Freezing Weather

While we in Seminole County are not disposed to profite at the other fellow's misfortune, the fact seems increapable that the current cold wave throughout the country is bound to benefit local farmers. Latest reports indicate that local celery and citrus have suffered very little so far-from the freezing temperatures:

Indications also are that citrus in the northern part of the state, as well as in Texas and California, has met with considerable damage. In Texas alone estimates of the loss run as high as 30 percent of the protected fruit and 80 percent of the unprotected fruit. Removal of this much fruit from the markets at this time-should improve costs siderably the démand for Florida citrus undamaged by the cold.

The Herald is also advised that n nywhere in the country north of here have been destroy by the freeze. Even to the south of us, especially in the Everglades section, there has been considerable damage. Of course celery has not been hurt much anywhere, but the removal of other vegetables from the market will increase the demand for celery.

While we regret of course that the farmers elsewhere will suffer as a result of this cold wave, we can be thankful that what is one man's poison is another man's meat and that the sun doesn't takine on the same dog's tail tall the time. Our farmers have had their full share of trought bles and it is about time they got a good break.





Home Demonstration Notes By REVA D. ANDREWS

Many foods containing fats or oil will develop rancidity rapidly if exposed to light. During the summer months, when sunlight is long and intense, these foods become rancid very quickly. The refrigerator is a good place to store most of them, not only be-cause it keeps them cold, but be-cause in excluding light, it keeps them fresh.

The Bureau of Chemistry and Soils of the U. S. Department of Agriculture discovered that when oil-bearing foods were enclosed in green, black or foil containers, tancidity was appreciably delayed. Potato chips packed in ordinary commercial bags turned rancid within a week. When wrapped in green paper they remained fresh and edible for at least 2 weeks. Cashew nuts kept in a clear glass bottle and exposed to direct sunlight became rancid in 4 days. Another sample of cashews kept in a green bottle under the same Friends of Miss Marian






