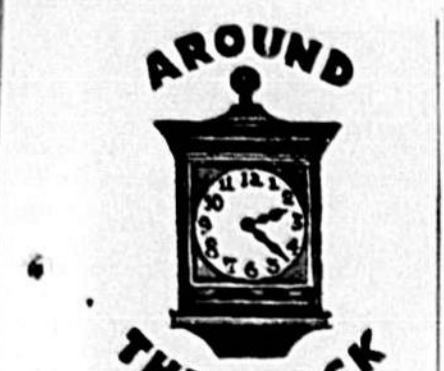

Court Action Threatened Over Sanford 'Dump' Plan

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The angry dozens of residents of Upsala and Vihlen Roads didn't ask, they "demanded" the board take immediate action to "stop Sanford from invading the Upsala county" and creating another garbage dump.

City Manager W. E. Knowles appeared before the board early this afternoon and in dictations are the county and city will work out a mutual agreement for Sanford to use the Upsala County dump on a permanent basis.

For nearly an hour the complaints were heard, with John Fitzpatrick, district commissioner of the area, pleading with the group. "Please, give us an opportunity to do something about this. If you will be patient, we will take action this morning."

Robert Brown, zoning director and Val Roberts, county sanitarian, were called in to give reports. Brown reported the land where Sanford is creating the dump is owned agricultural and sanitary land or use as a dump is not permitted.

The board immediately ordered Brown to contact the city to cease operation on the sanitary landfill until the matter is properly brought before the Board of Adjustment.

Robbins was instructed to investigate and study the problem and come up with a recommendation.

The residents reported the city is opening a "new dump on property belonging to John Higginbotham. He wants them to fill his low land in so he'll have more improved pastures."

Mrs. Carl McWhorter said she and Mrs. McWhorter own the land where Sanford is creating the dump. "I have mess up and down Upsala and Vihlen Roads now from people going to the county dump. We don't want another dump there," Mrs. McWhorter remarked.

Mrs. H. E. Starnes stated, "I pioneered in the Upsala area. I fought for the road, a mail route and a school bus for the children. I am a citizen, resident and taxpayer. I'm not asking you to stop this dump. I'm demanding you stop it. Tell Sanford to keep out of the county. I moved to the country for fresh air and I am going to have it. We have enough dead dogs, cats and trash now, without another dump."

Carl McWhorter advised the residents of the area were prepared to go to court and seek an injunction to stop Sanford if necessary. "We do not want another dump," he said.

Seminole County school teachers might quit as a last resort if the legislature doesn't find more money for education, a spokesman told The Herald today.

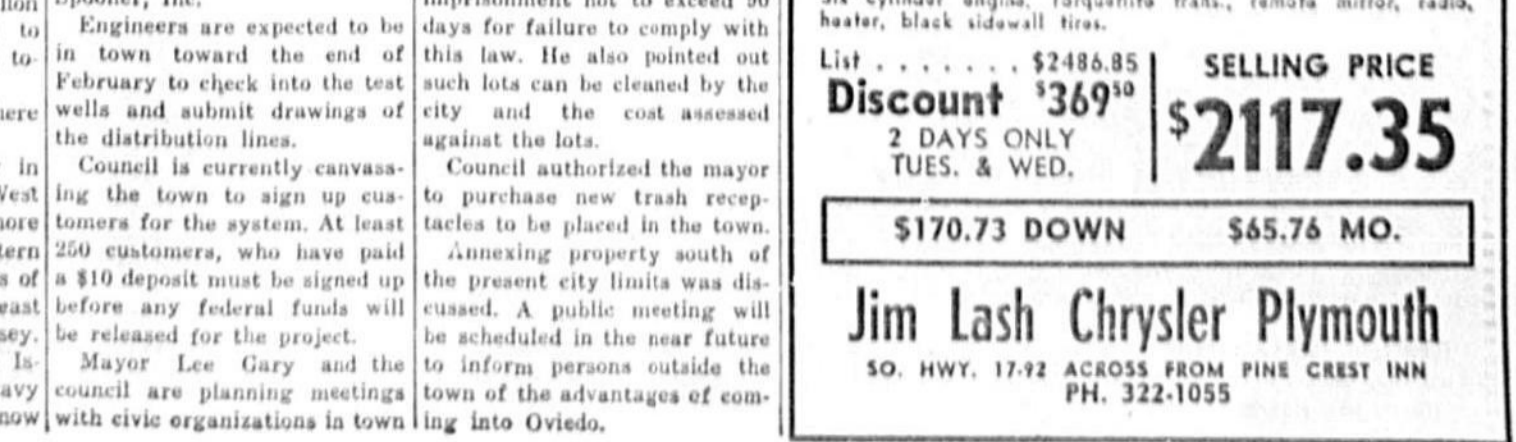
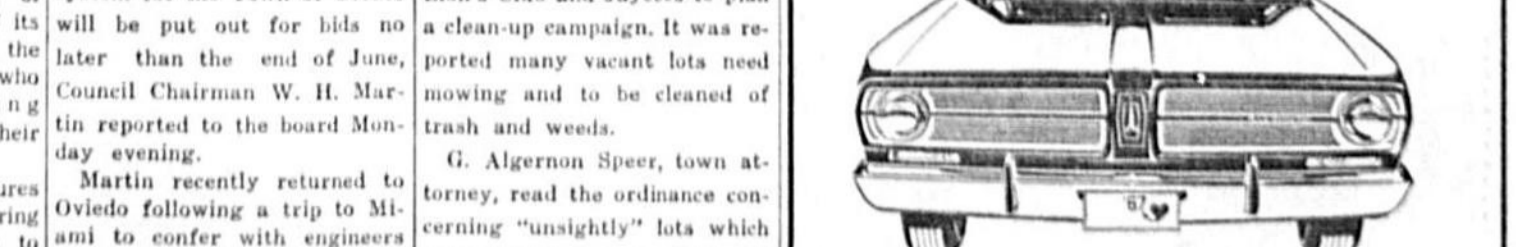
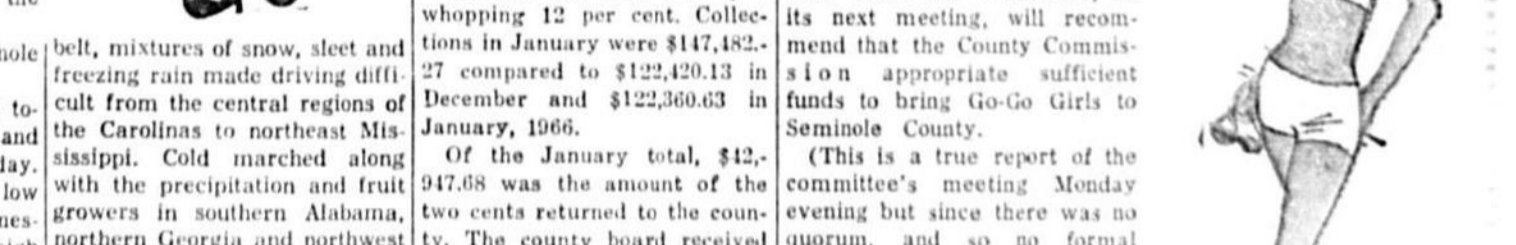
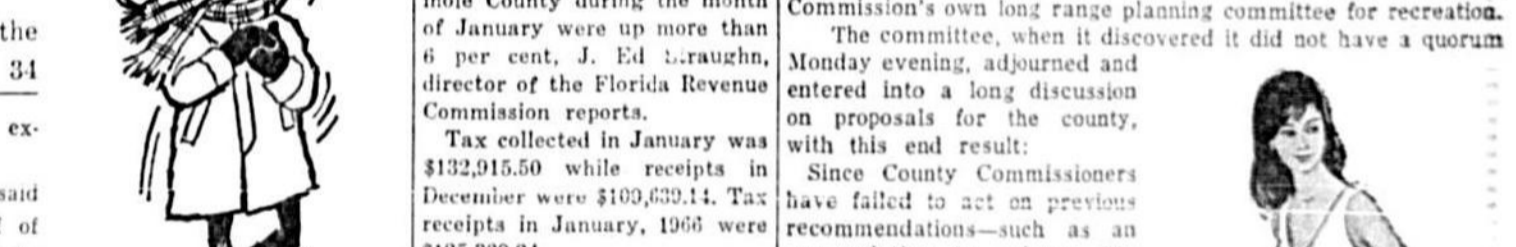
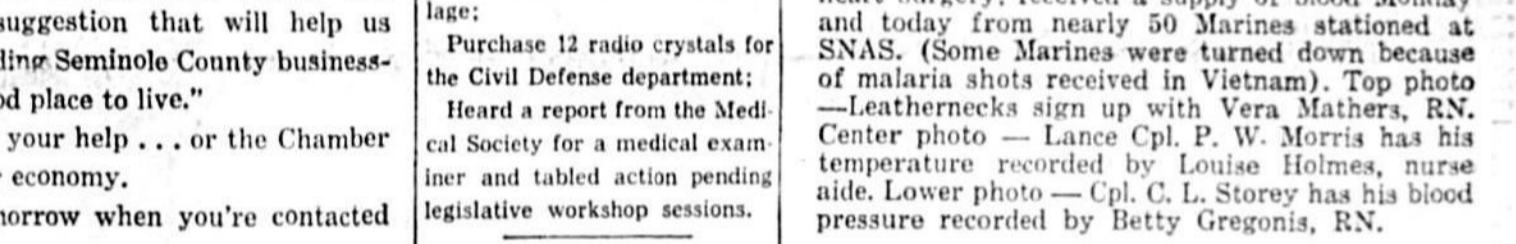
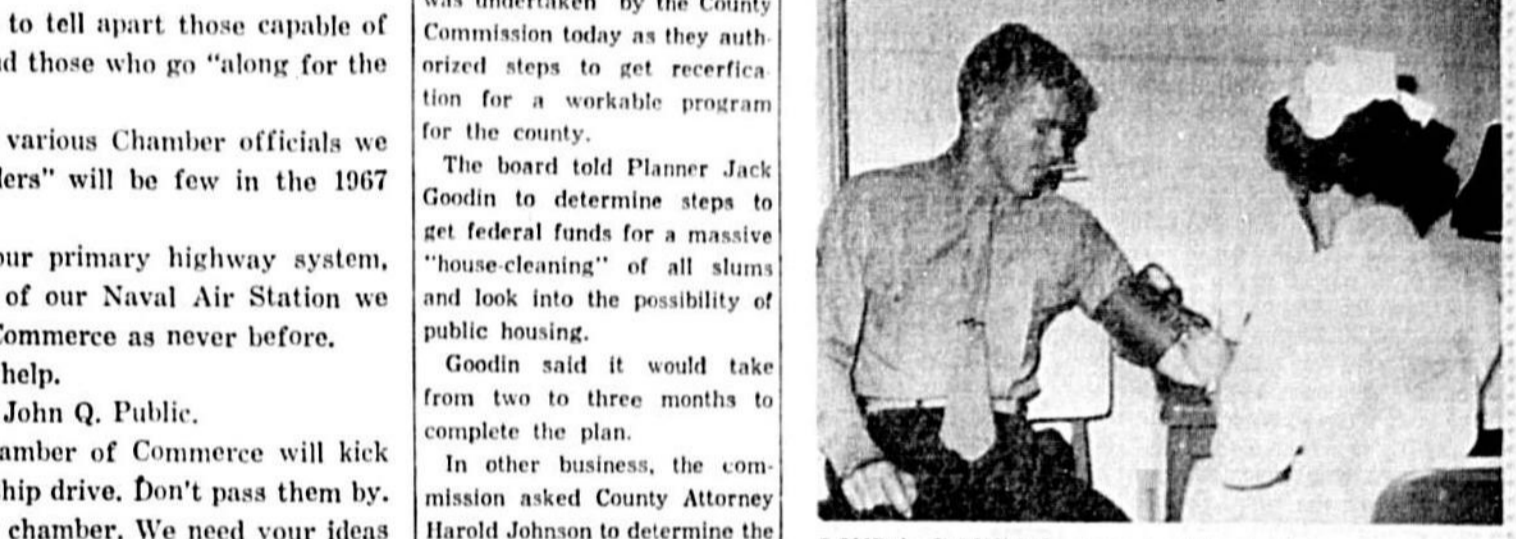
The spokesman, who asked his name not to be used, indicated that resignations would come on an individual basis. At the same time, George P. Dabbs, of Altamonte Springs, president of the Florida Education Association on political interference in Florida education, and rejected, the idea of obtaining updated letters of resignation from Florida teachers, to be handed to school officials if necessary.

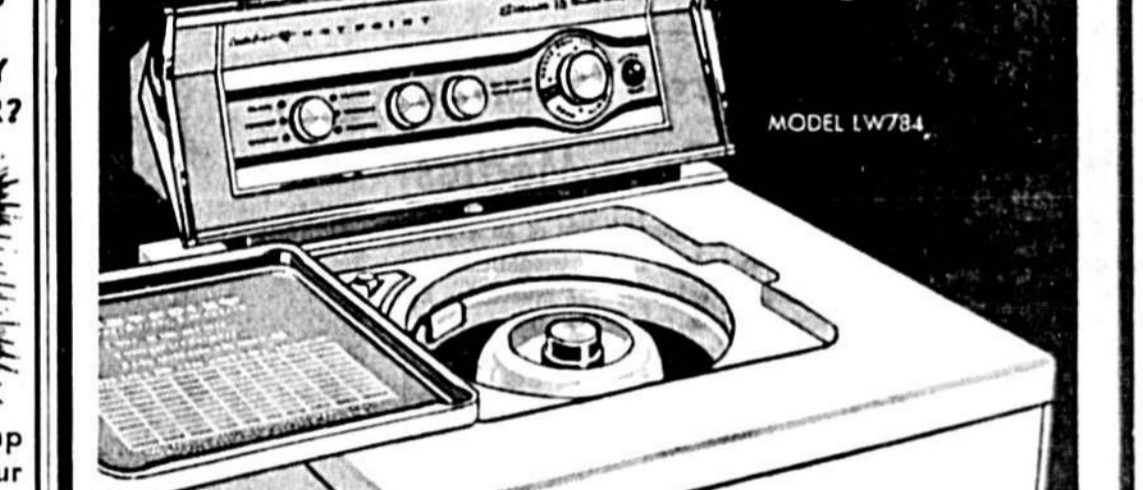

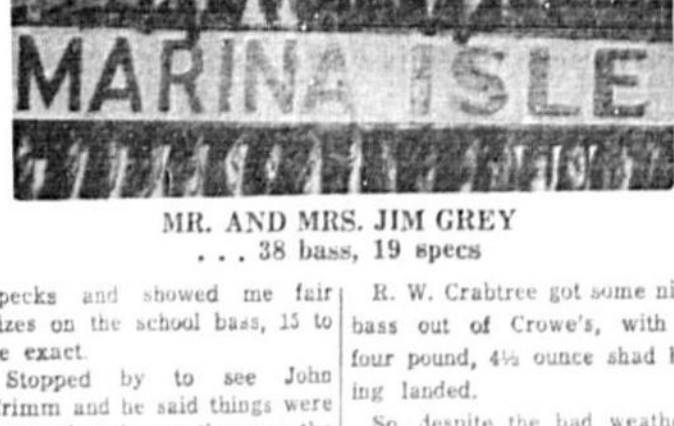

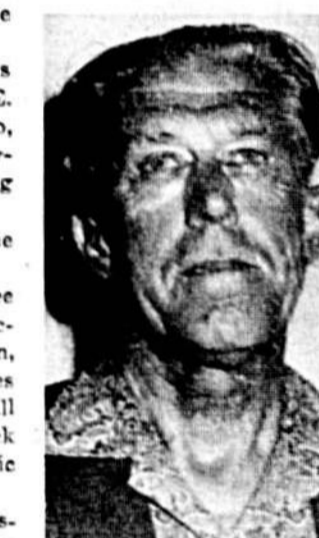
