## County OKs purchase of Katie's Landing

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioners agreed to pursue a joint agreement with the state to purchase Katie's Landing.

It's a deal the county has been trying to close for more than two years, and with the window of opportunity for state funding closing in less than two weeks, commissioners agreed to authorize staff to begin working on a joint acquisition with the Division of State Lands.

Commissioners also agreed to fund \$121,800 of the \$700,000 purchase price. "We got over a big hump today," said Clay Henderson, attorney for Russ and Katie Moncrief, owners of Katie's Landing. "This has been a long time coming."

Part of the hold up has been disagreements between the state's parks department and the county over how Katie's Landing will be managed and how the costs would be divided.

"Katie's will become part of the Wekiva Springs State Park," said

Commissioner Randy Morris. "Initially they will manage the area during the deconstruction of some of the outbuildings, and then the county will eventually take over management of the area. We managed most of the state park land along the Wekiva anyway."

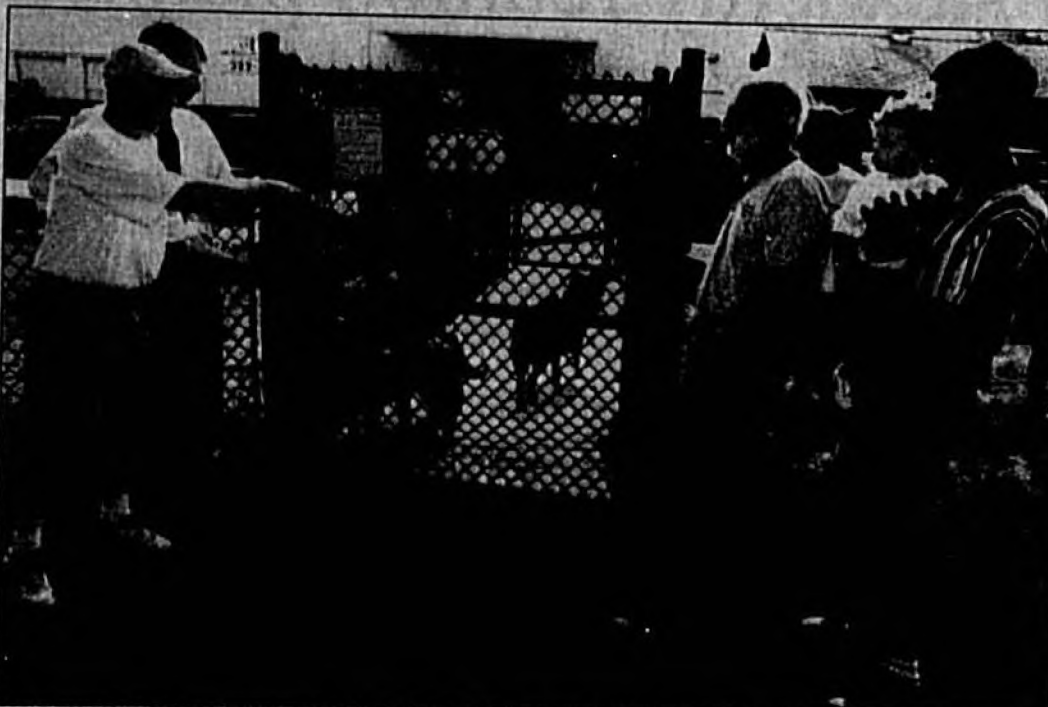
In a letter to Commissioner Daryl McLain, Henderson stressed the need for the county to move quickly.

"There is a current level of uncertainty regarding the availability of state land

## Expect delays as I-4 bridge work begins this month

SANFORD — We knew it was coming, and now it's here. Construction of a new Interstate 4 bridge over the St. Johns River is actually underway.

The work presently consists of the installation of test pilings, but new construction is set to begin before the end of this month.

The contract for the \$102 million project was ratified in March. The bridge was not scheduled to be replaced until 2007, but concentrated efforts by government bodies and legislative leaders moved the project up to the top of the list.

According to Department of

Transportation spokesman Steve Homan, "We'll be building two bridges over the St. Johns, one on each side of the present bridge, which will continue to be used. This shouldn't give anyone any traffic problems except for what we call 'visual delays', that is, rubbernecking from passing motorists looking at the construction work."

Homan said the two bridges will be three lanes in either direction, with an additional 10 feet of shoulder on either side. "This isn't going to be a widening as some reports may say," he said. "This will be an out-and-out replacement."

"After the two bridges are

## Talent came easily to them

Let's face it; some people have musical talent. They may not have studied music, but to them, it comes naturally. We have had many such talented people over the years.

..... Many decades ago, I had a cousin who would write music as it was performed by a person who couldn't read or write music. Thanks to her writing, his compositions were published. It was Ludwig Strouse, son of Johan Strouse the noted waltz king who, although not as famous as his father, has many selections being performed in concerts across the globe.

..... Modern Jazz pianist George Shearing was blind from birth and couldn't read music, yet his music was second to none back in the 40s and 50s.

This Friday, May 11, will mark the anniversary of the birth of another great composer, Israel Isidore Baline, born in 1888 in Tyumen, Russia. He and his family moved to New York City when he was four, and their name was Americanized to Berlin. This of course, was Irving Berlin.

After the death of his father when he was in his teens, he began singing in bars and on street corners to help earn money for the family. He taught himself how to play the piano.

Naturally, everyone knows some of the songs he composed: Alexander's Ragtime Band, White Christmas, God Bless America, There's No Business Like Show Business, Doin' What Comes Naturally, Puttin' on the Ritz, Blue Skies, and Oh, How I Hate to Get Up in the Morning, plus dozens of others.

Yet Irving Berlin could neither read music, nor write it. He hired people to take down notes as he played them.

While many of his songs were patriotic in nature, sung to bring about a spirit of pride in our country, others were based on what he saw in his lifetime. Puttin' on the Ritz, for example, had nothing to do with Sanford's Ritz Theater, but how he perceived people dressing up, possibly beyond their means, to attend special occasions in New York City to make others believe they may be wealthy.

During World War I, he encountered a soldier who told him that fighting in a war wasn't as difficult as getting up at 5 a.m. each morning. Thus, the appropriate song, heralded by military personnel since that time.

As far as I am concerned, and hopefully many others agree, Irving Berlin was a legend. His music will never be forgotten. He has been honored many times for his works.

Irving Berlin managed to live 101 years and five months, passing away on Sept. 22, 1989 in his beloved New York City.

While I firmly believe that those planning on pursuing music as a primary or secondary career study extensively, over the years, we have had some outstanding people who have given us great music, simply on their own. They are exceptional people.

## Naval Academy reunion planned

From 1967 until it closed in 1976, the present site of New Tribes Mission on East First Street in Sanford, was the Sanford Naval Academy. It was a private preparatory boarding school, offering private personal education with small classes, with the focal point being true learning experiences.

Students enrolled in the school were from various parts of the United States, as well as some from Central and South America, Mexico and Canada.

Many of the staff members were retired military personnel, giving the students a structured learning environment while offering leadership training as well as an advanced education. The staff members were excellent as role models for the midshipmen and stood as examples of leadership and service to their country from the late 60s to early 70s.

Some of the instructors, many local area residents from Daytona Beach to Orlando, not only served as educators, but as

coaches, guidance counselors and house parents.

Local high school girls served as cheerleaders for the school during their athletic programs which included baseball, football, basketball, track, swimming and crew.

Now, the time has come for all the graduates of the Sanford Naval Academy to gather together and reunite once again. With the assistance of Jeanne Esclavon from the Seminole County Public Schools, the former students at the Sanford Naval Academy are planning a reunion of all classes.

A reception to kick off the event will be held on June 9 at the Best Western Marina Hotel

on Lake Monroe.

With the assistance of Dave Byron of the New Tribes Mission, small private tours of the old school facilities will be offered to attendees on that Saturday, during most of the day.

Alumni will be attending from all over the United States, coming from as far away as Juno, Alaska. A few are expected from Guatemala City. Previous teachers, staff and cheerleaders have also acknowledged their planned attendance.

Many of the midshipmen settled in the Central Florida area, and while many of the classmates have been located, the search continues to find all local alumni, teachers, cheerleaders, staff and other parties associated with the school.

## Civil Rights

Much accomplished, much still unfinished

It took nearly 40 years, but four little girls have at last received a final measure of justice. Last week, Thomas Blanton Jr., a former Ku Klux Klansman, was sentenced to four life terms in prison for his role in bombing a black church in Birmingham, Ala., in 1963.

..... It was an unspeakable crime. The four girls — Denise McNair, 11, and Addie Mae Collins, Carole Robertson and Cynthia Wesley, all 14 — were in the church basement when the bomb exploded at 10:19 a.m. on Sunday, Sept. 15. The hatred and savagery of the perpetrators — men who would not countenance full citizenship for blacks — frightened Southern blacks and seared the nation's conscience.

In its perverse way, the bombing played a part, just as firehoses and police dogs did, in prodding Congress toward passage of civil rights laws. Those lawmakers who believed themselves fair-minded could not stomach the slaughter of innocents.

In the 40 years since that awful day, Birmingham, like the rest of the South, has been transformed. Though city leaders resisted any serious effort to bring the church bombers to justice in the early 1960s, Blanton is the second of four original suspects identified by the FBI to be convicted in decades since. Ringleader Robert Chambliss, convicted in 1977, died in prison. And a third, Bobby Frank Cherry, has been indicted. (A fourth suspect died without ever being charged.)

Even if Cherry, who has been ruled mentally incompetent to stand trial, is never convicted, he and his co-conspirators have long since been condemned to the very fate they were willing to kill to avoid: a New South of integrated schools, black mayors and black jurors sitting in judgment of their crimes. Retribution is rarely so sweet.

Yet there is the danger of making too much of this, of looking for something casually called "closure," of assigning this episode to the history books and forgetting. Closure cannot come until we acknowledge the climate that accommodated the Blantons of Birmingham and Montgomery and Atlanta and Augusta and Greenville and Biloxi. They thrived because middle-class whites who knew better — respectable, God-fearing, upright folk — did nothing to stop them.

Few wanted to risk the enmity of their peers or the comfort of their social positions. Doing the right thing is often difficult and isolating. Few will chance it. That's a hard and bitter truth, but one that ought to be acknowledged more often.

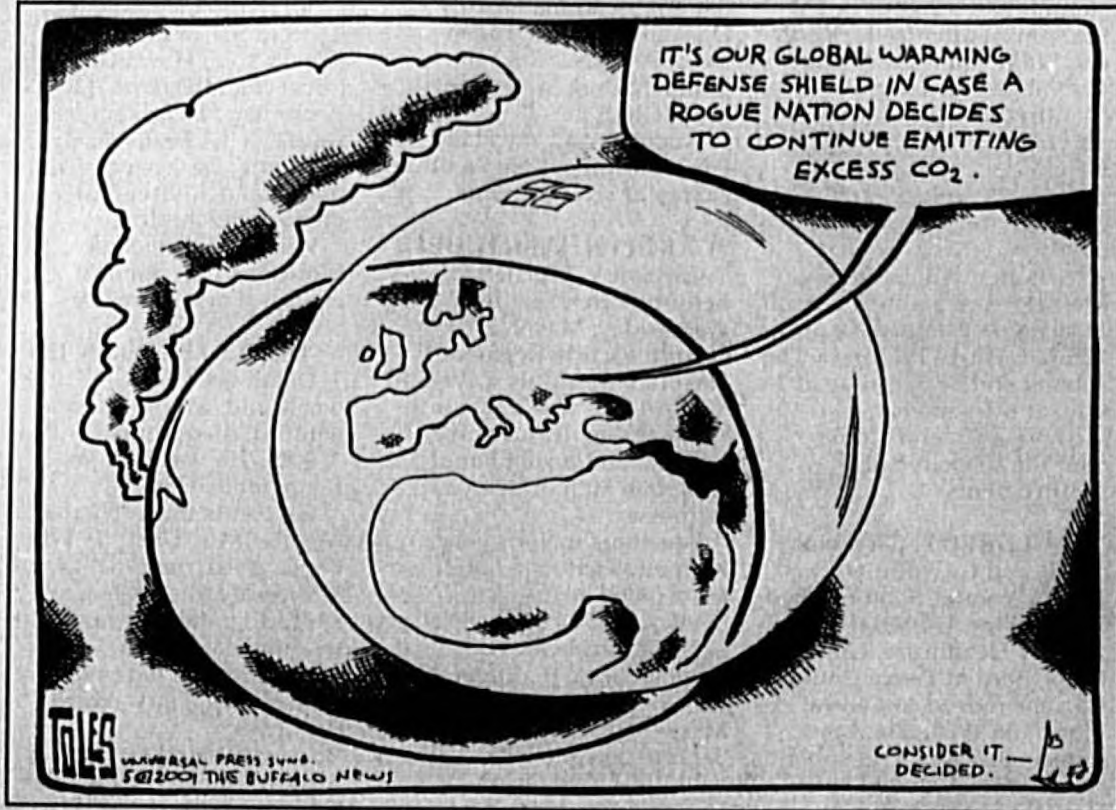
Interviewed for Spike Lee's stirring documentary, "Four Little Girls," Chris McNair, the father of Denise, spoke of Birmingham's infamous police commissioner, Bull Connor, known for his brutality toward peaceful black protesters.

"A man like Bull Connor couldn't exist without the status quo — the big boys in any town," McNair said. Neither could the mad bombers like Thomas Blanton.

This is a season of biographies and memoirs, anniversaries and commemorations of civil rights activism. Indeed, May brings the 40th anniversary of the Freedom Rides, when young men and women, black and white, rode buses into hostile Southern towns to protest segregated public transportation. These commemorations tend to be upbeat, dwelling on the victories, celebrating the heroes.

There is nothing wrong with that. The South — indeed, the nation — has much to celebrate, having undergone such a dramatic social transformation in such a short time. But the United States has not shed itself of bigotry — homophobia, religious intolerance and, always, the hostilities of the color line. More good people will have to find the courage to stand up for justice if the nation is to live up to its creed.

### Beary: Column emotional but leaves out facts

To the editor: Cynthia Tucker's recent column concerning our nation's anti-drug efforts was full of emotion but void of fact. Her summary that our strategy is "a miserable failure" is not only inaccurate but clearly demonstrates the false and misleading information the public receives.

Did you know that the 1999 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse revealed that the overall use of drugs in the United States has fallen by almost 50 percent during the last 20 years? Or that after increases in the early

1990's, during the last three years we have recorded a consistent downward trend among adolescent use of illicit drugs? How about our nation's crime rate? Did you know that it is at the lowest level in 20 years? Does this sound like failure?

Now let's talk about our national effort. All the professionals involved with reducing our nation's drug dependence support our current strategy which consists of a balanced approach of three key elements, Prevention/Education, Enforcement and Treatment. For a visual affect, just imagine each key element as part of a three-legged stool. If one leg is removed or significantly altered the stool is useless. This illustrates the need for consistency.

Despite Ms. Tucker's opinion that treatment is the only solution, every treatment professional I work with tells me that without incarceration or fear of incarceration most addicts will not seek help. Her assumption that our prisons are full of people who simply use drugs and have done "nothing worse than torture themselves and their loved ones" is blatantly false. In Florida, only 5 percent of the prison population (five percent federal system) were admitted for Drug Possession - this includes many cases what were plea-bargained down from Drug Trafficking and Sale and Delivery. Additionally, research reveals that over 60 percent of adult male prisoners across the nation tested positive for drug use at the time of their

arrest for every type of crime imaginable. Most Americans understand that drug use changes behavior and exacerbates criminal behavior.

In closing, those of us charged with implementing our national anti-drug strategy recognize that we are far from victory but we are clearly on the right path and succeeding. If we can reduce drug demand, addiction and the crime rate without much help from the media and a confused society, just imagine what is possible with enlightenment.

## Bob Kerrey's damage control maneuvers

Article 118 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice says, "Any person subject to this chapter who without justification or excuse, unlawfully kills a human being when he 1) has a premeditated design to kill; 2) intends to kill or inflict great bodily harm; 3) is engaged in an act which is inherently dangerous to others and evinces a wanton disregard of human life; or 4) is engaged in perpetration or attempted perpetration of burglary, sodomy, rape, robbery, or aggravated arson; is guilty of murder, and shall suffer such punishment as a court-martial may direct."

Amy L. William L. Calley Jr. was convicted of four counts of murder under this article for the execution of more than 100 women and children at My Lai, South Vietnam in 1968. Former Sen. Bob Kerrey of Nebraska is now defending himself against similar accusations. Kerrey has recently started talking about the women and children killed by his unit in a Feb. 25, 1969 raid in the Mekong Delta village of Thanh Phong.

In interviews with "60 Minutes II" and Gregory L. Vistica (for the

New York Times Magazine), Kerrey said he had no recollection of killing women and children. Gerhard Klann, a member of Kerrey's unit, says Kerrey gave the order to fire. There is a dispute among the combatants as to whether they were fired on first. Kerrey says they were but has acknowledged that after 32 years, "my memory of this event is clouded by the fog of the evening, age and desire."

A Vietnamese woman named Pham Thi Lanh was interviewed about the incident by "60 Minutes II" in February. She says she witnessed the killing of 17 unarmed women and children. She was identified as the wife of a Viet Cong fighter.

The truth about this incident, and perhaps many others like it — known and not yet known — may be hard to determine. But there are a number of questions that should be asked.

Why did this take so long to emerge? Newsweek magazine, which had the story two years ago when Gregory Vistica was on staff, sat on it. Newsweek assistant managing editor Evan Thomas, who interviewed Kerrey with Vistica, told The Washington

Post, "We could have run the story. We had Kerrey's confirmation. We just didn't want to do it to the guy when he wasn't running for president." Did someone do a political hit on Kerrey so he wouldn't run for president?

Newsweek editors demonstrated far less heart when they ran a story in 1996 alleging that Adm. Jeremy "Mike" Boorda, chief of naval operations, did not earn two of his many decorations. Vistica was the reporter on that story, too. Less than two hours after he received an interview request from Vistica about the medals, Boorda committed suicide.

Last Friday (April 27), Kerrey met with five other members of his SEAL commando team (Klann was not invited) to discuss what happened the night of the raid. Each signed a statement, which disputed central elements in Klann's story.

While in Thanh Phong, "Klann says that the squad rounded up women and children from a group of hooches," Vistica writes in the New York Times Magazine. Then, according to Klann, Kerrey gave orders to machine-gun the captives, fearing they might alert enemy soldiers. Kerrey says he and his men fired from 100 yards away. The problem with that ver-

sion is that the dead were huddled together when it might have been expected that upon hearing gunfire they would have headed for the bunkers that were under many of the huts, or scattered in different directions. It was dark and it seems unlikely that even the best marksmen could hit and kill every human target in such a "neat" manner from that distance.

Sen. John McCain (R-AZ), a fellow Vietnam veteran and former prisoner of war, defended Kerrey last week in The Wall Street Journal. McCain is correct when he says that those who have never been in combat should not rush to judgment of those who have.

That's not an excuse for doing nothing. Others, like Lt. Calley, have been convicted of actions similar to those of which Kerrey and his men are accused. Other incidents of large numbers of civilian casualties in Vietnam remain uninvestigated or untried.

Is there a cover-up about events at Thanh Phong? If so, who else is involved and how high up the chain of command?

If war crimes have been committed, the United States, which has held other nations responsible for such crimes, has an obligation to credibly investigate its own.

finished, the present bridge will be demolished," he said. "But we have installed pilings so, in the future, it needs to be filled in again for possibly a rail corridor, we won't have to go back into the water for more work."  
The bridge project will also include improvements in the on-ramp from 17-92 to I-4, which will be much longer and merge on the third ramp of the new bridge.

The new bridge also will include six-laning of I-4 from the bridge to the new Saxon Boulevard Interchange in Volusia County.

Also scheduled is the six-laning of five miles of I-4 in Seminole County from Lake Mary Boulevard, north to U.S. Highway 17-92, just short of the new bridge. The cost for that project is \$37 million.

"This work is not scheduled to begin until some time next year. We won't begin this part of the work until we have installed message boards and cameras," Homan said. "With the boards we'll be able to advise motorists of possible delays or lane closures during the work." The new message boards and cameras will be installed from Lake Mary Boulevard to Exit 54, the

Deland/Orange City exit in Volusia County.  
"He added that right-of-way purchasing for the widening between Lake Mary and the St. Johns River is scheduled to begin this year at an additional cost expected to be approximately \$17 million. "We don't need any additional land for the actual Interstate," he said, "the purchases will be for water

retention ponds on either side of the widened highway. "That work however, is not scheduled to begin until next year.

Although the Department of Transportation has a list of 11 major road construction projects along the Interstate 4 corridor in east Central Florida, to be started before the end of 2005, only these two involve Seminole County.

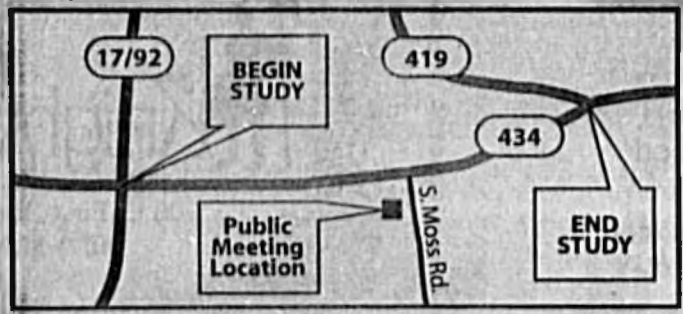

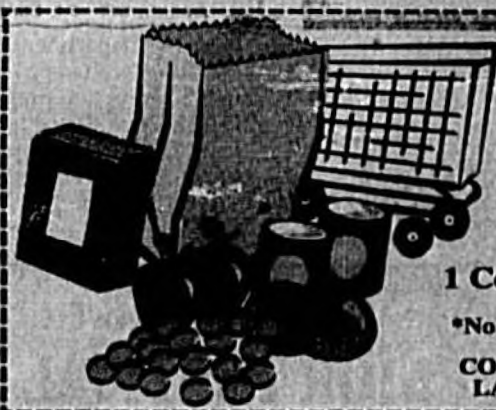

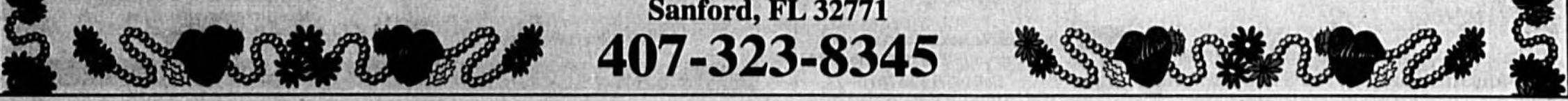

acquisition funds," Henderson wrote, noting that any contracts signed after May 18 would be delayed until the next budget cycle when there "will be fewer funds available. Indeed, there is no guarantee that there will be sufficient funds in the right pot of money to acquire Katie's Landing next year."

County officials see Katie's Landing as an opportunity to guarantee public use of the area, while at the same time protecting an environmental sensitive area.

"That area has some really intense uses on it right now," Morris said. "You've got RVs out there, and you've got people who live there throughout

the year. By putting that land under public control we can clean it up and provide a more natural setting."

Morris said Katie's Landing would remain a popular launch area for non-motorized boats and said there could be some limited temporary camping facilities.

He also noted the acquisition of Katie's Landing is part of Seminole County's attempt to "bookend" the Wekiva.

"We're in negotiations to purchase Wekiva Marina on the south end of the Wekiva River" Morris said. "If we can accomplish that, we would have two bookends that would ensure the public has access to one of the most beautiful rivers in the nation."

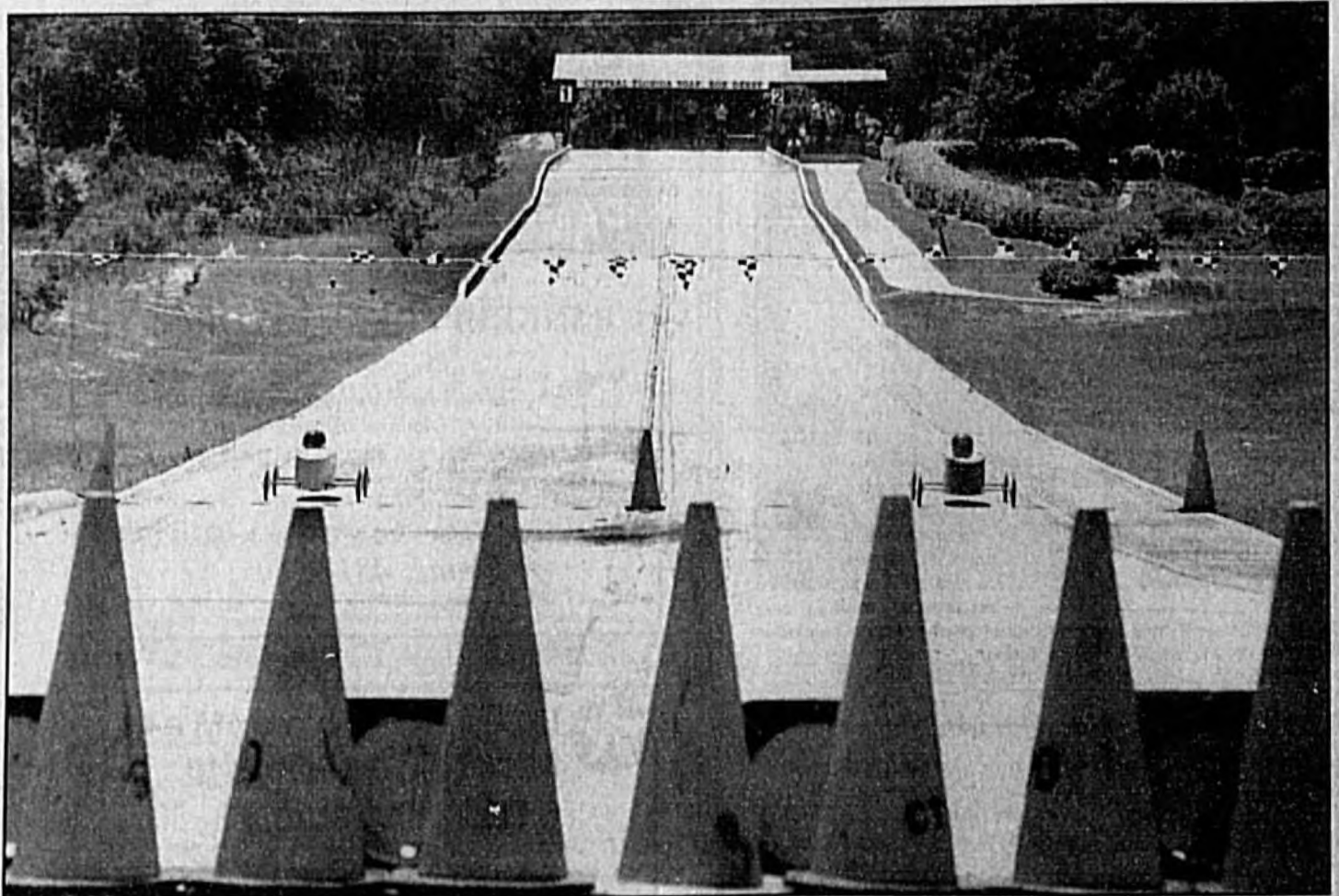

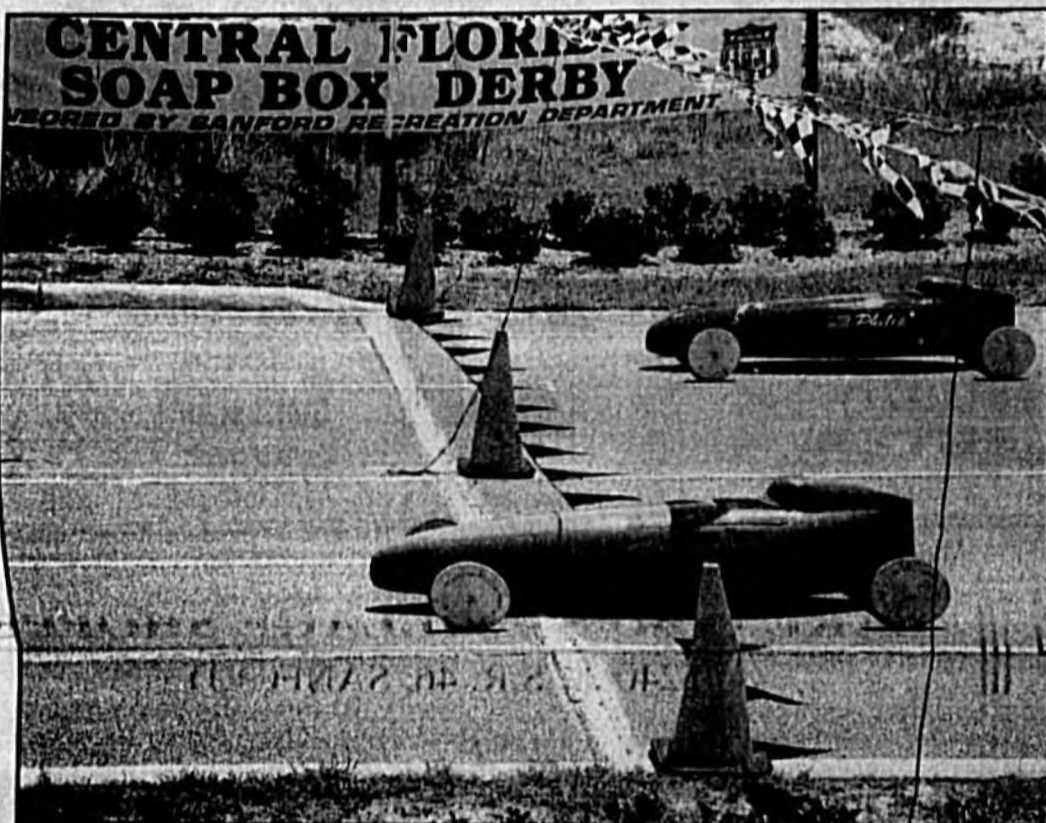

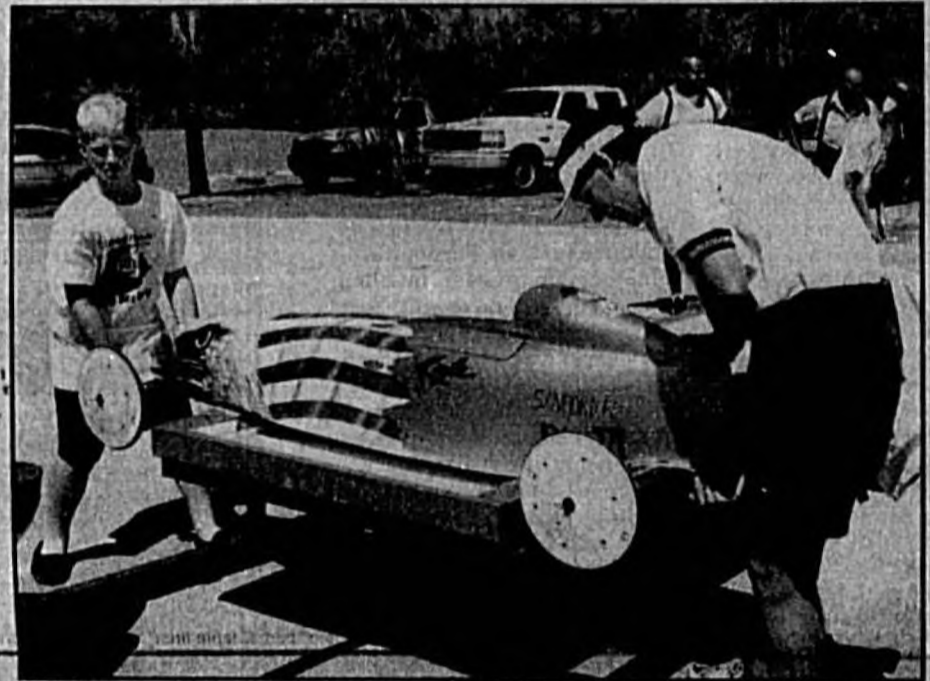
