

State Attorney Says Grand Jury 'Conscience Of Community'

Herring Denies His Office Totally Influences Jury

Under fire from the Pratt Committee and other Democrats in Seminole County, State Attorney Abbot Herring scolds at the concept that his office had total influence over the grand jury that indicted top ranking county officials.

For that matter Herring is quick to point out that a state attorney only aids and directs and offers legal advice to a grand jury, and it is the jury's responsibility to determine if charges are warranted.

In essence Herring says the grand jury is the "conscience of the community" and that if jurors find "probable cause" that violations of the law have occurred indictments are likely to follow.

Herring also points out that "if a grand jury finds probable cause, jurors are not going to be dictated to by me or another state attorney."

In Seminole County, grand jury proceedings were monitored by Herring's assistant, William Staley. The Pratt Committee says Herring has "misused and abused" the powers of his office. And Freeman threatens to take the issue into the federal courts to seek redress against the state attorney for what Freeman calls "trumped up political charges."

Kwiatkowski called charges issued by the grand jury the result of an "incompetent state attorney."

Kwiatkowski's attorney, Newman Brock, says Herring's track record speaks for itself. Brock said Herring has filed charges against 21 public officials.

"None of the charges stuck," Brock said. "In fact, Brock says few, if any, ever made it to trial. 'It's blatant and speaks for itself,'" Brock added.

After Judge Wallace Hall last week dismissed the grand jury charges against the trio, Herring retiled almost identical charges based on evidence unearthed during grand jury proceedings.

The state attorney monitors the proceedings and presents evidence to jurors. But Herring says it is the grand jurors who make the final decision—not the state attorney.

"You know," Herring said, "when a grand jury makes a decision it is not necessarily the decision in all cases that the legal advisor concurs with."

The two commissioners and the county attorney are charged with meeting secretly to discuss the county's plan to purchase an aborted \$517,000 clay pit and for discussion centering on the hiring of Freeman as county attorney.

As far as moving the issue into the federal courts, or asking Governor Reubin Askew for a special investigator, Herring says he favors both approaches.

"As far as some outside attorney looking at it, I would love it—really love it," says Herring. He said he favors any action that would move the issue to trial so the facts he says he can be made public.

In response to the Pratt Committee's request for a special prosecutor, Herring says, "I think they (committee members) ought to do something instead of just talk."

"If someone would come in and look at the whole ball of wax, I'd love it—really love it."

Cowart Bars Press In Unusual Action

Circuit Court Judge Joe A. Cowart Jr. today barred reporters seeking to attend the "sounding of the docket" for this week's circuit court criminal trials at Sanford.

One reporter said today was the first time in nearly 10 years that he could remember not being allowed to sit in on a pre-trial session in which a judge inquired of defense attorneys if their clients are going to trial as scheduled.

The trial docket of 14 criminal cases for this week before Cowart, as published by the Circuit Court Clerk's office listed the trial for Courtroom B on the second floor of the courthouse south judicial wing.

Only one of the Seminole-Brevard Circuit Court Criminal judges, Robert B. McGregor, has in the past held the "sounding of the docket" in the courtroom open to the public. Other judges, including Cowart, have held the proceedings in chambers. On all occasions the press has been allowed to sit in on the sounding.

When reporters tried to enter a hearing room in Cowart's chambers at 9:15 this morning

Capt. J. Q. Galloway of the Sheriff's Department informed the newsmen that they were barred from chambers.

Galloway said Cowart said "there isn't enough room in chambers."

In the past Cowart has allowed reporters to sit in the chambers or to stand along the wall with defense attorneys if there weren't adequate chairs in the chamber.

Today attorneys attending the sounding of the docket said at least two attorneys had to stand.

Another circuit judge, when asked about Cowart's action said, "I've never heard of this before." He said, "As far as I know there's nothing in the Administrative Order about it."

The Administrative Order is a document outlining local court rules.

When reporters went to Chief Circuit Judge Virgil B. (Continued On Page 2-A)

Jim Ryan To Face Fechtel

Jim Ryan is gearing up to run for the Florida House seat occupied by Vince Fechtel.

Not only is Ryan planning to take on the Republican from Leesburg, Ryan plans to keep his job as port administrator while campaigning.

Ryan informed the seven-member port authority board last week of his intentions.

Only County Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski was in opposition to Ryan's running for political office while holding down the top job at the Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA).

However, Ryan's assistant, Dennis Dolger, said today that SCOPA attorney William Hutchinson is researching the issue to insure SCOPA board members that Ryan can legally run for political office while acting as port administrator.

According to Dolger, Ryan's plans are to retain his position at the port—even if he wins a seat in the House.

Dolger says he envisions no problems because he said Ryan will equip his car with two-way radio equipment and maintain communication with Dolger and other SCOPA officials who might be in need of a decision from the port administrator.

"Jim would work hard for Seminole County, and his being elected to the House couldn't do anything but help the port," Dolger said. Ryan was out of town and unavailable for comment.

Ryan is a Democrat. Another Democrat, Sidney Vilhen Jr., had his eye on the Fechtel seat, but Vilhen felt Fechtel was too strong.

Although Vilhen never officially announced his intention to seek Fechtel's job Vilhen has announced he was considering entering the race.

Now, however, Vilhen says he is considering entering a race for the U.S. Congress against incumbent Richard Kelly, a Republican.

Today Longwood City Council To Get Sewer Report

LONGWOOD — Brady Mitchell, the city's sewer plant operator hired under the federally funded Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) will report to the city council at 7:30 p.m. today on the equipment needed to set up a laboratory for testing sewer plant effluent.

Several weeks ago, Council Chairman J.R. Grant told Mitchell that Mitchell said an expenditure of \$10,000 would be necessary to equip a laboratory. Last week, however, Grant said Mitchell had scaled down the estimate of needs to \$1,400.

The Council asked that meeting, council voted 3-2 on the appointment to the land planning agency to fill the post currently held by James Smith, whose two-year term had expired.

Councilman Lawrence Goldberg and Grant favored Andrew Seminazzi, an assessor with the Orange County tax appraiser's office, while Council members June Lormann and Parker Anderson were opposed.

Anderson said he was not opposed to Seminazzi personally, but was not aware of the man's background and philosophy. Mrs. Lormann said Smith had originally been her appointee.

Council has also set a workshop meeting for 7:30 p.m. Thursday, with city accountant, Harold Hartsock, to determine the status of the city's finances.

City Hall Probable Commission Topic

A committee formed to study the issue of locating the new city hall is expected to appear at tonight's 7 o'clock meeting of the Sanford City Commission.

The committee, housed by the Downtown Development Corporation (DDC), is made up of representatives of the DDC, the Downtown Business Association (DBA), and the Banker's Committee of the Greater Sanford Area Chamber of Commerce.

The committee is expected to request that commissioners hold off on making a final decision on locating the city hall until the commission's first meeting in March, in order for the committee to have time to study the matter.

At a DBA meeting last week, that organization adopted a resolution urging the city commission to leave the city hall in its present downtown location.

The city commission voted in September to designate a city-owned 14-acre site at Seminole Boulevard and French Avenue as the new city hall site.

In a draft report dated Dec. 31, City Manager W.E. Knowles advised the commission that building the city hall on the Park Avenue site would cost \$2,750 more than locating it on the 14-acre site. Knowles' final report on proposed city hall locations is due Feb. 1.

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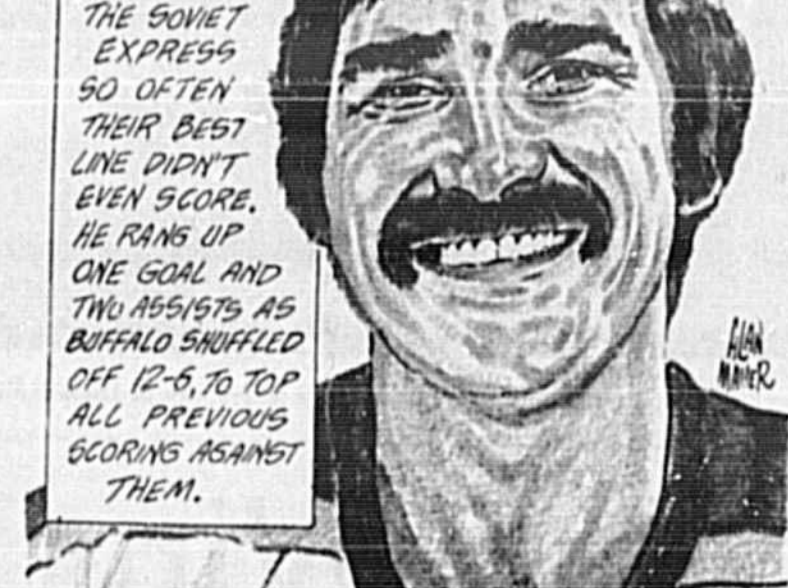

The Camellia Japonica is one of the most beautiful plants in the South. Even in a small garden, camellias add much to the beauty as the foliage is pretty and the flowers are gorgeous.

The Camellia Japonica was introduced to the American gardens nearly two centuries ago. It was originally grown in China, Japan and Korea, where it grows up to 30 feet tall. It was named for a Moravian Jesuit, George Joseph Karna, who set for 7 a.m.

Some time before 1839, the camellia was taken to England and France, and in time to America. Camellias were kept pruned and not let to grow naturally and all varieties which were not formal doubles were discarded.

In 1935 there were some new varieties developed, semi-double and singles in various colors. Camellias grow particularly well in the Carolinas and some plants must be several hundred years old. The varieties are old

but pretty when blooming. It is not unusual to see plants 12 to 15 feet high with a spread of 10 feet.

Camellias are easy to grow in Florida. They should be planted in an acid soil. Use half peat and half top soil in the mix when preparing the flower bed. The hole should be twice the size of the ball of the plant, both in width and depth. Spread the soil mixture evenly around the plant.

Camellias prefer partial shade but will grow in full sun. Never try to grow them in full shade. Good drainage is necessary as they hate wet feet — never plant
