### City announces qualifying period

SANFORD — The Sanford City Clerk, as determined by the Mayor and the City Commission, has announced that the qualifying period for Sanford's Nov. 8, Special City Election at which the District 4 city commissioner will be elected (subject to a potential run off election on Nov. 29) will begin at 8 a.m. Monday, Sept. 19, and end on Friday, Sept. 23, at 5 p.m.

The special election became necessary after District 4 Commissioner Kevin Hipes resigned for an undisclosed medical problem in August.

During the qualifying period, any person wishing to run for the unexpired term of District 4 city commissioner must file qualifying papers and pay the qualifying fee in the city clerk's Office, Sanford City Hall, 300 N. Park Ave., Sanford, before the end of the qualifying period.

## Citizens vow to fight for justice

Residents seek answers in July shooting death

SANFORD — The Seminole County Chapter of the NAACP called for an impartial, three judge jury to look into the shooting death of a black 16-year-old by two white security guards in July.

Turner Clayton Jr., president of the local NAACP, said the organization would bring in more "fire power" if justice doesn't prevail in the case. He made his vow before 80 or so people at a town hall meeting Sept. 13 at the First Shiloh Missionary Baptist Church in Sanford.

Attorney Natalie Jackson showed those gathered a petition signed by more than 400 residents calling for a judicial review of the case.

The shooting took place in the early morning of July 16. Travares McGill, 16, drove a car into the Country Lake Apartments near Seminole High School to drop off one of four passengers, accord-

Raw will succeed Terry L. Schenk, who retires Sept. 30 after 30 years of service in Seminole County.

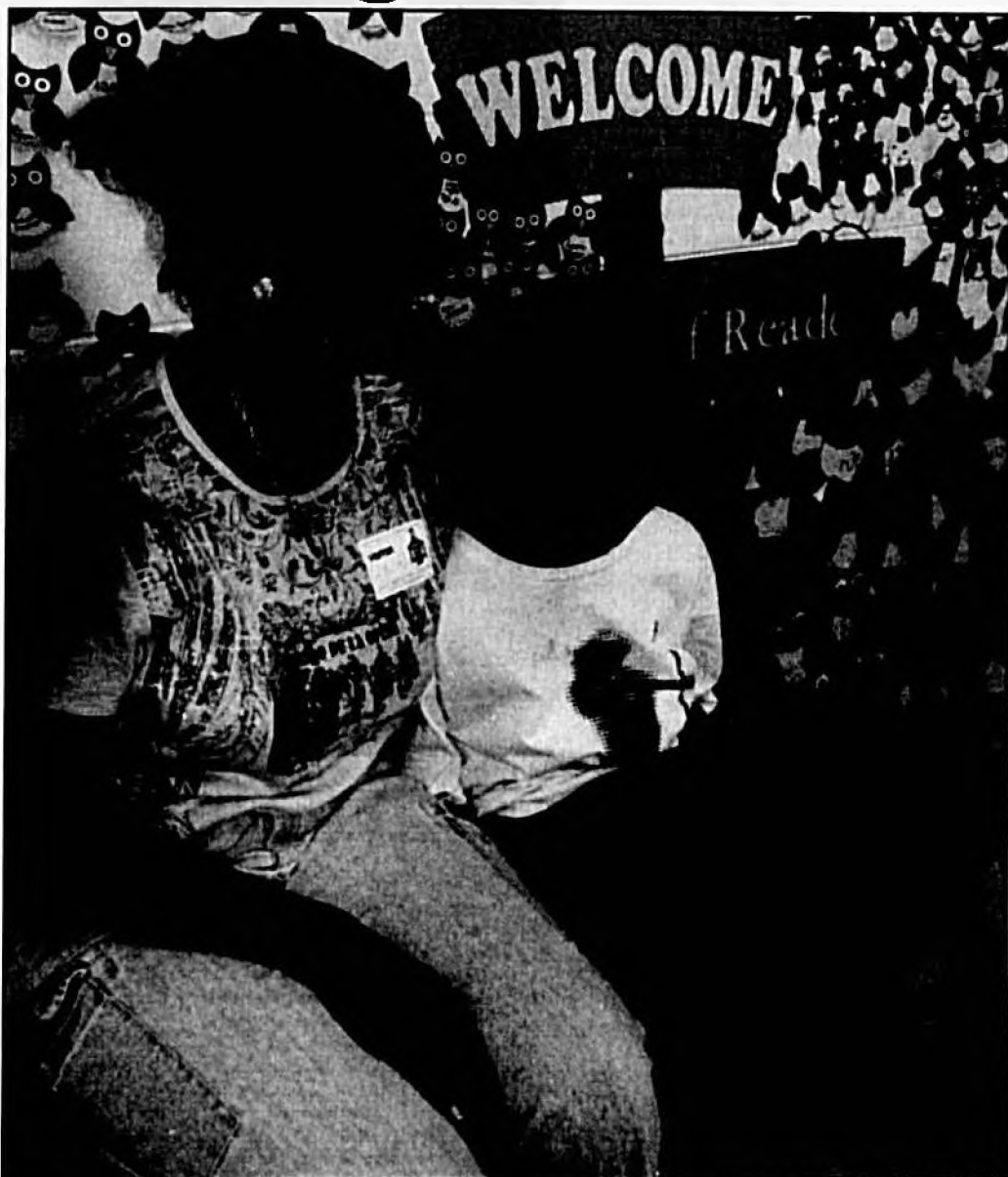
Raw will oversee the county Fire Division.

## New Orleans family overwhelmed by generosity in Winter Springs

WINTER SPRINGS — Fleeing from New Orleans, living in a hotel in Houston, pleading for her identity with government agencies and relocating to Winter Springs did not exist in the mind of Veronica Jones days before Hurricane Katrina put her home and business underwater.

Still Veronica, her husband Carl, and their two children have landed in a place where people have piled on the gen-

erosity while anxiety about employment, housing and the future grows.

"It still seems like a movie," Veronica said Thursday during an interview at her son, Caleb's new school — Keeth Elementary in Winter Springs. "It still doesn't seem real." When she thinks about the devastation in New Orleans and the Gulf Coast, she said: "It seems like some other country."

Central Floridians may identify with Veronica's Saturday morning on Aug. 27, two days before Hurricane Katrina dev-

astated her home and beauty salon business.

Veronica knew from experience that if her family was going to evacuate New Orleans, it would have to be sooner than later because traffic backs up quickly on major roads.

She went to work that Saturday morning, but told her family to prepare to leave by noon. She describes a scene at work as she and three clients watched hurricane updates on TV. At one point, all four of

## Doctor: Helipad will help save time, and time is life

SANFORD — A small crowd gathered Friday morning at the Central Florida Regional Hospital as an ambulatory helicopter kicked up leaves, dust, and a single Styrofoam cup as it landed for the first time on the new helipad, among the dancing debris.

The new helipad was constructed just outside the emergency room doors to provide better service for patients who need transportation by EMS Helicopters.

Hospital personnel said that before the new helipad was constructed, helicopters transporting patients were parking in the streets and parking lots. In the last few

years, the need has grown for a helipad because the hospital is so close to the interstate, and the hospital is often used as a stabilization point before

patients are transported to the Orlando Regional Medical Center.

## Shriners hospitals treat more children

SANFORD — When people think about Shriners, they picture men wearing funny hats and driving tiny cars in parades. People in the Central Florida area may picture Gus the camel who makes appearances at many parades.

Local Bahia Shriners want people to know their true mission, which is to help families deal with orthopedic problems, severe burns and spinal cord injuries all at no cost at their 22 hospitals.

On Oct. 14 and 15, people will see the Shriners out and about with their fezz hats. They will hand out Bahia Shrine News, which tells about the organization's activities, and they will take whatever donations people offer to

fund the hospitals.

The closest Shriner hospital to Seminole County is in Tampa, said Gary Bergenske, potentate of the Maitland-based Shriners. His territory includes Seminole, Volusia, Orange, Sumter, Osceola and Lake counties.

"Except for our hospital in Mexico City, the others have empty beds," Bergenske said. They are always looking for families who have children in need.

The Shriners are famous for helping burn victims because those stories make headlines, but people don't often know about the orthopedic and spinal cord help available. Orthopedic problems may stem from birth defects or from an accident. The hosp-

## Man with short arm steals cash

LAKE MARY — A man with an atrophied left arm robbed a Lake Mary supply business at gunpoint Thursday morning, according to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

The Sheriff's Office is seeking information that will lead to the arrest of the suspect. The robbery occurred Thursday at around 10:20 a.m. at the Sally Beauty Supply, in the Lake Mary Center, at 3725 Lake Emma Road.

The suspect had a unique feature about him, according to investigators. Part of his left arm appeared to be atrophic and short. He's described as a white male, about 50 years old, with short-cropped, reddish hair. He is about 5-feet, 10-inches tall, and he was wearing a blue shirt.

The victim, a store employee, told deputies the suspect came into the store, took an item off the shelf, and went to the check out, as if to pay for it. The employee says the suspect then produced a handgun and ordered the clerk to give him money.

The employee opened the cash register, so the suspect could grab the cash. Due to his handicap, the suspect was unable to grab the cash with his left hand and hold the handgun at the same time. He ordered the store employee to place the money on the counter, which he scooped up, with his right hand, before exiting the store. He fled in an unknown direction, with an undisclosed amount of cash, the Sheriff's Office said.

Other store merchants in the plaza recalled a person, matching that description, wearing glasses, and going store to store this morning.

Anybody with information is asked to contact the Seminole County Sheriff's Office at 407-665-6600, or Crime Line at 800-423-TIPS. The call to Crime Line allows one to be eligible for a cash reward.

## Markham Woods Presbyterian gets new pastor

John Vernon "Joe" Wendorph, was given a unanimous vote of acceptance by the members of Markham Woods Presbyterian Church, to be its new Pastor. The vote came during a congregational meeting Sunday, Sept. 11.

Taking over the pulpit for the first time on October 2, he will be replacing Rev. Mike Andrews, who has served as Interim Pastor of the church for the past 2 and one-half years.

"Joe" as he prefers to be called, was born in Jacksonville on May 16, 1957, where he attended Lakewood Presbyterian Church. His candidacy for the ministry was sponsored through St. Augustine Presbytery.

While at Florida Junior College and Jacksonville University, he worked with at least five Young Life Clubs and, for two years, served as program director for the Brooklyn inner city summer camp at St. Augustine Presbytery's Camp Montgomery.

He graduated from Jacksonville University in 1983, magna cum laude with honors in Psychology. He then entered Columbia Theological Seminary and received his Master of Divinity Degree in 1986. He was ordained as Minister of the Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. on January 18, 1987.

From 1988 until the present, he has been Associate Pastor at Christ Presbyterian Church in Ormond Beach.

He and his wife, Alisa have been married for 21 years and have two daughters, Cara, age 15 and Rachel, 11.

All four of the family are musically inclined. Alisa has been involved in the Episcopal School teaching music and other classes. Both Cara and Rachel participate in youth group activities. Rachel had a lead role in the children's musical earlier this year and Cara played guitar in the youth praise band. Joe is an avid guitarist.

## 218 Years Young

This Saturday, Sept. 17, is the 218th anniversary of the United States Constitution. George Washington originally called for a convention to create a new constitution to replace the Articles of the Confederation in February, 1787. The convention was started on May 14 of that year. It took an entire summer of discussion, arguments and conflict to come up with the final draft. It was on Sept. 17, 1787 when delegates from 12 states (Rhode Island did not send a delegate), finally voted unanimously to approve the proposed document. Thirty-nine of the 42 delegates on hand signed the document.

Of the signers, two later became President; Alexander Hamilton and James Madison. Benjamin Franklin was one of the signers, as were several others who had previously signed the Declaration of Independence 11 years earlier.

In 1955, a Presidential Proclamation declared that beginning in 1956, the week of Sept. 17 through 23 is to be considered Constitution Week.

Several states, including Florida and Arizona, have declared Sept. 17 as an official holiday, although hardly any offices or businesses will be closed as they are for other holidays.

I doubt seriously if most folks have ever read the Constitution all the way through, unless they are studying it in school, or have a connection with it through law. It's sort of like the Bible in that - it's there for all to read, but many people rely on someone else to interpret it and tell them what it means. Unfortunately, many people take the words and bend them in such a way as to reflect their own personal point of view.

This is especially true when it comes to the Bill of Rights, the amendments made to our constitution. The first amendment deals with religion, and the second amendment explains the "right of the people to keep and bear arms". How many times have you heard these two discussed with differing viewpoints. In fact, if you have a copy on hand, read the exact wording and see what you think they are actually saying.

The United States is a young nation compared to other nations around the world, yet our Constitution is probably one of the oldest continuing rules of operation. Most countries have made many changes, or struck it from the books and written new ones.

After those delegates signed the document in 1787, it couldn't become official until it was approved by at least nine (of the 13) states. This was not accomplished until June 21, 1788 when New Hampshire became the ninth state to ratify it.

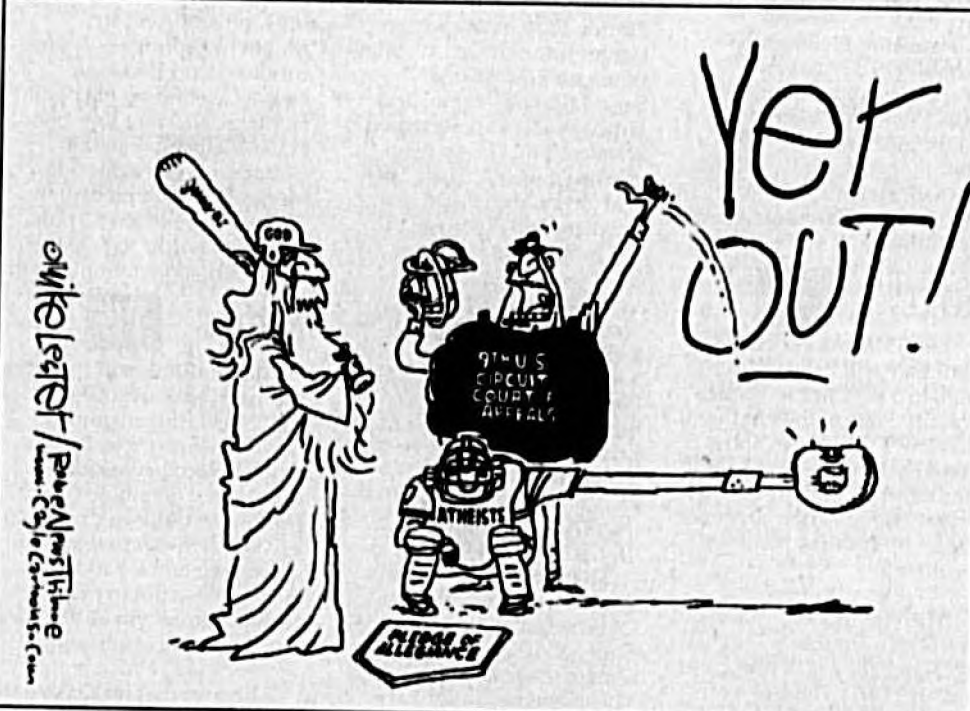
Go back in history for a moment. What if you lived in one of these states (and were allowed to vote)(many were not), on whether or not to accept this document which would end up governing how your country would operate and what freedoms you would have, or would not have, under its direction. How would you vote? Would you even know what you were voting on?

Now - back to the present. The citizens of Iraq are now faced with exactly that same situation. They have drawn up a new constitution that will govern their country. It's coming up for a vote. Will those who are allowed to vote know what they are considering? With a number of different groups (political organizations) who are Iraqi citizens, will all of their demands be met in this document? Will this particular constitution make it a better nation? The answer to all of these questions will probably be NO. Not at the present time.

I would expect this constitutional preparation will be voted down, and go back to the drawing board for further revisions. It took our nation's Constitutional Convention members over six months of discussions, objections and disagreements before ours was drawn up to the point of being accepted.

Unfortunately, until Iraq gets to the point where it can control itself, backed by a strong document such as a constitution, our nation will continue supplying troops to subdue the violence.

We observe our Constitution this week, but with the fighting, deaths and conflicts still going on in Iraq, I doubt if they will have such a similar observance for a long time in that nation. It's a sad situation.

## The War According to Michael Yon

Michael Yon is unknown to most Americans. But in the Internet blogosphere, he is making a name for himself as one of the best combat reporters filling stories from Iraq.

Yon doesn't work for a news media outlet. As he declares on his remarkable Web site, michaelyon.blogspot.com, he is "an independent, informed observer chronicling the monumentally important events in the efforts to stabilize Iraq."

Yon, 41, does much more than observe, however. Armed with only a digital camera, the Special Forces vet from Florida is embedded with the U.S. Army's 1st Battalion 24th Infantry Regiment, which patrols Mosul in wheeled Stryker armored vehicles.

His dispatches provide a narrow view of a complex war. Nevertheless, they offer a unique and valuable inside look at the dangers American soldiers face every day.

His most recent blog, "Gates of Fire," describes a harrowing, deadly shootout in an alley with "terrorists" that began with a battalion commander being hit three times, ended with hand-to-hand fighting and included Yon picking up and shooting an M4 carbine. It includes 14 amazing action photos shot by Yon.

Yon makes no bones about whose side he's on in Iraq - ours. He went in January, on his own dime, to do something personally about the "disconnect" between what's really going on in Iraq and what the mainstream media are reporting.

Since communicating with Yon by phone is a logistical headache, I interviewed him in late August from Pittsburgh by e-mail:

Q: Has anything you've seen in Iraq changed your mind

about your decision to go there?

A: Terrorism is a horrible thing and must be confronted. If you do not confront terrorism, it will confront you. That said, I have seen different types of terrorism in different parts of the world. "Terrorism," like religion, is a word that begs definition. The kind of terrorist who wakes up in the morning plotting how to run airplanes into your buildings should be confronted.

Q: What is the major thing you and soldiers over there know (about the direction of the war) from being there that we consumers of mainstream media do not know?

A: That very real progress is being made. This war is simmering and could get worse. Iraq could possibly fall apart. We have seen many nations do this. I, personally, have been to many nations during major upheavals. When countries fall apart, the world keeps spinning. Iraq, on the other hand, is getting stronger. Only time will

reveal what will happen with Iraq.

Q: I found your stuff very good - and I don't mind the pro-military point of view/bias, because you are upfront about it.

A: Actually, the military drives me crazy. That's why I got out. Our military is professional, they represent us, and they are not terrorists. They are fighting terrorists now. It's important to be upfront that I am pro-troop and anti-terrorist. Journalists who are not up front about this are either hiding something, or just look dumb. Either way, they lose credibility.

Q: My fellow journalists, especially newspaper types, say you are not providing the wider perspective....

A: Tell them to get their asses over here and help. I am only one man.

Q: ... and are not providing info about the enemy and are too cozy with military brass.

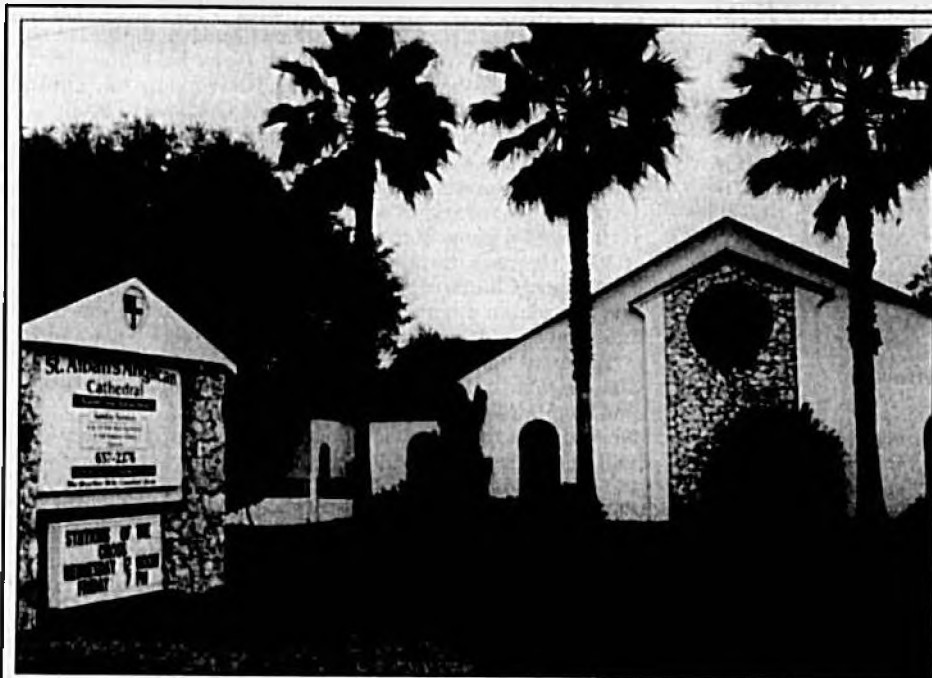

## The Way We Were:

### Filling in the history gaps

Many of you know that I wrote "A History of First Baptist Church, Sanford, Florida 1884-1984" for the church's 100th anniversary, Feb. 3, 1984. Since then I have been considered the church's historian, and along with a history committee, have continued to collect and preserve items of historical significance. In our present sanctuary, which celebrated its 10th anniversary Aug. 27, 2005, we have a small Heritage Room in which are displayed several of these items. There is also a large storage/work room.

Fortunately, the church has had several excellent church clerks who have recorded minutes of business meetings and kept other church records plus pastors, secretaries, deacons, etc., who had kept records and other items. Therefore I was able to write a pretty complete history, but there are some gaps.

Recently two items came into our possession which shed light on some of our lost history. I will tell you today about the first item, a souvenir program of the opening of the Baptist Temple, Nov. 14, 1914. Gary Taylor found this on the Internet and gave it to

Before this, we did not know the date that the front part of our brick sanctuary had been built. Let me tell you what we did know.

On Oct. 15, 1913, Rev. George Hyman began his service as pastor. He was previously Sunday School Secretary for the Florida Baptist Convention.

Soon after this coming, a Sunday School building called "The Shack" was erected, possibly in one day, behind the wooden church which had been built in 1885.

An Outlook Committee was appointed in January, 1914 to investigate the feasibility of erecting a new church building.

At the Feb. 11, 1914 church conference, all of this committee's recommendations were adopted. Here are some of them.

That the church purchase the next lot on Park Avenue (the house on it became the parsonage soon afterward).

That the Shack be moved to the back of the new lot and that the wooden church be moved to the back of the lot on which it then stood.

That a committee for planning a new building be appointed and that the foundation of the new church be put in as soon as possible.

The building committee that was selected consisted of D.K. Brisson, chairman, John Jenkins, H.E. Tolar, M.M. Stewart and George D. Ballard.

It was recorded that Protracted Services were held Nov. 22 - Dec. 2, 1914, with F.M. Watkins as preacher, but no mention was made in our records that the new building had been completed and that services were held there.

The building that was built in 1914 was only a part of the present building. It was the front Sunday School part. The auditorium was completed in 1920.

This Sunday School section has three floors with a Sunday School auditorium on the second floor. This auditorium was used for church services until the large auditorium was built. The front section is what was opened on Nov. of 1914.

The souvenir program was dedicated to "Our Nest Egg Contributors, Miss Allie Trafford and Mrs. C.M. Williams". (Miss Allie was church secretary 1919-1942 and was the only paid a pitance for most of those years. She was also Candle Roll director and would walk all over town, visiting families with new babies).

There were six services held that day, Nov. 22, 1914, and an order of service was given for each.

The first service, "A Prayer Service" was held 6:30 - 7 a.m. Scriptures were read, prayers were prayed and hymns were sung. Two of the hymns were "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Jesus is All the World To Me".

From 9:30 to 10:45 a.m. there was a "Bible Service" with the Sunday School in charge; John Jenkins was superintendent. There were hymns, scripture readings, sentence prayers by teachers and officers, a Bible lesson, secretary's report and announcements. The men sang "Fountain Filled with Blood", and the ladies sang "Near the Cross".

A Thanksgiving Service was 11 a.m. until noon. The Doxology was sung as were, "Holy, Holy, Holy" and "Rock of Ages". There was an invocation, scripture, announcements, offertory, and a choir selection. The sermon was entitled "What Has the Lord Done for Us?"

A General Service was held from 3 until 4 p.m., which was evidently for community members to attend as scriptures and prayers were led by area ministers; Rev. E.D. Brownlee of First Presbyterian, Rev. Francis Stinemeyer of First Methodist, and Rev. Strong. There was a portion on the program for "Testimonies by All".

A Training Service was held 6-7 p.m. conducted by the BYPU, Miss Clara Millan, President. First on the program was "Cox rally Song, Band Accompaniment" (Did this possibly have something to do with Mrs. Emma Cox, charter member, who continued to be very active?).

There was also a BYPU Yell, Ladies Quartette, BYPU Rally Song, and talks by Mrs. F.E. Gatchel, M.L. Wright and Pastor Hyman.

The final service, 7-8 p.m. was a Song Service. It was led by the choir, J. Rowland Wildman, director. Pianists were Mrs. R.E. Tolar and Miss Margaret Davis. There were several choir numbers, hymns and a sermon, "Ten Days, What?" which probably referred to the upcoming Protracted meetings.

What a treasure for the church to have this souvenir program which gives us an insight into our past.

## Stetson's Corner Prayer, reflection and action

President Bush has designated September 16, 2005 A Day of Prayer and Reflection for our country. I suspect many more prayers have been raised in the last few weeks than God is used to. Prayers of pleading, of questioning, and of thankfulness to whatever higher power can help us wrap our minds

and arms around this disaster.

How appropriate is the old anecdote about the man stranded on his roof praying to God to help him survive the rising water? He refuses help from the rescuers in the boat, in the helicopter, and I truthfully can't remember the third one. He drowns and at heaven's gate questions God: "Why didn't you help me?" And God says, "Hey, I sent you the boat, the helicopter, etc!"

Our prayers are answered in many ways, some we understand, some bewilder us. What is the take away, the lesson we are meant to learn from each life changing experience whether we are direct participants or spectators? That we have much to reflect on is certain. It could have been us. The hardships Floridians experienced last year now seem pale in comparison. What would we have done in a similar situation? What could have been done differently? Many on the scene in the gulf area report that the images we see on television do not give us a true sense of the horror.

Such an event shows us the best and worst of human nature and everything in between. Heroism, hopefulness, commitment, generosity, trust, courage, selflessness, and creativity burn brightly within man and beast, within the souls of the rescued and the rescuers. And the dark underbelly of our human weakness is exposed on the 24/7 news coverage. Anger, greed, power, hatred, judgment, fear, and selfishness all demonstrated in a very public, very ugly way. Again we ask ourselves, how would we have behaved in such an unthinkable situation?

And then there is the reflection of 9-11. We would be remiss to not connect the memories, heartache, and unity of that time four years ago to our current situation. Again, it could have happened to us, on our passenger plane, in our downtown business district, in our back pastures. And it did happen to us because it was an assault on our country, our sense of peace, and our way of life.

We must reflect on our personal plans in case of a major disaster. What would we have time to take with us? How would we communicate? How would we travel and where would we go? I used to take a lot of grief for stocking up on canned goods and water when I lived in South Florida. Accused of over reacting to the hurricane media hype. But there is a big gray area between that, and sitting around assuming some agency will help us. That's one thing I can say about people in Geneva, most have that "can do" spirit, that confidence to make and execute a survival plan with or without the government.

The silver lining to Hurricane Katrina, in my opinion, is the spotlight on the grassroots efforts of churches, small businesses,

cul-de-sac associations, and determined individuals that all asked the same question. What can I do? What can we do? We must act and quickly. Vans, pickups, SUV's, bass-boats and airboats, all made the gas expensive trip across the country to deliver supplies and comfort where it was needed. No government agency or big brother told them to do it. Their innate sense of morality and humanity kicked in automatically.

What an example for our children to see lemonade stands, donation sites, and convoys springing up overnight, making a difference in the lives of strangers, miles away. Schools large and small as well as youth organizations are also very involved, reaching out to assist disaster victims. The hope, generosity, and sincerity of the children of our community stands as an equally shining example to adults. Cards, toys, letters, money, and supplies will go a long way to soothe the youngest ones caught up in this trauma.

So on this day of national remembrance, we pray and reflect on the anniversary of 9-11 and what it means to us and to our future. We mourn the deaths of those lost four years ago and those yet to be found under the filthy water and extensive rubble of Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama. We reflect on the complexities of these disasters, the biggest challenges of our lifetime. And then, we act.

It is also used to transport patients from Central Florida Regional Hospital who are in need of services the hospital cannot provide. Head injuries that require neuro-surgery and children with intensive care needs are all easily transported via the ambulatory helicopters.

"Time is life," said Larry Alexander, emergency room doctor and medical director.

Personnel and a few board of trustees stood in front of the helipad, with the N1755F emergency service helicopter in the background, and cut a red ribbon to commemorate the occasion.

Seminole County Emergency Medical Services Director Dr. Todd Husty said that because of the growth in the county, the hospital grew out of their heliport. He also briefly spoke about his recent trip to the Gulf States where he was assisting in transporting Hurricane Katrina victims from hospitals.

Husty said that if it weren't for "corporate" America a lot of people would not have made it.

"They rose to the occa-

sion," Husty said of the participation of corporate hospitals in the natural disaster rescue and relief.

As for the new helipad, he said that hopefully the county will never have an emergency such as the one affecting the Gulf region, but if they did the county would be ready.

The helicopter was flown in by Air Rescue 3, operated jointly by the Seminole County Sheriff's office and the Department of Public Safety.

A member of Air Rescue 3, Dave Williams, said that the helicopter is one of the biggest ambulatory helicopters, holding up to 8 people, if needed. It has the emergency and medical tools to handle two trauma patients at one time, Williams said.

The new helipad has landing lights that are controlled by the helicopter pilot. The activation of the lights, as the flying ambulance lands prepares to land, also turns on the traffic warning lights on Medical Plaza Drive to stop traffic, a press release said.

"That's amazing," Williams said of being able

to navigate the lights from the helicopter.

Planning for the project began in April last year and included the help and approval of regulatory agencies such as the Florida Department of Transportation, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the State of Florida Agency for Health Care Administration.

CPH Engineering, of Sanford, and architectural firm Lyman, Davison and Dooley, of Tampa, provided the design for the helipad. General Contractor R.J. Griffin Construction, of Orlando, began building the site in May of this year.

Central Florida Regional Hospital is a 226 acute care hospital serving Seminole and Volusia Counties. Specialized services include open heart surgery, emergency services, hyperbaric medicine and wound care, The Baby Suites and women's services, a release said.

The hospital is located in Sanford on the south side of Lake Monroe, three miles east of the Seminole Towne Center Mall.

them called Houston hotels at the same time checking room availability.

The Jones family, including Veronica's mother, lives and works in the Gentilly section of New Orleans. That area sits north of the French Quarter and adjacent to Lake Pontchartrain. In other words, it is the flooded area scene on so many news casts in recent weeks. Some people may have seen the famous photo of the Humanity street sign rising just above the flood. Veronica's home is near Humanity and Piedmont.

The family spent four nights in Houston. Carl's employer, Roto Rooter plumbing service, told him there was work in Central Florida. With his boss, the Jones family made its way to Winter Springs. Family members had searched for the best schools in the area, and that brought them to Seminole County.

"We have lived there for five years, and our property value had doubled," Veronica said, but in Central Florida, she is not sure how they can afford housing. Most job openings for hair dressers pay minimal salaries, she said.

For now, they are relying

on the generosity of strangers like the people of Keeth Elementary and Barrington Place Apartments near Oviedo.

"This is when the blessings started coming," Veronica said.

The school district has given her a year's exemption to attend a school out of zone, but the generosity of the people she has met has been overwhelming, she said.

The apartment complex furnished the family's kitchen and bedrooms. People from Keeth helped get beds for the family, even one that they saw on the patio of her apartment neighbors.

The Jones family had arrived with just a few family photos and clothes. She cannot get over the generosity, she said, or the blessings. Her daughter, Azariah, 13, loves dolphins, and her bathroom was decorated with dolphins. Veronica loves pine trees and had decorated her salon in New Orleans with them, and her room has pine trees here. Her son loves canned Mandarin oranges, and now they have plenty of them.

"No one knew what our favorite things were," she said amazed. She registered her children for school on a Thursday and they were in school Friday. She was grateful for that.

Keeth Assistant Principal Georgia Hill gave Veronica's phone number to PTA and others. Before long clothes, food, and other necessities poured in.

"My home was like a revolving door," she said.

"Look at these cards," she exclaimed as she spread out about 10 gift cards from shoe stores, Target and other places.

PTA President Tina Guerricajotia, Keeth P.E. Coach Linda Cohn, third-grade teacher Becky Crabtree, and PTA member Leanne Buchanan all coordi-

nated drives and brought bags of clothes and food. The school will have three families in all from the hurricane areas.

Veronica said the children don't seem to understand everything that's happened. Azariah loves adventures, but the children had a hard time when they found out their dog, who they had to leave with someone in Texas would not be returning to them.

"I don't even realize the scope of this thing," she admitted.

She does know how to deal with the Red Cross and other agencies. She was supposed to get \$1,500 from one agency sent to Western Union, but they said someone saying they were her picked it up in Baton Rouge. She did receive a card for food stamps, which she has never had to use before, but so far the card hasn't worked in any store.

After all the heat that the Federal Emergency Management Agency has taken, Veronica reports that she received \$2,000 from FEMA. She said she thought she was one of the first to get that aid.

She is happy with the schools her children attend, she said. In New Orleans, they both attended successful magnet schools. Azariah does say that Lake Howell High School is huge compared with her school back home.

"She says, 'Mom I have to walk so far,'" Veronica said.

She admits she doesn't know what the future holds for them. She is open to staying in Florida, but the home prices are prohibitive. That is a question for later. Her best friend is coming down from Alabama to have her hair done this weekend.

"We know we have a place to live at least for a year," she said.

The total 2005 budget for Shriners hospitals for children added up to \$625 million. Nearly 800,000 children

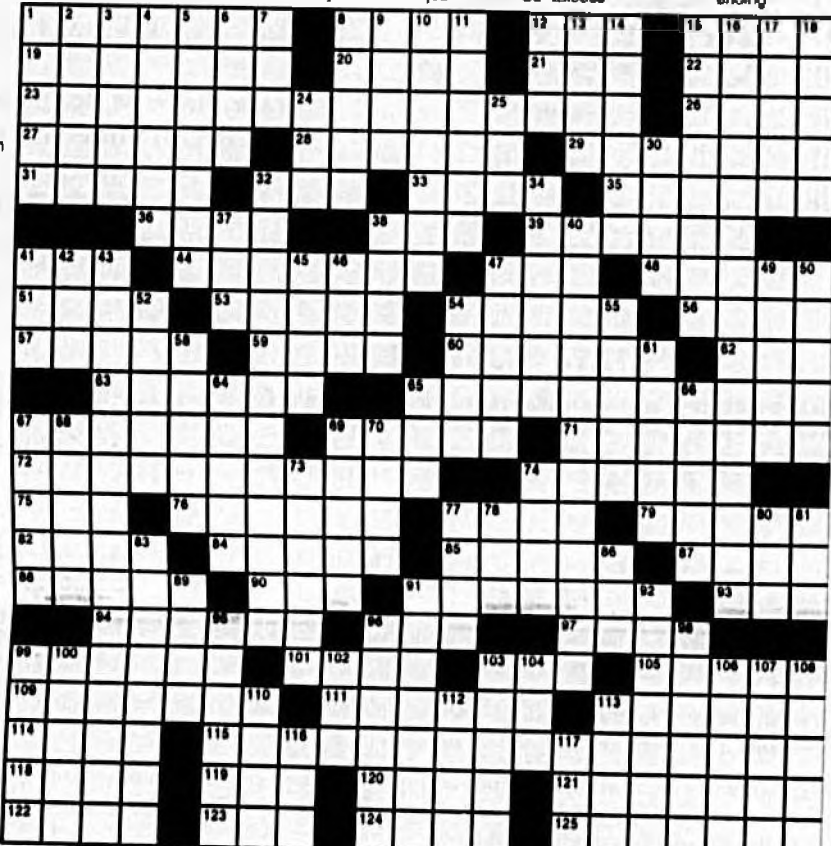

# Bears bounce back

## Winter Springs takes care of business

WINTER SPRINGS — The Winter Springs football team worked on one thing this week — finish what you start.

And that's exactly what the Bears did Friday night, taking advantage of nearly every break and getting the job done when it was time to get it done and the hosts dominated the scoring in defeating Lake Mary, 28-9, in the Class 6A-District 2 opener for both teams at the A.W. Epps Sports Complex.

The past two weeks Winter Springs (2-2) had good stats, but mistakes and turnovers allowed powerful Mainland to blow out the Bears and Winter Park to pull out a close win.

But Friday night, the hosts didn't let falling behind 3-0 early and turning the ball over three times on interceptions bother them as they virtually moved the ball at will against the Rams (2-2).

The Bears then marched right back down the field, but turned the ball over on downs at the Lake Mary 20.

But the excitement of stopping a big drive was tempered moments later when Winter Springs Ashuwa Richardson took a punt at the 35, made one defender miss and ran 65 yards for a touchdown that put the hosts

ahead to stay with 41-seconds left in the first period. David LeBar added the first of his four extra points on the evening.

The Rams would continue to move the ball on offense, but every time they got into scoring position, there would be a turnover or a crucial mental mistake that would result in a penalty or forcing themselves to use up a time out.

And the Bears were there to take advantage.

Following a fumble recovery at its own 36, Winter Springs went on a seven play, 64-yard drive capped by an 11-yard touchdown run by Tyrone Lewis, who had 32 yards on two carries during the drive.

Three turnovers, two by Winter Springs, kept the score at 14-3 as the teams went to halftime.

The Bears basically put the game on ice early in the third quarter as Lake Mary went three-and-out and the hosts took over at their own 22 and went 78 yards on seven plays.

The big plays in the drive were a 33-yard run by Lewis and two long runs by fullback Elwil Acevedo of 18 and 17 yards, the second being for the touchdown with 7:12 to go in the third period and the score was 21-3.

Both teams turned the ball over on interceptions on their next possessions and the Rams then turned the ball over on downs at the 23 and Winter Springs then went on a drive over the final 3:36 of the third quarter and first 2:45 of the final period to seal the deal.

The 12-play drive not only ate up time, Lake Mary was also forced to use two defensive time outs, on back-to-back plays, and the home fans were starting to feel a win coming.

Tim Boykins did most of the damage, carrying the ball seven times for 50 yards, including the final five yards

SANFORD — One of Central Florida's oldest rivalries had a brilliant new chapter added to it Friday night at Thomas E. Whigham Stadium. After 48 minutes that fea-

tured seven fumbles (three lost), three interceptions, two blocked field goal attempts, and a collection of molar-rattling hits, the latest episode of the Oviedo-Seminole football rivalry came down to a two-point conversion in overtime. Jordan Dalrymple ran for the

two-point conversion to give the visiting Oviedo Lions a 15-14 come-from-behind win over the host Seminole Fighting Seminoles in a 6A-District 2 and Seminole Athletic Conference contest.

"If there's such a thing as an ugly district win, this was it," said Oviedo coach Greg Register. "Both defenses played great all night long."

"Seminole is a very good football team. Everyone was quick to count them out after they lost their first two games, but DeLand is much improved this year and Nease is Nease, one of the state's top teams. Seminole battled us hard."

Register and the Lions had hoped that the return of senior quarterback Tyler Crockett from a thumb injury would kick-start the Oviedo offense which had managed just one touchdown in its last two games (and that was on a one-yard, one-play drive following an interception against Lyman).

In the first half against Seminole, the Lions had three turnovers and accumulated just 62 yards.

"Our offense has to start clicking," said Register. "Our

defense did a great job of keeping us in the game tonight and giving us a chance to win."

Seminole (0-3, 0-1 district, 0-1 SAC) exploited an Oviedo fumble in the first quarter when Travis Goodline broke several tackles during a 20-yard touchdown run. Thanks to Julian Brown, who blocked an Oviedo field goal attempt as time ran out in the second quarter, the Tribe took that 7-0 lead into halftime.

That lead lasted all of four plays into the third quarter as Oviedo took the kickoff and raced 73 yards to tie the score. Dalrymple completed the drive with a seven-yard touchdown run.

Again thanks to Brown, who blocked another Oviedo field goal attempt in the final seconds of the fourth quarter, the game went into overtime.

Seminole had the ball first and scored on three plays to retake the lead. Goodline rushing in from the 5-yard line. Jared Curtis kicked the point-after and Seminole had the lead again, 14-7.

After years of talk and speculation, UCF and USF will finally meet on the gridiron this evening (Saturday) at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa.

Despite being a mere 98 miles apart, this will be the first time they have faced each other on the football field. Kickoff is set for 7:06 p.m.

FSN Florida will televise the game, with Rick Peckham handling the play-by-play duties and Tony McGee as the color analyst.

For fans who cannot see the game, the UCF ISP Network and its flagship station 740-The Team AM (WQTM) will broadcast live from Tampa. Marc Daniels will once again have the call with Gary Parris. Jerry O'Neill will handle the sideline duties.

UCF head coach George O'Leary hopes this first meeting on the gridiron is the start of a yearly tradition. O'Leary would like to play the Bulls each season.

"I think everyone at UCF would like to see it every year," said O'Leary. "I think when you have 11 games, I could see the problem, but once you go to a 12th game, it seems to be a natural fit. Instead of looking in Utah or California to play a game, you have one (game) two hours down the street. They have a stadium over there that will hopefully bring their crowd and our crowd. It will be a great crowd to watch the game."

UCF Fans can learn more about the Golden Knights as they prepare to face the Bulls by watching "The George O'Leary Show" prior to the game. The program airs today at 1 p.m. on WESH-TV 2.

Just like O'Leary, USF head coach Jim Leavitt has been asked all week about the possible rivalry forming. Like O'Leary, Leavitt also sees it as a natural fit.

"I think it's natural," said Leavitt. "I don't think that there is any question. We haven't been playing football for that long, and we didn't play them early because they have been playing football for quite a while longer. We were a I-AA team just trying to see if we could become a football team. Everybody's already been writing about it, since the two schools are so close, that it would be natural."

After opening the season with a 10 point loss to Penn State, the Bulls bounced back last week with a 37-3 victory over Florida A&M. Running back Andre Hall was the big playmaker for USF. He ran for 156 yards on 18 carries, to go along with a career high three rushing touchdowns. The Bulls spent most of the time on the ground, with 56 of their 74 plays being rushing attempts. Quarterback Pat Julmiste threw for just 71 yards against Florida A&M.

Defensively against FAMU, USF was led by linebackers Stephen Nicholas and Ben Moffitt, who both totaled six tackles.

UCF had a bye last week, but had an impressive showing at South Carolina on Sept. 1. Despite a 24-15 loss, the squad showed great improvement from last season on both sides.

Defensively, UCF held the Gamecocks to just 32 yards on the ground and registered three sacks for the game. Paul Carrington, Frisner Nelson, and Chris Welsh each had a sack and Ronnell Sandy led the team with seven total tackles. The UCF defensive front will be challenged all night by Hall. Hall has quickly established himself as one of the best runners in the history of the program, rushing for 1,585 yards, while appearing in just 13 career games.

UCF had two receivers go over 100 yards against the Gamecocks. Mike Walker hauled in nine catches for 105 yards and a touchdown, while Lake Howell graduate Brandon Marshall had 10 catches for 102 yards. After a solid preseason, quarterback Steven Moffet completed 27-of-39 passes for 258 yards and a touchdown. The improvement of Moffet also caught the eye of Leavitt.

"He (Moffet) is a very good football player," said Leavitt. "We recruited him out of high school and we know what he can do. He's very talented. He can run and throw. He's a very talented player."

The UCF rushing attack should get an extra boost this week with the return of Dontavious Wilcox. He was forced out of the South Carolina game early in the first quarter of taking a knee to the head, resulting in a minor concussion. Kevin Smith and Jason Peters filled in nicely for Wilcox. Smith, a true freshman playing in his first career game had 48 yards on 13 attempts, while Peters had 42 yards on 13 carries.

# The Long Count

This coming Thursday, Sept. 22, and Friday, Sept. 23, will mark the anniversaries of two of the most controversial decisions in sports history.

On Sept. 22, 1927, the event was a world championship boxing match between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney in Chicago.

The purse, \$990,446, was the largest in the early history of boxing, and nearly half the population of the United States reportedly listened to the fight on radio.

In the seventh round of the 10 round fight, Tunney was knocked down. Following the rules, Referee Dave Barry interrupted the count when Dempsey failed to go to the farthest corner. The count was resumed after 12 to 15 seconds, and Tunney got to his feet at the count of nine. He was subsequently awarded seven of the 10 rounds and won the fight and the world championship.

Dempsey appealed the decision but was denied and never fought again.

The other controversy was on Sept. 23, 1908 in a base-

ball game between the Chicago Cubs and New York Giants.

It was during the heat of the National League pennant race and in the bottom of the ninth inning, the score was 1-1. New York was at bat with two men on and two men out.

The batter hit safely to center field scoring the winning run. Fred Merkle, who had been on first base, seeing the winning run scoring, thought the game was over and headed to the dugout, thus invalidating the play.

Chicago second baseman, Johnny Evers, attempted to get the ball and tag Merkle out, but was prevented by fans who rushed out onto the field, also thinking the game had ended.

Days later, Harry C. Pulliam, head of the National Commission of organized Baseball, decided to call the game a tie and the teams were forced to play a post-season playoff, which the Cubs won, 4-2.

Fans subsequently invented the terms "boner" and "bonthead" in reference to the play, and it has gone down in history as "Merkle's Boner."

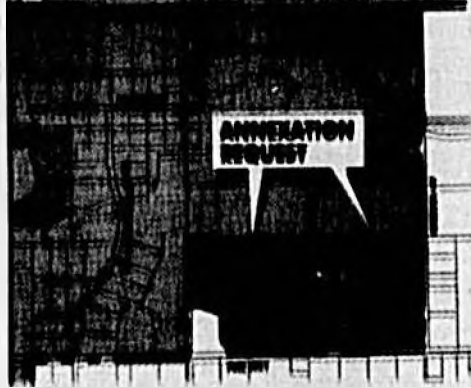

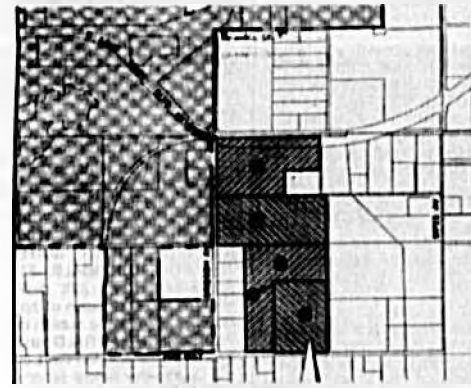
