Hugh Johnson, of NRA fame, goes to the dictionary to find out what a liberal is and unearthe this definition, "A liberal is a person favorable to constitutional changes and legal or administration reforms TENDING IN THE DIRECTION OF FREEDOM OR DE-MOCRACY." We assume from that that if the constitu-tional changes tended AWAY from freedom or democracy —toward regimentation or dictatorship, for instance—the person would not be a liberal.

Then Gen. Johnson proceeds to apply this definition to our new Supreme Court justice. His first "great bid to fame," the former NRA chief says, "was a bill designed to force this whole country by fiat to a 30-hour week, a regimentation so inflexible, intolerant and impractical that even the most starry-eyed social workers rejected it. In this session of congress he introduced a bill which gave roving commission to a labor standards board to decree any rates of hours and wages anywhere and at any time they desired. It proposed such a vicious dictatorship in this field that even its sponsors had to drop it.

"Freedom from 'unreasonable search' was a guaranty of one liberty which Mr. Jefferson insisted on including in the Constitution as a safeguard to democracy;" Gen. Johnson continues. "Senator Black ruthlessly ignored it in his search of telegraphic files. That may be liberty but it is not the kind the dictionary mentions. It is neither de-mocracy nor 'tending in the direction of freedom and cemocracy to tax some people to give the money to others. Yet every class in this country that has anything is being so taxed (as much as 20 percent for the \$1,000-a-year laborer) in part for that purpose, and these so-called liberals favor that.

"It is not democracy to centralize governmental powers in a few hands and rape from the states and other departments of the government plenary powers to be given to executives and boards to govern the former independence of great classes of people," the General concludes. "It is a distinct tendency, in the direction, at least, of the present governments of Italy and Germany."

And so we conclude that a "liberal," in the New Deal

sense of the word, is merely a person who is liberal with ther people's money.

Senator Hugh Black whose recent appointment to the upreme Court aroused considerable criticism even among cllow Democrats, has been hailed by his friends as one of he foremost "liberals" in the Senate, giving rise to the question, "Just what is a liberal anyway?" Time was when a liberal was a person primarily who believed very strongly in liberty.


