

# New Changes In Social Security Law

(Following is the first of two dispatches telling about forthcoming changes in the Social Security law and what they will mean to you.)

WASHINGTON—(UPI)—Virtualy every family in America will be affected by major changes in the Social Security law which will go into effect over the next few weeks.

These changes were voted by Congress at its recent session, and were signed into law by President Eisenhower on Aug. 29.

The Social Security Administration has been working overtime

since then to prepare detailed interpretations of the new amendments, and to apply them to the millions of individual cases involved.

Here is a summary of the most important changes, and how they will affect you. Additional information on specific situations may be obtained from local Social Security offices.

**Payroll Taxes**

The Social Security tax deduction from your paycheck will be bigger, starting Jan. 1. The tax for both employers and employees will go up from 2 1/2 per cent to

3 1/2 per cent. And it will apply to the first \$4,800 of annual earnings instead of stopping at \$4,200 as it does now. The net effect of these two changes for people who pay the maximum will be to increase the annual bite from \$94.50 to \$120.

The tax on self-employed persons likewise goes up on Jan. 1, from 3 3/8 to 3 3/4 per cent, and the ceiling goes to \$4,800.

The higher taxes will affect 74,000,000 people.

Old Age and Survivors Insurance The 12,300,000 people who re-

ceive monthly old age survivors and disability benefits (OASI) will receive bigger checks, starting in February.

The increases will average about seven per cent.

Payments to retired workers aged 65 and over now range from \$30 to \$108.50. Under the new schedule, they will range from \$33 to \$118 a month. Benefits for eligible dependents and survivors also will be increased by the same percentage. For example, a retired worker and his wife, both over 65, will be eligible for a maximum monthly benefit of \$174 compared with the present \$162.90.

The increases in OASI checks will be made automatically. No one has to apply for them.

## Public Assistance

There are about 3,800,000 people who receive public assistance checks based on their need, regardless of whether they are covered by the Social Security insurance system. These benefits, sometimes called "welfare" or "relief" checks, go to the needy aged, the blind, disabled persons and dependent children.

Each state runs its own public assistance program, and fixes the amount of benefits to be paid. The federal government contributes part of the cost under a complicated formula.

The new amendments make three important changes in this program:

1. For the first time, federal contributions will be based in part on the relative wealth of the various states. The poster a state in per capita income, the larger the federal contribution.

2. About \$200,000,000 in additional federal funds will be pumped into the overall program.

3. The maximum payment in which the federal government will share is raised to \$65 a month for the aged, blind and disabled, and to an average of \$30 a month for dependent children.

While the states retain a wide discretion in managing their public assistance programs, experience indicates that most of them will raise their monthly checks by a few dollars each to pass along the additional federal money.

## Child Welfare

An extra \$15,000,000 will be distributed among the states to improve and expand child welfare services. For the first time, children in city slums and other urban areas will be eligible for federal-aided services on the same basis as rural children.

# Bikini Suit Inventor Designs Another

PARIS —(UPI)—The man who invented the bikini bathing suit and gave it its name, dimensions and the sport of girl-watching is at it again.

For anyone who likes midnight swimming, he has come up with a phosphorescent suit which floats. Advantage: it can be taken off, parked on the nearest wall, and easily found even in pitch darkness.

Or also there is one with tacks on the outside to ward off sea-going wolves.

"I'm always experimenting," said swimsuit designer Louis Reard with a dreamy, faraway

look in his eyes. "That's the way you make the big, new discoveries."

But for the mild-mannered Parisian, who at 63 is often called the "Bathing Suit King," the biggest success so far is certainly the bikini.

"I created and launched it in June 1946," he said.

"To present it, we picked a model named Bernardini. Her main occupation was dancing in the nude in night clubs."

"We chose her because of her perfect plastic qualities," he said. "When she displayed the bikini the first time she did a sort of striptease in which she took it off, folded it up and put it in a match box."

At the moment the bikini was launched, Reard said, France was heading into an explosion of joy and high living after the grim years of occupation and war.

"People were in the mood for new ways to amuse themselves and enjoy themselves," he said. "The bikini came out just at the right psychological moment."

The phosphorescent bathing suit, as Reard puts it, "swims by itself" because of tiny bits of cork in its seams. It is designed so that it can be peeled off quickly and easily in the water, Reard explained, and it is for girls who like to enjoy the freedom of a midnight swim with no bathing suit at all.

There are not, apparently, too many girls who seek such enjoyment. Reard confesses the suit has not been a tremendous success.

Reard said he tries out all kinds of eccentric bathing suits in his hunt for a first-class innovation. Here are some of the new ideas he has attempted without, alas, producing another "bikini" success:

—A bathing suit made of plywood strips. "It can be waxed," he said.

—A bathing suit of woven gold cloth. While worn it can be hooked up to a radio and used as an antenna.

—A bikini made of supple aluminum bands. "It shines brightly in the sunlight," he said.

—A bikini decorated with strips of formica plastic. "It also shines brightly in the sunlight."

—A bathing suit which has patches of specially treated fabric. When the fabric is damp, matches can be struck on it.

—A bathing suit covered with small squares of mirror glass. "You can look at yourself in your bathing suit."

# Canines Take Big Bites Out Of Owners' Purses

PHILADELPHIA —(UPI)— America is going to the dogs to the tune of a half-billion dollars a year.

That's how much it's costing us to let dogs lead a dog's life, said Harry Miller, one of the nation's leading canine connoisseurs and Director of the Gaines Dog Research Center.

Miller pegs the nation's pooch population at 23 million, which includes 113 recognized breeds, one-third of all there are.

"There's no recession in the dog industry," said Miller. "It's thriving, with 40 per cent of the nation's homes having one or more dogs. We figure the total gross last year, including sale of puppies, food, shows, medical expenses and otherwise, was well over \$200 million."

Biggest item, he explained, was \$325 million for dog food, the likes of which Mother Hubbard's Cupboard never imagined. There are canned foods, meal types, baked goods, frozen foods and special prescription foods. Then there are diets aimed at reducing obese dogs, those in aid the kidneys of aging dogs, other high protein diets for dogs who are under stress, and menus for just about every condition imaginable. Nervous dogs get tranquilizing drugs; listless ones get energy foods.

"For the most part," said Miller, "dogs are treated as members of the family. They get sick and old like humans, and they get medicine and hospitalization in the same manner."

Miller's book "Puppy and Dog Care" is a best seller among dog owners, and its proceeds go to the Cornell Research Laboratory for Diseases of Dogs. But there are as many varied publications on dogs as cross-breeds.

You can, for example, get a national listing of hotels and motels which do not discriminate against dogs if you're traveling. There's a pamphlet on dog names; there's one that tells you how to groom your dog, another on how to enjoy a dog show, another on how to record all his shots, treatments and visits to the veterinarian, a counterpart to the "Our Baby" book. It even has a space for the pooch's picture.

Dogdom, in brief, is enjoying a boom, said Miller.

"We know that two out of every five homes being set up will have a dog," he stated. "In a great many cases, the dog comes before the child. If the couple raises the dog right, chances are they'll do a pretty good job with the child."



**Letters Approved As Case Evidence**

BIRMINGHAM, England (UPI)—A U.S. Air Force court martial trying a master sergeant accused of fatally poisoning his wife today overruled defense objections that letters he wrote to a 24-year-old English woman contained "defamatory information."

The ruling came in the fifth day of the 14-member court's hearing on charges M. Sgt. Marcus Marsmont poisoned his 23-year-old wife, Mary Helen, last June.

Marsmont, a 37-year-old Hobbsville, N.C., Korean War veteran, has pleaded not guilty to both the murder charge and having sexual intercourse with a "woman not his wife."

Defense counsel Maj. William Karr objected that "further letters might contain certain matters which cannot be disregarded by the court relating to the adultery charge, despite the court's instructions."

Today's hearing saw distraught "other woman" Mrs. Cynthia Taylor, continue to read through and identify letters Marsmont sent her during their nearly two-year association.

**Fire Sweeps Home, Five Persons Die**

FAST NEW MARKET, Md. (UPI)—Five persons were killed last night in a fire which swept a frame house here.

The bodies of the other three victims were not recovered immediately from the wreckage. They were identified by state police as 65, and Nathaniel Cephas, 34.

**Vegetables Okay, Citrus Is Barred**

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (UPI)—The state Plant Board announced Thursday that all Florida fresh fruits and vegetables with the exception of citrus may now be exported to Jamaica.

The Jamaican government restricted movement of these items two years ago on the outbreak of the Mediterranean fruit fly in Florida.

**'Goose' Is Killed As Decoy Missile**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Air Force canceled today its program to develop the Goose, its long-range ground-to-air decoy missile.

It was the second Air Force missile program terminated in recent weeks. The Rascal air-to-surface missile was abandoned Nov. 29.

The Air Force said development and testing of the Goose had "progressed satisfactorily" but that the program was being dropped because of "changes in operational concepts."

The Goose, designed for use by the Strategic Air Command, is a light-weight, air-breathing missile intended to confuse enemy air defense systems. The Fairchild aircraft and missile division, Hagerstown, Md., was the prime contractor.

**Net Gain Reported By Minute Maid**

ORLANDO (UPI)—The Minute Maid Corp. has announced a net income of \$1,539,024 for the fiscal year ending Oct. 31, compared with a net loss of \$2,542,963 for the previous fiscal year.

President Jack Fox said the net gains amounted to \$2.85 per share on the company's 1,594,000 shares of outstanding stock. He also reported substantial improvements in inventories, debt structure and the firm's cash position for the past fiscal year.

## Little Guy Deserves Bit Of Praise, Too

With so many distinguished visitors in Sanford, it is easy to overlook "those who also serve."

At the Sanford Naval Air Station, all of the glory goes to the air crews competing for prizes in the sixth bombing derby. At the Mayfair Country Club, all eyes are on the "name" golfers in the tournament.

It takes more than just the flight crews to stage a successful bombing derby; more than just the top money-winners to have a successful golf tournament.

Plugging away to help make these big events successful are hundreds of "little" guys, all trying to do a job.

At the Naval Air Station, the ground crews, maintenance men and hundreds of others play a vital role in the operation.

At the Country Club, about 100 little-known golfers are battling for stardom, the one victory which would set them apart.

The American public likes celebrities. The American public also cheers for the underdog. That is why sports galleries on many occasions cheer for the "little" guy in his battle against a favorite.

"Names" make news. This, down through the ages, has been one of the basic fundamentals of newspaper reporting. It always will be so.

Galleries sometimes can be cruel, unintentionally, by ignoring the average participant. The guy who checks the plane for fuel probably is just as proud as the one who flies the plane. His job is just as important.

When the admirals and big sports figures step into the limelight, it might be well to remember that they once were "little" fellows, too. Today's "little" guy well could be the big star tomorrow.

It is fitting that the stars should be given the limelight. But, let's make them all welcome.

## Pension Probe Needed

The House Veterans Committee yesterday indicated that it plans to examine pensions of ex-servicemen. It is gratifying to know that the congressmen on this committee have decided to go to work.

Such an investigation is overdue, by some 10 years at least. Pensions are not to be confused with compensation. Pensions are for disability incurred in civil life and are payable only where the veteran passes a test of need. Compensation is paid to veterans with disabilities incurred in military service.

Committee Chairman Olin E. Teague of Texas said that investigation revealed one "needy" veteran drawing a pension had served four months in the military service. All of this was in the U. S. He has drawn pension checks totaling about \$4,800. During the remainder of his life, he could expect to draw about \$9,480 more.

At the same time, this veteran, not disabled in any way due to his military service, and his wife have a worth of about \$28,000. He and his wife have an annual income of \$2,348.

Rep. Teague reportedly is planning a bill to increase compensation to disabled veterans. At the same time, many "roll riders" will find themselves faced with the sad task of finding a job.

Disabled veterans should receive compensation. Every veteran who draws a pension should come under scrutiny. Taxpayers cannot afford "handouts" just because a man is a veteran. We now are a nation of veterans.

## Blizzard Prevents Search For Plane

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Tass news agency said today Soviet rescue planes were grounded by a blizzard while trying to fly to the rescue of a crashed Belgian plane in the Antarctic.

In Brussels, the headquarters of the Belgian Antarctic expedition, it was said the plane crashed and that both aerial and overland attempts to reach it were blocked by the storm.

## Washington Calling

BY WILLIAM S. WHITE

WASHINGTON—The Far West has a new leader in the Senate and in the highest foreign policy councils of the United States, Senator Mike Mansfield of Montana. Curiously, he has not sought out the honor; actually, it has come and tugged insistently at his sleeve.

Indeed, upon the life and times of Mike Mansfield there hangs a tale that might be called paradoxical. Nothing about him follows the familiar scripts. For he has come to great power almost against his will.

He has been returned to the Senate with the greatest victory at the polls scored by any Senator in a two-party state in the country. 75.3 percent of the total vote. This was a more decisive reelection score even than those of two much more publicized Senators — John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, 73.5 percent, and Stuart Symington of Missouri, 69.1 percent.

Any one of these figures may speak loudly of all.

Nevertheless, he has none of the characteristics commonly regarded as standard to politicians. He is very quiet and shy, rather than cheerfully aggressive. He is studious and even a little bookish, rather than hearty and backslapping. He speaks briefly and infrequently, rather than long and often.

Sometimes he is unsure about what ought to be done about major issues—and candidly says as much — instead of being absolutely and automatically positive with the answers.

In fact, he is a master politician, although, given all his background, he never should have been anything of the kind.

He does not really wish to run anything or anybody; to hold a seat in the Senate is enough for his ambitions. In the last Congress he lightly bore and rather apologetically used his influence as an assistant Democratic leader, a post that was pressed upon him in the first place. This time, however, he will have no choice but to use it more often and more openly.

For the West is the emerging force in the Senate and Mansfield is inevitably its spokesman. Moreover, the greatly enlarged Democratic majorities will provide more work and more problems for all the party hierarchy. Thus an added part of this general load must now fall upon Mansfield. So, too, will an increasing foreign policy responsibility on a man who is a "strong" member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

And the Mansfield who is a reluctant powerhouse has a parallel in the Mansfield who is an untypical Westerner. To conform to the stereotypes he ought to be almost exactly what he is not. He fits the pattern only in the physical sense. He is appropriately tall and bushy.

But he has no big hat, no Western drawl — and no interests that are exclusively Western. In no way does he suggest the wide open spaces and the great outdoors. Instead, he suggests the library — the college library at that.

He was born 56 years ago, not on any range but in New York City. His parents moved to Montana when he was three years old. As a boy he dug in the mines at Butte. It is a high, curiously cosmopolitan city where the great controlling copper corporations have long since adopted a philosophical attitude toward the necessity of having a Democrat — Mansfield — representing Montana in Washington.

He never went to high school; he simply read and studied in his own way until he was able to go directly to Montana State University. He took a Master's degree there and wound up bearing what is sometimes a fatal curse politically — he was a professor, no less, in Latin American and Far Eastern history.

He is the only member of the Senate, who has been a private, or the equivalent, in three of the armed forces — Army, Navy, Marines. As a Marine he served, in the 'twenties, in the Philippines, Siberia, Japan and China.

He began his career as an unqualified liberal but he has progressively moved into the center of the Democratic party. He is, in a word, one of the "moderates." And these, by all present signs, have inherited the balance of power in the Far West.

This brought traffic jams on the holy night, speechnic parades, the whistles of traffic cops, and even bigger Christmas trees, with more elaborate trimmings, including live ones.

The tree arrived this year aboard two flat cars in the Baltimore and Ohio yards. It was an Englemann spruce 99 feet tall and 19 years old, cut from the Kootenai National Forest near Libby, Mont., by the J. Neils Lumber Co. a division of the St. Regis Paper Co.

Sen. James E. Murray (D., Mont.) presented the tree at the Georgetown railroad yards; he said it was the first ever sent to the White House from the West.

## Herb Elliott Wins Sportsman Of Year

FRANKFURT (UPI)—Herb Elliott of Australia was named the sportsman of 1952 today by a panel of European sports editors from both sides of the "Iron Curtain."

The Aussie miller won the nod from the panel for two amazing feats—a 3.54 1/2 mile at Dublin's Santry Track on Aug. 6 and a 3:34 record for the 1,500 meter run at Gothenburg, Sweden, Aug. 28.

In the six years that the United Press International has been polling European experts on their sportsman of the year choice, it was the first time a European athlete did not win the title.

The poll also reflected Australia's emergence as a leading power in world sports, America's continuing as a producer of great champions, and Russia's sudden decline in sports.

Elliott, who captivated European sports enthusiasts not only for the records he set, but as well for the ease and mastery he showed in every race in which he competed, won in a landslide, being the pick of 39 of the 41 leading sports writers who participated in the poll.

Rafel Johnson, the world decathlon record holder from Kingsbury, Calif., was second in the balloting, getting nine first place votes for an even 600 points. Elliott had 723 points according to the point system used.

Australian swimmer Jon Konrad was third with four first and 391 points, followed by Brazil's world champion soccer team and Roger Riviere, a French cyclist.

The Russians, whose Vladimir Kuts won the sportsman's award in 1950 and 1951, finished out of the top 10 for the first time, winding up with an aggregate point total of 291 compared to the Aussie total of 1,317.

Duke's Blue Devils were hoping to pin the first defeat of the season on West Virginia, but they never got off the ground. A heavy snowfall forced cancellation of all flights in North Carolina and also caused postponement of the game. Officials are trying to re-schedule the contest tonight at Morgantown, W. Va.

At that, the Blue Devils didn't have half as much trouble as poor Florida State.

Forget jerseys  
Power failure caused by heavy snow in the Winston-Salem, N. C., area delayed the start of the Florida State-Wake Forest game for an hour, and when they finally got the lights on, Florida State players discovered they had left four of their jerseys on the plane which brought them to North Carolina.

What a mess! Wake Forest loaned Florida State its jerseys, necessitating a change every time a substitute entered the game. That's as far as the hospitality went, though, because Wake Forest went on to register a 73-61 victory with the aid of George Ritchie's 23-point performance.

Third-ranked Kentucky had no picnic with Southern Methodist. The Mustangs outshot the Wildcats from the floor and trailed only by 33-31 at intermission. Sophomore Bill Ray Lickett finally solved SMU's zone defense to score 23 points for Kentucky.

Xavier wasn't exactly any ball of fire, either, in handling Iowa's first loss after three straight victories. The Ohioans looked a bit sluggish during the first half but in the second half, Hank Stein, Joe Viviano and Rich Plontek proved too much for the losers. Although guarded closely, Stein poured in 17 points and Viviano added 16 in the nightcap of a doubleheader at Madison Square Garden.

**Suffer First Loss**  
New York University handed Boston College its first setback of the campaign in the opener, 81-70. Cal Ramsey and Tom Sanders sparked a rally that enabled the New Yorkers to snap a 28-all life and go ahead 42-32 at half-time.

Oklahoma overcame a five-point halftime deficit to defeat Minnesota, 32-25, at Minneapolis. Guard Ray Lewis led the Sooners with 18 points while Ron Johnson was high man for the Gophers with 17.

Loyola of Chicago beat Creighton, 67-51, on a late second-half surge led by Clarence Red. High scorer for Loyola was Tom (Buzzy) O'Connor with 20 points.

## Cannon Is Chosen 'Player Of Year'

NEW YORK (UPI) Billy Cannon, Junior triple-threat star who believes Louisiana State's national champions can post another perfect record next season, today was named college football's "Player of the Year" for 1952 in a nationwide poll conducted by United Press International.

The Tiger halfback, who previously was voted "Back of the Year," received the first-place votes of 85 of the 293 sports writers and broadcasters throughout the nation who took part in the balloting.

Pete Dawkins, Army's All-America halfback who was runner-up to Cannon in the voting for top backfield honors, once again finished second to the LSU flash with 64 first-place votes, followed by passing star, Randy Duncan of Iowa in third place with 38 and halfback Joe Kepp of

California a distant fourth with 18.

Center Bob Harrison of Oklahoma, who previously was voted "Linebacker of the Year," topped all linemen in the "Player of the Year" voting with 14 first-place votes. All told, 29 different players received mention in the balloting.

The latest honor for Cannon climaxed an amazing period of award-gathering for LSU and its key personnel. In addition to Cannon's two honors, Coach Paul Dietzel was named "Coach of the Year" in the annual poll conducted by the New York World Telegram and Sun and Scripps Howard Newspapers and LSU was voted the nation's No. 1 team by the UPI Board of Coaches.

Dietzel hailed the selection of Cannon as "Player of the Year," as "a wonderful tribute to Billy and his teammates who helped him achieve the honor."

Alabama, with a 2-1 season mark, goes against Louisville tonight.

Kentucky never did trail the Mustangs, although SMU had a better shooting average during the first half. Lickert, a promising sophomore, hit his stride for the first time this season. Sophomore Dick Parsons was second high in the Wildcat scoring with 19 points.

Georgia Tech also used two sophomores to get off to a head start in the three-game set it will play against Georgia this season. These were Roger Kaiser and Bob By Dew, who piled up the winning margin toward the end of the game.

Kaiser had 17 points and veteran Buddy Blenker 13 for the Engineers. Gordon Darragh and John Johnston had 17 and 16 respectively for the Bulldogs.

Dick Davies with 15 points was the key man in pulling LSU out of a hole against Louisiana College. The Tigers led 35-24 at the half but hit a slump midway the final half.

# Furgol Overcomes Handicap To Win

Lame-armed Ed Furgol, 1954 U. S. Open Champion, is an old hand at overcoming obstacles.

This experience may stand him in good stead in his 1958 comeback.

This 40-year-old native of New York Mills, N. Y., turned in a Jekyll-Hyde performance in 1957. After enjoying his best first five months ever, Ed faltered in the last seven months of the year.

After tying for 14th and winning \$500 in the Rubber City Open, Ed wasn't in a contending position in any other 1957 event. His best finish during the remainder of the year was fifth in the Spanish Open. His best U. S. showing in the latter half of 1957 was a tie for 20th place in the St. Paul Open.

Thanks to his fine start, Ed still placed well up among the 1957 money winners with a total take of more than \$17,000.

Ed started 1957 realizing he might swing himself right out of action. A torn triceps muscle in his good right arm, source of much of his power, threatened to sideline him every time he took a full cut. He didn't have the injury treated radically because he was playing well and in contention for a Ryder Cup team berth. An operation on the arm would have shelved him for two months.

Ed tore the muscle in 1954. "I felt as though I've lost from 10 to 20 per cent of the strength in my right arm," he relates. "The arm is weaker in cold weather because the muscle then contracts."

Furgol won his only 1957 title when he defeated big Al Besselink in a playoff for the Calliente Open crown in January.

Veteran of 18 years on the PGA tour, Furgol ran into more physical misfortune just before the '57 Aralea Open in Wilmington, N. C., when he hurt his right arm in an automobile crash. He still has a large bone chip on the elbow as a result of the collision. "Sometimes the elbow throbs like a toothache," says six-foot Ed, "but I'm not going to have it operated on because there's no assurance the operation would help."

Tough luck again literally tripped lean Ed up just before the Labatt Open in Montreal in 1957.

# U. S. To Deliver Missiles To Allies

PARIS (UPI)—The United States pushed ahead today with its plans to equip its European allies with intermediate range ballistic missiles despite the recent successful firing of the intercontinental missile Atlas.

# The meeting of the military leaders of the 15 NATO nations

was a prelude to the annual NATO foreign, defense and finance ministers conference opening here Tuesday.

# U.S. Defense Secretary Nell H. McElroy

was flying here from Rome, where he discussed U.S. Italian missile plans with Premier Fanfani and President Gronchi. One report said the first shipment of U. S. Jupiter intermediate range missiles was expected to arrive in Italy in the next few months.

Progress in getting the intermediate missile set up in Europe was slow, however. Only Britain and Italy have agreed to accept them and France still is negotiating over them.

Playing co-starring roles with Miss Day and Widmark are Gig Young, a detouring husband; and Gia Scala, as the social worker who operates above and beyond the call of duty. Elizabeth Fraser and Elizabeth Wilson repeat their original stage roles. Gene Kelly displays the same zip in directing as he does in acting in this, the first picture he has directed in which he does not appear.

There are two opportunities for Doris Day to sing in the production: a title song, "Have Lips, Will Kiss in the Tunnel of Love," and "Run Away, Skiddaddle Skiddoo." She and Richard Widmark offer a surprise in their new comedy roles as Augie and Isoldo Poole, a couple with a charming, re-converted barn in the suburbs but no baby in the bassinet.

To prove her worthiness, Isoldo even dons her Girl Guide uniform, while Augie throws caution to the winds in his attempts to pose as an acceptable father. # Collins Considers Interview Request

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Gov. LeRoy Collins today considered a request by the NAACP to interview Negro Frank Peterson before he goes on trial in Bonifay for the double axe slaying of a young share cropper and his two-year-old daughter.

NAACP Field Secretary Robert W. Saunders of Tampa said in a telegram that since Peterson has no family in Florida, something other than appointment of a court assigned attorney should be done in order to guarantee the Negro a completely unbiased trial.

Saunders added that no reflection was intended on Rep. A. P. Drummond, Bonifay attorney who was named to defend Peterson. But he said since Drummond was a local lawyer he might be handicapped by community sentiment.

"We ask that a lawyer or lawyers from the NAACP be allowed to interview Frank Peterson before he comes to trial," the telegram said.

Peterson, 27, is charged with the murders of Ira Gene Carnley and his daughter, Ernestine, last June. Okaloosa County Sheriff Itay Wilson said earlier this month that Peterson has admitted the two murders.

He will probably be tried during the early part of January.

# Smaller, Brighter Light Bulb Ready

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—General Electric announced today that it will put a smaller, brighter 100-watt household light bulb on the market next spring.

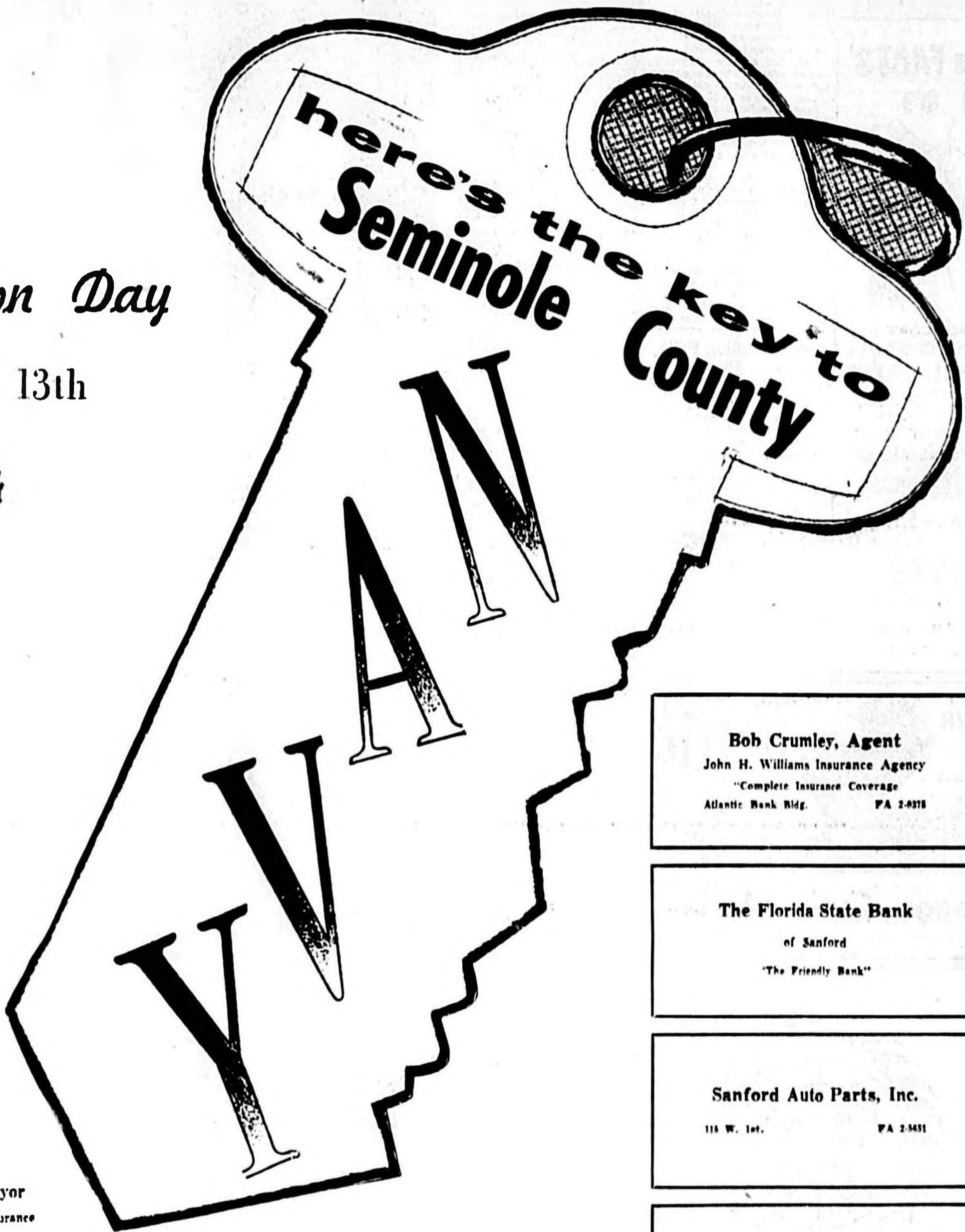

Some of the gadgets that sprout from fertile sales minds at this season are — as the Broadway set would say — real gassers.

Take, for instance the lucite cocktail stirrer with an electric bulb on the stirring end — for stirring cocktails in blackouts.

Despite the fact that practically nobody ever has occasion to stir cocktails in the dark, this thing sold right out shortly after it went on sale in a New York store.

The real stroke of genius in the liquor line, however, is not on the market yet because of tax and licensing difficulties. This is the portable martini, in the handy vest-pocket or handbag size, clothed in a transparent, sealed plastic envelope.

**Might Market It**  
The brainwave for thus packaging cocktails for portage between oases came from the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing

Co., which makes the polyester film that encloses the drink without imparting any flavor to it.

Liquor companies are said to be investigating the possibility of marketing the pocket cocktails (they're only being distributed to friends as gifts by the Minnesota company now). One difficulty in marketing is law requirement that a tax stamp must be destroyed on opening. At present, the bag can be scissored or hit ten open anywhere on its surface.

A holiday pitch thought up by one purveyor of spirits, Schenley by name, is a fancy Christmas-time vodka decanter aimed directly at deathbeds who stop by to cadge drinks. The base of the bottle is a metal bank with slots labeled "coins," "tips," and "L.O.U.'s." Attached is an automatic pencil and a pad of I.O.U. blanks.

Vicuna, a soft-touch fabric of growing reputation, apparently has zoomed to record popularity in Christmas buying. One store reports vicuna sales to be three times as high as they were in the 1957 Christmas season. Vicuna smoking jackets run as high as \$500; lounging robes, \$750.

One attractive item that has just been announced, though not necessarily as a Christmas gift idea, is a telephone with a built-in sanitizing system. According to the Danco Telephone Co., of New York, which developed the phone, an automatic radiation unit emits ultra-violet rays that kill bacteria and viruses within seconds after the mouthpiece is returned to its rest. It keeps the conversation clean.

## Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI) — When George Meany, head of AFL-CIO, talks about organized labor setting up its own political party it is appropriate to mark the date as an historic occasion.

That is appropriate because George Meany is a cautious, conservative individual who more than any other in the modern labor movement is heir to the caution and conservatism and the thinking of the late Samuel Gompers: his patriotism, as well.

Samuel Gompers might be the name of a race horse or of a movie magnate, long dead, so far as today's Americans are concerned. He was, however, the great man of the U.S. labor movement, a clear maker of trade who was born in England and who died Dec. 13, 1924, full of honors conferred by his adopted homeland.

Gompers was one of the founders of the AFL, and its president from that founding in 1880 until his death, except during the year 1905.

**British Socialism**  
Gompers was firmly against organized labor setting up its own political party although as an Englishman he must have been intimately aware of the political movement sparked by British labor in 1900 which is the powerful British Socialist Party of today.

Perhaps that was because Gompers also was acutely aware of what was happening inside the British party. The so-called conservative British laborites who founded a party 58 years ago had no suspicion, in their innocence, that they actually had contrived the political cradle of big-time British socialism.

Quick Rejection  
Ramsay MacDonald recommended in that interview that U.S. labor follow the British lead and create a political party of its own. The United Press New York news desk referred that London dispatch promptly to Sam Gompers for comment. With snap and vigor the old man repudiated the whole idea. No political party for him! Reward your friends and oppose your enemies, was Gompers' political creed.

Many weren't very enthusiastic this week about setting up a labor party. He said it would be done if labor could not otherwise gain its political objectives. The 2,812 listening delegates of the New York AFL-CIO convention, however, agreed the idea with boom-in-cheer.

Gompers wouldn't have been cheering had he been there. He watched labor go political in his native land and was not pleased. (Above form PMs Fri., Dec. 12

## Dove Symbol Of Battle, Not Of Peace

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — (UPI) — What will the Democrats do about the doves?  
This question threatens to make a long winter longer for California sportsmen and conservationists as they await the start of the Democrat-controlled state legislature in January.

The cause of their concern: A pending bill which would spare doves from hunters and place them on the list of protected songbirds in California.

The target of their concern: The Assembly Fish and Game Committee, which has had Assembly Bill 2307 in its nest for about 18 months.

Committee chairman Frank P. Belotti, a Republican from Eureka, estimates that he and his colleagues have received more than 15,000 dove letters.

The correspondence is about equally divided between conservationists, who warmly support the bill, and sportsmen, who violently oppose it.

A glance at the letters jamming file cases, boxes and closets in Belotti's office shows that both sides occasionally soar into flights of eloquence.

"Please help us to protect these symbols of peace and gentleness in a world where these qualities are rapidly diminishing," San Francisco woman wrote recently.

A Los Angeles sportsman disagreed: "The dove is not the most peaceful bird. It is the fiercest. Doves will move in on cities and cause more damage than pigeons are now doing."

Both factions make full, if inconsistent, reference to the Bible: "The Bible refers to doves 20 times for us to take a lesson in peace, gentleness and all that is beautiful in this troublesome world."

"The Bible does not make the dove a sacred bird. God put game on this earth to be taken by man. . . ."

Not is there agreement about the voice of the dove.  
"One of the most pleasant sounds I remember from my first year in California is the cooing of doves. . . ."

## Integration Story Tops Of Year, Editors Decide

NEW YORK (UPI) — The continuing struggle over the racial integration of schools was chosen by editors of United Press International today as the biggest news story of 1958.

They noted that the battle was waged all the way from the Supreme Court of the United States to remote hamlets in the South. Integration confronted the American people with one of the most acute sociological problems since the days of Reconstruction.

The other nine top stories picked by the editors:  
2. American and Russian probes into outer space, bringing within the range of possibility interplanetary travel by human beings.

3. The Democratic victory at the November polls, giving the party the biggest congressional majority since the high tide of the New Deal.

4. Anglo-American intervention in Lebanon and Jordan.  
5. The resignation of Sherman

Adams and the indictment of Bernard Goldfine on charges of contempt of Congress.

6. The death of Pope Pius XII and the election of John XXIII.

7. The economic upturn in the United States.

8. The Red government's consolidation of its rule over the Chinese mainland, and the bombardment of Quemoy. It was a year in which Peking appeared to have won equal status with Moscow in directing the strategy of world communism.

9. The Chicago school fire.  
10. The stabbing of Johnny Stumpano by Lana Turner's daughter.

Other stories that won prominent mention: The Berlin crisis; the cruise of the Nautilus under the North Pole; DeGaulle's rise to power; the railroad disaster at Newark, N.J.; Pasternak rejects the Nobel Prize; Alaska wins statehood; the Springfield, N.S. mine disaster; plane collision over Nevada kills 49; death of Mike Todd in an airplane crash.

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# New Changes In Social Security Law

(Following is the second of two dispatches telling about forthcoming changes in the Social Security law.)

WASHINGTON —(UPI)— There are about 400,000 people in the U. S. who are newly eligible for Social Security payments. The Social Security Administration is trying to locate them to advise them of their rights. They won't get the money unless they file claims.

You, or someone you know, may be one of them.

Their right to benefits stems from a series of amendments to the Social Security law which Congress enacted at its recent session. Here are the principal groups affected:

**Disabled Workers and Families**  
Since 1957, disabled workers who are covered by the Old Age and Survivors Insurance (OASDI) program have been able to collect, beginning at age 50, the same monthly benefits they would have gotten had they retired at age 65. About 200,000 disabled workers are drawing these benefits.

Now, for the first time, their dependents also are eligible for benefits—on the same basis as dependents of retired workers. There are about 180,000 of them. But they must file applications at local social security offices.

Also, thousands of disabled workers, who were previously turned down as now eligible for insurance benefits. The law used to contain two requirements for eligibility. First, the worker needed to have Social Security credit for at least five out of the ten years before he became disabled. And second, he had to show that he had been working at a job covered by Social Security for at least one and a half out of the last three years before he became disabled.

The second of these requirements has been abolished. Any disabled worker who was turned down because of it should immediately file a new application.

**Aged Parents**  
The new legislation liberalizes the conditions under which survivors' benefits are payable to parents who were dependent on a worker covered by Social Security. Previously dependent parents were not eligible for benefits if the deceased worker also was survived by a spouse or child.

Now dependent parents who survive an insured worker are entitled to benefits regardless of whether other members of the worker's family are drawing survivor's checks.

There are about 80,000 such dependent parents. Social Security is having a very hard time locating them. They must file applications to get their checks.

**Adopted Children**  
Under the old law, a child must have been adopted at least three years before an insured worker died in order to be counted in figuring the family's survivor's benefits. That restriction has now been eliminated. An adopted child counts like any other child, regardless of the time of adoption.

**Disabled Children**  
In the past, disabled children over 18 years of age qualified for benefits as dependents only if it was shown they had been receiving at least half of their support from a retired or deceased parent who was covered by Social Security insurance. # 25 Years Later, His Dream Is Nearer

MEMPHIS, Tenn. —(UPI)—It took 25 years of scrimping and an understanding wife for Dr. Darwin Rannels to realize his dream. But he never thought of turning back.

"I've always had a yearning for medicine, even in high school," said the 44-year-old "student" doctor and father of two.

Next September, Rannels will finish the three years of residency training required for certification as a specialist.

Then he will be ready to begin practice, as an obstetrician. Dr. Rannels has been "getting education as financial means permitted," and he's the first to admit that "I wouldn't have been possible without my wife."

"We did it together," he said. A University of Tennessee graduate in home economics, Mrs. Rannels did everything from running a student rooming house to teaching school to help foot her husband's college bills.

When Rannels finished high school in Lancaster County, Pa. in 1931, he began working as a day laborer for a farm contractor. Three years later, he got a job as an attendant at the Masonic Homes Hospital at Elizabethton, Pa.

"Ever since I got into hospital work I have desired nothing but bedside medicine—that is, working with the patient," he said.

In 1936, Rannels entered the School of Nursing for Men of Pennsylvania Hospital and after graduation became a registered graduate male nurse.

During World War II, he served as a chief pharmacist male in the Navy, spending three months in the Panama Canal Zone and aboard a destroyer escort in the South Pacific.

With his mustering out pay, he enrolled at Temple University and then went on to graduate from Jefferson Medical College.

Now, after serving out his one-year internship and two years of residency training, the end is in sight for Dr. Rannels.

"I have an older brother, Harman, who has been practicing obstetrics since 1941, he said. "I guess that influenced me somewhat."

Despite the long struggle, Dr. Rannels has never thought of turning back from his goal.

"My long medical experience made me determined to specialize," he said. "I simply held onto that determination."

# Walk Softly, But Carry Lead Pencil

NEW YORK —(UPI)—An official of the Lead Pencil Manufacturers Association is out to identify Theodore Roosevelt as closely with lead pencils as George Washington ever was with cherry trees or Abraham Lincoln with log cabins.

"T. R.'s prolific use of lead pencils was so widely recognized," according to Clyde Nissen, executive vice president of the association, that during his inauguration in 1903, the presidential reception committee wore white silk ribbons to which were fastened slender, elegant three-inch lead pencils, each crowned with a gold-plated cap and beautifully coated with white lacquer.

Nissen pointed out that a lead pencil is even on exhibit at the Theodore Roosevelt Museum in New York. It was the pencil T. R. used in 1914 to scrawl what he thought would be his last message while seriously ill with jungle fever in Brazil.

Among "historic documents drafted in pencil" by the 26th President and "preserved for posterity," Nissen added, was his address in 1910 to the Nobel Prize Committee.

## Troops To Invade If West Attempts To Break Blockade

BERLIN (UPI)—East German Communist Party Boss Walter Ulbricht hinted today that Red troops would invade West Germany if any attempt is made by the West to break a Berlin blockade.

He made the statement in an East Berlin speech as the East German Communist newspaper "Young World" was warning that a single shot fired in defense of Western troops in West Berlin could start world war.

Ulbricht said today "every attack on the German Democratic Republic (East Germany) will be turned into a devastating defeat west of the Elbe and Werra rivers"—the rivers between East and West Germany.

Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev declared last week that any Western military move against East German blockade measures would be considered an attack on East Germany and that the Soviet and other Warsaw Pact allies would fight back.

In that context, Ulbricht's blast today was the most serious threat since Khrushchev launched his get-out-of-Berlin campaign in Moscow on Nov. 10.

Ulbricht, head of the Communist Party and deputy premier, made his threats to speak on his return from a six-day official visit to Poland.

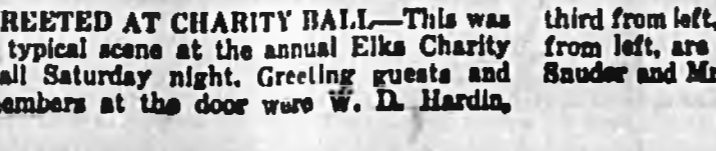
