Longwood Hit By Annexation And Tax Snafu

Two of the most valuable pieces of property in Longwood are not legally a part of the city, it was learned today.

The Longwood Plaza property and a tract of land which includes the Winn-Dixie Food Store along Highway 17-92 will have to be annexed all over again.

Special legislation has been prepared and will be introduced in the current session of the Florida Legislature to re-annex the property.

The two tracts of land were first annexed to the city Oct. 22, 1963.

City Attorney Webber B. Haines said today that the act under which the annexation took place was "invalid" and it would all have to be done over again.

The city has been collecting taxes on the land and the buildings subsequently built on it since 1963.

The legal status of the tax collections is in doubt.

In addition to Winn-Dixie there are eight or nine business establishments in Longwood Plaza effected by the annexation.

Marines Unload Big Howitzers

More Troops Due In Line With Buildup

SAIGON (UPI) — U. S. Marines today began unloading a shipment of big guns in Da Nang—including a platoon of eight-inch howitzers, the biggest artillery pieces ever brought to South Viet Nam by any force.

A military spokesman said the Marines did not have nuclear war heads for the weapons, but they were capable of hurling such projectiles up to 14 miles.

The eight-inch howitzers, a battery of 165 mm. howitzers and other heavy equipment were unloaded at the main docks in the center of Da Nang 350 miles north of Saigon. The arrival was in line with the continual buildup of the 9th Marine Expeditionary Brigade at Da Nang.

MORE MARINES DUE

Another battalion of ground combat Marines is scheduled to arrive this week to join the brigade, which is charged with the protection of Da Nang air base.

The eight-inch howitzers arrived at a time when the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas were reported building up for a major offensive.

American intelligence sources said they had "proof positive" that North Viet Nam has laboriously transported a significant amount of artillery into South Viet Nam over the Ho Chi Minh Trail.

The air war against the Communists continued. A spokesman reported that eight B57 bombers made air strikes against Viet Cong positions in South Viet Nam this morning. He said no raids were made against North Viet Nam.

Voting Laws Face Changes

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — State legislators returned to the capitol today for their second week of the 1965 session with proposals for some sweeping changes in Florida's election laws expected in the House.

Introduction of bills was expected to pick up sharply this week, especially in the heavily-populated lower chamber.

Included in the proposals was a big package of election laws, promised to the House today or Tuesday by Rep. George Stallings, of Duval. Stallings is head of the Legislature's interim committee on elections.

One of the bills in the elections change package would permit a candidate to vote for at least one candidate of an opposing party without violating his election oath.

The present election oath calls for a candidate to vote for 90 per cent of his party's proposed candidates in his county. Thus, a candidate is now forced to vote the straight party ticket if there are less than 10 opposed candidates from his party on the ballot.

Another bill in the election package would waive the present one-year residency requirement for new Floridians to vote in presidential elections. They would have only

\$1.3 Billion Education Bill Signed By LBJ

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (UPI) — President Johnson Sunday signed into law a sweeping \$1.3 billion education bill designed to be a double-pronged attack on both the problems of educational deficiency and poverty.

The President said the bill would help "bridge the gap between helplessness and hope for more than five million educationally deprived children."

Johnson signed the bill at the rural school where he first learned the three Rs.

Watching the President sign the bill was his first teacher, Mrs. Kate Deardrich Loney, 72, of Rough and Ready, Calif. She was given the pen that the President used in signing the bill.

The President said with the new legislation "we put into the hands of our youth more than 30 million new books—and into many schools their first libraries. We reduce the terrible time lag in bringing new teaching techniques into the nation's classrooms."

When Johnson signed the historic school aid program, he brought into being three new federal education assistance programs.

They are:

- \$1.08 billion to improve the schooling of about 5.3 million children from poor families.
- \$100 million to buy library and textbooks for the use of students and teachers in both public and non-public schools.
- \$400 million to encourage "shared time" education projects developed by public, private and parochial educators at the local level.

Loss Runs In Millions

CHICAGO (UPI) — The death toll soared past 200 today in the wake of a barrage of tornadoes that smashed through six Midwest states from Iowa to Ohio. Rescue workers groped through mounds of rubble for more victims.

The twisters slammed from the dark spring sky Sunday afternoon and Sunday night. They left a trail of tragedy. More than 1,000 persons were injured and property damage ran into untold millions of dollars.

Bodies were still being brought out of the shambles today.

Indiana was hardest hit with at least 100 dead in the state's worst disaster on record. Ohio caught the tail end of the storm and authorities there counted at least 64 dead. There were 34 dead in Michigan, seven in Illinois and three in Wisconsin for an overall death count of 208.

SURVEY DESTRUCTION

Two of the hardest-hit areas were west of Toledo, Ohio, where at least 50 persons perished, and in a trailer camp at Dunlap, Ind., where the same number were killed.

The storm took at least 18 lives at Lebanon, Ind., and at least 17 in Lorain County west of Cleveland.

Indiana Gov. Roger Branigan declared the stricken area of his state—a broad band stretching from near Indianapolis, the Hoosier capital to the Michigan line—to be a disaster area. An aerial armada of 18 planes took off at dawn to survey the destruction.

Authorities urged rural residents in need of help to lay out white sheets in the form of a cross.

HOSPITALS FILLED

Hospitals throughout the battered areas in Michigan, Indiana and Ohio were filled today with injured. Makeshift morgues were set up in some towns for the dead. Homeless families filled high schools, churches and National Guard armories.

The twisters knocked down homes, stores, barns and trees. They left streets in many towns deep with rubble and debris. National Guardsmen were called out to patrol some areas where there was a possibility of looting.

Civil defense workers, policemen and volunteers set up flood lights and lifted through shattered buildings all night long in search of the dead and injured.

Indiana reported parts of 40 counties were without electrical power because of the storm.

Lakefront Move To Be Studied

The commission has been asked to join the Southern Bell Telephone Company in a request to repeal the federal excise tax on communication services and also to join the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce in petitioning the Florida Public Utilities Commission for a county-wide telephone service.

Prior to the regular commission meeting, officials will meet at 7 p. m. at the new Pinehurst Park at Chase Avenue where Acting Mayor A. L. Wilson will throw out the first ball in a kick-off Babe Ruth League game between Civitan and Rotary teams. The park will be dedicated. The public is invited to attend the ceremonies and the following game. (See Page 8 for picture and additional story.)

Two Presbyterian ministers of Sanford have been elected by the Presbytery of St. Johns as commissioners to the Presbyterian (U.S.) General Assembly, meeting at Montreat, N. C., April 20-28.

Rev. Grover C. Sewell Jr. and Rev. Thomas H. Makin, pastors of First Church and Church of the Covenant, will be among some 400 ministerial and ruling elder members who will meet in the highest court of the denomination to consider various overtures and other reports coming up from the presbyteries and synods.

Among the controversial items will be the relationship to the National Council of Churches and proposals for uniting with other Reformed and Presbyterian bodies.

'War On Poverty' Doing Good Job

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sargent Shriver told Congress today the "war on poverty" was doing its job and should be given twice as much money to continue in its second year.

Shriver, director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, appeared before a special House education and labor subcommittee to support President Johnson's request for a twofold increase in agency's spending authority. The request would total \$1.5 billion for the year starting July 1.

JERUSALEM (UPI) — The holy places of divided Jerusalem today attracted thousands of pilgrims from around the world.

By a rare coincidence of the calendar, the Christian Holy Week falls at the same time as the Jewish Passover and the Muslim feast of El Adhw.

Good Friday — one of the holiest of Christian days — will be celebrated this week on the same day that Jews begin their annual Passover observance marking the exodus of the Israelites from Egypt.

In Vatican City Sunday, Pope Paul VI opened Holy Week on a somber note. He said current world conditions shake his faith in the ability of man to prevent war.

Thousands of worshippers walked in a Palm Sunday procession in Jordan's old city of Jerusalem, carrying palm branches along the route once followed by Jesus. The ceremony commemorates Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem before his crucifixion.

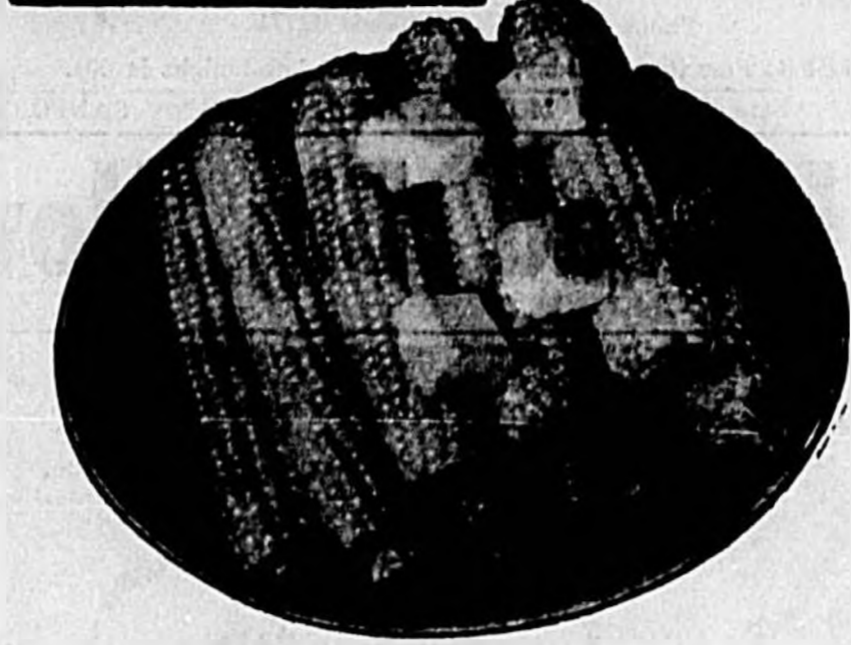

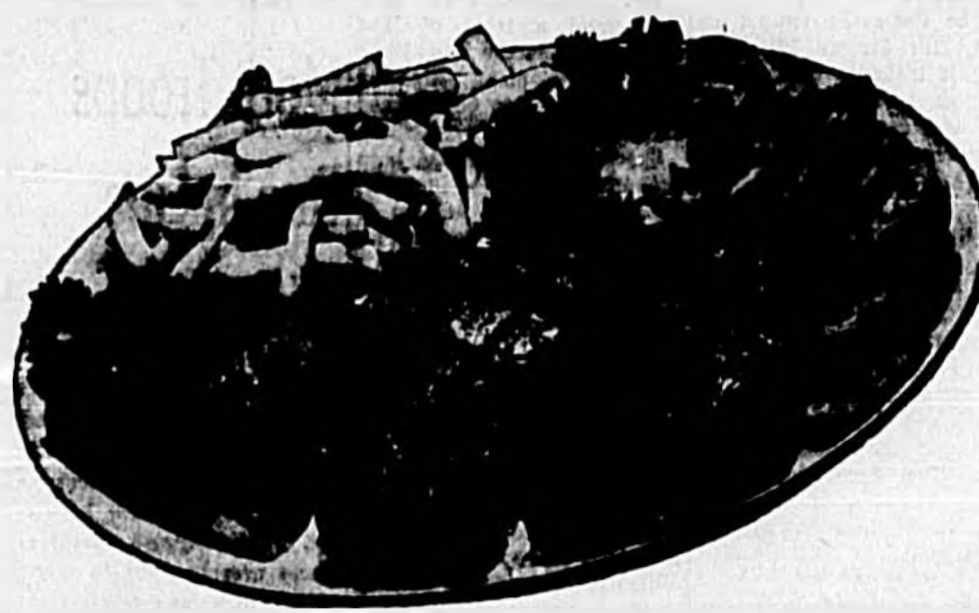

Polaris 'Father' Now No. 1 Spy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Retired Vice Adm. William F. Raborn Jr., a Navy missileman known as the "father of the Polaris," is the nation's new master spy—succeeding John A. McCone as director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA).

President Johnson announced the appointment of the 60-year-old Raborn Sunday at his Texas ranch.

At the same time, he named Richard McGarrah Helms, now CIA director of plans, as the agency's deputy director and thus No. 2 man to Raborn.

The President said he did not know when the appointments would take effect or when he would send Raborn's nomination to the Senate for confirmation. "I assume it will be at an early date," he said.

It has been known for some time that McCone, a 63-year-old California industrialist, was anxious to retire from the CIA post.

McCone, a Republican, was appointed by the late President John F. Kennedy to succeed Allen W. Dulles as CIA chief. Prior to that, he served during the Eisenhower administration as chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC).

Raborn, a native of Decatur, Tex., and a 1928 graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy, is now vice president for project management of Aerojet General Corporation at Pasadena, Calif. He retired from the Navy about 18 months ago.

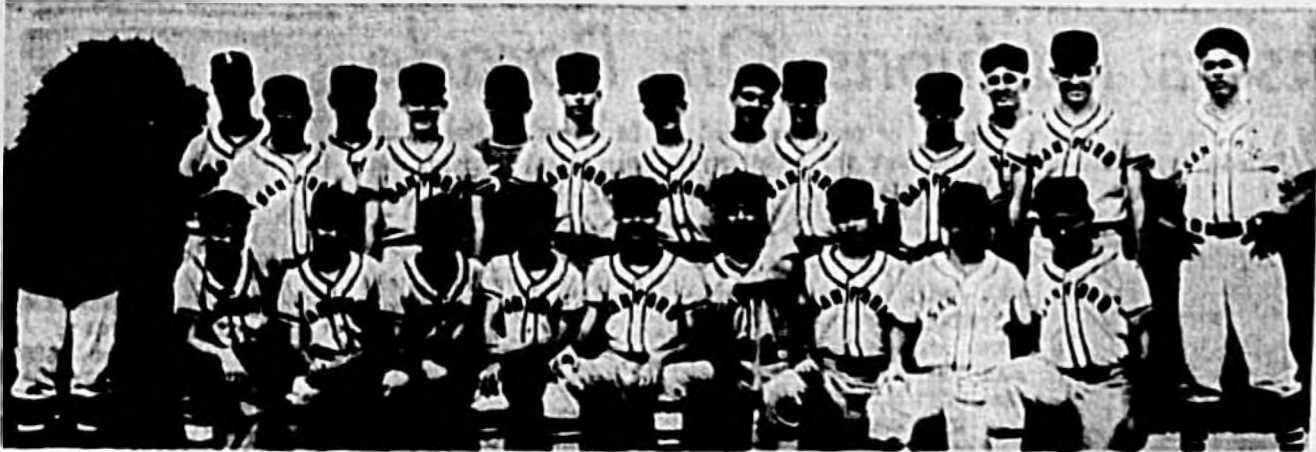

McIntosh, Dr. Starke To Join New Council

Kenneth W. McIntosh, Seminole County prosecuting attorney, and Dr. George H. Starke, immediate past president of the Seminole County Medical Society, are expected to be elected to the board of directors of the newly formed Central Florida Council on Alcoholism at an organizational meeting Wednesday at Orlando.

At a later date, special council projects will be carried on in Sanford by Sanford people, especially in matters of formal education, court and law enforcement programs.

The group is a non-profit charitable corporation whose general objective is the control and prevention of alcoholism through early detection

and treatment. As one council official said, "We want to sell the public what alcoholism is and what can be done about it."

CFCA says it will be one of 74 councils which have affiliated with the National Council on Alcoholism since 1944 and is the first to be established in Florida, although four other Florida cities, including Miami are presently forming similar groups.

While taking pride in their accomplishment, local members admit they face a formidable program of intensive and continuing public education at all levels, including planned activities in schools and colleges. An information center with a qualified full-time staff will be established. Here, consultation and referral to sources of treatment will be available to families and others who are interested, including alcoholics themselves.

To avoid possible impairment of its primary objectives, CFCA will not engage in "wet" or "dry" controversy; is neither for nor against social drinking; will not engage in any effort to control or prevent the sale or use of alcoholic beverages. The council asserts it is concerned solely with control and prevention of the disease of alcoholism which presently afflicts over five million Americans and ranks with heart disease, cancer and mental illness as a major public health problem.

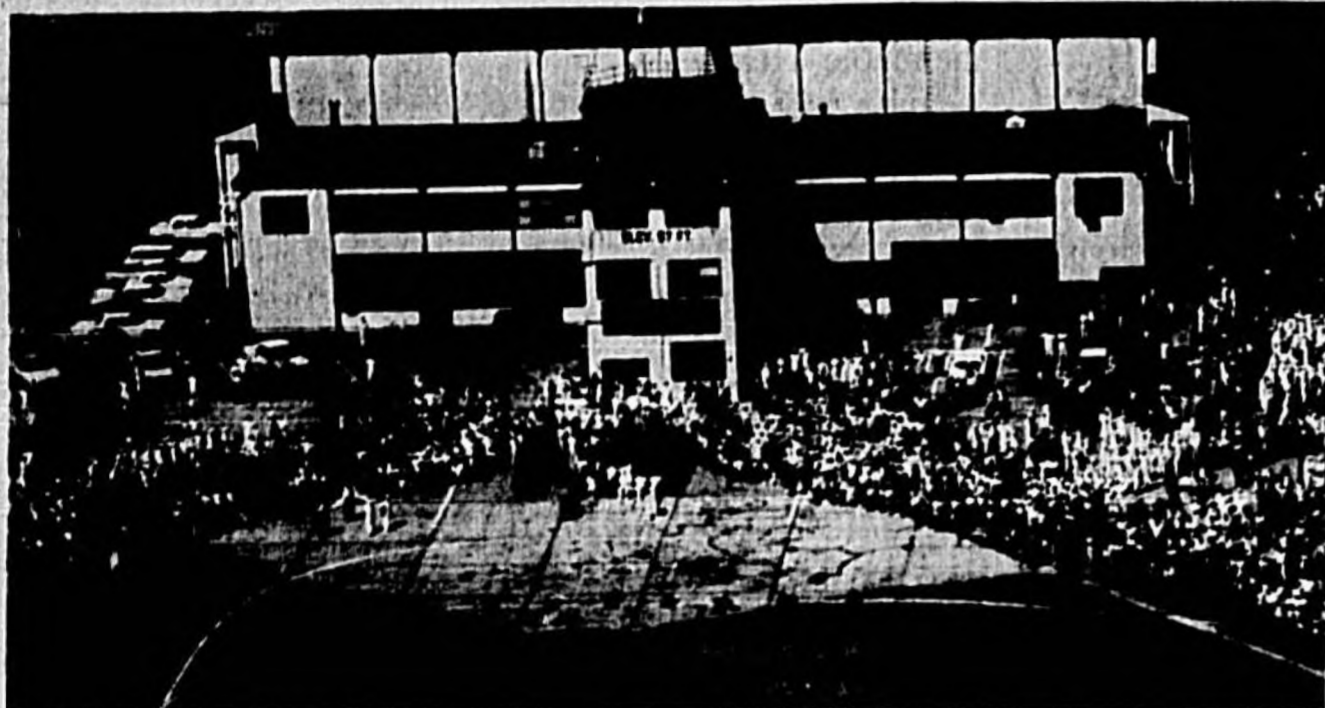
CFCA points out that it does not duplicate the work of any existing agencies or facilities and that it neither competes nor compares with Alcoholics Anonymous, many of whose members are among the council's most active supporters.

Officials of the Florida Alcoholics Rehabilitation Program at Avon Park have evidenced their interest in CFCA's success with helpful suggestions and encouragement and several of them, including Dr. W. P. Hill, chief clinical psychologist, are expected to attend the membership meeting.

Continuing committees for specific projects will include doctors and nurses, administrators and nurses, clergymen, social agencies, business and industry, the courts and law enforcement personnel.

All persons interested in the purposes of the council are urged to attend the meeting at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday in the Friendship Room of First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Orlando, Church and Magnolia Streets. A panel of informed speakers will give brief talks explaining the program of CFCA and how it will be carried out. Ample time is being allotted for open discussion and questions.
