In New York Wednesday, cabbage prices were alightly higher with crates selling at 2.50-3.00, mostly 2.75. Crates of red type were 2.50-3.00, and Savoy 2.50-2.75, Carrots in crates of 48 1 lb. film bags were 8.90-3.25, unchanged from yesterday's quote, Celery was dull, crates of 2 doz. selling for 3.00-3.25, 21% to 3 dozen 3.00-3.50 and 4 dozen 3.25-3.50, Crates of 18 film wrapped celery hearts were 3.50-3.75. Chinese cabbage was steady at 2.00-2.50 for erates of unwrapped heads, and 2.50-2.75 for wrapped. Endive was steady at 1.75-2.00 and Escarole brought 1,50-1.75, few 2.00. Romains was also steady at 2.25-2.50 per crate. Crates of curly parsley, small and mostly in fair condition, sold for 2.00-2.50. Bushel bankets of spinsch were steady in price at 2.25-2.50 and collards were 1.75. Radishes were steady at 1.00-1.25 per basket of 30 - 6 os. film bags and water cress was slightly weaker at 13-15 cents per bunch.

In Central Florida Tuesday, the market was steady for practically all commodities except iceberg lettuce, which was slightly higher at 3.00 per crate of 24 heads, and romaine, which was lower at 1.25-1.50. Cabbage sold for 1.50 m crate and 1.25 for 50 lb. sacks, with some sacks of smaller sizes and poorer quality at 1.00. Carrota were 2.10 for mesh sacks of 48 - 1 lb film bags, and Chinese cabbage was 1.40 per crate. Cauliflower brought 2.25 for cartone of 12 medium to large heads, endive was 1.25 per crate, and escarole was 86 cents. Curly paraloy was 2.00 per crate of 5 dozen bunches. Bushel baskets of mustard and turnip tops were 1.25 and spinach was 1.50. Radishes were 75 cents per basket. Shipments from Florida Tuesday included: Celery rail 33 truck 57; cabbage rail 6, truck 136; Escarole rail 2, truck 25; lettuce rail none, truck 10 and radishes rail none, truck 18.

### Big Responsibility

When a reader hasn't the time to write a letter to the editor he sometimes does the next best thing: call by phone to discuss editorial com-

Such was the case of a reader who has commented on the recent reminders to parents concerning egg throwing, vandalism by youths, improper and doubtfully correct diets for teenagers, and fourteen-yearolds operating motor scooters when not required to pass a driving test. It does seem parents get a great deal of criticism and one could ask how much of a teenager's activities can be called the parents' responsi-

It isn't a new question. It seems the finest Book ever written refers to bending the twig to shape the tree and raising a child in the way he should go.

But it is true, also, that in today's modern society the teenager is extended many privileges formerly reserved for older persons. . . so in accepting the privilege the youth must accept his own responsibility.

### Where Is Moral Code?

Nobody really questions that a loss of freedom anywhere, however small, diminishes freedom everywhere.

Yet not much is said about the idea that the same thought should apply in the realm of individual, national and world morality.

At none of these levels is observance of the moral code ever even remotely close to perfect, and no practical person expects that,

But it is always fair to demand that the tenets of the code-at whatever level-be constantly reasserted, and that departures from such principles be noted and protested.

Where, then, are the indignant ones today?

When New York's Rep. Adam Clayton Powell sought recently to answer charges that he had abused congressional privilege in a variety of of ways, his defense was simply that he was only one of many who do the same things.

Undoubtedly there are more than a few who think such an answer is both clever and sensible. What he anid is true, isn't it?

Very likely it is. But is that the kind of reply which ought to satisfy a nation concerned for its moral character? If not, where is the indignation?

The logic of Powell's argument is that one transgression justifies another. Carried to its limits, that suggests that anything goes so long as somebody else is doing it.

The end product of such thinking is the destruction of the moral code. An individual or a society which seeks to rationalize immorality has no

morality. A people sliently watching transgression may well lose all capacity for protest. The young who note this silence are quick to perceive its meaning, "Everybody's doing it" is a powerful teen-age weapon against parents who never wax indignant over the adult world's lapses.

And where is the lesson against stealing for children in homes cluttered with ash trays, lamps and other objects lifted "sportingly" from

You can't sell morality to children if you do not practice it-and preach it widely. You can't teach self-control in a home or a society

that exalts self-indulgence. The same goes for countries and their leaders.

In his troubles with Red China, we offer India's Nehru help now not because he is a moral man who has been morally wronged by an aggressor, but because it is in the practical interest of world freedom to do so.

If Nehru had any pretensions as a moral leader, he aubverted them when he could find no words of protest in 1956 against Russia's repres-

sion of Hungary. Where was the wrath of the pious, self-serving Africans when Khrushchev resumed nuclear testing on his own? Their indignation appears curionely selective. They reserve it for

Morality is a whole cloth. "Practical" men inevitably labor to cut it up. But if we are to have human dignity, we must-at the minimumhave other men who try to stay the
