4 ounces butter I tsp. horseradish Salt and pepper

In large fry pan, saute butter the pepper, pimiento, horseradish, mushrooms, shallot and crab meat. Slowly add the heavy cream, while stirring with a wooden spoon, and cook until thick. If you want it a little thicker, dissolve 1/4 tesspoon of arrowroot in the sherry, add, and cook a few minutes longer while continuing to stir. Set aside to cool off.

With crepes spread oper spoon crab meat mixture into the center of each crepe, roll carefully and arrange in s shallow oven pan, next to each other. Keep wrm in oven until ready to serve, then cover with a sauce mousseline, a hollandaise thinned out with unsweetened whipped cream, and place under the broller for a few minutes to brown on top. Serve piping hot.

For variety, the crab meat may be replaced by pieces of cooked swordfish, poached filet or sole, scallops, shrimps or lobster or any combination thereof. The crepes may also be served with a shrimp and scallop poulette, prepared from the following recipe:

SHRIMP AND SCALLOF POULETTE

1 quart light cream 3 shallots or scallions, chopped

6 ounces dry white wine 4 level taps, arrowroot 1/2 pound sea scallops 1/2 pound shrimp

Cut the scaliops into small pieces, cover with cold water, bring to a boil for two minutes and drain. Keep one cup of the scallop court-bouillen. Cook the shrimp, peel and devein, and cut into small pieces. Set aside.

POPCORN "SHURFINE" YELLOW 2 LB. PKG. 26°

Saute the shallots in the wine with a dab of butter and cook until it thickens. Mix the arrowroot in a cup of the light cream to dissolve, add to the shallots with the rest of the cream, and cook to boiling point. Add the cup of courtbouilion to the shallots at the same time as the cream. When it reaches the boiling point, lower the fire and cook, stirring continuously, until it has thickened. Season with salt and white pepper, remove from

and beating 1/2 minute after each addition. Sprinkle about 1-3rd of the flour-baking powder mixture over the creamed mixture and gently fold in with a rubber spatula: gently stir in about 1/2 of the vodka. (Don't worry if batter looks grainy and watery.) Add another 1-3rd of the flour

and fold in; stir in remaining vodka and fold in remaining flour. Fold in ginger-pecan mixture with any flour that does not stick to the ginger and nuts. (Don't worry if batter looks curdly.) Turn into prepared pan and flatten top with spatula. Bake in

a preheated 300-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean-1 bour and 35 to 40 minutes. (Cake will have a crack on top). Place cake in pan on a wire rack for 30 minutes. Wrap cold cake in transparent plastic wrap for a few hours or overnight before slicing so flavor has a chance to mellow and top crust softens enough to make slicing easy.
