Editorial Comment

Seminole Junior College: Unified Effort Witness

Dedication of Seminole Junior College on its delightful campus with well-planned, attractively designed and efficiently organized buildings was a visible evidence of what this county can accomplish when a unified effort is resolutely maintained.

This is that chamber's Long Range Planning Committee. For the membership included those who were convinced that this junior college should be located in Seminole and spared no efforts to see that it was done.

During these difficult and challenging founding years the college had the whole-hearted support of the business community. But, more importantly, the interest and backing of the Seminole County Commission, the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction and the Sanford City Commission.

This county is in its vocational education courses. Here is a very practical and a very much neglected aspect of formal education that is coming into its own as the pressure of needs for craftsmen is being felt in the county-wide economy.

SST Explanations

Some Alan Cranston and John Tunney bear a heavy burden of responsibility for the Senate defeat of the American supersonic transport aircraft, representing as they do the leading aerospace state.

Senator Cranston has not said why he voted against the SST. Senator Tunney, who has been on both sides of the issue, has given two principal reasons for his opposition.

He alleges that construction of the SST actually might increase unemployment in California because it would decrease the number of jobs on other aircraft construction.

However, this argument is contradicted by the vigorous campaign in favor of the SST that was conducted at the 11th hour by organized labor.

Senator Tunney argued also that cancelling the SST program would free substantial funds that could be used for domestic problems in the United States of America.

This is improbable. Cold statistics reveal that it will take almost as much money to close down the SST prototype program as it would to complete the two aircraft. Contracts and commitments must be honored.

California is a leading aerospace state. People in California are concerned about a higher than-average unemployment rate which is largely due to a slowdown in aerospace industries.

Finally, like all Americans, Californians are worried about the future role of the United States in international aviation.

These are among the reasons why Californians are entitled to a better reason than complete silence or shallow explanations from Senators Cranston and Tunney for their negative votes on the SST.

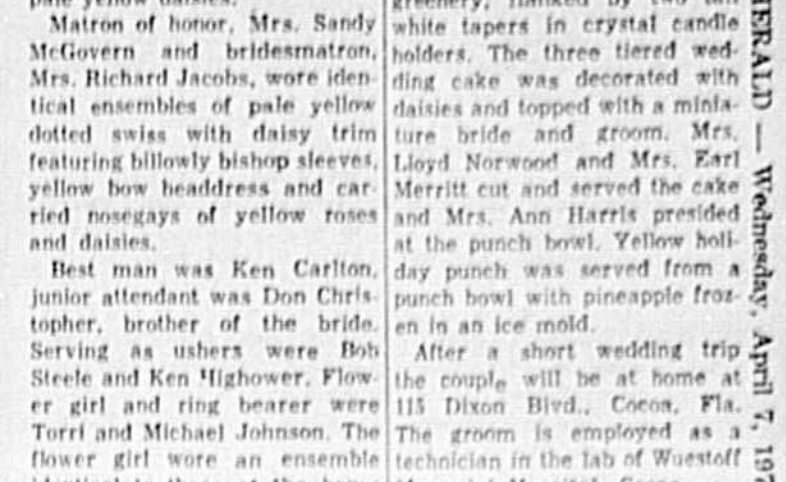
Free the azaleas with special food because they are acid loving plants; and be kind to other plants and give them a little snack, because the weather has been unkind these past four months.

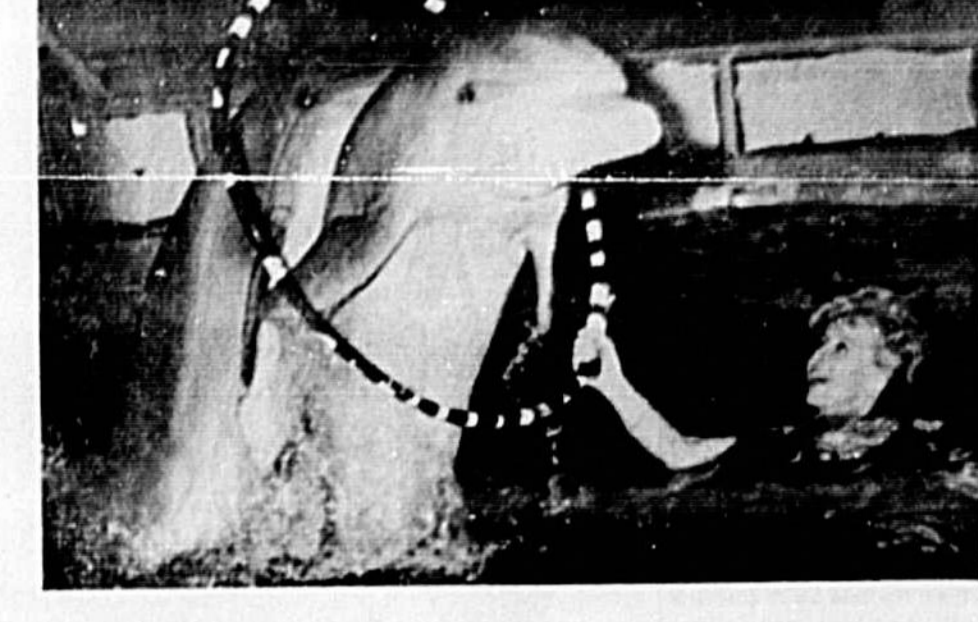

Ham Top Easter Entree

 Many a young man has been lured down the aisle after being impressed by a gal's quiche Lorraine (among other things). For a different Easter week dish, serve a special Ham quiche. The quiche originally was an open-faced flan or tart and dates from ancient times. It then was made of bread dough but the French created the rich pastry now considered essential for a tasty quiche. Fillings vary from fruit to fish, potatoes, onions, spinach and ham.

HAM QUICHE
 1 unbaked pastry shell
 1/2 cup real mayonnaise
 1/2 cup milk
 2 eggs
 1/2 teaspoon cornstarch
 2 1/2 cups cubed (1/2-inch or less) cooked ham
 3/4 cups chopped Swiss cheese
 1/2 cup sliced green onion
 Dash pepper

Treats pastry and fit into a 9-inch metal or ceramic quiche pan or in a 9-inch pie pan. Mix together mayonnaise, milk, eggs and cornstarch until smooth. Stir in ham, cheese, onion and pepper. Turn into pastry shell. Bake in 350-degree oven on shelf to 40 minutes or until golden below the center of the oven. Broil on top and knife inserted in center comes out clean. Makes 6 to 8 main dish servings or 10 to 12 appetizer servings.

Pastry Shell: Mix 2 1/2 cups sifted flour and 1/2 teaspoon salt in bowl. Cut in 1/2-cup regular margarine with pastry blender or 2 knives until mixture is well mixed and fine crumbs form. (Do not be afraid of overmixing.) Sprinkle 2 tablespoons cold water over mixture while tossing to blend well. Press dough firmly into ball with hands. (If mixture seems crumbly, work with hands until it holds together.) Flatten dough slightly and roll out to 12-inch circle on lightly floured surface. Fit loosely into 9-inch pan. Trim to fit type of pan used.

Arrange peaches over batter; carefully spread remaining batter over peaches. Stir together remaining 1/2 cup sugar, cinnamon and pecans; sprinkle over batter. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean—35 minutes. Cut in wedges and serve warm. Makes 6 servings.

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Patates Douces aux Marrons

 Tradition plays an important role in our holidays, but that's no reason why we should confine ourselves to the traditional dishes.

Yams with the Easter ham are pretty humdrum, but add a garnish of marrons glaces and you give the holiday dinner a real lift.

For years, my contact with chestnuts was limited to those street corner stands where they sell you half a dozen roasted. But the French, I discovered, have devised dozens of wonderful ways of using chestnuts as desserts, confections, sauces, meat stuffings and even as a vegetable.

Marrons glaces are whole glazed chestnuts, eaten usually as a confection or a garnish for desserts. They come wrapped individually in gold foil and packed in handsome round metal boxes.

Marrons au slip consist of chestnut bits in a vanilla syrup and go beautifully on ice cream. Creme de Marrons is a puree of chestnuts sweetened with vanilla syrup. Blended with whipped cream this form is used as a filling for layer cakes or tarts. Gourmet departments in many stores carry the puree in tubes.

There is also an unsweetened puree of chestnuts which the French serve with butter or combine with Brussels sprouts or celery.

Then there is a finely milled chestnut flour that has a variety of uses including chestnut soup, cakes, desserts and confections.

You may not find all these forms of chestnuts in America, but specialty shops and delicacy departments of the big markets will carry at least some of them.

Meanwhile, try this recipe for yams with chopped chestnuts for your Easter spread.

PATATES DOUCES
AUX MARRONS
 4 large yams or six sweet potatoes
 Grated rind and juice of one orange
 4 egg yolks
 1 1/2 cups ground nutmeg
 1 can (11 oz.) water-packed chestnuts drained and chopped
 3 pineapple slices
 8 marrons glaces
 Cook yams until tender; peel and mash them. Add butter and stir until melted. Stir in juice and rind of orange. Beat in egg yolks, nutmeg and chestnuts. Fold beaten egg whites into yam mixture. Spoon mixture into a heavily buttered 2 quart casserole. Bake in a preheated oven at 300 degrees F. for 30 to 40 minutes or until lightly browned. Serve hot, garnished with halved pineapples slices and marrons glaces. Serve with slices of baked pineapples and marrons glaces. Serve with slices of baked ham, broiled with a cold rose wine. Serves 6.

Crepes Of Crab Meat Dewey

One of the most exclusive pieces of real estate in New York City is Gramercy Park, a small property located at the foot of Lexington Avenue on 21st Street.

It is about a block square and, even though it belongs to the city, it is always kept under lock and key as stipulated by Samuel Ruggles when he donated the land in 1823. Only those who live on or own property surrounding the park have keys to the gates.

The park is surrounded by charming five and six-story brick houses, many with old-fashioned green wooden shutters, and ornamented with brass carriage lamps and door knockers.

Gramercy's glory days were in the latter half of the 19th Century. In addition to a liberal sprinkling of bankers and publishers, neighborhood residents included Theodore Roosevelt, the Barrymores, Peter Cooper, Cyrus Field, Stanford White and Edwin Booth.

The Players and The National Arts Clubs on the south side of the park, with their great high-ceilinged rooms, were complemented in the late 1920s by the Gramercy Hotel on the north side.

One of the most comfortable residential-type hotels in the city, it boasts fine cuisine, a head chef, Swiss-trained John Hudacek, has been there for 12 years and the saucier, John Provenzano, 26 years. Both are regulars for the specialties they have worked out together.

One that we have enjoyed is well known to the dining room: crepes of crab meat Dewey and we were successful in eliciting their recipes. It will serve four.

CREPES OF CRAB MEAT DEWEY
Use thin unswollen crepes. 1 pound fresh or frozen lump crab meat

1/2 green pepper, diced
2 strips pimiento
1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced
1 shallot or 2 scallions, sliced
2 ounces sherry
1/2 pint heavy cream
4 ounces butter
1 tsp. horseradish
Salt and pepper

In large fry pan, saute in butter the pepper, pimiento, horseradish, mushrooms, shallot and crab meat. Slowly add the heavy cream, while stirring with a wooden spoon, and cook until thick. If you want it a little thicker, dissolve 1/4 teaspoon of arrowroot in the sherry, add, and cook a few minutes longer while continuing to stir. Set aside to cool off.

With crepes open, spoon crab meat mixture into the center of each crepe, roll carefully and arrange in a shallow oven pan, next to each other. Keep warm. Dip each roll ready to serve, then cover with a sauce mouseline, a hollandaise thinned out with unswollen whipped cream, and place under the broiler for a few minutes to brown on top. Serve piping hot.

For variety, the crab meat may be replaced by pieces of cooked swordfish, poached fillet or sole, scallops, shrimps or lobster or any combination thereof. The crepes may also be served with a shrimp and scallop poquette, prepared from the following recipe:

Lane Cake Famous Dessert

Lane Cake is one of the most famous desserts in American cuisine. It's a four-layer white cake with a spirited yolk-rich filling and a soft white frosting. It was originated by Mrs. Emma Rylander Lane of Clayton, Ala., and the recipe appeared in her 1898 cookbook, "A Few Good Things to Eat."

Now Mrs. Lane's granddaughter, Emma Rylander Law, has adapted another cake recipe from her grandmother's cookbook. Mrs. Lane called this recipe White Pound Cake and made it with butter, sugar, flour, baking powder, egg whites and pure alcohol. Emma Law has improved on her grandmother's recipe; she uses vodka instead of pure alcohol and adds crystallized ginger and pecans.

Ever since we tried this latest version of the White Pound Cake, it has become a regular at our house, and tasters never fail to ask for the recipe. In tribute to Emma Rylander Law, we are naming it Lane Cake.

Lane Cake is the perfect accompaniment to hot tea. But do justice to the beverage. Whether you use loose tea or teabags, make the tea in a teapot, warming the pot by rinsing it with hot water before adding the tea. Put the tea (1 teaspoon of loose tea or 1 teabag for each cup) in the pot and add freshly boiled water. Cover and brew for five minutes. If loose tea is used, pour through a tea strainer. For tasters who want weaker tea, add some of the brew plus freshly boiled water to each cup.

1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
3 cups sifted cake flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup 12 one-quarter pound sticks butter
1 1/2 cups sugar
8 egg whites, from large eggs
3/4 cup vodka, 80 proof
Line the bottom of a long loaf pan (11 by 4 1/2 by 2 1/2 inches) with wax paper; butter paper.

Rinse ginger with hot water to soften and remove outside coating of sugar; drain and dry well on paper toweling. With kitchen scissors snip ginger into tiny pieces—there should be about 1 cup. In a small bowl mix together the ginger, pecans and 1/2 cup of the flour.

On a sheet of wax paper sift together the remaining 2 1/2 cups flour and the baking powder. In a large mixing bowl cream butter and sugar; beat in egg whites in 4 additions, using medium speed of electric beater and beating 1/2 minute after each addition.

Sprinkle about 1/3rd of the flour-baking powder mixture over the creamed mixture and gently fold in with a rubber spatula; gently stir in about 1/2 of the vodka. (Don't worry if batter looks grainy and watery.) Add another 1/3rd of the flour and fold in; stir in remaining vodka and fold in remaining flour. Fold in ginger-pecan mixture with any flour that does not stick to the ginger and nuts. (Don't worry if batter looks curdly.)

Turn into prepared pan and flatten top with spatula. Bake in a preheated 300 degree oven until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean—1 hour and 35 to 40 minutes. (Cake will have a crack on top. Place cake in pan on a wire rack for 30 minutes. With a small metal spatula loosen the cake sides on the wire rack; remove paper; with another rack, turn cake right side up; cool completely.)
No fat-free cake in transparent plastic wrap for a few hours or overnight before slicing so flavor has a chance to mellow and top crust softens enough to make slicing easy.

Make-Ahead Oven Pot Roast (Boned Chuck) Serves Many

If you want a lot of servings of meat for your money, choose boned chuck beef and pot roast. It may be served to a goodly number of dinner guests, or it may be used for a couple of meals for just the family.

In the following recipe the beef is oven-roasted in make-ahead style. You cook the meat one day and heat and serve it the next day or thereafter. This method often fits beautifully into a crowded schedule.

MAKE-AHEAD OVEN POT ROAST

5 pound boned beef chuck roast

1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
2 medium large onions, coarsely chopped (2 1/2 cups)
2 large ribs celery, finely chopped (1 cup)
1 medium carrot, pared and thinly sliced
2 large cloves garlic, peeled

Sprinkle beef with salt and pepper.

Into a 4-quart heavy casserole,

or similar utensil turn the onions; add celery, carrot and garlic. Place beef over vegetables.

Bake, tightly covered, in a 300-degree oven until meat is tender—about 3 hours. Beef will shrink during the baking and there should be a large quantity of broth.

Remove beef, cover and refrigerate overnight.

Strain vegetables from broth; place vegetables in a small container; cover tightly and refrigerate overnight.

Place strained broth in a separate container, cover and refrigerate overnight.

Slice beef fairly thin. Remove hardened fat from top of broth.

Turn vegetables into an electric blender with some of the broth and puree; mix with remaining clear broth.

Arrange sliced beef in a 3-quart shallow baking dish (about 14 by 8 1/2 by 2 inches) or similar utensil. Heat blended broth and vegetable mixture until very hot and pour over meat.

Sesame Seeds Spice Fried Chicken

Sesame is one of the world's oldest spices and herbs. Like so many spices and herbs today it is having a renaissance in American cooking. Sesame makes a pleasant crunchy topping for a fried chicken dish. It may be stirred into a filling or stuffing, added to salad greens or battered noodles. When added to a mixture, toast sesame seeds in a moderate oven for 10 minutes.

BARBECUE

2 1/2 to 3 lbs. chicken legs

and thigh

2/3 cup soy sauce
3 tbsps. sugar
1 tbs. ground ginger
1 tbs. onion powder
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
2 tbsps. melted butter or oil

2 tbsps. sesame seeds, toasted*

Place chicken in a tight-fitting container or plastic bag. Mix soy sauce, sugar, ginger, onion powder, salt and garlic powder. Pour over chicken. Cover and refrigerate 2 to 4

hours. Remove chicken from marinade. Broil over hot charcoal or under preheated broiler 7 inches from heat source, 50 to 60 minutes, turning often. Brush with butter and marinade frequently during broiling. Sprinkle with sesame seeds when chicken is tender. Serve hot or cold. Makes 6 portions.

Police Continue Hunt For Robbery Suspect

Law enforcement officers of the sheriff's department and the Sanford police department combined efforts last night to check several Sanford area houses, searching for the fifth suspect in a daring Monday afternoon armed robbery at Wheatland's grocery in Lake Monroe.

Four of the suspected bandits were captured shortly after the robbery when the county and city forces combined in a mass effort, along with help from Florida Highway Patrol trooper C. E. DePuy. All four are being held in the Seminole County jail under \$40,000 bond on charges of armed robbery and assault with attempt to commit murder.

When efforts proved fruitless last night, Sheriff John Polk learned that the subject had been taken to the airport to catch a plane to Chicago.

Polk revealed this morning that two warrants had been issued and that he felt the suspect is still in the area. According to Polk, a check of the airports showed no ticket sales to Chicago. Polk also revealed that Chief Deputy Duane Harrell is in Chicago today, checking out all possibilities that the suspect did go there.

The suspect, described as a colored male, 6-foot-1, 215-220 pounds and light complexioned, is believed to be heavily armed. At least two guns used in the hold-up, along with all the money, is still missing. Polk estimated the amount taken at \$86.

Detective Johnny Wright and Sgt. Tony Calanogio also are assigned to the case and are currently running down several leads.

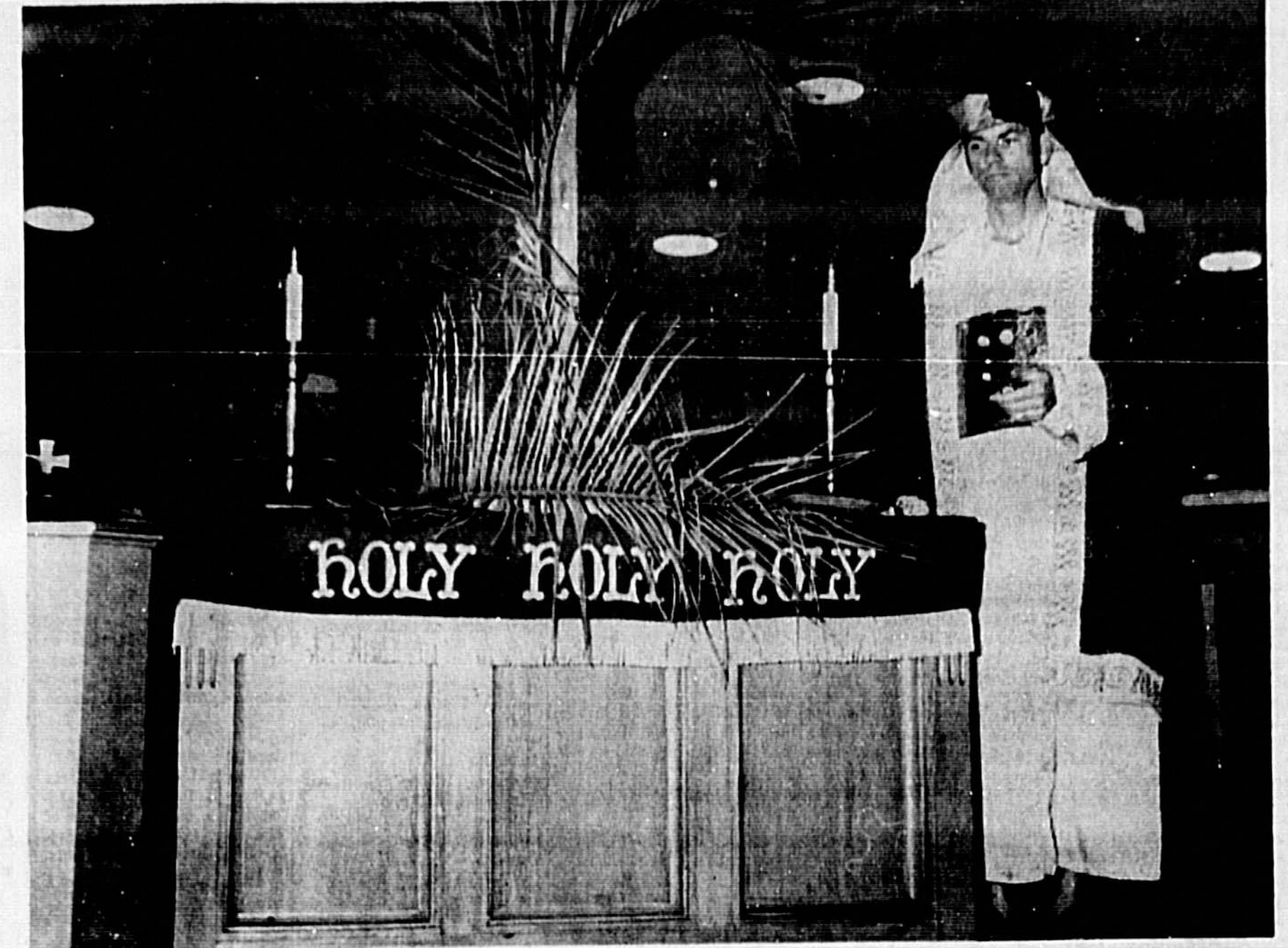
Superior Aircraft Negotiates For Sanford Airport Hangar

The Sanford Industrial Commission announced today that Superior Aircraft Refinishing is finalizing plans to relocate from Kissimmee Airport to Sanford Airport, Sanford City Manager W. E. Knowles presented the tentative agreement to the SIC this morning and it was unanimously endorsed by the seven-member commission.

Superior Aircraft Refinishing will occupy hangar 146 at Sanford Airport and will employ six to eight people when the plant begins operation. The aeronautical company is owned by Lamar Garrett. The tentative lease agreement calls for Garrett to provide all maintenance to the hangar at a leased price of \$3,000 the first year, \$4,000 for the second year and \$7,000 for the remaining three years of the five-year lease. The leased price will be 10 cents lower per square foot than the present rental guidelines, 80 cents per square foot, due to the fact that Garrett will be providing all the maintenance to the 14,000 square foot hangar.

Also this morning the SIC voted to send a telegram to Gov. Reubin Askew stating its objections to his proposal to repeal the law granting an exemption to the two per cent insurance premium tax to insurance companies with regional home offices in Florida. Commission member John Krifer pointed out that it was the exemption from the premium tax (Continued on Page 8A, Column 1)

Shops Line 'Way Of Cross' Jesus' Path Is Commercialized

JERUSALEM (AP) — The Way of the Cross, the path the condemned Jesus followed from Pontius Pilate's court to the rocky hill where he died, is only 1,000 steps.

Nearly 20 centuries later the traveler following those same steps may find the Via Dolorosa, a Street of Sorrows still — for another reason. Only the most devout pilgrim can close his eyes to its commercialism and secularism.

Too often the visitor, remembering his early Bible training, has an idealized vision of Christ's last agony, perhaps a palm-shaded lane leading to a cloud-shrouded mountain. It is far from that.

The Via Dolorosa is a narrow, twisting, cobbled alley leading from the Lion's Gate in Jerusalem's eastern wall through the teeming heart of the Holy City to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, marking the traditional site of Calvary and the entombment.

It is lined with countless shops bearing such impious names as Eighth Station Souvenir Bazaar, Peace Land Souvenir Shop in Holy Land Exhibit, and the entombment.

Eager shopowners, who have looked forward to the Easter Week bonanza for a year, beckon from doorways importuning the pilgrim to buy souvenirs — olive wood crucifixes, mother of pearl Bibles, rosaries, brocades, maps, guidebooks.

The truth is, the old walled city of Jerusalem is not unlike any other Arab quarter of the Middle East — filled with the (Continued on Page 1A, Col. 4)
