#### Police search for bandit

Sheriff's Office is investigating a series of convenience store and fast-food restaurant robberies that appear to be relat-

The robberies have occurred on weeknights, between the hours of 6:45 and 9:30 p.m. The suspect is described as a Hispanic male, approximately 5 feet 9 inches tall, with a medium build. He wears a dark colored, longsleeve, hooded sweatshirt and derk colored pants, along

# City rejects HPB recommendation

Sanford Commissioners decided Monday to allow Stephanie Powers to remain on the Historic Preservation Board (HPB) despite a recommendation for removal from the board.

According to the city's attorney, Lonnie Groot, the HPB has the authority to recommend a board member for removal, however, it is ultimately the decision of the City Commission whether to accept that recommendation.

In the case of Powers, the HPB voted 7-1, with Alec Then voting against, during its June meeting to recommend that City Commission remove Powers from the volunteer

# Iraqi diary: Invited to tea with the enemy

Editor's note: Stuff Sergeunt Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford Historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is currently deployed in Bughdad, Iroq as purt of the 549th Military Police Company.

Carlson has provided a continuing iournal of his experiences in Iraq, which the Herald will publish over the next several weeks.

May 17, 2003. The Nightstalker platoon is living up to its name as we do a lot of night patrols. Last night we drove around with the 2nd Cav

We were told about some Fedayeen moving people and weapons by using ambulances. We saw an ambulance in one of the alleyways acting suspicious. Our convoy pulled a stop on it and when I felt sufficient security was in place,

I told the lieutenant that I was going to go and search the ambulance and passen-I got out and

really felt alone as I was the only one that went up to the ambulance. I had the shot-

Carlson gun and moved along the passenger side and ordered the driver to get out and open up the back. He did, and keeping my eye on the passenpers, I forced my shotgun into the back and searched it. It turned out to be a normal ambulance. The rest of the night was uneventful.

Today, we had a joint patrol with the Iraqi police. I drove an Iraqi police general in my Humvee to a police station that 1st Platoon is to get up and running.

After that we headed over to another part of Baghdad where one of our squads was with the Iraqi police at the scene of a carjacking. While responding to this scene, I was informed about a guy who wanted to talk with a high ranking officer in the U.S. Army and wanted to let us know that he was a Baath Party member.

I took my squad to his house and after verifying his identification, apprehended the guy, who turned out to be General Jamal Mohammed Rasool, a Baath party member and a top expert on air defense artillery in the Hussein regime.

We took him to the JOC where he was interrogated then released back to us to take home but enroute back to his house I was directed to take him to BIAP [Baghdad International Airport] for detaining and further interrogation.

I guess you can say that I "cap-tured" an Iraqi general, but it would be more accurate to say he was apprehended or turned himself in.

When we got to his house he invited me in for tea. Leaving my gunners outside, I went inside with him and then told him that we were to take him to BIAP and turn him over to M.I. [Military Intelligence] and that he would be detained there.

I had him ride in my vehicle between the front and rear gunners,


**Detours:** Tried driving down Park Avenue lately? If so, you've noticed the detour at 9th Street.

City crews have tried several options: bigger stop signs, a brighter flashing light and increased traffic enforcement. The current work is designed to compliment those improvements and give drivers a better visual marker that

they need to pay attention. Concrete crosswalks are being at all four corners. The bricks beneath the asphalt will be reposition around the concrete strips to add further add a visu-

al element to the intersection.

While George stresses that the first priority of the project is to improve safety, there are two side benefits. First, each cor-

ner is being reworked to provide handlcap-ramps allowing a smooth transition from sidewalk to street instead of the sharp 6-inch curbs.

Second, George hopes to remove all of the asphalt from the middle of the intersection so the original street bricks are visable. He's not sure if they'll be succensful, mainly because the equipment normally used to remove asphalt is too expensive to use for such a small area.

Whatever city crews are able to accomplish will be an improvement for that area, both for safety and visually.


Word Around The Clock is that many in City Hall are chomping at the bit for Grieshaber to come on board.



## What street is next? Do you know?

I commend the city of Sanford for those new street aigns (name signs) depicting the logo of the city. They are indeed beautiful and I feel certain they draw a

great deal of comment from passers-by.

Soon, I hope, that type of sign will be located throughout the city, although to do that will require a considerable draw from the city budg-

et. Nonetheless, I hope it is something in the city's future.

But for a moment, let's change these comments from the new sign, , to the plain old everyday signs in our cities, the county, and in most places in the

What is the most common reason for fender-benders? Law enforcement agencies will tell you without a Pfeifauf moment's hesitation, that it is the lane changing. OK, next question. Why do people change lanes suddenly?

Answer - because they aren't in the lane they want to be to make that have a suddenly?

be to make that turn onto a cross street or into a driveway.

Some cities have incorporated an improved street sign program. They not only tell you the name of the cross street, but the name of the next one coming up.

Savannah is a prime example. Say you are heading north on Abercorn, looking for Liberty. (assuming you have no idea where you are). Right after you pass East Harris, the sign along side the street reads, "Next Light Liberty." If you intend to turn left, you know immediately to get into the left lane. If you want to turn right onto Liberty, you know to get in the right lane. This saves you the problem of waiting until the last minute, just feet before Liberty, to change that

I would imagine that if we had such "coming up next" street signs in addition to those identifying the cross street, we could allow for much earlier lane changes, and possibly reduce the number of fender benders by more than half.

Wouldn't it be great, if our visitors, heading west on First Street from downtown Sanford, not only saw a sign at Park that identified it as the cross street, but another one telling visitors that the next light was French Avenue/U.S. Highway 17.92. Think of how

much easier it would be to make proper turns.

Then, too, there are a number of places in Sanford where you don't know that you are in a right turn only lane until you get to within 50 feet of an intersection. Couldn't that information be made available earlier in the oncoming route?

We can thank the city for those nice new street signs - but let's not stop there. We can save accidents by adding a few extra touches. It's up to our city. Will anyone listen?

## FBI loses perspective in investigating terrorist tips

In June, Marc Schultz (cq), an Atlanta bookstore clerk, received a call at work from his mother. "The FBI is here," she said. "They say

you're not in trouble; they just want to talk. They want to come to the store."

Schultz said he was puzzled but could only guess the FBI was performing a routine background check on a friend who had applied for a government job. He was wrong. The FBI was after him.

According to Schultz, two agents came to the bookstore and quizzed him about his brief stop at a coffee shop a few days earlier, asking whether he had been reading something while there. Nervous, as he remembered it, it took him a while to recall that he had been reading an article called "Weapons of Mass Stupidity: Fox News hits a new lowest common denominator," a scathing attack on Fox News written by columnist Hal Crowther.

Tucker

Crowther is a left-leaning writer who frequently lambasts the establishment, but he can hardly be considered a terrorist. Apparently, however, Schultz's mere reading

of Crowther's column prompted some bystander to report him to the FBI. who, astonishingly, queried him about it.

Frightening, isn't

it? If you thought that alarmists were exaggerating the erosion of civil liberties since the terrorist attacks of two years ago, think again. One of many disturbing features of the Patriot Act, pushed hastily

through Congress in the panic immediately following 9/11, is that it gives the fed-

eral government the authority to inspect or seize the reading lists of any library user or bookstore customer. The feds can get the goahead from a secret court without showing probable cause. And a gag order prevents librarians and book retailers from revealing to customers that the government is sifting through their reading lists. Could George Orwell

have been right, after all? Special Agent foe Parris, spokesman for the FBFs Atlanta office, says the Schultz episode is being misconstrued." While reiterating the Fill's standing order to investigate all terrorist leads, Parris insisted,

"We are not thought police. We don't consider something a terrorist lead that someone is standing in a check-out line reading an article that might be misconstrued as critical of American foreign policy. That simply does not and

will not happen." Yet that is exactly what happened.

According to Parris, the I'Bl "received a call from someone who said he was standing in line in a coffee shop behind a young man reading literature concerning WMDs. He attempted to cover up the reading material, and he seemed nervous. ... In the caller's mind, the totality of circumstances alarmed the caller."

That's nonsense. These days, newspaper headlines are full of the phrase weapons of mass destruction. As it happens, however, Schultz was reading an article titled "Weapons of Mass Stupidity." The last I heard, that's not illegal.

Yet Parris insists that the FBI was compelled to inves-tigate. "God help us if we don't, and it turns out to be the next Mohamed Atta. I. think the public expects us in this day and time to be vigilant."

A 25-year-old college. graduate who lives with his parents, Schultz says that

he's liberal but not criminal. "I had a reckless driving ticket once," he offered.

He's bearded, but his only accent is Southern. He was born and reared in suburban Marietta, Ga. Since writing about the episode in an Atlanta alternative newsweekly, Creative Loafing, Schultz says he's spoken with many friends and acquaintances who are "pretty astonished," as he is.

Parris, on the other hand, is clearly exasperated by the continuing media inquiries. When I told him Schultz was the subject of my call, he responded, "Oh, God."

The FBI needs to get a grip. Blindsided by Ösama bin Laden and criticized for ignoring critical leads that may have prevented the attack, the agency has responded by abandoning discretion and discernment and investigating everything, including crank tips and irrational suspicions. That wastes time while generating fear and ill will.

Those tactics won't get Osama.

Steve, David's dad, chartered my boat on Tuesday to learn some techniques for catching redfish. We departed from the dock at 5:30 a.m. for a little early morning action. As we traveled to our first spot the phosphorus was streaming bright green. Upon arrival to the first hole we quietly poled around as the sounds of dolphin priceless. crushing mullet could be heard in the distance. We quietly moved around in hopes of seeing tailing reds. We were not disappointed. The sun was breaking the horizon on this perfect morning and there were tails of redfish waving high. As we eased the Hell's Bay toward the fish we met up with Captain John Lulay of Chuluota. The fish spooked and moved

away, so Captain Lulay and I anchored up in an area we knew the fish would stay. The next thing I hear is Steve's reel singing. After a 15 minute tussle the hook somehow ulled loose. Within five minutes 15-yearold David's reel began to scream and after another struggle the fish zoomed under the boat and the line hit a trim tab and broke.

We were all a little heart broken because both fish were pretty big. After rigging David' pole, his next cast led to another hook up. This fish hit and ran about 100 yards of line on his first run. As we pulled up the anchor we began to get some line back and then the fish took off again, this run was about 40 yards. After about 20-25 minutes the fish was alongside the boat and we could not believe the size of the fish.

I lipped the fish with my Boga Grip and they bottomed out the 30 pound scale. I grabbed the Shimano 50 pound spring scale and I thought they were going to bottom out. This red of a lifetime went a whopping 43 pounds and was 51 inches long. After some quick pictures we revived the fish and released him to swim again.

We decide to leave that area and ended up catching two more nice reds which went nine- and 15-pounds, respectively. The smile and excitement on all of our faces was

This summer has been awesome for big redfish. My clients and friends have boated 30 fish over the 25 pound mark this year. All of the fish have been caught using light tackle. I rig with Ande 10-pound test, Shimano Stradic 4000 or Fin-Nor 4000 Reels, Stiffy fishing rods, Daiichi hooks and 20 pound fluorocarbon leaders.

Some of the fish have been caught on Rip Tide soft plastics, a variety of topwater plugs and a variety of live baits. The secret to catching these slobberknockers is a quiet approach. It is important to keep the fish off to the side of the boat, cast in front of the fish, let the fish come to the bait and be patient and courteous. Work with other guys if you find a nice school. I have seen schools of 300-to-500 fish this year. My good friend, Captain John Lulay, and I have worked together many times and it makes a huge difference.

Follow these tips and you too can catch the Reds Of Summer.

It was pitching and some stellar outfield defense that helped the Sebastian High Sharks defeat Riverside High School of Greenville, S.C., which was ranked in the top five in some national polls, in the Southeastern Baseball Classic in Hartsville, S.C.

Express coach George Young sald the homer shifted momentum Indian River's way, especially because it came off pitcher Dominic Petracca, who was 9-2 with Daytona Beach Community College this

season. The Hamrick-Shepherd duo also teamed up in the first inning to keep Sanford off the scoreboard. Sanford had runners on first and third with one out when Hamrick uncorked a wild pitch. Shepherd chased the ball down and fired it to Hamrick to tag Matt Fraysier out at home.
