Couple, daughter murdered

WEST OF GENEVA - One resident of Geneva says she believes "bad spirits and devils" are walking the streets of the town. How else, asks Ann Gordon, can one explain the horrible incidents that keep occurring in this once peaceful rural community.

Seminole County Sheriff Don Ealinger's Office is working hard but saying little about what he considers to be a tri-

ple homicide at a mobile home on Clekk Circle. The densely wooded property is less than five miles away from where a deputy was killed and two wounded on July 8 and near the wildfires of June.

A couple and their 11-year-old daughter were found at 1 p.m. on Wednesday by a family member who called 911. Later, the sheriff identified the victims - Daniel Ray Privett (33), Robin Elaine Razor (31) and their daughter Christine Razor.

Garnering support for light rail

CENTRAL FLORIDA - Community leaders gathered recently in an ongoing grass roots effort to garner support for the proposed light rail system.

Acting, astronaut communities lose two stars

Two icons in different fields died in the last week. Robert Young, star of the small screen, and Alan Shepard, one of the pioneers of space exploration, died Tuesday.

Young, 91, who was known for his starring roles in the popular television shows *Father Knows Best* and *Marcus Welby M.D.*, died at his Los Angeles home Tuesday at 9:15 p.m. He died of respiratory failure.

Shepard, 74, who was the first American to go into space, and hit a golf ball on the moon, died in his sleep Tuesday at a California hospital.

Young played Jim Anderson, the patriarch of *Father Knows Best*, between 1954 and 1960. He originated the character on radio. He also won two Emmys for that role. Then came *Marcus Welby M.D.* in 1969, and he

1994. He is survived by four daughters, six grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Alan Bartlett Shepard Jr. was born on November 18, 1923 in East Derry, New Hampshire. He graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy and was stationed on the destroyer *Cogswell* until the end of World War II.

In his career at NASA, Shepard was the first American to go into space aboard the *Mercury Freedom 7*, but the mission only lasted for 15 minutes. President John F. Kennedy awarded Shepard with a "Distinguished Service Medal" after the mission.

Shepard went into space again as a part of the *Apollo XIV* mission. During the *Apollo* flight, Shepard walked on the moon, and he even practiced his golf game hitting the dimpled white ball on the gray surface. He retired from the Navy and NASA on August 1, 1974.

Shepard is survived by his wife, Louise Brewer, and his two daughters.

Mayor, commissioners may take home more pay

SANFORD - A pay increase is expected for Sanford city commissioners and the mayor. Those presently in office however, will not benefit unless they are re-elected.

The second and final reading of Ordinance 3418 is scheduled for Monday night's city commission meeting. If approved, the salary for the mayor will increase from \$3,600 annually to \$9,000. Commissioners' salaries would increase from \$3,000 to \$7,500.

The salaries are lower than the averages around the state for mayors, listed at \$11,543. The average for commissioners however has been listed by staff reports at \$6,146 in cities with comparable popula-

tions of 50,000 or less. The current Altamonte Springs salaries are \$4,800 for mayor and \$3,600 for commissioners.

The ordinance was approved unanimously on first reading at the July 13 city commission meeting.

Other increases will add to the amount received. The mayor and each member of the commission will receive an additional \$495 per month for expenses.

According to the city charter, a commission is prohibited from approving a pay raise for itself. The raises would only come into existence after the next election for those who are elected or re-elected to office.

With the full commission elected on staggered terms, those put into office at the next election will have the increases,

while those not up for re-election will remain at the present salaries until their election time.

The increases in expense amounts however, would take place immediately upon final approval of the ordinance.

In the actual wording of the ordinance, "it is the desire of the city commission of the City of Sanford to increase the annual salary and expense compensation of the city commission and of the mayor to those paid to city commission members and mayors of other Florida cities of comparable size and having comparable duties."

The Sanford City Commission meeting will begin at 7 p.m. Monday, July 27, in the commission chambers of Sanford City Hall, 300 N. Park Avenue.

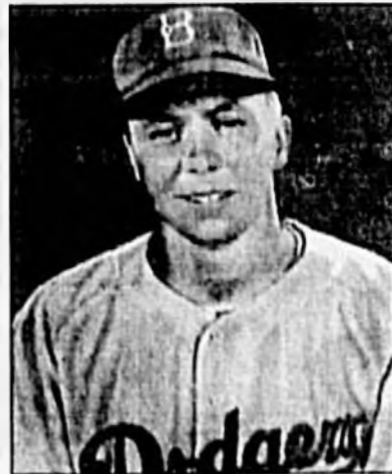
Talk show host Don Imus is 50 today. He says he was born in 1948, and we want to believe him.

Women's club presents scholarship, awards

of Metrolinx, the regional authority on transportation coordination and planning said. "I strongly support the forming of a transit advocacy group representing business people as well as citizens. It will provide a balanced transportation system in this region."

All citizens with diverse backgrounds will be included in the process, Barley said.

Mica reminded the group that light rail "is cost effective."

Lynx Executive Director Leo Auger said, "Now is the time. We surveyed 1,200 households in the community and 81 percent of the people said that light rail would help Central Florida."

Lynx has been working tirelessly to make the light rail system a reality in Central Florida.

Why light rail? Auger describes it as electric motors and short trains, so it is quiet. The trains can efficiently carry over 1,200 passengers an hour. It can also provide a faster, more efficient transportation at a lower cost than many other

forms of transportation. Auger also points out that 72 percent of Seminole County residents commute daily to and from downtown Orlando.

Transportation lobbyist Dick Batchelor also spoke on organizing the group saying, "We are happy to have several groups represented here today."

Batchelor explained the need to file with the secretary of state as a non-profit group.

Batchelor expressed the need for immediate contributions, and said, via a subcommittee, two to three cities where light rail is in effect will be studied.

Lynx Advertising and Public Relations Manager Ernie Kelly informed the group about some of the marketing ideas to help make the idea of light rail more acceptable to the general public. Kelly said, "We want to make it clear that light rail is just another part in the Lynx system. Kelly added, "We are ready to have some commercial announcements out soon."

Financial commitments for this project will be discussed next week. Financing

will be as follows: 50 percent from federal funds; 25 percent from state funds and 25 percent from local funds (including contributions from Universal, International Drive, City of Orlando, Orange County, The Orange County Convention Center and the Downtown Orlando Development Board.)

A video presentation shown featured light rail in Germany known as the Eurotrain. The sleek ergonomic design which was referred to as forward technology, was shown to be a good example of the style that is being looked at for the Central Florida system.

Another Lynx marketing person, Warren Wright, demonstrated some of the positive aspects of light rail, its high value and how it will help traffic congestion on I-4.

Construction on the first segment is being planned for early 1999 at International Drive, by Sea World, with the I-Drive portion beginning by the end of 2001, coming into downtown Orlando by the year 2003 and reaching the airport by 2007.

111). Eslinger said a 14-year-old daughter, who was visiting a friend, was OK. She came to the site later.

By 2 p.m. the narrow dirt Clekk Circle was swarming with investigators and media. TV cameras and news photographers clicked from behind the yellow crime scene tapes. Other family members and neighbors came to the home to console one another. Some talked with reporters but were encouraged not to do so by authorities.

There were toys scattered and a children's swing set in front of the home which was lined with palm and oak trees. A 10-mile an hour traffic sign was opposite the property. The road was so jammed the sheriff's office was stumped on how to get the crime lab unit up to the residence.

At first investigators said they believed the deaths were a

murder-suicide, but Eslinger said later they were being considered a triple homicide. Who did the killing and why was the puzzle. A report that the three had been shot was not correct, a spokesman said, but no other details were rendered.

"Detectives are following every lead they have," Chief Deputy Steve Harriett said today. "We intend to solve this as quickly as possible and in order to do so we can not release any further details."

A K-9 unit was brought in Wednesday to search the area which is just off Route 46 in east Seminole County. There are some 5,000 people who live in or around Geneva. They're for the most part private people who don't pry into each other's lives. Many Geneva families have lived in the area a long time. "We have a lot of aunts, uncles, sisters and brothers," Gordon said. "It's

one of the last communities with extended families."

There's only one traffic light, two gasoline stops and five churches in Geneva. There's the Geneva Elementary School for the youngsters up to sixth grade. Middle schoolers and high schoolers are bussed 12 miles to Oviedo. There was an uproar in Geneva when the School Board wanted to bus the middle schoolers to Sanford.

Land used to be dirt cheap but has become more expensive. Many who have lived in trailers a long time might not be able to buy the lots at today's costs. A gated community called Seminole Woods is strictly upscale.

All of Geneva has been affected by the recent incidents that include the wildfires that destroyed 13 homes and the 13-hour shoot-out that cost the life of Deputy Sheriff Eugene Gregory, a well-

respected figure in the territory. Some are asking if God is punishing Geneva. Some are considering moving.

Roger Collins said Wednesday that he was concerned the community has become "cursed." He was stunned anything so horrible could have happened to the family on Clekk Circle. "You don't find nicer, friendlier people. This was gruesome."

James Peck said the couple were fine neighbors. "They would give you anything, they were very generous."

Janet LaBlanc, who lives on Clekk Circle, said, "we used to feel pretty safe—didn't even have to lock our doors at night."

Privett did drywall and construction work, and Razor was said to have done house cleaning. Again, very little information was given.

"We hope the next news is good," Harriett said.

Juvenile records may follow into adulthood



PEOPLE'S LAW

Many people, including juveniles, know that juvenile records are sealed and therefore not open to inspection by the public. This "knowledge" has probably led many juveniles to believe that their actions are really of no consequence to them. However, a juvenile's actions may have consequences that reach well into the child's adulthood.

For example, there are a number of people who have or may have access to juvenile records. These include: the child; the parents, guardians, or legal custodians, and their attorneys; authorized personnel of the court; the Department of Juvenile Justice and its designees; the Department of Corrections; the Parole Commission; the Juvenile Justice Advisory Board; County Sheriffs; Chiefs of Police; other law enforcement agents; school superintendents and their designees; school principals, classroom teachers, and appropriate school personnel if a felony; school district information system directors; any licensed professional or licensed community agency representative participating in the assessment or treatment of the juvenile; other providers of juvenile services; victims of a

crime or next of kin; any other upon order of the Secretary of Juvenile Justice; and any other upon order of the Court.

Additionally, some state agency positions, require that persons occupying such positions be subject to a security background check which will reveal juvenile records. These include: all positions within the Division of Treasury of the Department of Insurance; and within the Department of Children and Families, and the Department of Elderly Affairs, all positions in programs providing care to children, the developmentally disabled, disabled adults, or elderly persons for 15 hours or more per week; all permanent and temporary employee positions of the central abuse hotline; and all persons working under contract who have access to abuse records

are deemed to be persons and positions of special trust or responsibility.

Furthermore, regardless of the fact that a juvenile record is sealed, a person may not lawfully deny or fail to acknowledge the arrests covered by that record if: that person is a candidate for employment with a criminal justice agency; that person is a defendant in a criminal prosecution; that person petitions for a seal or expunction; that person is a candidate for admission to the Florida Bar; that person is seeking to be employed or licensed by or to contract with the Department of Children and Families or the Department of Juvenile Justice or to be employed or used by such contractor or licensee in a sensitive position having direct contact with children, the developmentally disabled, the aged, or the elderly; or that person is seeking to be employed or licensed by the Office of Teacher Education, Certification, Staff Development, and Professional Practices of the Department of Education, any district school board, or any local government entity which licenses child care facilities.

Finally, most people do not know that the name, photo-

graph, address, and crime or arrest report of a child who either commits a felony or three or more misdemeanors shall not be considered confidential and exempt from the provisions of F.S. 119.07-1), allowing inspection, examination, and duplication of public records, solely because of the child's age. Unfortunately, a child in this situation may be exposed to many more obstacles than he or she would normally encounter in life.

Juvenile records are not open to public. However, more people have access to those records than one would imagine and, as noted above, having a juvenile record may affect a child even after the child reaches adulthood. Therefore, it is important that a child know the "real life" consequences of his or her actions. This knowledge may prevent him or her from mistakenly believing that a delinquent act won't really affect him or her because he or she is a minor.

Medicinal qualities of ginger

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've heard that ginger is sometimes used to treat nausea. Is this true?

DEAR READER: Ginger is purported to treat gastrointestinal distress, including nausea and motion sickness. In fact, one study showed that the aromatic spice is also effective in treating hyperemesis gravidarum, the intractable nausea sometimes experienced by pregnant women. Other possible pharmacological effects of ginger include reduction of arthritic pain and a tendency to retard blood clotting.

Consequently, patients undergoing surgery should refrain from eating ginger. Finally, high doses of the spice can interact with anti-coagulant drugs and cardiac medications.

For prevention of motion sickness, 1 gram is taken 30 minutes before travel. The maximum daily dose is 4 grams.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I was treated for years with thyroid supplements because of an underactive thyroid gland. My HMO doctor stopped these about six months ago. A recent blood test showed my thyroid function to be at the low end of the normal range. I feel somewhat tired. Should I go back on supplements?

DEAR READER: Not necessarily. It would be unwise for you to make a decision based on a single blood test. There are two possible reasons that your test was low-normal.

First, you may simply be at the low end of the normal scale. The levels of thyroid hormones in people's blood samples vary a good deal; this is why the normal range is so broad. You may not need supplemental thyroid pills at all. Second, you may in fact be in the process of developing a deficiency. Six months ago, you may have been in the upper range of normal; now, as your body draws on your thyroid stores, you are at risk of depleting them. Eventually, you may require supplements.

In my opinion, the simplest and cheapest way of solving this dilemma is to wait six months and retest your thyroid. If the level is again low-normal, relax. On the other hand, if it is below normal, your physician will surely prescribe thyroid supplements.

While you're waiting to be retested, ask your doctor to address your symptom of fatigue. This could be caused by stress, depression, anemia or a host of other conditions that might need treatment.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband blows his nose so hard that the room shakes. I'm afraid he'll blow his brains out. When I warn him of this, he just disregards me.

husband ought to temper his enthusiasm. Violent nose-blowing produces no known health benefits; plus, it's an unattractive habit. I think he would be better off blowing his nose in a more genteel fashion.

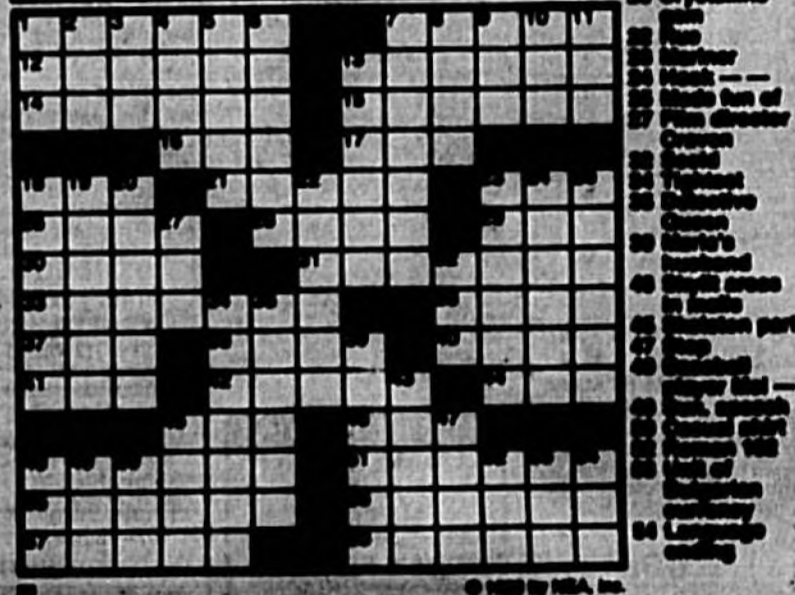

I can see clearly now

When were the first contact lenses invented? Keeping one's eyes open at the bridge table isn't a bad plan. Sometimes, I ask students what the opening lead was. The weaker players don't know. (I advise them to rearrange their hand, putting the led suit on, say, the right.) The better ones answer that it was, say, a club. (I recommend that if they have a score-card handy, to write the lead into the card. One cannot refer to it during play, but this improves one's chance of remembering the exact card.) The best players answer correctly, of course.

How would you plan the play in this three-no-trump contract? West leads the heart seven.

There is a natural reaction to finesse dummy's heart 10 (or queen). But if you do that, you should fail to make the contract. What did West lead? What does that card tell you?

Right — he led the heart seven, which is presumably fourth highest from his longest and strongest. When someone leads fourth highest, apply the Rule of Eleven. This card from 11. Now you know there are four hearts higher than the seven in the dummy. East's hand and your hand combined. And you can see all four: your eight and dummy's ace-queen-10. So, East has no heart higher than the seven.

That tells you to run the first trick round to your right. Next, play a heart in dummy's 10. Return to your hand with, say, a spade to the queen, finesse dummy's heart queen, and claim nine tricks: three spades, four hearts, one diamond and one club.
