176 Seamen Lost As U.S. Warships Collide At Sea

Gen. Gruenther To Remain As Staff Chief; Ike Returning To America On June 1

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway was appointed today to succeed Gen. Eisenhower as supreme Allied commander in Europe. President Truman announced at the same time the appointment of Gen. Mark W. Clark to succeed Ridgway as the U.S. commander in Korea and commander in chief of the U.S. Armed Forces in the Far East.

The collision took place shortly before midnight Saturday 120 miles east of Lisbon and 700 miles east of the Azores. The Navy said today it has called off the search for 176 seamen listed as missing.

The first official word of the crash came shortly before noon EST Sunday. A Navy Department spokesman said the search was called off because planes and ships in the area of the crash had ample time to search the waters.

The crash rapped a 75-foot hole in the hull of the Wasp. The ship was just above the water line near the bow. The Wasp was making its way to New York to repair it when it was expected to reach New York before Friday or Saturday.

The Hudson and the Wasp were part of a task group assigned to the Mediterranean. In all there were about 31 carriers, cruisers, destroyers and submarines. Night maneuvers were being held by the route.

Anderson Predicts Good Market Sales

With April sales at the Sanford State Farmers Market stepping ahead in units and valuation over a year ago, Anderson today predicted that the long climatic interference, total sales for the season may reach or exceed the \$5,000,000 record of last year.

Mr. Wilson also emphasized the correctness of Southern political thinking from Thomas Jefferson down through the years to the present time when "it is left for the South to rescue the country from the element that has polluted the stream of simple and sane Jeffersonian Democracy," and read the names of all Confederate soldiers from Seminole County.

The program was broadcast over Station WTRR. Dr. W. P. Brooks, Jr., asked the invocation. Mr. Wilson's address was as follows: "Before the adoption of our national constitution, two schools of thought sprang up in this country, one espoused by Alexander Hamilton, who believed and taught that a highly centralized national government with absolute power in the President and the Congress would rebound to the best interest of the people; the other by Thomas Jefferson, who believed, and correctly so, as time is demonstrating, that the more government is diffused among the people, the safer are the people. Thomas Jefferson was the greatest political thinker that this country has ever produced.

At times marching on, the wisdom of his views on the proper relations of the government to the citizenry was demonstrated in the lives of our country's greatest leaders.

Brooker Farmers Market Will Be Opened On May 3

WINTER HAVEN (Special) — The formal opening of the Brooker State Farmers Market, the newest of Florida's State Markets, will be held on May 3rd with the dedication program at 5:00 p.m. Nathan Mayo, Commissioner of Florida's unique market system will be the principal speaker. Other state officials have been invited to attend the meeting and the unimposing fish fry which follows the dedication ceremony.

Preparations are underway to take care of 1200 growers, buyers and people in the LaCrosse, Santa Fe and Worthington Springs area which the market expects to serve according to Honorable Howell S. Anderson, Mayor of Brooker. This market like many of our most successful markets is starting out with a single building, but with the enthusiasm of those interested in agriculture and the strawberry movement in Louisiana, North Carolina and other sections have affected the offerings on the State Farmers Market though the total gross revenue of \$14,707.54 to growers. Prices ranged from \$3.00 to \$9.50 with no daily average under \$5. A light supply of tender green beans moved out at \$2.75 per hamper.

The Palmetto State Market sold over 2,600 packages for gross returns in excess of \$12,345.50. Tomatoes led in volume and ranged in price from \$6 to \$7.50, averaging \$4.77. Pink beans averaged \$2.75. A light supply of pole beans averaged \$5.82, bush beans, yellow crookneck squash, pepper and cukes moved at fair prices.

The Pompano State Market experienced an increase of more than 15,000 bushel units of vegetables over the previous week's activities. A total of 175,987 bushel units of peppers, eggplants and okra with the week starting out strong in peppers. Eggplants are showing good quality and volume is expected to continue for three or four weeks if demand remains strong. Okra is increasing in volume though not expected in quantity at any time.

Fort Pierce State Market advises the tomato volume movement is not as heavy as anticipated just now due mainly to cool weather and the wide spread in planting dates. However, most growers will be picking on or before May 10th. Approximately 63,053 crates of No. 1 green tomatoes sold from \$3.90 to \$5.40 with an average of \$4.73; 6,205 No. 2 tomatoes brought gross returns of \$8,065.92; pink tomatoes brought \$7,280.16 for 737 bushels. Cucumber volume has also been below expectations though quality continues good and some newer fields will be ready the latter part of this week. 5,108 bushels of cucumber brought gross returns of \$13,326.05 and 457 bushels of miscellaneous produce brought the total units of all items sold for the weekly period ending April 22nd to 75,710 packages selling for gross return of \$36,855.96.

The Immokalee State Market handled 3,737 bushel units for gross returns of \$18,338.55 for the weekly period ending April 18. Tomatoes and cucumbers lead in volume and gross receipts. Other items in light of fair volume were yellow, white and acorn squash, pepper, eggplants, field peas and okra. Watermelons and cantaloupe are expected in good volume this week with lighter supplies of cucumbers, black-eyed peas and yellow squash.

Cucumbers were the main commodity on the Fort Myers State Market with price strengthening over the previous week. Growers received gross returns of \$41.

More than 58,800 bushel units brought growers \$241,092.50 on the Plant City State Market week ending April 23. Bell pepper lead in volume with pole beans and yellow squash next. Baby lima beans and eggplants made their first appearance on the market the past week. Beans of every variety, cucumbers, corn, English and field peas, pepper, potatoes, squash and tomatoes are moving in increasing volume.

Cabbage moved back as a leader on the Sanford State Market last week along with beans and celery. 30,185 bags of cabbage averaged \$2.55 gross sales \$77,736.75 and 7,708 crates of cabbage grossed \$23,391. Bean sales grossed \$29,928.15 for 9,500 bushels and 8,788 crates of celery brought \$27,014.55. While the total number of units decreased 2,463 over the previous week, the valuation increased \$60,177.21 due to higher market on cabbage, celery and beans. In addition to the above items the market anticipates a good volume of corn, cucumbers, yellow squash and light supplies of pepper, eggplant, iceberg lettuce, Red Lima potatoes and tomatoes.

Potatoes are strong on the Palmetto State Farmers' Market.
