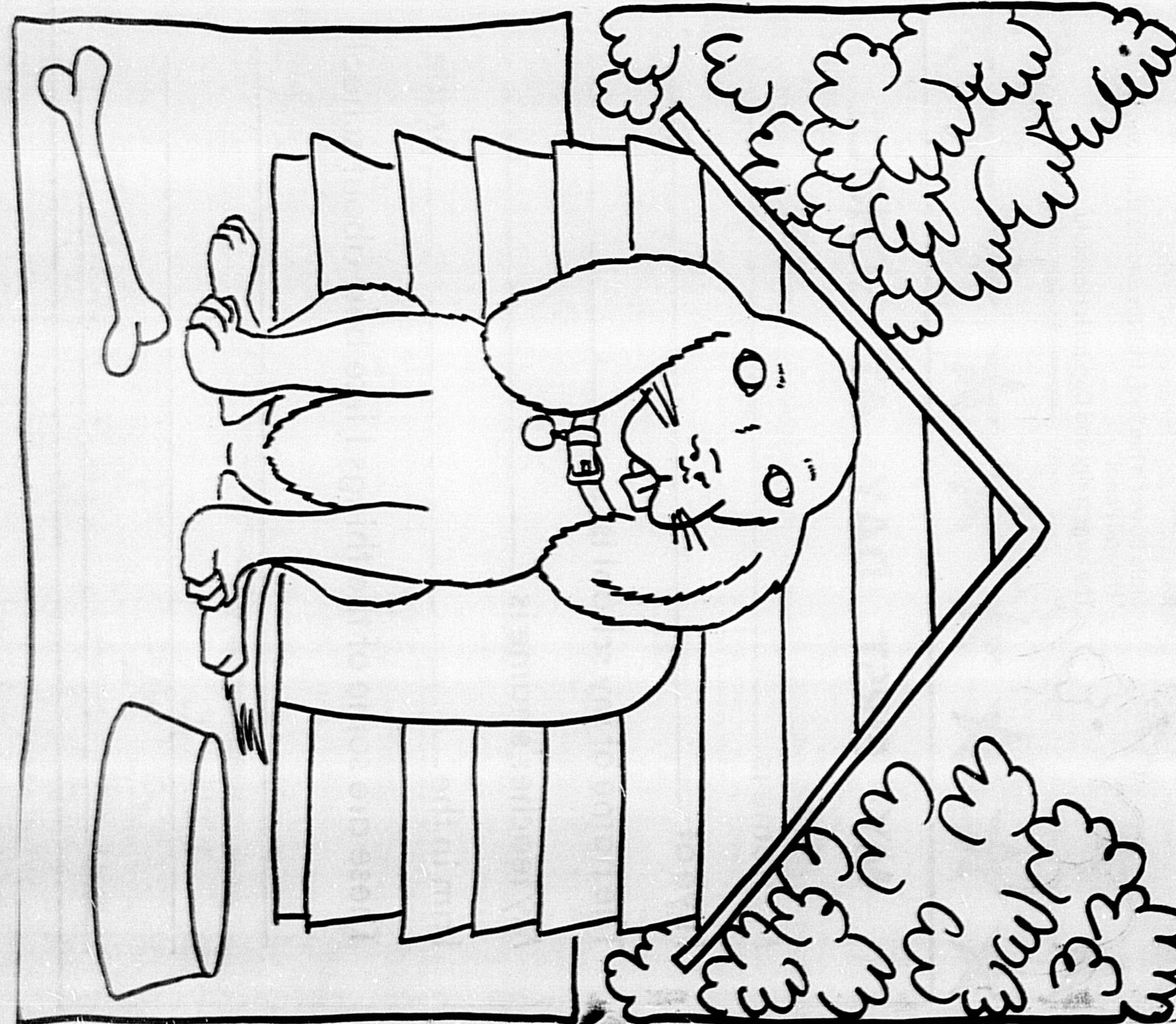

Republicans Eyed For Tax Assessor

Gov. Claude Kirk's patronage committee in Seminole County commenced anew this morning to screen a list of Republicans for selection of one for recommendation to the Chief Executive for appointment as county tax assessor. Robert Anderson, Casselberry real estate broker, who was slated for the nomination to succeed the late S. O. Dorminey, this morning informed patronage committee members that he was withdrawing his name for consideration.

State Rep. E. Pope Bassett, member of the committee, informed The Herald this morning the appointment would be forthcoming "within a few days." The committee is slated to meet Tuesday. However, Kirk's appointment will be delayed pending a security check of the nominee.

Anderson told The Herald he was withdrawing from the race because it would cost him financially "to change over so quickly." However, he said he would be happy to compete in an election at a later date. A resident of Seminole County for 10 years, he registered as a voter for the very first time last Friday. He is a Republican.

Mrs. Dorothy Gilson, in charge of the elections division of the Secretary of State's office, said that under the new state Constitution the appointment of the assessor's post will be until the November general election in 1970. Dorminey's term would have expired in January 1973. Dorminey's successor and Greg Drummond, an appointed county commissioner, would run for election in November 1970.

Manufacturing Plant Studied Home Firm Rents Base Space

An Orlando firm, interested in construction of modular and mobile homes possibly in Sanford, has leased 2,000 square feet of Sanford Airport Building 9 to construct two prototype homes for evaluation purposes before building a plant to manufacture the units.

This was confirmed today by Richard P. Coniff, general manager of diversification for Florida Gas Company of Orlando.

Coniff stated that Stan Hoffmann was acting as consultant for the gas firm in setting up an evaluation program to study engineering before constructing a plant to build the \$13,000 to \$18,000 range homes.

Coniff said Florida Gas was talking about buying property near Sanford if it was decided to market the homes.

"It's possible that we would build a plant on this property or construct on 4,500 acres already owned by us near the Martin tract south of Orlando," Coniff divulged.

Don Rathel, Sanford Industrial Commission director, stated in a Friday meeting of the committee that he was withdrawing his name for consideration.

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Schools-Airport Lease In Hassle

Speaking during Friday afternoon's SIC session, Knowles said the buildings were being leased to schools for 50 cents a square foot in competition with a city taxpayer, who had attempted to lease warehousing space to the city but could not meet the low airport price.

Knowles indicated the structure is located on the flight line and is partitioned as to be unsuitable for warehousing but instead for people.

Don Rathel, SIC director, stated the airport has four of these type buildings and a year ago people were concerned with being able to operate the airport without having to obtain money from the city taxpayers.

"Now, we are getting the airport on a paying basis," Rathel said.

A. K. Shoemaker, SIC chairman, told Knowles this is a short term lease and would have (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 3)

Zoo Site-Still A?

Sanford's zoo committee, set up by the city commission, to find a suitable site in which to locate the present city zoo, indicated at Friday's meeting to pursue three moves in finding the proper site.

Mayor Lee P. Moore, chairman of the committee, suggested a site located near the Sanford stadium on property available to city, or selling this property and using the funds to purchase another site possible downtown or moving the animal attraction to the Lake Golden area at the Sanford Airport.

Committee also would consider placing the zoo on either of two county locations, at the Big Tree Park or at the proposed Lake Monroe Park, now being considered by the county commission.

A. B. Peterson Jr., zoo vice-chairman, said the Lake Golden area would be as good a site as any since few if any complaints from property owners would be forthcoming.

The lake area was first suggested by Harry Shoop, downtown merchant and purported candidate for mayor, at least a month ago when the city voted to set up the zoo relocation group.

Moore and Peterson indicated they would talk with John Alexander, Seminole Commission chairman, about locating within the county, if the committee decided to follow this idea.

The Celery Avenue and Melonville location is on a site formerly occupied by the agricultural building, which was later moved, and is 6.46 acres.

Moore said this site would draw some complaints from nearby property owners and suggested the city turn the problem over to the Zoning and Planning Board for a public hearing.

City Manager W. E. Knowles said the Z and P board would not want to hold hearings on this property as they are then subjected to abuse by citizens.

Peterson suggested the zoo committee have public hearing on the property before any action was taken and this met approval by Moore and Knowles.

Assessor Office Is Open

The hope that Gov. Claude Kirk's advisors will recommend an individual for appointment to the office of county tax assessor prior to the end of this week in order that no crisis will arise, was expressed by County Commission Chairman John Alexander.

Alexander said he, the county attorney and Assistant Assessor Terry Goebel conferred Friday afternoon and determined the assessor's office would be open today for routine business.

Check at the courthouse showed the office is open.

Goebel when contacted by The Herald said that the office on advice of the attorney, is operating in an advisory capacity only. "We can't do any corresponding," he said.

At the same time, Goebel said although the company doing the data processing for the county, Hovens and Associates, Tampa, was ready to run the tax roll over the weekend, they had to be stopped since there was no authorization to allow them to proceed.

The tax rolls have to be completed and certified for presentation to the County Commission by Oct. 1.

County Asks Pit Enjoiner

Temporary injunction was sought by Seminole County in circuit court today to stop operation of the Allen R. Pyle Land Clearing, Inc. and Earl Lefler borrow pits in Sanlando Springs.

In the suit filed by County Attorney Harold Johnson, it is charged that the two companies failed to obtain permits in compliance with the law, encroached on public right-of-way and failed to observe setback requirements. It is further charged that both enterprises constitute public nuisance which tends to the immediate annoyance of the citizens of Seminole County in general.

The county begs the court to take jurisdiction in the matter and asks that defendants be enjoined from operating the borrow pits. In addition, a mandatory injunction is requested to require the defendants to correct all violations and setback requirements.

The suits have been assigned to Judge William G. Akridge.

Two New Park Plans Studied

The Civic Improvement Board has prepared final plans for a Memorial Park and a Senior Citizens' Park. The plans for the two new parks for the Sanford area will now go to the Tri-County Planning Commission for presentation to the City Commission.

The City Commission will provide the final approval for the budgetary appropriations. They have the power to suggest, alter or abandon the plans.

The Board, created by the City of Sanford, is designed to look after the beautification of the city on a uniform basis. They held their regular meeting this morning at the Chamber of Commerce Building.

The plans for the lake-front Memorial Park, located near the Sanford Marina, will be studied to determine if a decking facility is necessary.

Improvements for the Marina Isle have been deleted from the overall plan for the Memorial Park because that land is under private ownership and is leased to the Holiday Inn.

The game areas, which would have included croquet, shuffleboard and horseshoe areas, have been deleted from the final plans for the Senior Citizens' Park.

The park is designed to be a tranquil park, and the game areas were not deemed conducive to this end. Also, the cost was cited, and the fact that these facilities could be added later on was mentioned.

Additional rain shelters will be added to the Senior Citizens' Park, and water fountains will be provided if feasible.

On the first Wednesday of October the Civic Improvement Board will hold its regular meeting at the C of C Building at 8 p.m. to continue their study of the city next August, at the City's Budgetary hearings.

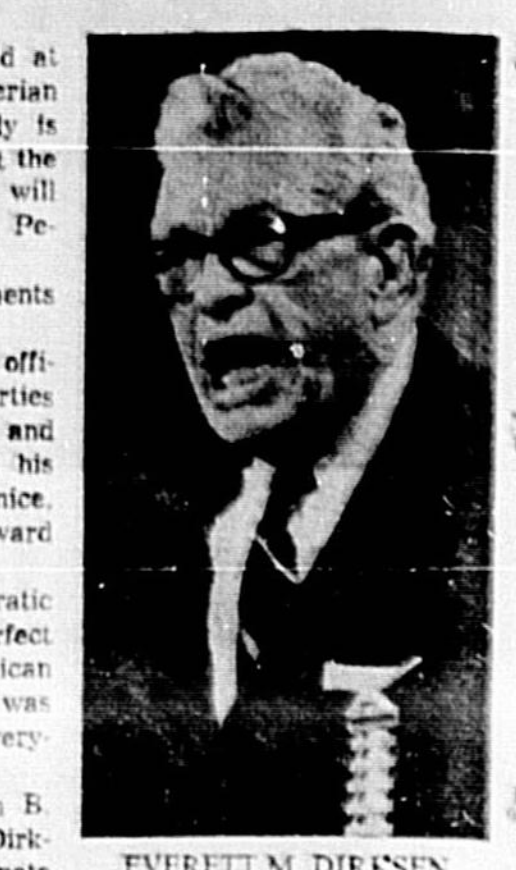

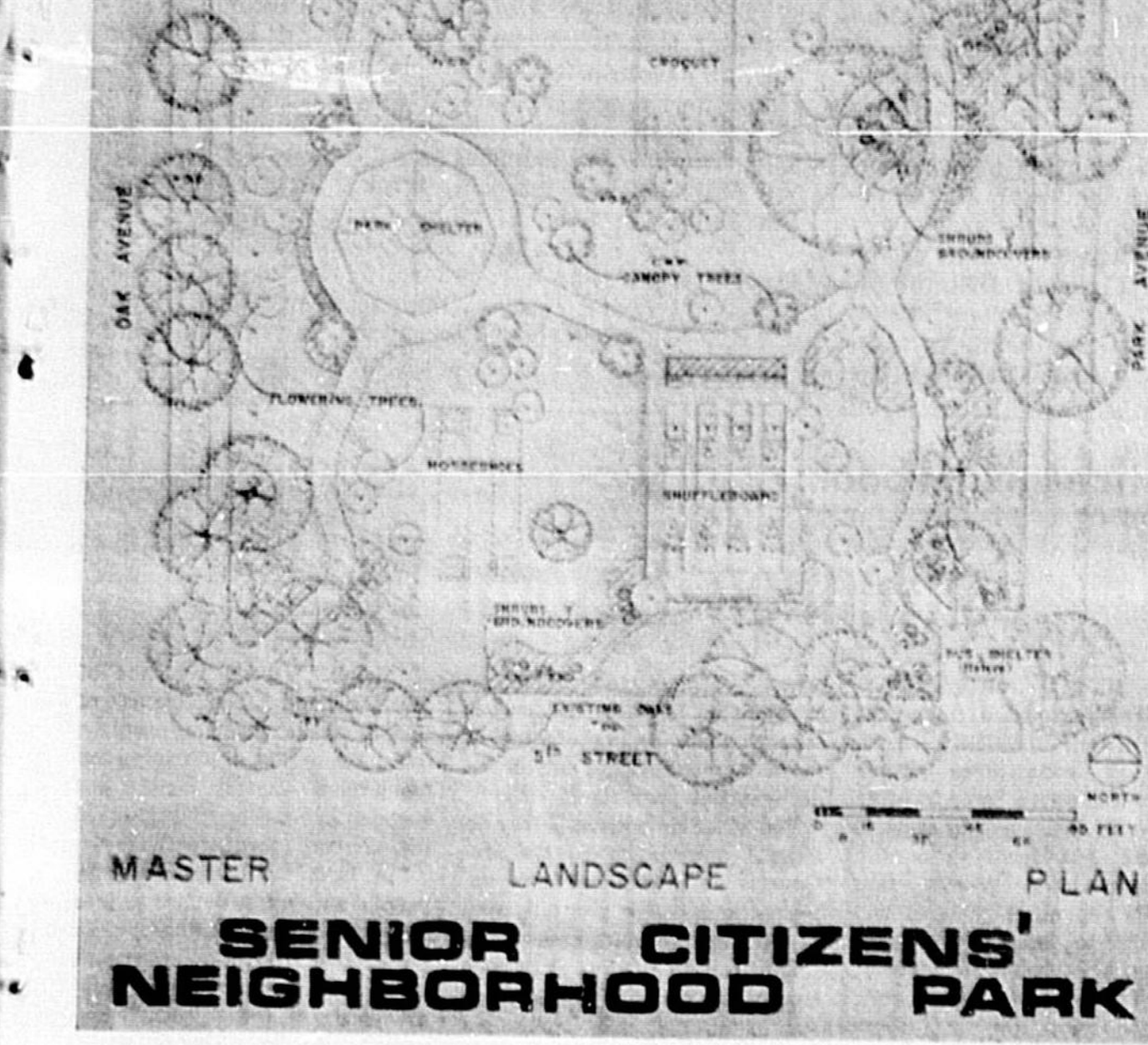

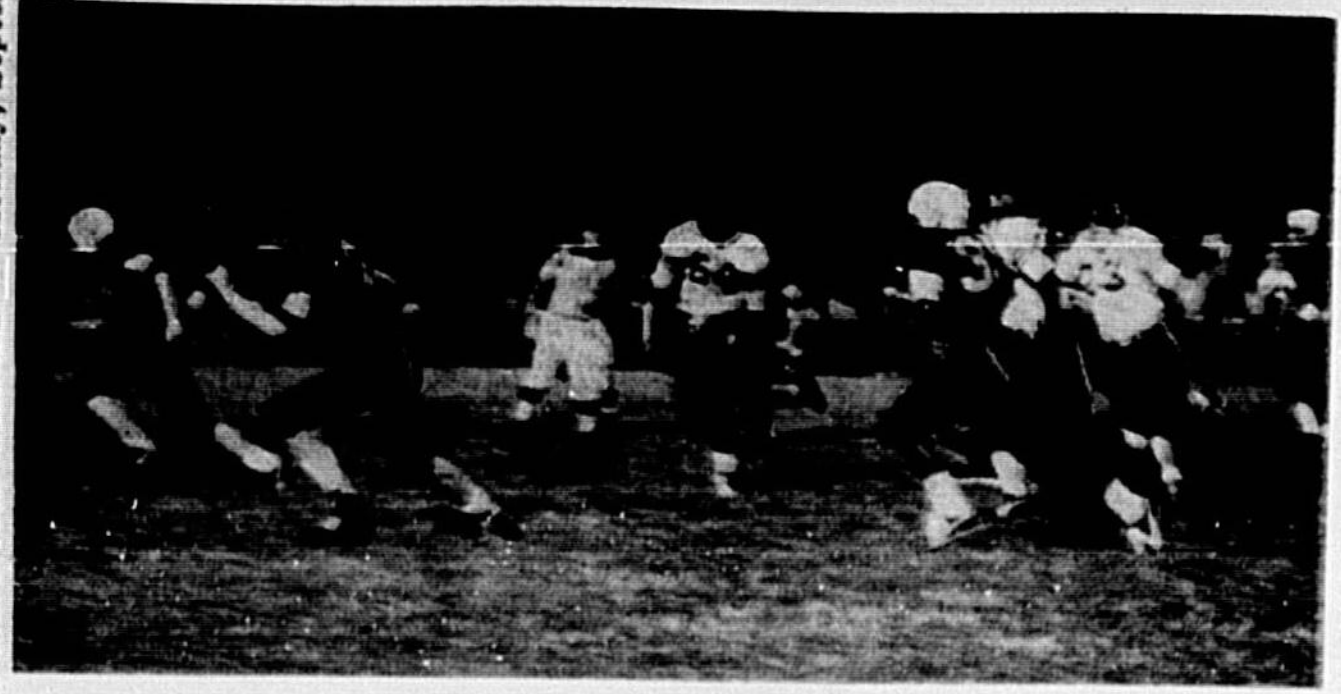

Hill was a third-string full back with the all-stars and general scout was that the Cowboy scouts must have gotten confused when they drafted him.

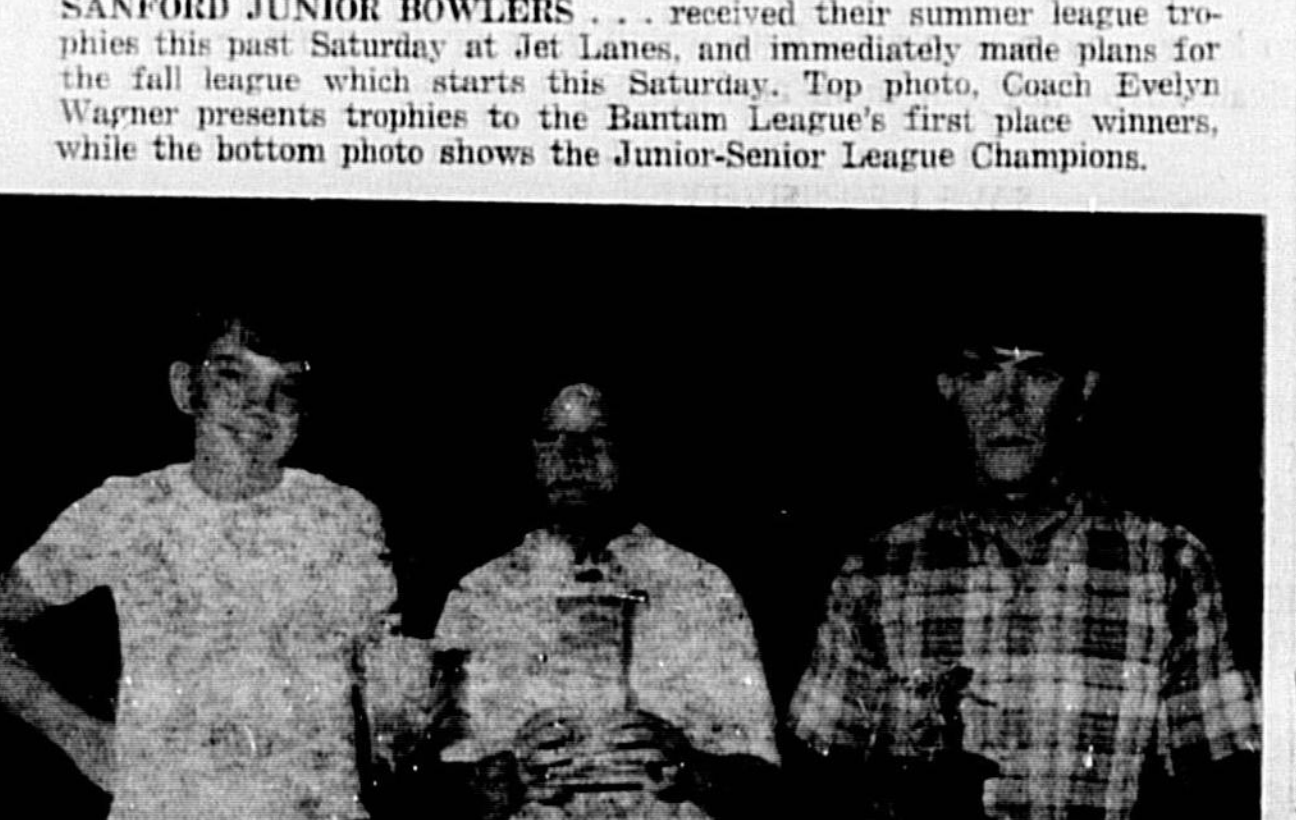

The Seminoles' first regular season game was Thursday, September 18, at Sanford Memorial Stadium when they met Oviedo.

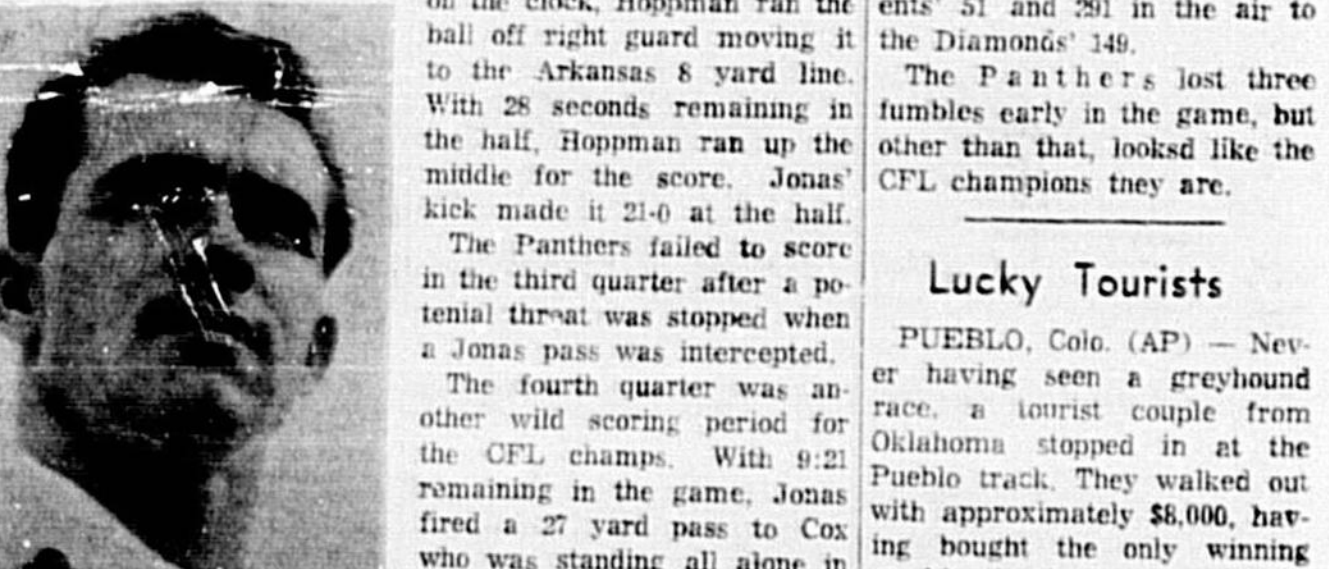

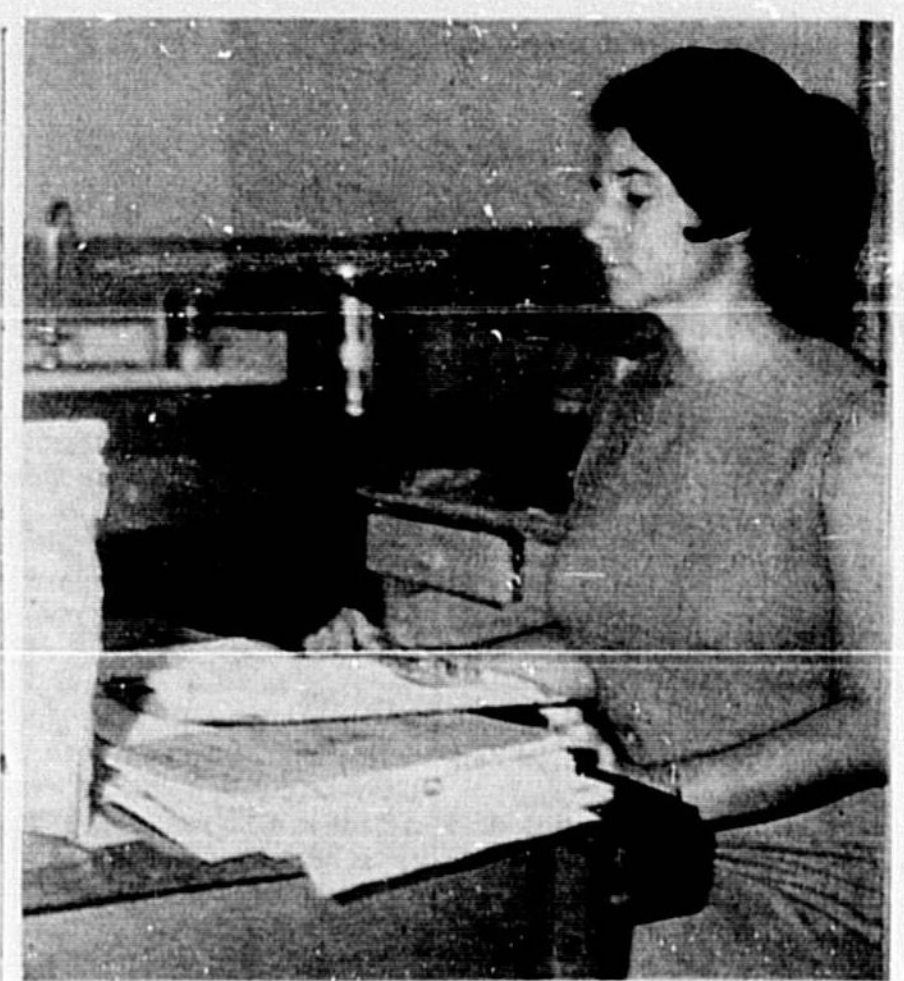

Oviedo Water Unit Doubles In Year

 The City of Oviedo water system celebrates its first birthday Sept. 15 and Sept. A. M. Jones reports that in this time it has more than doubled the number of customers served.

The system is reported to be one of the most up to date in the state for a municipality this size in that there are 12 miles of water main laid running from 18" to 60" pipe. This in itself is unusual in that more than usual cities have to go back and re-do their pipe lines to accommodate the water output.

Consumption started out at 50,000 gallons daily and has now reached a volume output of 100,000 to 125,000 gallons daily. Total bills mailed to its customers during the first week of operation amounted to \$1,428.86 as compared to the last billing date of July 26, which was \$2,114.85.

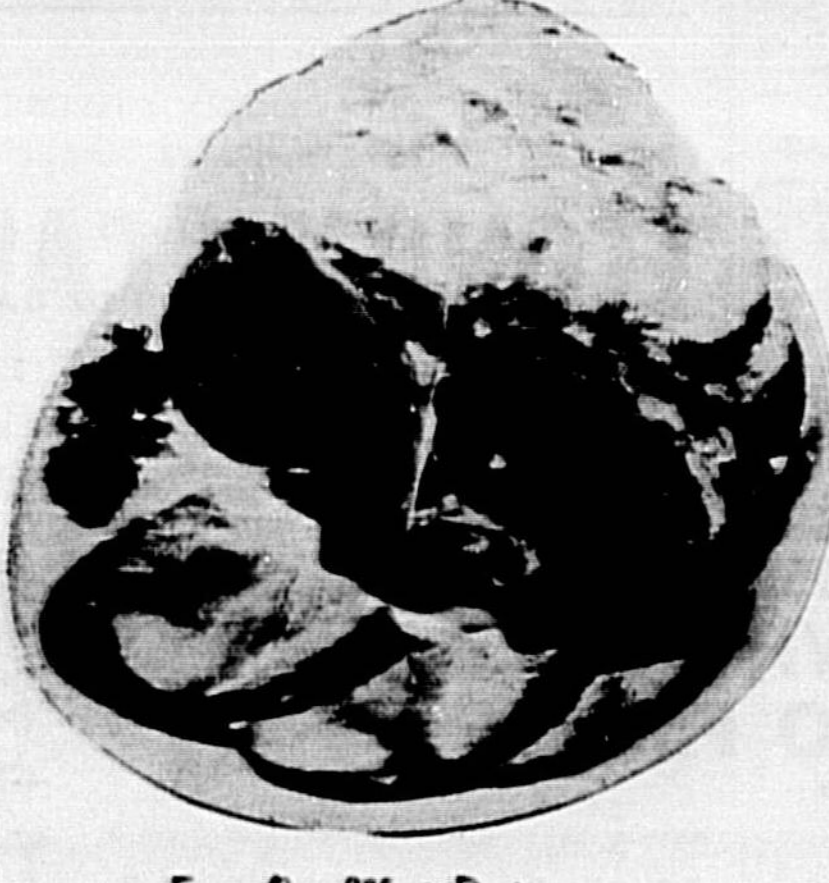

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Schools Defend 'Choice' Policy

School Board Attorney Douglas Stenstrom has confirmed that acting under the instruction of the board he has written a reply to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare's (HEW) list of 30 allegations which maintain the county's freedom of choice school plan adopted for 1969-70 term by the board does not do away with a dual school system.

Stenstrom said the reply to the allegations was necessary and added the board would also request a hearing of the charges before the HEW's civil rights officer.

Stenstrom said that since an Orlando attorney had indicated to the press and to others his intentions of filing legal action against the board, it would not be long before the school system would be back in federal court.

A conspiracy charge against Jean Bryant and Ray Sloman, board members, was dismissed by Judge George C. Young in U.S. District Court two weeks ago. William Rowland, Orlando attorney, filed the action on behalf of 611 plaintiffs opposed to the freedom of choice plan.

It is expected that Rowland will file an injunction, possibly this week, against the board's choice plan and seek to have the federal court throw it out in favor of a central school plan advanced by him (Rowland).
