, lieutenants, captains and majors.

These are the backbone of North Vietnam's main forces. If they are destroyed in sizable number, then this invasion could be the same disaster for the North that Tet-1968 was-in that at Tet the cream of the Viet Cong

In summary, President Nixon in his bombing and mining decision is gambling the South Vietnamese armies will in the end carry on aggressive warfare. Note that for this strategy to succeed, it is not necessary that the South Vietnamese troops win these battles. It will be sufficient that they fight strongly even if retreating. if retreating.

Court Compliments It; Rejects Plan Anyway In devising the la'est Atlanta plan, Dr. Stolee spent nine months juggling reams of information from the Atlanta

MIAMI (AP) - When a U.S. District Court complimented D. Michael J. Stolee's massive Atlanta school desegregation pian but rejected it anyway Thursday, the integration specialist was philosophical about the nine months of effort he put into it.

"I've always been very slow at trying to second guess the district court of the United States," said Stolee, associate dean of the School of Education at the University of Miami.

"I feel sorry for all the poor judges-just think how much work is involved for them to weigh first our proposal, then the school board's proposal, try to understand what each one means and then decide which one is more workable and meets the criteria of each particular case. Boy, their job sure isn't easy, either."

For the second time in a year, the court in Atlanta found the city's school system unitary and rejected busing as a means of achieving racial balance. Judges Sidney O. Smith Jr., and Albert J. Henderson Jr.,

ruled that segregation in Atlanta has been de facto since 1967 and is beyond control of the Atlanta school board. The decision in the 14-yearold school case was the result of a 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals order that the district court hear the plan proposed by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Stolee was employed as a consultant by the NAACP Legal Defense Fund to mastermind the plan. It was not a new assignment for the 41-year-old Minnesota native.

He was responsible for creating the accepted mass desegregation plan which went into effect last September in Norfolk, Va. He has also spent months formulating various desegregation patterns for Knoxville, Tenn., Chattanooga, Tenn., Houston, Tex., Roanoke, Va., San Francisco, Calif. and his hometown of Minneapolis. But he is modestly quick to

Stolee, who holds degrees from St. Olaf College and the University of Minnesota where he got his doctorate in 1963, became interested in his highly specialized field while serving as director of the Florida School Desegregation Consulting Center from 1966 to 1969.

Before coming to the University of Miami, he was a teacher, then principal, then school superintendent in his home state. His wife is a humanities instructor at Miami-Dade Junfor College. The couple has three children.

Refusing to be discouraged by the Thursday decision, Stolee was back in his university office hard at work on "a couple of other plans" just hours after the Atlanta judges issued their ruling.







DEAR POLLY-and Mrs. S. F. R. whose mahogany dresser was marked up with a ball point pen-I find that hair spray removes these marks from almost anything. Spray and then wipe quickly-FRANCES

DEAR GIRLS-Hair spray is good for removing such marks from many things but do try it on an inconspicious spot first so as to see the effect on the finish of the dresser. If the ink has soaked into the wood itself I do not think it will help. I found it removed such marks (fresh ones) from a table but dulled the finish. The shellac finish seemed to disappear when the hair spray was wiped off and waxing was required to restore a gloss. Try with reservations as the finish on the piece will be the determining factor in its success. As far as I know there is no sure cure but if the piece is heavily waxed the ink may have penetrated through it only and then it would come DEAR POLLY-With vacation time here we would like
