Film Made In Africa Depicts Romance In Midst Of Savagery

Furious Fight Rages In Area Near Peiping

Sixty Thousand Japs And Chinese Engage In Fierce Struggle For Northern China

TIENTSIN, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Some 60,000 Chinese and Japanese troops were engaged in a furious battle 30 miles southwest of Peiping today in the opening clash of a wide Chinese offensive to drive the enemy out of North China.

Independent sources indicated the fighting thus far was indecisive with the outcome not apparent. Weather conditions were believed to favor the Chinese, equalizing the superior Japanese-maintained land forces and combat aviation.

### A Visit At Camp

### Louis Goes Through His Last Workouts Before Farr Fight

POMPTON LAKE, N. J., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Joe Louis, the king, played second harmonics to the pretender, Max Schmeling, right in his camp yesterday as the Teuton sceler visited Pompton Lake for his first good closeup since he smashed him into that surprising knockout defeat at Yankee stadium a year ago last June.

Max, looking much younger than his almost 28 years, rolled into the champion's camp just before the Brown Bomber engaged in his six round semi-final workout for his title match against Tommy (No Chance) Farr, Thursday night. As flash lights popped and photographers had a field day, Max and Joe posed together with expressionless faces.

"Hello, Joe," said Max. "How you feeling?"

"Hello, Max," said Joe. "How you feeling?"

There wasn't much news in that, so the reporters looked on as the photographers had Max, Joe and promoter Mike Jacobs line up for practice shots around the camp pool table. Later, Joe was seated in an overstuffed chair with Max in the edge, leaning over as if to whisper something in Joe's ear. The truth is neither said a word. They were either too excited or bored. It was plain to see there isn't much love lost between Max and Joe.

After Joe had boxed in leisurely fashion, sports writers asked Max what he thought of Louis yesterday.

"I see something," said Max. "I am more eager than ever to fight him. I can lick him again."

"What did you see?" he was asked.

"Something. I tell you better after Thursday night's fight."

The crowd at the ring-side, some 2000 who didn't mind a slight drizzle, cheered Schmeling as he was introduced. The negro section of the crowd was quite silent, most of them gazing in awe at the Teuton. Some of them kept staring at Max even when Louis knocked down Tiger Harston, human punching bag No. 3 from Wheeling, W. Va.

## Farr And Former Champ Max Baer Nearly Stage Non-Title Bout At Farr's Camp

### Farr Nearly Brings One From The Floor Of The Camp Ring When The Welshman's Manager Steps Between Fighters

LONG BEACH, N. J., Aug. 22.—(AP)—They had to pull Tommy Farr off of Max Baer in the training ring here, yesterday. Only quick intervention of Ted Broadribb, manager of the hot-tempered Welshman, averted what might have been the most spectacular scrap of the summer.

Struggling with anger because of a recent interview in which Max was quoted as saying that Farr "couldn't kill a fly," the hard guy from Tommypan did his best to take a crack at his former tormentor. He still was sore today because they stopped it.

The eruption occurred when Max, clad in fighting trunks, climbed into the ring in the midst of Farr's workout before about 500 fans. He and his brothers, Buddy Haer, were going to workout later, Farr walked until his handlers had removed his gloves, then went up to Max ruffling like a fighting cock.

"What do you mean, making remarks like that about me in the paper?" he demanded, thrusting his perspiring face about six inches from Baer's chin.

"Don't believe everything you read in the papers, little boy," Max rejoined. "When they quit writing about you, that will be the time to worry."

That was enough for Tommy. He started to bring one from the floor, and failed to land it only because Broadribb dived between them. It took Farr's manager and two others to force him back into his corner. He was livid, and the things he called Max wouldn't bear repetition here.

For his part, Baer got right out of the ring and stayed there until Farr had completed his workout. He was magnanimous about the whole thing.

"Good thing I've got a sense of humor," he confided to the ring-side, caressing his right hand. "I could have hit him on that cheek and copped that fight then where would his fight Thursday night with Lee's be?"

Farr gradually consented to shake hands with Max when he left the ring, but he didn't mean it. His still was Luffing in the "grazing" in its large neither spirit nor vacillating when he's worked up properly, dear Tommy.

"I wish they hadn't stopped it," he said fiercely. "I cut that guy to ribbons in London and I wouldn't mind doing it again. Making belittling remarks like that about me. If I can't hit what happened to him in London, I'd like to fight him again for nothing."

## Strolling Man Is Killed In Holdup

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Robert Francis Burns, 40, part owner of a suburban Evanston meat market was found by police fatally shot early yesterday in Grant Park near Michigan boulevard. Capt. John Pendergast, chief of uniformed police, said Burns was in the arms of an attractively and stylishly dressed blonde woman.

Burns died in a hospital half an hour later. Pendergast said he believed the man had been shot by "a couple of young punks who got nervous during an intended holdup."

He said Burns had made a tour of near north side taverns with the woman before the slaying. The woman, the captain said, told him two men accosted her and Burns as they walked in the park "to cool off," one of them slapped her and then she heard "one or two shots."
