Johnson Backs Reserves Shift

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson claims that the Pentagon's sweeping plans for realignment of the Army reserve combat "economy in government and combat readiness" are "both prudent and wise."

The Chief Executive's defense of the move—and his first public statement on it—came in a letter this weekend to Rear Adm. Edgar H. Reeder, national president of the Reserve Officers Association (ROA). Reeder made the letter public Sunday night.

The ROA, which represents about 50,000 officers outside the National Guard, sharply criticized the plan as "monstrous" and charged that the Pentagon has been engaged in a "conspiracy" over the past four years to destroy the reserve.

In a news conference Saturday, Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara outlined the plan to transfer the "unit structure" of the 300,000-man Army reserve into the National Guard.

He said it would increase combat readiness and save taxpayers \$150 million a year.

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Council Studies 'Phone Sell Ban

City commissioners will face an 11-point agenda when they meet tonight in City Hall.

The league said only 5,800 horses were slaughtered in England and Wales last year for human consumption, compared with 16,720 in 1957.

State Aide Hits Christmas Bonus To County Aides

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The state auditor was critical of apparent Christmas bonuses paid out to employees of two Palm Beach County officials.

Auditor Ernest Ellison said additional payments totaling \$37,115 for three years and were made to employees of Tax Assessor Edgar W. Maxwell in November 1963 and December of 1961 and 1962. He said the payments were not supported by records for overtime work, and in the absence of other records, appeared to be Christmas bonuses. He said there was no legal authority for payment of Christmas bonuses.

Maxwell said the additional payments were salary adjustments. The auditor also reported similar payments by the office of County Judge Paul F. Douglas. Douglas notified the auditor he would discontinue the payments.

The audit was generally good except for the additional payments.

West German Tribunal Set Up At Auschwitz

OSWIECIM, Poland (UPI)—A West German war crimes court today set up a temporary tribunal at the Auschwitz concentration camp to verify testimony against 20 former Nazis charged with killing millions of Jews for Adolf Hitler.

The trial began in Frankfurt a year ago.

The purpose of the Auschwitz sessions is to determine whether certain former inmates at the camp could have seen the horror they described in earlier testimonies.

An estimated four million Jews were exterminated at Auschwitz during World War II in Hitler's "final solution to the Jewish problem."

Judge Walter Hott and his staff set up the outdoor court room, near the so-called "black wall of the death" and the railway loading platform where new inmates were herded out of cattle cars.

In front of the red brick wall stands a black fiberoptic light trap which gives it its name.

Fresh flowers are placed there regularly in tribute to the thousands of Jews mowed down by Nazi machine-guns.

Only one of the 20 defendants was brought here. He is Dr. Franz Bernhard Lucas, a 53-year-old baldish gynecologist accused of selecting victims for the Auschwitz gas chambers.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson is sending out invitations to his inaugural but Sen. Barry M. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) still has one more chance to be the next president of the United States.

Despite what 69 million voters thought they did on election day, they did not elect a president.

The job of actually electing the president falls to only 538 men and women.

They vote today in each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

Who are these president-makers? Where do they get their power?

The answer is found in the Electoral College, an often-criticized holdover from the days of the founding fathers who didn't trust the popular will. Here's the way it works: Under Article 2 of the Constitution, each state is entitled to as many electors as it has senators and representatives.

At presidential election time, the voter actually casts his ballot for a slate of electors.

It is possible for a presidential candidate to receive more popular votes but lose the election because he failed a majority of the votes in the Electoral College. The anonymous electors can—and have—decided who will be president.

There is nothing to prevent a state for electing a slate of unpledged electors, but if an elector is representing either of the two major parties he theoretically must vote for his party's candidate. The political trouble has been that he doesn't always do this.

As recently as 1960, a defecting Republican elector from Oklahoma voted for Sen. Harry F. Byrd.

In 1936, a Democratic elector from Alabama cast his vote for a man who was almost unknown to the nation at large.

In 1948, former President Harry S. Truman lost a vote when a Tennessee elector cast his ballot for Sen. Strom Thurmond, who ran for president on the Dixiecrat ticket.

The possibility of a mass defection of previously pledged electors is remote, but the idea of a man being elected president with less popular votes, but more electoral votes than his opponent, is not. It has happened three times in the past.

The most famous case was the Rutherford B. Hayes-Samuel J. Tilden battle in 1876.

The reason lay in a dispute over the electoral votes from Florida, Louisiana, South Carolina, and Oregon.

To settle the fight, Congress set up an electoral commission along party lines. The result was that the commission gave the contested votes to Republican Hayes.

Andrew Jackson was another victim of the electoral system. In 1824, Jackson edged John Quincy Adams in the popular vote.

But he failed to get the coalition required majority of electoral votes. This threw the election into the House of Representatives.

Jackson had few friends in the House and the lawmakers voted to elect Adams.

The most recent loser-turn-ed-winner was Benjamin Harrison. He lost the popular vote to Grover Cleveland but Harrison's popular vote was concentrated in states that had big electoral votes. The result was that Harrison became president.

'Top Secret' Stamp On Fatal Crash

SAIGON (UPI)—U. S. military authorities today reported the death of another American

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in combat against Communist guerrillas. Officials put a "top secret" stamp on a mysterious troop transport crash which killed two other Americans. There was speculation that the downed plane, said to be carrying 30 Vietnamese commandos, may have been involved in a secret mission against North Viet Nam. There were no survivors. The U. S. battlefield fatality—10th in one of the bloodiest weeks of the anti-Communist

war—was a U. S. Army staff sergeant killed Sunday in a bitter clash with the Viet Cong near the Perfume River 290 miles north of Saigon. An American military spokesman said 11 Vietnamese troops were killed and 30 wounded in the battle. Government forces reported counting 37 Viet Cong bodies. They estimated that the guerrillas carried off more than 100 dead and wounded. The wreckage of the downed C123 transport plane was found today in the coastal mountains, 280 miles northeast of here. The bodies of the two Americans, an Air Force major and an Army sergeant, were recovered. Reliable sources said seven Vietnamese airmen and 30 commandos of the Vietna-

mese special forces were also aboard. The plane crashed Friday, but American spokesmen refused to discuss its mission other than to say it was a "training" flight. It was the worst air disaster of the war.

Kynes Says: Tax Assessors Must Impose Full Cash Value

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Atty. Gen. James W. Kynes said it is the duty of the state comptroller to require county tax assessors to impose property taxes at their full cash or just value.

The attorney general said full cash value and just value were for all practical purposes the same.

Kynes wrote the opinion for Comptroller Ray E. Green and for the Cabinet Budget Commission, who sought advice on their duties in requiring assessors to live up to property valuation laws.

Kynes said the comptroller, under supervision of the Budget Commission, was authorized, if not directed, to notify the county assessors to base property valuations on full cash or just value.

He said if they failed to comply, the comptroller was to use whatever action necessary, including going into court, to force compliance.

Under the law and under decisions of the courts, said Kynes, "it is clearly the duty and obligation of the county assessors of taxes, as well as the Board of County Commissioners sitting as boards of tax equalization, to assess all real and tangible personal property on the basis of full cash or just value and, where equalization is necessary, to equalize on that basis."

The opinion said the comptroller should not take over from the local assessors initial valuation of properties nor should he attempt to sit as a board of equalizer.

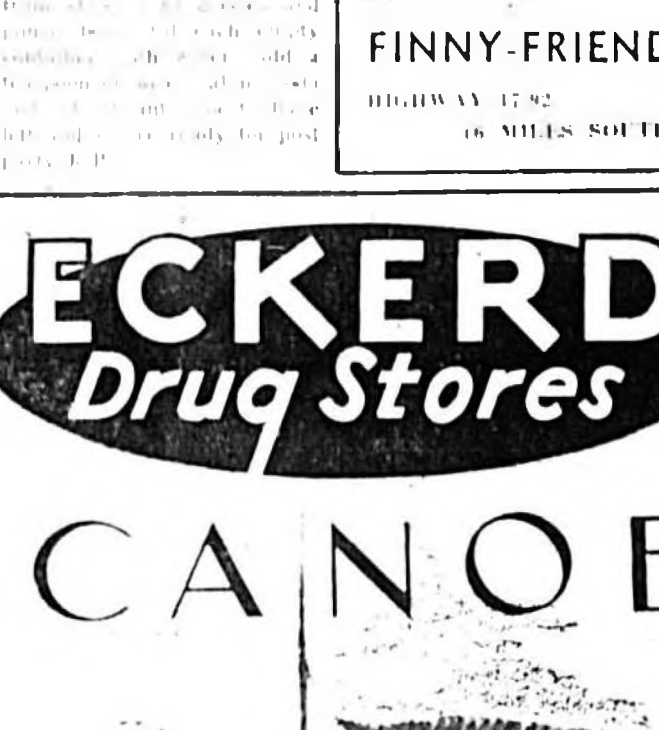

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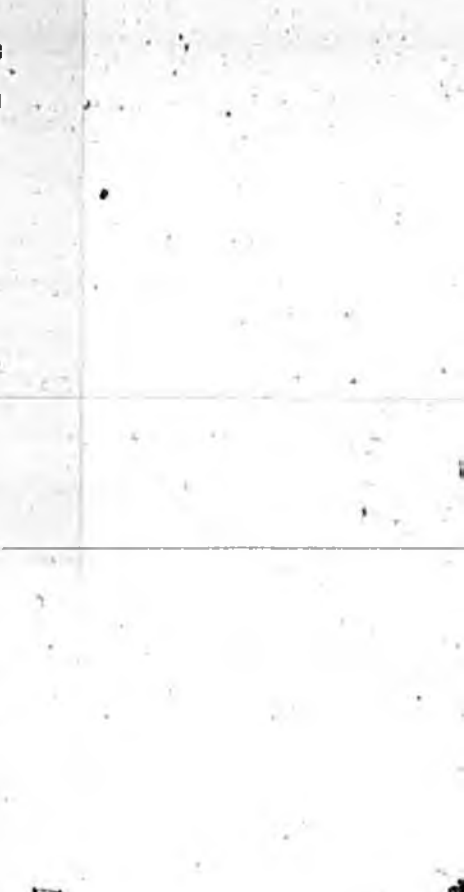

Illegal Use Of Guns

During the next few months, the United States Congress and the legislatures of all of the 50 states of our Union, except Kentucky, Mississippi, and Virginia, are scheduled to convene in regular session—43 in January, 2 in February, one in April, and 2 in May. This situation is certain to produce a large number of bills to control the ownership and use of firearms. Many anti-gun laws will be proposed by persons who believe that such a law will prevent crime or that it will assist in the arrest and conviction of criminals.

The American people seem to have developed an inclination to try to eliminate problems by passing laws, especially laws prohibiting people from doing things by which a small minority cause trouble. Much of the sentiment against people owning and using firearms is based very largely on a notion that if guns were more strictly regulated there would not be so many murders and robberies and such. Most proposed firearms legislation is pointed in the wrong direction. It disarms the honest, law-abiding citizen, while it falls miserably in its avowed purpose of disarming the criminal. It is aimed at outlawing the gun rather than punishing the criminal who uses the gun for an illegal purpose.

No legislation can prevent criminals from securing and using guns. Reputable gun owners maintain that legislation should not be aimed at the firearm but at its misuse. They do not oppose reasonable legislation regulating the carrying of a concealed handgun, but they do oppose the theory that a target shooter, a hunter, or a collector should be required to meet the same conditions. They do oppose legislation which denies or interferes with individual rights of our citizens or is designed purely for the convenience of law enforcement or for the purpose of circumventing due process of law in order to more easily obtain convictions.

In their concern with trying to prevent the use of firearms in crime, too many people forget that the right to keep and bear arms is critically significant to a free people. It is not by accident or merely because of the temper and conditions of the times that a guarantee of the right of the people to keep and bear arms is the second item in the Bill of Rights. Like other protections of the individual in the Constitution, as originally amended, this was a product of a knowledge and understanding of history—the kind of history which those who fail to understand are doomed to repeat.

As we strive to solve the problem of increasing crime in some areas, our efforts must be based on reason and knowledge, not on emotions or misinformation. Existing laws must be strictly enforced with severe additional penalties for individuals who use a firearm in the commission of a crime. Any proposed legislation must not be directed at firearms or the right to keep and bear arms, but at the illegal use of guns.

Couldn't Care Less

From Juan D. Peron's unsuccessful attempt to stage a return to Argentina, two facts seemed to emerge. The Argentine people just don't seem to care very much anymore. And neither, apparently, does Peron.

For 10 years, from 1943 until 1955, the dictator Peron dominated all phases of Argentine life. But for most of the last 10 years, he has been in exile. Time has eroded his appeal. When Peron abandoned the

comfortable life of Madrid and headed for Buenos Aires via Rio de Janeiro, it ostensibly was to carry out a promise that he would return to Argentina this year. But now there are those who say that at the age of 69, Peron had no intention of making more than a gesture.

It is said he knew Brazilian authorities would stop him in Rio, and that, besides, he had no stomach for the possibility that in Argentina he would

have to stand trial on charges ranging from rape to treason. But, if not for himself then for others, Peron's quick roundtrip Atlantic flight created new problems.

Despite Peron's long absence, a large bloc of Argentine labor remained loyal to him. Its members were concentrated in "The 62", the Peronista unions within Argentina's Confederation of Labor. And among them the recriminations already have started.

Accompanying Peron on the airliner from Madrid were Andres Framina, extreme left wing leader of the Textile Workers Union, and Augusto Vender, head of the 239,000 member Metalworkers Union. Framina, who combines the roles of wealthy textile mill owner and labor leader, last year called for a "revolution of bullets" if Peronistas were banned from Argentine political office.

Their unions now have called for a general strike to protest failure of the Peron mission and have appealed to other unions in "The 62" for support. Promises of the latter to "study" the issue is interpreted as a polite rejection.

Meanwhile, both Framina and Vender are under attack within their own unions.

It is estimated that Peronista leaders spent around \$400,000 in the last year in their campaign for Peron's return. Most of the money is believed to have come from union funds and it does not count the money spent on round trips to Madrid by the plotters, some of whom visited Peron three and four times.

Among those casting about for blame it is being said that the "atmosphere had not matured sufficiently" to welcome Peron. This is a way of saying there were not the proper conditions of anarchy to force the government to permit his return or force the military into actions against the government.

For Spain there also is a problem. It is what to do with Peron in the face of Latin American protests against the conditions which have permitted Peron to hatch his plots on Spanish soil.

For Argentine President Dr. Arturo Illia there is both praise and blame. Blame because he permitted Brazil to handle his problem for him. Praise for what seems to be a major strengthening of his political position.

But the key seems to be the Argentine banking in the sum of Buenos Aires sidewalk café. He just doesn't care about Peron anymore.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Some of the criticism leveled at J. Edgar Hoover's Federal Bureau of Investigation in recent weeks indicates there is much misinformation on what the FBI is and what it is permitted by law to do.

First—The FBI is not a national police. By law, it cannot go into a state, county, city or town and take over from local officials. It must work through and with local officials, though it may conduct independent investigations of federal violations.

Second—By law, the FBI has no power to protect anyone—whether the president of the United States, other government officials, civil rights workers or persons being illegally deprived of the right to vote.

Protection comes under the Secret Service, the federal marshals, the state and local police. If the local police do not provide adequate protection for a man or woman, or if the local police or sheriffs are inefficient or corrupt, there is nothing the FBI can legally do about it.

On occasion, the Secret Service has borrowed FBI men to help it in guarding the president. But these agents are on loan and are not (while on such guard duty) working under orders from the FBI.

Third—The FBI does not decide who in the government is a security risk and who isn't.

Some officials are fond of saying "I have an FBI clearance." These officials are mistaken. No one except an FBI man has an FBI clearance.

By law, the FBI cannot say this man or that should not be hired because of his past—because he is a potential spy, because he drinks too much, because he may have loyalty to a foreign government, because he talks too much, because whatever knowledge he picks up may be or sale, because he may be a homosexual or because he may have a weakness for women or horses.

The FBI is allowed only to report the facts, statements and other evidence its agents pick up from interviewing people and looking up records and such.

The FBI is not allowed to make evaluations of this evidence or reach conclusions as to whether the man or woman investigated is or is not a security risk.

One exception: The FBI does decide on the suitability of all FBI personnel.

The government department or agency employing, or interested in employing, a man or woman takes the FBI evidence and makes its own evaluations and its own decisions as to whether to grant a security clearance or not. That is, the decision is made at the White House, the State Department, the Department of Defense, or wherever.

Fourth—The FBI doesn't normally investigate the backgrounds of Senate or congressional staff employees. Any such investigations are normally made by the Senate or House Committees concerned. (There are certain committees which can ask the FBI for assistance.)

The FBI's director, and a succession of president and

congressmen, have taken part in keeping the FBI's functions strictly limited. The fear has been that if the FBI or any similar federal agency were given police decision powers, it could be the first step toward creating a possible police state.
