Murder . . And Honor

There has been no lack of arrests in the past in cases of assault and murder arising out of the South's civil rights struggles. This happened swiftly following the beating of three ministers in Selma, Ala., one

of whom later died. What would be different would be a conviction and appropriate punishment following a fair trial prov-ing the guilt of those responsible. This, more than anything else, would go far toward restoring the confidence of the nation in the desire and ability of the South to solve its own problems legally, morally, responsibly and reasonably.

It has nothing to do with the specific events that brought these men to this troubled town. It is not a question of one race against another, of one section of the country conflicting with another, of one set of beliefs in opposition to another.

It is a matter of simple honorsomething to which southerners have always asserted a strong claim.

Substantial 'If' Remains

For the first time, man himself has swum in "the new ocean."
When Lt. Col. Alexei Leonov left

his capsule to float beside it in orbit, he got as close to space as any hu-man being can—and live. All that separated him from immediate death in that hostile environment was a thin envelope of air and warmth. For 10 minutes his life-sustaining space-

suit was, in effect, his spaceship.

Coming as it did just before the first manned Gemini shot, the Russian feat—only the latest in what is now a long line—has stolen some thunder from this country's first multimanned capsule launching.

But only a little. Leonov's stroll into space was not a technological breakthrough but merely a logical advance based on a capability that already existed—something like the Wright brothers making the first turn in the air after achieving straight-ahead flight.

The Russian accomplishment is not to be minimized of course. An American astronaut is not scheduled to leave the shelter of his ship until the fifth Gemini sometime in 1966, so the USSR is still at least that far ahead

In beating a pathway to the moon, however, this country's series of Ranger probes, and the unmanned Surveyor landings that will come later, will have contributed as much fundamental, necessary knowledge as

any space spectacular.

If the Russians do get to the moon first, this may be some consolation. Right now, experts say, the "if" remains pretty substantial, despite Leonov's whittling it down a chunk.


