Schools debate zoning policy changes

SANFORD — The Seminole County School Board is considering revisions to its attendance zone policy in order to ease the tensions of rezoning students from one school to another.

The Future School Planning Committee, consisting of school district staff, Seminole County residents and parents of children attending public schools, has reported that the school district will need at least eight elementary schools, two middle schools and one high school

Proposal aimed at streamlining process; no zoning lines changed for now

over the next ten years to meet projected growth.

The purpose of draft revisions to the school attendance zone policy is to provide a systematic process for creating

attendance zones for new schools and for revising attendance zones to address overcrowded conditions.

"It is not significantly different from what we have now," said School Board

member Larry Furlong. "It codifies the policy and streamlines it a little bit. But, all the policies in the world don't make it any easier for families being rezoned."

The plan calls for the acquisition of school sites as far in advance as possible to aid in the future planning and assignment process.

Sites would be acquired in close proximity to residential development to minimize transportation costs. The school district will also monitor development trends and track new residential projects to evaluate potential impacts on school See Schools, Page 8A

Sanford airport welcome center to be renovated

SANFORD — Construction is underway this week on renovations to the Welcome Center at the Orlando Sanford Airport.

The four week project is expected to be finished in early January 2000. Construction on the \$350,000 project began this Monday.

The renovations were requested by the 12 international tour operators who operate at the airport. The tour operators will receive new air conditioned and carpeted facilities.

In addition to improvements to facilities used by businesses and organizations at the Welcome Center, a small cafe area will also be established. Hot foods, beverages and snacks will be available.

"This is going to bring a whole new feel to the area," said Larry Gouldthorpe, president of Orlando Sanford International, the airport's international terminal manager. "We're changing the Welcome Center a lot, giving it a more up-scale feel."

The two largest tenants of the Welcome Center, Cosmos Holidays and Transatlantic Vacations, will both benefit from the expansion by receiving new facilities.

The storefront for Transatlantic Vacations will be 1,650 square feet, while the storefront for Cosmos Holidays will be 1,800 square feet.

"We are going to have more comfortable surroundings for customers to use the Welcome Center," Gouldthorpe said.

The center walkway at the Welcome Center will maintain an open area.

"We will still have open walkways for customers," Gouldthorpe said. "Even those areas will have new ceiling fans, flooring and lighting."

Booth operators at the Welcome Center will also receive larger space with improved lighting. Coach USA will receive a new ticket window, while the Sanford-Seminole County Chamber of Commerce booth will be relocated within the Welcome Center.

SANFORD — Major League Baseball star and Sanford native Tim Raines will be the Grand Marshal in the city's Christmas Parade this weekend, organizers announced on Thursday.

Saturday's parade along First Street in downtown Sanford will begin at 11 a.m. and last until 12 p.m. Participants will start at San Juan Avenue and proceed to Myrtle Avenue.

Raines will be among 50 participants riding floats in the parade. Santa Claus and several Disney characters will also participate. Sanford Main Street is the parade's sponsor.

"(Raines) is so popular in this city, and his presence will really enhance the parade," said Linda Kuhn, executive director of

A 20-year Major League veteran, Raines, 40, was born in

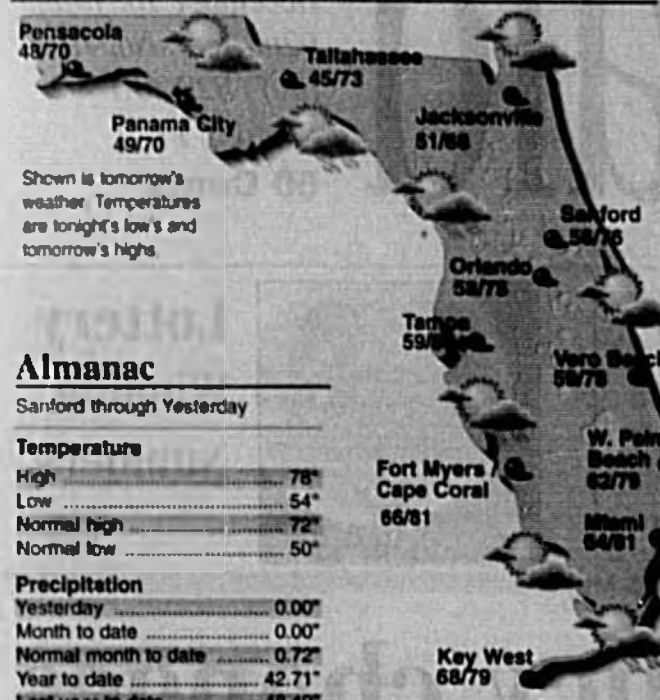
Sanford and currently resides in Heathrow with his wife and children.

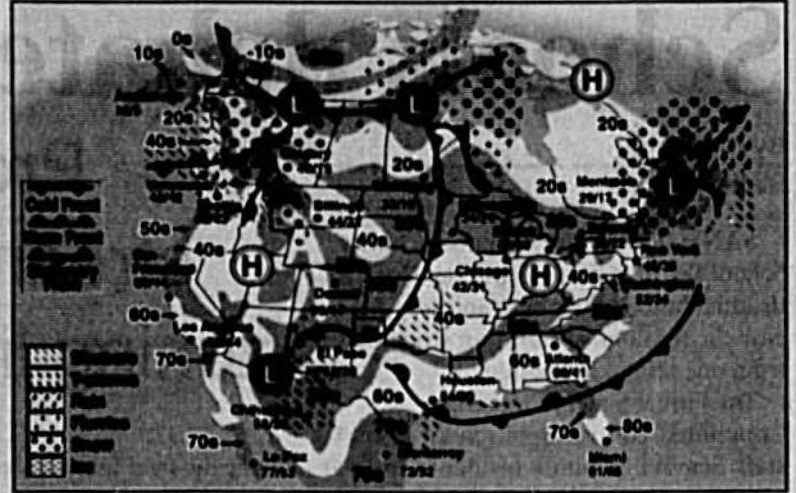

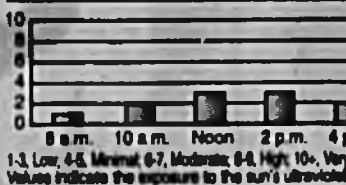

Police look for links in robberies

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Eleven armed robberies have occurred since Nov. 22 in Altamonte Springs, and investigators are looking into whether the robberies are connected to a pair of similar armed robberies that occurred in the Sabal Point area of Longwood and Casselberry on Tuesday.

The robberies to individuals in Altamonte Springs have occurred in the parking lots of apartments or hotels. Four businesses have also been robbed, with both the business employees and customers being victimized, according to the Altamonte Springs Police Department. The Altamonte Mall has also been victimized.

In several of the eleven robberies, victims have been injured. One victim was hospitalized with head injuries after being struck by a handgun carried by the suspect. The weapons carried have usually been handguns, but knives have also been used, police said.

The descriptions most common in the incidents are black males wearing masks or bandannas, and wearing dark clothing. In some cases a single suspect has committed the robbery, but in several instances there have been two to four suspects, police said.

"The Altamonte Springs Police Department is working closely with other area agencies who have experienced similar robberies," said officer Michael Nelson, a spokesman for the Altamonte Springs Police Department. "Intelligence information is being shared and some leads have been developed."

Police are advising residents to take care when leaving their vehicles, apartments and businesses.

"They should be aware of their surroundings and contact the (police) department to report any suspicious circumstances or people," Nelson said. "It is also suggested that businesses make sure that doors, especially rear doors, are locked whenever possible."

Nelson said the Altamonte Springs Police Department will have marked and unmarked police vehicles conducting stake-outs and extra patrols throughout the city.

Three robberies occurred last week on Wednesday night and early Thursday morning that investigators suspect may be related, because the suspects have similar descriptions. The robberies included:

- On Dec. 1, Dunkin' Donuts

at 635 E. Altamonte Drive was robbed by a gunman, while an accomplice waited in a blue or black sedan. An estimated \$500 to \$700 was stolen.

- On Dec. 2, two men robbed the Olive Garden Restaurant at 30 W. State Road 436. An estimated \$2,600 in cash and a victim's car was stolen.
- On Dec. 2, a resident of the Ravens Crossing apartment complex lost \$300 in valuables while being held up at gun-point. Two black males apparently attacked the 39-year old victim as he was walking to the breezeway that leads to his apartment.

As he reached the stairwell the victim was struck over the head with a silver colored hand gun. He was thrown into the back seat of his vehicle, as the suspects unsuccessfully attempted to steal it. The pair then fled the scene on foot. The victim's briefcase, which contained his wallet and day planner valued at about \$300, was stolen, the police report said.

Meanwhile, investigators believe that two armed robberies in Longwood and Casselberry on Tuesday were committed by the same man, according to Steve Olson, a spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

"It is not known whether the suspect has any link to the robberies in the City of Altamonte

Springs," Olson said. "Investigators are comparing notes."

On Tuesday at about 10:19 p.m. at 6304 at 6304 Bayhill Lane in the Sabal Point area of Longwood, Maryann Cerasoli, 58, told investigators that after she got out of her vehicle in front of her apartment, she was approached by an unknown black male who attempted to steal her purse.

She was able to thwart the robbery attempt by screaming and holding onto her purse. However, she suffered bruises on the left side of her face when the suspect struck her with a pistol.

Forty minutes later, 19-year-old Tammi Fitch and 22-year-old Blaine Helmick had just returned home to the nearby Regency Oaks Apartments at 220 Maltese Ct. near State Road 436 in Fern Park, and were walking to their apartment.

A young adult black male then came up behind the couple with a gun. The suspect stole their wallets containing \$35 in cash and a cellular phone, according to the incident report.

"The method of operation is very similar to the first robbery attempt," Olson said.

The black male suspect is described as young, approximately 6 feet 1 inches tall, well spoken with a thin build. He was last seen

wearing black pants, a brownish shirt, and was armed with a chrome colored semi-automatic pistol.

In other action, investigators have also been looking into a string of robberies that have occurred along the Interstate-4 corridor from Daytona to Orlando, primarily to restaurants and hotels.

Many of the recent robberies have occurred along bustling roads such as State Roads 436 or 434, as well as near Interstate-4 exit ramps, authorities said. Other recent robberies include:

- On Nov. 30, in Longwood, a guest at a Ramada Inn along SR 434 lost cash and a room key in a robbery. The suspect had a similar description to those involved in robberies in Altamonte Springs and Volusia County.

Investigators are looking into whether recent robberies that have occurred in Seminole and Volusia counties may be related.

- On Nov. 30, in Deltona, two separate robbery attempts were made within five minutes of each other. Both incidents occurred on Deltona Boulevard, near an Interstate-4 exit ramp. One robbery attempt was made in a NationsBank parking lot, the other in a Best Western Deltona Inn parking lot.

Lake Mary prepares for St. Lucia celebration

LAKE MARY — According to the Lake Mary Historical Commission, this is how Swedish families begin the month-long celebration of the holiday season; they hold it on Dec. 13 and strictly follow tradition as close as possible.

At dawn, the eldest daughter or relative of the family, dresses in a long white gown with a red sash. On her head is a wreath with a ring of seven lighted candles. The wreath is entwined with green sprigs of lingonberries, (fruit of the mountain cranberry).

She is dressed to honor the real St. Lucia, a young girl from

the province of Varmland who, according to legend, sailed around the lake in a large ship, to bring food to the starving during a terrible famine. The name Lucia means light. According to legend St. Lucia is traditionally shown with a halo of light because she would not be harmed by fire.

According to the calendar used in the middle ages, the holiday was actually the longest night of the year. Peasants tried to eat three breakfasts before dawn. The extra food was supposed to help against the dark. Lucia is first noted historically at the end of the 18th century.

With Dec. 13 being a Monday, the Lake Mary Historical Commission will

observe the day Sunday, Dec. 12 with a special event at the Frank Evans Museum, 158 N. Country Club Road. Open house will be held from 2 until 4 p.m., with well known author Charlie Carlson as guest speaker.

While the event is open to the public, families from Sweden and their descendants are urged to be on hand, and will be recognized as among the founders of the local area which had a large contingent of Swedes. People with old photos, from 1980 and before, with a Swedish connection, are asked to bring them to the gathering, where copies will be made for display at the museum.

State grants will provide window protection for hurricane shelters

SANFORD — In preparation for next year's hurricane season, two Seminole County schools that are used as shelter areas will receive new window treatments.

Seminole County has been awarded state grant of up to \$106,316 to provide exterior window protection for Highlands and Carillon Elementary Schools.

Both schools are designated as primary shelter sites during times of emergency. Carillon is located on Lockwood Boulevard in Oviedo, while Highlands is located on Shepard Road in Winter Springs.

The grant was awarded to provide exterior window treatment so that the windows can withstand the force of airborne debris in the event of a major storm.

The county plans to install a system, similar to a shade, to be stored in a small, tamper resistant, inconspicuous box over the windows.

The window protection

"shade" will have the appearance and texture of the sun screen fabric that is commonly used at nurseries, but it will be stronger than the shades at nurseries.

The project is expected to be completed by June 2000, just in time for the start of the hurricane season.

The county is proceeding with obtaining a contract for the work, and staff of the Seminole County school district will assist in contract management. The contractor is expected to be ready to start work in January 2000.

A 1998 survey performed by the Florida Department of Community Affairs identified several items that could improve emergency shelters, based on survey criteria of the American Red Cross.

Lack of window protection was cited as the highest area of concern among shelters sur-

veyed throughout the state.

State grants have been established to allow local emergency management agencies the opportunity to address identified, high priority shelter needs and to provide a resource of funds for the renovation of shelters.

Navitivy stories are best ever told

Of all the stories in the Bible, the best told - and the best news - are those of the Birth of the Messiah by Matthew and Luke.

The essence of the Good News is that God has made Himself present to us in the Life of His Messiah who was born and walked on this earth.

Through the years there have been Biblical scholars and others who may have scoffed at the frequent angelic appearances, the virginal conception, and the star guiding the Magi from the East.

Whether interpreted by saint or skeptic, the stories are well told. "They (The Magi) opened their treasure-boxes and brought out gifts for him: gold, frankincense, and myrrh." Matthew 2:11. The Bible does not say how many Magi there were. It is believed there were three because of the three differ-

ent gifts. The NIV (New International Version) Bible says that contrary to tradition, the Magi did not visit Jesus at the manger on the night of his birth. They came months later and visited him as a child at his house. "The child was with his mother Mary."

We'll heard a number of recreations of the Nativity this Christmas season - and the Magi will be in some, not in others. From the time I was in school, I thrilled each time the story of Christ's birth was told. He was born in a stable, not at Holiday Inn. He was wrapped in swaddling clothes.

Tommy Hilfiger wasn't around. The Good News is that the Son of God was born and His birth has been recorded. If we know one story in our lifetime, if we need to teach our children one story, this is the One. This is

the Gospel that makes fully human. The Best Story ever told.

Herod's the big bully of the story, of course. He was appointed king of Judea by the Roman Senate in 40 B.C. He murdered his wife, three sons, mother-in-law and uncle - along with the babies two years old and under in Bethlehem.

Herod tried to deceive the Magi but they learn in a dream not to let him know the whereabouts of the Baby Jesus. Of all the Bible villains, Herod's way up there. His son, Archelaus, was also cruel and tyrannical. It is not know how long Jesus and his parents were in Egypt after they fled from Herod's tyranny.

Several people have told me this week they they liken Fidel Castro to King Herod. It's an thought-provoking analogy - particularly in Castro's furious effort to embrace six-year-old Elian Gonzalez.

Still, it's difficult to compare Castro to the bad guy in the Greatest Story Ever Told. Castro was nice to the Pope, wasn't he?

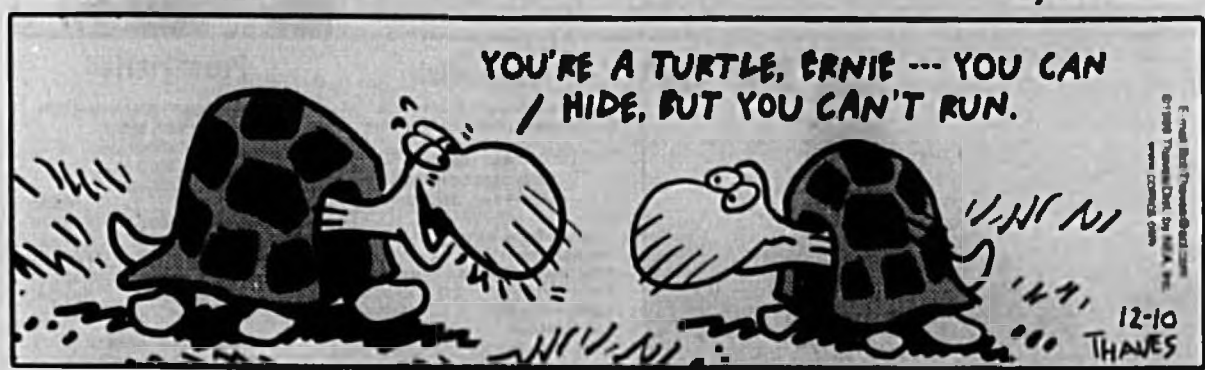

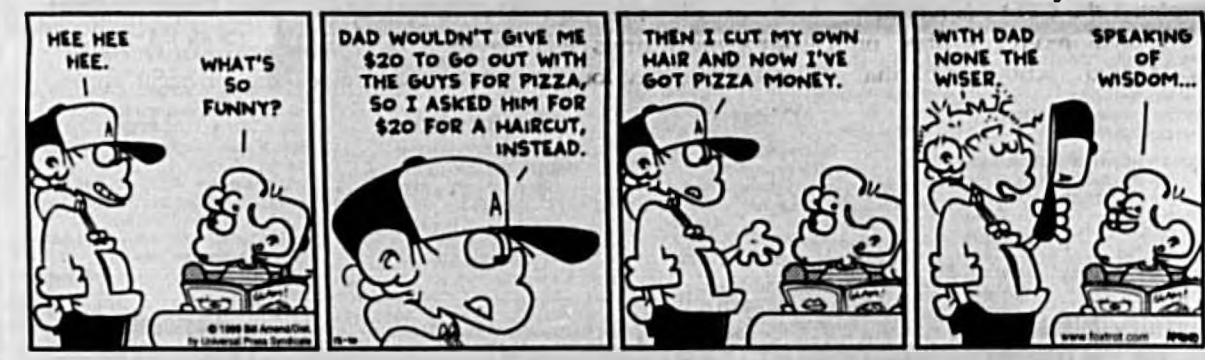

Win at Bridge

A mixed bag for beginners

By Philip Alder
At first, a beginner doesn't benefit much from a book. Only after he plays for a while will the printed word make some sense. Even then, it helps if, in particular, the bidding methods advocated by the book's author match those being recommended by the beginner's teacher. Recently I received "The Complete Idiot's Guide to Bridge" by H. Anthony Medley (Alpha Books, \$16.95). Not my idea of a good title, but I suppose it was inspired — if that is the right word — by the dummies books. However, it has a lot going for it, with 390 large pages and many useful diagrams containing tricks of the trade, lingo and other key pieces of information. The bidding is mostly modern, with 15-17 no-trumps and limit raises (but three-card support in the majors is considered sufficient, which it is not), yet Medley also recom-

mends the old-fashioned strong two-bid. Card-play doesn't start until page 250, and some of it is rather advanced. This deal, though, is much simpler. How would you plan the play in three no-trump after West leads the spade queen? You have eight top tricks: two spades, three hearts and three diamonds. There are four tricks available from the clubs, but you don't have time to play on that suit. The defenders would run the spades first. Instead, you must hope to collect four tricks from either red suit. Play off the three top diamonds. Is dummy's last diamond a winner? If so, you are home. If not, turn to hearts, hoping an opponent began with J-10-x.

Infant botilism is usually treatable

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is infant botilism, how does a child get it, and why don't doctors know more about it?
DEAR READER: Botilism is a serious form of poisoning that can affect children and adults alike. It is caused by eating certain foods that have been contaminated by an endotoxin, a poison produced by a class of bacteria called clostridium botulinum. Botilism is unusual in that it doesn't produce the typical signs and symptoms of food poisoning, such as nausea, stomach upset, diarrhea and fever. Weakness is usually the first sign of botilism, followed by double vision and difficulty swallowing. Nausea and vomiting occur in less than half of the cases. Symptoms usually appear within a week of eating contaminated food that has usually been incorrectly canned or improperly cooked.

Because the diagnosis is difficult to establish, treatment with anti-toxin is often delayed. About two-thirds of cases are fatal. Doctors certainly know about botilism but the disease is unusual, especially in sporadic forms, and does not come readily to mind when sick infants become affected. Pediatricians recommend against feeding honey in any form to youngsters under the age of 1 because of the chance that it may contain botilism. Infants seem to be particularly sensitive to the toxin in honey. There is a major distinction between infant botilism and the adult variety. Anytime a baby experiences difficulty breathing, the child is put on a respirator. This is one reason why infant botilism is not as likely to be fatal as the affliction in adults, who are unlikely to be given ventilatory support. Fortunately, the infant form progresses slowly enough so that respiratory assistance can be administered in time to prevent serious

consequences.
DEAR DR. GOTT: Several years ago, I suffered a laceration of my penis that required stitches. Once I became sexually active, I began having problems with consistent, severe pain. I can't discuss this with my parents or with a doctor without them finding out. What do you suggest?
DEAR READER: Of course, a doctor should find out. This is what doctors are for. Your old injury may have produced scar tissue that is painful when you are aroused. In my opinion, you should be examined by a urologist, who may be able to perform a simple operation to remove the scar tissue and enable you to enjoy normal relations.
A doctor is also committed to confidentiality, so your parents would certainly not be informed of your problem. I suggest that you overcome your reticence and help the doctor find an appropriate solution.

Buy, buy gifts, but not bye, bye money

Shop in reputable stores and observe these ground rules at all times:

- Make sure you understand the store's refund and exchange policy.
- Save all sales receipts.

- Keep track of all purchases you charge and make sure that the monthly statement is correct.

Your statement must be in your hand at least two weeks before payment is due. Do not allow the store to debit you with finance charges on unpaid balances, if your late payment is due to their neglect in late mailing of your statement.

If you have a dispute about a billing error, do not write a note on the bill. Write a separate letter to the store, mail it certified mail, best, but not a must, with return receipt requested.

The store must acknowledge receipt of your complaint within a week and may not report any unfavorable report on your credit rating while the dispute is in progress.

- Do remember with each purchase, that the day of reckoning comes soon after the festivities.

- Do not let the ease of charging put stars in your eyes and tinsel on your brain. Even post-holiday delayed payment privileges have a way of making time run at high speed towards high finance charges.
- Goodwill to all — Be wary of individuals who try to take advantage of holiday spirits by asking for contributions to a charity you've never heard of. Charity cheaters would rather take than share. Make sure that the charity isn't for the person who's collecting.
- In the mail — Mail-ordered merchandise can cause trouble, arriving late, defective, or not at all.

Mail-ordered merchandise must arrive within 30 days, or the customer must be notified in writing, that he or she may cancel the order for a full refund, or agree to a later delivery date by signing and mailing a postage prepaid card, which must be supplied, together with the notice of delay in delivery.

- Unordered gifts arriving in the mail — Boxes of Christmas cards, decorations, hankies are yours to keep. By law, you are not responsible for merchandise you have not ordered. Do enjoy them if you wish. Do not believe that you must return the merchandise or pay for it.
- One last idea — Instead of throwing away the wrapping paper, save it to use again next year. You'll not only save money, you'll save the trees that provide the paper, and you'll help to decrease the air pollution from burning discarded paper.

I love him as though he were a blood relation and so does my brother. Should I keep lying to my friends about him when they ask questions, or should I move to protect my reputation? They think I should transfer to another college so people won't know about him raising me. I love him, and the last thing I want to do is hurt him. Please help.

DEAR TORN: Harold's sexual preferences are personal, and none of your curious "friends" business. Since you say he is not "out," I see no reason for you to reveal anything for him. Tell your friends exactly what you told me — that he is your mother, father, aunt, uncle, counselor and — most of all — your best friend. Alternatively, you could

call him a confirmed bachelor. (It's certainly the truth!) Anyone who would imply that you should be ashamed of the way you were raised is speaking out of ignorance, is not your friend, and is not worthy of your time. Police still investigating cause of death in two homeless cases

SANFORD — Police say that one of the two homeless people whose bodies were found Saturday in wooded areas near U.S. Highway 17-92 in Sanford died of natural causes, while the other was murdered.

The body of James Roland Thorne, 45, a Native American from the Menominee Tribe of Wisconsin, was found Saturday morning in a wooded area on the 3600 Block of Orlando Drive (17-92) just behind the former location of the Movieland drive-in theater.

Even though Thorne died of natural causes, investigators are still looking into his death as suspicious, said Sanford Police

Department Spokeswoman Cleo Cohen.

"We are not going to rule out anything at this point," Cohen said. "Because they were both homeless, and their bodies were located a half-mile apart, we are still investigating whether there is a connection."

Thorne's tribal name was Roland Amobe, and his alias on the streets was "Chief," investigators said.

The body of a white female believed to be in her late-40's or early 50's was also found Saturday in a wooded area on the 2800 block of Orlando Drive. A man looking for aluminum cans discovered the woman's body near an area known for camps frequented by homeless people.

Her death is being investigated as a homicide because of the crime scene and the nature of her injuries. Her identity is not being released until family members are notified, Cohen said.

Both people are believed to have been homeless residents of Sanford for at least two years, investigators said.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office and Florida Department of Law Enforcement are also participating in the investigation.

The bodies were both found in areas that are known for having homeless camp sites, police said.

Mailbox vandalism occurs in Apopka

APOPKA — Investigators are searching for suspects in a series of mail thefts that occurred in the Bear Lake area of Apopka on Wednesday.

Two young, Hispanic males in a black Ford EXP drove into several subdivisions and removed mail from curbside boxes, discarding the unwanted items in the roadway, according to investigators.

"Some victims reported that

checks were stolen and others recovered all of the items," said Steve Olson, a spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Investigators are aware of at least seven victims.

"There may be more from which we haven't heard," Olson said. "Residents are asked to be on the lookout for any suspicious activity."

All of the victims told investigators that there was no cash,

just checks in the mail. Numerous boxes were left open with the red flags still in the upright position, the incident report said.

The Orange County Sheriff's Office said that similar incidents of mail theft have occurred in the Thompson Road area. Witnesses in that area described a similar looking older vehicle, with the possible exception that it might have been a Toyota, according to the incident report.

Under the plans, subdivisions and small neighborhoods would remain in the same attendance zones.

The School Board has approved using \$14 million in available funding to construct a new elementary school and a primary learning center in time for the 2001 school year to meet rising elementary capacity needs in the Northwest portion of the county.

The primary learning center is mini elementary school which houses kindergarten and first-grade students. The center will contain 14 classrooms, cost \$3.1 million to construct, and will be located at Lawton Elementary School.

However, the Board has yet to decide where the new elementary school will be constructed.

The total cost of building a new elementary school is about \$10 million to \$10.5 million, said Dianne Kramer, director of facilities and planning.

There is property available for purchase in the Master's Cove area next to Millennium Middle School. However,

Kramer said she is concerned that most of the Master's Cove properties have industrial zoning. District officials will look into building a school on other properties, in addition to the Master's Cove area.

In several elementary schools clustered in the Northwest portion of the county, there are currently 20 students per teacher in kindergarten through second grade, and 25 students per teacher in grades three through five. By constructing the new elementary school, the school board hopes to maintain low class sizes.

The district also expects to be able to fund a second elementary school during the next five years.

According to Department of Education estimates, the district needs 3,000 additional student stations. There are also 210 portables in the district.

In Northwestern Seminole County elementary schools, there are 14 portables at Idyllwilde, 12 portables at Wilson, and eight portables at Wicklow Elementary School.

The growth rate for middle and high school students is expected to accelerate during

the next five years, while the growth rate for elementary school students will decline.

Seminole County's population has grown 8.4 percent over the last five years, from 324,130 in 1995 to 354,148 in 1999, according to county records.

Meanwhile, the Middle Schools affected by rezoning for Chiles Middle School in Oviedo include Jackson Heights, Indian Trails, South Seminole, Tuskawilla, and Millwee. The Elementary Schools affected by rezoning for a new elementary school on Chapman Road include Partin, Stenstrom, Geneva, Lawton, Carillon, Rainbow, Keeth, and Winter Springs.

Kramer said it remains to be seen how many students will be affected by the rezoning because of the school board's offer to grandfather students into their preferred schools.

Kramer said the district continues to experience capacity problems at the elementary schools in the Northwest area of the county. She said proposed residential developments could add an additional 100 elementary students in that area over the next two years.

porter of youth programs in the Sanford community throughout his career, particularly D.A.R.E. programs for elementary school children and athletics at Seminole High School.

Raines graduated from Seminole High School, where he played baseball and football.

He stands in elite company as a baseball star, one of only four players with 2,000 career hits, 500 stolen bases, 100 homeruns, 1,000 runs scored, and 100 triples. Lou Brock, Ty Cobb and Honus Wagner, the only other three players to achieve the feat, are in the baseball Hall of Fame.

A left fielder, his career statistics include 807 stolen bases, 2,561 hits, 1,542 runs scored, and a lifetime .295 batting average.

Raines was recently diagnosed with lupus, a disease of the skin characterized by remissions and exacerbations of a scaling, red, muscular rash. The lesions contain plugged follicles that can cause atrophy. The disease is limited to the skin in 90 percent of patients, but may eventually spread to the immune system.

Raines was placed on the disabled list during the second half of the 1999 baseball season by the Oakland A's after being diagnosed with the disease.

He contributed to winning two world championships while playing with the New York Yankees from 1996 through 1998.

Raines had his most productive years with the Montreal Expos from 1981 through 1990, when he was a seven time All-Star selection, led the National League in stolen bases four times, and won a batting title.

From 1991 through 1995 Raines played with the Chicago White Sox, with his best years for Chicago coming in 1991 and 1992 when he scored 102 runs in both seasons.

His son, Tim Raines, Jr., is also a Seminole High School graduate who now plays in the minor league system for the Baltimore Orioles.
