unionism stands.  
"But General Motors, in common with much of 'big business' is afraid that the American Federation of Labor is not so organized as to control its members within the bounds of justice and safety to business. Therefore it thinks itself justified in planning to substitute company guided or company controlled unions in place of A. F. O. L. unions.

"But it is not as if the American Federation of Labor were set in its ways that it cannot adjust itself to these new times. It is too easy to say that its methods are the methods of the old class struggle, and that it stands rigidly for certain forms of organization which are applicable in modern industry. There is real industrial statesmanship in the A. F. O. L. Many of us, employers think it should be easier than it is to accept our advice. I have good reason to believe, however, that organized labor in this present crisis is ready to rise to its great opportunity and not in a spirit of compromise concerning any fundamental principle, but in a spirit of adjustment to these great new times, will be able to discover and propose a program which will be not merely acceptable but highly advantageous to all concerned \* \* \* which means in this instance, to everybody."

## Property Owners Are Liable To Arrest

Calling attention to a recent report made by drivers of two city garbage wagons City Sanitary Officer G. P. Paxton today reminded local property owners that under terms of a city ordinance they are liable to arrest if they fail to provide proper garbage containers.

Mr. Paxton sees the healthfulness of the community slowly being destroyed by the failure of the people to co-operate in providing proper garbage cans. A city ordinance requires that they be of a certain size and covered at all times.

T. E. Smith, driver of a route which includes 1297 homes, reported that less than 25 per cent of the property owners on his route own garbage cans that would qualify under terms of the ordinance.

He stated that only 291 garbage cans, not all of them covered, are used. Garbage on his route is taken from 278 old tubs, 294 wooden or pasteboard boxes, and 234 drums of various types.

Ben Smith, driver of a truck route which includes 300 homes, states that only 181 garbage cans of the required type are in use. Other garbage containers include old trunks, dish pans, tin oil cans, buckets, hampers, and wire celery baskets.

## RAIL GROUPS TOLD TO END WAGE DISPUTE

### Roosevelt Wants Present Agreement Extended 6 Months; Workers Ask Raise

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—(AP.)—President Roosevelt today warned railway employers and workers to settle their wage dispute before he took any action.

The president took this action shortly after railway employees had demanded a 20 percent wage increase above what they now are getting, effective July 1.

In a letter to conferring railway executives and labor officials, the president repeated his proposal for a six months' extension of the present wage agreement.

Meanwhile, the Senate called upon Secretary Morgenthau for a list of hearings of silver.

A resolution said it is "currently reported" that there has been speculation in the white metal and that "certain people" were hearing it.

A stock market regulation bill less stringent but still, strong as it is revised, started its Congressional trip today, while the Philippine independence measure approached the end of its wavy road.

In spite of Administration inaction, the House yesterday passed a bill to limit the amount of silver that can be sold over the two-thirds vote required by the procedure under which it was considered.

Volting 227 to 113, it sent to the Senate the Dies bill directing that silver be shipped at a premium above the world price in exchange for agricultural commodities in which a surplus exists.

The Dies bill was drafted to attract the support of two strong House factions—the inflationists and the farm bloc.

Under the bill, it would be established to regulate sales of agricultural surpluses to foreign buyers, and to exchange silver into or out of a price to be fixed by the board, but not to be higher than 25 percent above the world price of silver.

## 90 Percent Of Merchants At Miami Beach Have Failed To Obtain Blue Eagle Of NRA

MIAMI BEACH, Mar. 20.—Ninety percent of Miami Beach business establishments have failed to obtain the Blue Eagle of the NRA, a check of government files at the postoffice revealed yesterday.

Only 500 of the Eagles have been distributed to firms qualifying since the Administration's program started more than six months ago. During the same time 2,061 business occupation licenses have been issued at Miami Beach city hall.

Most of the Blue Eagles were issued to operators of small businesses, such as grocers, service stations, barber shops and soda fountains.

Many Miami Beach merchants and business men have contacted since the first announcement of NRA provisions, that they could not operate their businesses profitably if obliged to observe national codes of their various organizations. The wide variance in conditions between operating a business elsewhere and operating in a resort community like Miami Beach has been responsible for most of the NRA indifference exhibited here.

Last year, with off-season conditions prevailing during the winter and fall, the inability of most Beach merchants to abide by national codes, particularly in reference to wages and salaries paid employees, was particularly marked. As a result, there has been little, if any, criticism of Beach merchants who declined to join the NRA.

## AGED BUS DRIVER INDICTED FOR MANSLAUGHTER

PALATKA, Mar. 20.—(AP)—A Putnam county grand jury yesterday indicted D. E. Niles, aged school bus driver, on a charge of manslaughter growing out of the freight train-school bus crash near Crescent City Dec. 14, 1933, in which 11 children lost their lives and a score more were injured.

The jury was called into special session to consider the case after a coroner's jury declared the accident "was due to the negligence" of Niles.

Recommendation that school bus drivers cover railroad tracks as little as possible and that the county school board construct roadways to prevent crossings where possible was included in the presentment.

Niles, who is about 60 years old, was seriously injured in the collision. Testimony was introduced at the inquest, twice delayed because of his physical condition to show that his hearing and sight were subnormal. Other witnesses refuted this.

Children riding in the bus at the time of the accident, which occurred early on a foggy morning, declared the occupants were making enough noise to drown out the train whistle.

The Atlantic Coast Line railroad and its employees were held blameless by the coroner's jury. After the coroner's verdict last month, state's attorney J. C. Calhoun conferred with state officials before presenting the case to the grand jury.

## ROOSEVELT ASKS FOR 12 CREDIT BANKS

### President Seeks Means Of Releasing Funds To Small Industrial Firms Needing Help

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—(AP)—President Roosevelt yesterday asked Congress to set up 12 industrial credit banks which he had been told would safeguard the jobs of 246,000 persons and create work for 378,000 more.

Legislation to allow the federal reserves system to create the banks, financing them by selling \$200,000,000 of stock to the treasury, was introduced in both houses immediately after the President's wishes were made known to chairmen of the Senate and House banking committees.

The plight of the "small or medium size" industrialist was stressed by Roosevelt, and he cited results of a survey indicating that such industry was badly in need of \$700,000,000 of working capital.

The President asked for "early consideration" of his proposal pointing out that the situation called for "immediate relief."

The President's letter follows: "May I suggest to your committee legislation to create 12 credit banks for industry."

"I have been deeply concerned with the situation in our small industries. In numberless cases their working capital has been lost or seriously depleted. This (Continued on Page Two)

The entire group was the guest of the Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce and the Troop Committee of Troop 84 in that town.

## Dowager Queen Of Holland Is Dead

THE HAGUE, Mar. 20.—(AP)—Dowager Queen Emma, beloved for her charities and honored alike by Holland's rich and poor, died today of bronchitis. She was 75 years old. The queen mother, widow of King William the Third and mother of Queen Wilhelmina, had suffered from the malady for some time but she only became seriously ill a few days ago. She was attended almost constantly by Wilhelmina and her granddaughter, Princess Juliana, heir to the throne.

## FRANCE PLANS TO SWELL RANKS OF STANDING ARMY

### Concern Over Hitler's Demands Seen As Basis For Action

PARIS, Mar. 20.—(AP)—Apprehensive over the demands of Chancellor Hitler that Germany be allowed to re-arm, the government yesterday announced a plan to swell the army's ranks by including young conscripts to re-enlist in order to avoid the hazards of job hunting at the present time.

The army also invited all unemployed young men in France who have left the ranks in the last five years to enlist for new short terms until labor conditions improve.

The announced purpose of the government is to reinforce the army with short term recruits because the regular conscript classes are beginning to slack off in numbers, due to the low war-time birthrate.

Special recruiting will begin in April, an official communiqué said. Certain "specialists" will be offered 18-month terms and others may enlist for six months. All enlistment requirements will be lowered.

One of the reasons ascribed to the government's action today is the desire of the armed forces to polish all defenses along the Rhine land.

## SWITZ BARES DETAILS OF HUGE SPY RING

### American Wholesaler In Paris With Wife Says International Group Hired Him

PARIS, Mar. 20.—(AP)—Magistrate Andre Benon declared today that Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gordon Switz of East Orange, N. J., had disclosed that an international spy gang operated in New York and sent them as agents to France.

Benon said Switz, a former salesman, had uncovered the gang's operation and the part he and his wife played in it.

He said he had come here at a wage of 5000 francs, about \$335 a month.

The magistrate said the inquiry, which has been under way since last June, has already or will in the future reach the entire world and touch virtually all countries.

Benon said Switz told him the names of all members of the gang he knew and the duties of each.

Mr. and Mrs. Switz, young Americans accused of espionage activities, were questioned for hours yesterday by Judge Benon, who subsequently announced that new arrests would be made in connection with an alleged spy syndicate.

## Negro Girl Gives Up To Police After Shooting Relative

Toasting a still warm .32 special pistol on the desk of the sergeant's desk at the Police Station early yesterday afternoon, Annie Belle Pope, young negro field worker, after asking "Is this the police station?" calmly stated, "I just shot a woman; I had to do it."

Five minutes later she was being docketed at the County Jail, and charged with an assault with an intent to commit the murder of Janis Henderson, her mother-in-law, who was in a serious condition at the Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital, late this afternoon.

The Henderson woman has five bullet holes in her back. One of her lungs was punctured by the shots that were fired at close range as the climax of what the Pope woman said was a "little argument."

At the Jail this morning, the Pope woman stated that she and the Henderson woman have been quarreling for some time because of the latter's "messing around with my man," the son of the Henderson woman.

Yesterday, the Pope woman went to the home of her mother-in-law, in Beck's quarters on Hickory Avenue at about 10th Street, and sought to gather up clothing belonging to her husband. An argument ensued, the Pope woman stated, in which she was allegedly struck over the head by the Henderson woman.

Whipping the gun out of her dress, she said she fired at the retreating form of the woman. Turning away with no further words, the Pope woman said she stopped a boy riding a bicycle outside the house, asked him for a ride to the police station, jumped to a seat on the handle-bar, and was pedaled to her destination.
