

ST. JOHNS RIVER PROJECT EXPLOITED YESTERDAY AS INLAND WATERWAY

Great Gathering of Sanford, Orland and Others at Titusville

GREAT FIGURES

ON THE TONNAGE OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES AND MERCHANDISE FROM THIS GREAT SECTION

One of the greatest gatherings in south central Florida took place at Titusville yesterday when the members of the Central Florida Water Traffic League, members of the chambers of commerce, Rotary, Kiwanis and other clubs of Sanford, Orland, Titusville, Cocoa, Winter Park, Osteen, Enterprise, DeLand, Mims, Oak Hill and other cities interested in the St. Johns river and the lower Indian River as the Inland Waterway through Florida met Major Lemman and other officials of the government and U. S. Engineers' Corps at Titusville for a public hearing. Judge W. T. Bland of Orland was the spokesman for the Central Florida League and he presented a mass of documentary evidence that staggered the hearers and which when given in the aggregate would have astonished the world should it be given publicly. Mr. Bland after giving the vast array of facts and figures and submitting in typewritten form much that was not read at the hearing called on representative business men of the various cities and towns directly connected or benefitted by the water traffic. W. A. Leffler of Chase & Co. of this city was among those called to testify and give figures on shipments of fruits and vegetables. Joe Cameron told of the cattle business and L. A. Brunley of the farming industry. All of those called supplemented the brief prepared by the committee and their statements made the case much stronger. G. W. Knight, president of the Sanford Chamber and vice president of the Water Traffic League and A. P. Connelly, chairman of the Inland Waterway Committee of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce went to Titusville Monday night and were in the thick of the fray. A. P. Connelly, W. A. Leffler and E. T. Woodruff and other Sanford and Orland men helped to prepare the figures for the brief presented at the hearing and it is through their good work and the hearty co-operation of the members of the committees and the chamber of commerce of Sanford and Orland that the fight has been waged so brilliantly with the Central Florida Water Traffic League as the leader. S. J. Slight the president and M. W. Tarpley the secretary have been very active and have attended all the meetings over this part of the state and were at the meeting yesterday. Mr. Tarpley and Secretary Pearman going on down to Palm Beach where the hearing will be held today.

Daytona, Seabreeze, Daytona Beach and New Smyrna were represented at the meeting for the purpose of putting forth the East Coast canal project and their representatives seemed pleased at the idea of Central Florida and "Sanford" in particular, asking for a waterway via the St. Johns River. They said the East Coast canal was 78 miles shorter but forgot to mention the fact that if the appropriations are forthcoming for deep water and the bends are cut off and the channel made straighter that the St. Johns river will be much shorter. The delegation from Daytona had some figures but they could not show and never will be able to show the tonnage that central Florida can show and their chief asset, "tourists" seemed to be about all they had to offer. The St. Johns project is being backed by the people of Central Florida for the reason that they have the goods and they are not making any light on the upper east coast, on the east coast canal or any other part of the state. We are simply going after deeper water from Sanford to Jacksonville, to cut a canal through into the Indian river and give the people of the lower east coast and the whole of the east coast a real waterway if they want it. In case Daytona does not get the canal deepened and it is a state canal by the

way, they can easily truck their stuff to DeLand landing just as Orlando expects and is doing now, trucking to Sanford.

If all the people of this part of Florida would pull for the great St. Johns river they would be benefitted to a greater degree than by any other route regardless of the claims of the east coast canal people and all the folks who cannot see anything but that little ditch that is filled up with sand now and will be until the end of time.

The splendid spirit shown yesterday by the Orlando and Sanford and Titusville and all lower east coast folks yesterday at the meeting means that cooperation has been worked out to a fine point and the St. Johns river cannot be ignored by the government any longer.

This matter will now be left to the engineers who are the proper authority to lay the plans before the government and with the big start already made and the future plans of the Central Florida Water Traffic League there is no doubt about the result. There will be a twenty foot channel from Sanford to Jacksonville on the St. Johns river and nothing will prevent it.

About thirty business men of Sanford and as many from Orland journeyed over to Titusville together yesterday and the grand spirit shown all the way through the meeting of all the cities and towns interested in the St. Johns river spells nothing but success in this—the greatest move that Central Florida has ever made to lower the freight rates and get better transportation.

As the Orlando Sentinel of Tuesday said:

"Whatever the outcome of this hearing may be it is a foregone conclusion that the engineers will be convinced that a system of waterways would be utilized to the fullest extent by growers and shippers in this section of the state and that unanimity prevails in Central Florida on the subject.

A brief prepared by officers of the Central Water Traffic League for submission to the engineers at the hearing cites an annual tonnage for this section of the state of 3,010,873 tons, made up of vegetables, citrus fruits, live stock, hogs, cattle, horses, mules, naval stores, fish and miscellaneous articles. The territory included in the brief covers thirteen counties, Clay, St. Johns, Putnam, Flagler, Volusia, Lake, Seminole, Orange, Brevard, St. Lucie, Okeechobee, Osceola and Glades, with a total population of 131,294 at the last census, an increase of more than a hundred per cent. over the figures for 1900, which were 63,707.

Moreover, the Water Traffic League calls the attention of the engineers to the fact that many products are shipped from California in refrigerated steamers via the Panama canal "at much cheaper rates to Eastern markets than ever our present water rates afford and the contrast is made all the greater by comparison with the higher rail rates."

"It is," the brief continues, "a well known and established fact that Florida is today in the limelight as it has been at no other time in its history. We believe we are conservative in the prediction that its population will be doubled within ten years. Many thousands of citizens from other states have come into Florida and made large investments with a feeling of assurance will be doubly assured if the waterways of Florida will properly be developed and utilized."

Fish and Game Will Be Protected in Seminole County

Looks Like Closed Season of Three Years as Result of Meet Last Night

Fish and game will be protected in Seminole county in the future if the plans of the Seminole County Fish and Game Protective Association are carried out. This much was apparent last night at the meeting held in the court house with President James Lee in the chair and Vance Douglass, acting secretary.

Hon. Forest Lake and Hon. O. P. Swope, candidates for the legislature, were called upon to express their views on the subject and their decision as to where they stood upon the questions of illegal hunting and the seining of fish. Both gentlemen expressed themselves as being in favor of a closed season if possible and that whatever the association would see fit to frame into a bill for fish and game protection they would pass it if a local bill and see that it was made into a law.

Vance Douglass, chairman of the committee on laws, when called upon for a report stated that his committee was not ready with their bill but would have it in plenty of time and they were investigating the game laws of Pennsylvania that has the best fish and game laws in this country. The chair appointed the following committee to meet with the Wild Game League in Orlando June 14th: Whoever was elected representative and Douglass, Householder, Leonardy, Yowell and Holly.

The following gentlemen called upon for short talks responded and declared themselves in favor of protection for the fish and game: D. L. Thrasher, P. J. Feitner of Osceola, Dr. Thompson of Oviedo, E. H. Kilbee of Geneva, John Leonardy, Sheriff Hand and J. J. Dickinson.

A ballot of those present was taken at the close of the meeting of all who favored a closed season for fish and game and it was carried by a large majority and it is almost certain that the association in their bill to be framed will make it unlawful to hunt or seine in Seminole county for three years.

IN CONFERENCE AND OTHER POWERS SAY MUST HAVE OUR HELP AND PRESENCE

WASHINGTON, May 17.—French sources at Genoa prior to issuance by conference of invitation to United States to participate in the Hague meeting sent a feeler to develop the American attitude toward such participation it was learned today. The American reply was sympathetic but not an acceptance although apparently construed at Genoa as forecasting participation by United States.

PARIS, May 17.—The French government informed the American war debt funding commission it was ready to send a special mission to the United States to confer regarding payment of French debt.

GENOA, May 17.—Russia accepted the proposals for a meeting at the Hague to discuss Russian situation it was announced today.

GENOA, May 17.—Further appeals probably will be made to the United States by the allied powers in an endeavor to induce that country to take part in the meeting of the commission of experts at the Hague on June 15. The inviting powers, England, Japan, France, Italy and Belgium, held a meeting yesterday afternoon to consider the matters further.

The French delegates are anxious to have the closing plenary session of the economic conference on Thursday, but this is considered impossible, as there is no disposition to hurry the Russians in making their final reply regarding the Hague conference, and it seems likely that the closing session will not be held before Saturday or Monday.

Reign of Terror Instituted in Chicago By Building Trades

Set Fire to Partially Built Apartment House

CHICAGO, May 17.—Open defiance of the efforts of the police to check an outbreak of labor warfare which has terrorized the city for two months was seen last night in a spectacular fire which partially destroyed a seventy-room apartment building under construction at 7711 Sheridan Road, in the heart of a wealthy residence section.

Starting at several points on the first floor, the flame spread rapidly through the \$500,000 structure and practically all fire fighting apparatus in the northern section of the city was called before it was brought under control with half the building in ruins.

Workmen on the structure were employed under the Landis wage award, and police declared that the fire was but another step in a campaign of terrorism directed against the award which was made by former Judge Landis sitting as mediator in a wage dispute between the building trades workers and contractors. The award was accepted by the contractors but has been actively opposed by several of the unions which were dissatisfied with its terms.

We were greatly impressed yesterday by the wonderful spirit of friendship between the men of the two cities in the fight for the St. Johns river as the inland waterways through Florida. Orlando people have certainly shown their true colors upon a number of occasions and Sanford has and will reciprocate in a like manner and has done this and will continue to foster the spirit of friendship. Sanford and Orlando working together can accomplish wonders and the editor of the Herald who has ever been a friend to Orlando and who has as many friends in that city as any place in the world, will continue to do all in his power to promote that friendship and we want to say to Orlando that any time you need us call and we will respond.

TAKING CARE OF THE YOUNGSTERS

We have been investigating the work of the boys' committees in the various clubs of the city and find out that Sanford people and Seminole county people are always ready and willing to do their part toward the young people at all times. Especially is this true of the Rotary Club and the Kiwanis Club who are looking after the Boy Scouts and all the boys collectively. This Boy Scout movement is a great work and whenever the public is called upon to support it the support should be forthcoming. We are apt to forget the boys in our busy days and nights, we are apt to forget our own boyhood days when we were surrounded with all kinds of temptations and had company simply because in the early days there was no Boy Scouts, no Y. M. C. A. and no place made for the boys and said boys roamed at will to either rise above temptations or fall by the wayside. The Men's Club of the Parish House are doing a wonderful work and giving the boys the only place of amusement in the city. The Lakeland Star sums it up as follows:

"If the question of caring for the boys and girls of the community including their conduct, were up for debate, we would say that the burden of proof is on the community of Lakeland as a whole. We make this statement simply because they are being neglected; they are running at large as it were, and doing things that are not right and that down deep in our hearts any man or woman will not approve. But we pass it up because the spirit of the day seems to be to keep hands off of anything and everything that might need a little assertion of backbone, and as a result the breaking of the commandments from top to bottom seems to be the order of the day. It has been growing from bad to worse since the war and the signing of the armistice when all lines of propriety and modesty were cast into the melting pot and scattered to the four winds.

"Lakeland as a community has felt the aftermath and is seeing the results just as every other community is experiencing them. The peak of the looseness and unconcerned conditions has not yet been reached, because church members and church directors themselves do not have the backbone to stand in their pews and pulpits and denounce what they know to be wrong, and that which before the war was considered a base insult to Christianity and church aims, is now smiled upon by both member and pastor alike, and the indifference that has been expressed by parents and citizens alike and which is still being shown, is driving the children farther and farther away from that attitude of reverence and responsibility to their elders, which means a general breakdown in the governmental system. This same spirit of indifference is seen in the courts, in the officers where law enforcement is delegated, in the law making and law governing bodies until today it is possible, if you have the wherewithal to back you up, to pull most anything under the sun and get away with it without almost any penalty attached. But that is dealing in generalities. We started out to prove that the community of Lakeland owed the children of this locality a debt; to show that the burden of proof is upon Lakeland parents and Lakeland citizens and institutions to be a part in changing the order of the day into the form of attitude which should prevail under all circumstances.

"In the first place, we say the children who get into trouble should be punished, yet you don't find the proper places where such punishment can be administered and as a result, it is the custom to pass up the seriousness of the situation and there is nothing done to get the proper care taken of those who would do right if given the proper leadership. In Lakeland we talk about the children running the streets, yet there is no place else for them to play; we talk about the boys congregating in places they ought not

to, yet we are hesitating in backing up conditions that would bring about a proper place for them to gather, such as a Boy Scout headquarters and camp, Y. M. C. A. building or even a free public library. We also forget that the children of Lakeland need a place to play, regardless of the fact that they have yards and private grounds all over the city, but they must have a place where they can be supervised and public play grounds are the only proper solution, yet we are hesitating in offering these opportunities to these young people of Lakeland who are actually in need of something of this character.

"We claim that the burden is upon the people of Lakeland to offer these children something for their future, simply because the citizenship generally is too busy trying to make a dollar out of everything which they touch with their hands, they forget the children who belong to them and for whom they are responsible. These children are dependent upon us for their future welfare and if we don't realize that the responsibility is upon us, some of these days we will wish we had, to our sorrow. We, as citizens, owe a debt of gratitude to the Creator for surrounding us in this fair land with all the favorable opportunities that we have for the making of money and being successful and keeping good health, and in our mad rush to accumulate the few shillies that we think are due, we must not forget the fact that the coming generation is due some recognition and we should live for them as well as for ourselves. We should stop and take an inventory right now of the moral and social condition of the children of the community, just as we take stock and inventory each year in business and just as we make out our reports and income sheets to the government—if we do not follow the laws and rules laid down by nature or by humanity in general, we are going to be brought face to face with proceedings that will not be pleasant at all and for that reason it is up to us to meet the situation when presented and see that the children and unfortunates of Lakeland are taken care of now just as we would want to be if we were placed in their shoes—and the best is none too good for them, so long, under a community proposition, as they are all treated alike."

GROWING OLD GRACEFULLY

We are a witness daily of the effort that is made to conceal by artificial means the advance of age and the marks it leaves on the body. But why should we conceal it, or, rather, try to conceal it? Men and women alike manifest in this way their foolish worry about growing old. If such effort deceived anyone it might be worth while, but for the most part it only serves to make more manifest what is sought to be concealed. Is it not better to grow old naturally, giving 'em to growing old gracefully, striving to preserve youth from within rather than to prevent its counterfeit without? Of all the vanities none is so vain as that which prompts men and women fearing to be old to masquerade in the likeness of youth.

Growing old is something that is inevitable. Therefore, we should not allow the thought of it to become oppressive. The thing to do is to make the best of it, and especially to stop worrying about it. That is the way to peace and contentment, and also to youth perennial.

"The thought of growing old," it has been said, "is chiefly oppressive to those who never grow anything else." Busy people who are striving to create or achieve have little time to borrow trouble about growing old or to study crow's feet in the mirror. Worrying about growing old is among the most foolish of worries. The way not to become old is to refrain from worrying about it. That is not to say some thought should not be given to the problem of growing old, for it is a problem. Growing old is one of the most certain things in life; therefore, it is important that we should grow old in the right way. There is a way to grow old gracefully; a way to grow old without seeming to be old; a way to grow old and still be useful in spirit and purpose; a way to grow old and retain gladness in living. Likewise, there is a wrong way to grow old; a way to make the increasing years burdensome and the sunset of life wretched and clouded; a way to be old and crabbed in mind as well as in the body. Physical old age is in accordance with an unchangeable law of nature, but to be old in spirit is no more than a state of mind, a mental attitude. Physical old age cannot be stayed, but the preservation of mental and spiritual youth is wholly a matter of the will. It all depends upon how it occupies the mind, what use one makes of one's energies, time and opportunities. It all depends upon the interest that one retains in life. If life be ever regarded as an adventure one will have no time to think of growing old. Old age never becomes oppressive to one who is able to feel at the dawning of each new day the

thrill of life and living. The truth is that life is a wonderful adventure. Death has been described as the great adventure. The possibilities of life are infinite. One may experience many things in a long life, and still there will remain many things yet to be experienced—more than anyone can hope to accomplish in a lifetime. No two days are alike. One cannot judge what is to be by what has been. The future is every mysterious and alluring; the present never ceases to be fascinating. No one can foretell upon waking in the morning what the day shall unfold, what new interests it shall contain, what new opportunities it shall present. To be eager for life always, to be absorbed in what the world is doing, to be pushing forward, keeping step with militant humanity is to have no time for anxiety about growing old.—Palatka News.

With its work made nationally possible in the first place by the land wire telegraph, it is but natural that the government weather bureau has taken to radio with as great, if not greater, zeal as any other department. Their warning bulletins, reports, etc., sent out to mariners when the ship wireless was but an elementary affair has become, with the years, an organized cooperative affair that makes navigation more safe than ever before.

Beginning April 11 of this year, however, a new leaf was turned over by the department by way of re-planning its service and a broader service than ever was put into effect. The increasing popularity of aircraft together with recent startling advances in radio has made this necessary and, at the same time, possible.

A. J. Mitchell, meteorologist, and climatologist in charge of the Florida bureau, has issued a table of instructions for the benefit of those who get their weather reports via either route. It has mostly to do with the condensation of messages in code form to facilitate transmission, and the wise skipper will see that his radio force is furnished with a copy.—Times-Union.

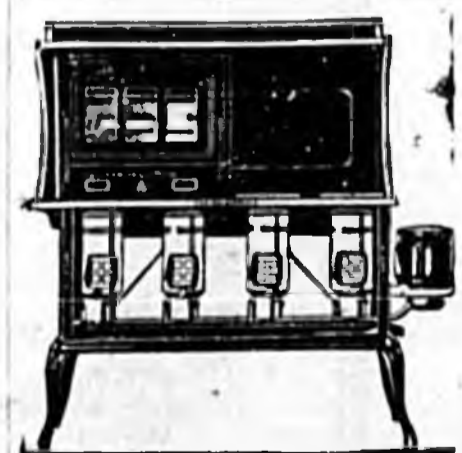

MAKING PAPER FROM GRASS FIBRE OF INTEREST TO FOREST SERVICE OFFICIALS

LEESBURG, May 16.—For more than a year past the United States forestry service has been in touch with the construction and plans of the Grass Fiber and Pulp Company's first big mill here at Leesburg, and on Tuesday, Clinton G. Smith, representing the department at Washington as special agent, and C. R. Rogers, the service man in charge of the government reservation in Marion and Lake counties, spent considerable time in checking up on the work that has been accomplished both in the methods to be used in the manufacturing and actual results of the work carried on in the miniature reproduction of the plant.

The government is interested from two angles. The use of saw grass for this purpose will conserve forests to a greater degree than any other method, short of reforestation on an immense scale, which is an extremely expensive method and one fraught with considerable difficulty because of the land ownership. The other reason for the particular interest of the forest service, in this plant, is the result of certain experiments carried on by this department and other scientific departments at Washington, particularly the bureau of standards, which shows that Florida forestry reservations could be called upon for the baser portion of news print when other sources have been used up. This small section would not last long, but so great is the need that no possibility is overlooked in this government investigation. The idea here would be to make news print out of a combination of the baser wood pulp mixed with the fine, bleached, high grade saw grass pulp, to give it strength and body.

Officer Smith has just completed a survey of the Alaskan spruce forest reserve with a view of locating the available areas near enough to rivers to permit transporting the logs over dummy lines to water and then rafting down stream to the milling point. Here the logs can be rafted direct to the mill. Having so recently come from a place where conditions mean higher price for high grade pulp and no possibility of lowering the present prices, he was naturally greatly surprised to find here conditions the very reverse where greater production will eventually mean gradually lower prices rather than the reverse.

For the purpose of furthering the news print possibilities of the big scrub, the forest reserve agents asked and were assured of the co-operation of the chemistry and scientific departments of the grass fibre plant, as well as its experimental laboratory now being built just north of the elevated tanks.

"An Ordinance Providing for an Issue of Bonds by the City of Sanford,

Florida, in the sum of \$625,000.00 for Municipal Purposes; the Proceeds Derived from the Sale Thereof to be used for Building and Constructing a Municipal Building, for the Extension of Park Avenue Northward into the Waters of Lake Monroe, for the Extension of the Drainage and Sewerage System, for Constructing Paved, Macadamized or Other Hard Surfaced Streets and for Funding and Paying the Outstanding Floating Indebtedness of the City of Sanford, Evidenced by Vouchers Heretofore Issued, and Authorizing the Mayor of the City of Sanford, Florida, to call an Election to Determine the Question as to the Issuance of Said Bonds for the Aforesaid Purposes.

Whereas, the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, deem it expedient and to the best interests of the City of Sanford, Florida, to issue bonds of the City of Sanford, Florida, in the sum of \$625,000.00 for municipal purposes, the proceeds to be derived from the sale of said bonds to be used for the following municipal purposes, to-wit:

(a) Building and constructing a municipal building for the housing of the municipal library of the City of Sanford, Florida.

(b) The Extension of Park Avenue Northward into the waters of Lake Monroe to enable the public to avail themselves of the right of commerce and transportation afforded by water, and to furnish the means of access from the highway by land to the highway by water for the use of the public.

(c) The extension and enlargement of the drainage and sewerage system of the City of Sanford, Florida.

Section 1.—That a bond issue in the sum of \$625,000.00, for the municipal purposes enumerated and specifically set forth in the preamble of this ordinance, be, and the same is hereby authorized, provided, however, that before said bonds, or any part of said bonds shall be issued, this ordinance shall be first approved by a majority vote of the electors of the City of Sanford, who are qualified to vote as shown by the registration and tax books of the City, at an election called and held for that purpose, at such time and in such manner as prescribed by law and the ordinances of the City of Sanford, Florida.

Section 2.—That said bonds shall be of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars each, bearing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, interest payable semi-annually on the 1st days of July and January, said bonds to be numbered consecutively from 1 to 625, both numbers inclusive, said bonds to mature in the following manner, to-wit: bonds to be numbered from 1 to 300, both numbers inclusive, shall be serial bonds; the maturity dates of bonds of this issue to be numbered from 1 to 300, both numbers inclusive, shall be as follows, to-wit:

- Bonds numbered 1 to 30 to mature July 1st, 1925.
Bonds numbered from 31 to 60 to mature July 1st, 1926.
Bonds numbered from 61 to 90 to mature July 1st, 1927.
Bonds numbered from 91 to 120 to mature July 1st, 1928.

Section 5.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the sum of \$67,000.00 will be required to pay the cost of the extension of Park Avenue northward into the waters of Lake Monroe to enable the public to avail themselves of the right of commerce and transportation afforded by water, and to furnish the means of access from the highway by land to the highway by water for the use of the public, and that the extension and construction of Park Avenue northward into the waters of Lake Monroe is a necessary public improvement and will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality of the City of Sanford, Florida.

Section 6.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 5, of this ordinance is the sum of \$67,000.00, and the sum of \$67,000.00 of said proposed issue of bonds is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 5, of this ordinance.

Section 7.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the sum of \$40,000.00 will be required to pay the cost of the extension and enlargement of the drainage and sewerage system of the City of Sanford, Florida, and that the extension and enlargement of the drainage and sewerage system of the City of Sanford, Florida, is a necessary public improvement and will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality.

Section 8.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 7, of this ordinance is the sum of \$40,000.00, and the sum of \$40,000.00 of said proposed issue of bonds is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 7, of this ordinance.

Section 9.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the sum of \$468,000.00 will be required to pay the cost of constructing certain paved, macadamized and other hard surfaced streets in the City of San-

ford, Florida, and that the said proposed paving and hard surfacing of certain streets in said City is a necessary public improvement and will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality.

Section 10.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 9, of this ordinance is the sum of \$468,000.00, and the sum of \$468,000.00 of said proposed bond issue is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 9 of this ordinance.

Section 11.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the present outstanding floating indebtedness of the City of Sanford, Florida, amounting to the sum of \$35,000.00 should be funded by the issuance of bonds, and that said outstanding floating indebtedness should be paid, thereby improving the financial condition of said city, and that the payment of said floating indebtedness will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality.

Section 12.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 11, of this ordinance is the sum of \$35,000.00, and the sum of \$35,000.00 of said proposed bond issue is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 11, of this ordinance.
