

Economy: Off To Good Start, But...

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The American economy is off to a better start in 1981 than many economists expected, the government says, but the full impact of fuel price hikes and oil price reduction is just beginning to be felt.

The Labor Department today planned to release the January Producer Price Index, a gauge of wholesale activity. The department said "processing" problems pushed back the usual 9 a.m. EST release time by six hours.

Meantime, analysts who studied Commerce Department figures released Thursday on December business inventories were encouraged about the possible results: improved industrial production and a leveling-off of price pressures at the wholesale level.

Retailers lowered their inventories by \$1.7 billion in December, apparently underestimating Christmas season demand. Overall, the decline amounted to about 0.2 percent from November, "a very nice sign," said Jill Thompson, an analyst for the Massachusetts economic consulting firm Data Resources Inc.

The "decumulation" of inventories is "a stronger-than-expected sign of economic strength," she said.

And, he said, the country should brace itself for fuel price increases of 9 to 10 percent a month due to President Reagan's decision to decontrol oil prices.

Heavier-than-expected hog slaughtering has brightened prospects for keeping meat prices from rising in 1981, but Georgia State's forecast still includes a hefty increase later on.

At the White House, the administration released figures from its audit of the economy the day Reagan took office.

It listed "the most persistent high inflation in this century," a growth of federal spending to 23 percent of the nation's output and record interest rates as major damaging influences.

It also cited a drop in average weekly take-home pay, measured in 1972 dollars, from \$122 in 1972 to \$105 in 1980, and an unemployment rate nearly double that of 1968.

Press secretary Jim Brady said the president still hopes to have the budget balanced by 1983.

But Brady acknowledged Reagan has modified some of the proposed budget cuts he will reveal Wednesday in a speech to Congress.

Meanwhile, the dollar, suddenly "the most attractive investment around," rose on European money markets today, opening at the highest level in Zurich in more than three years and hitting another record in Milan.

But the gold markets showed little movement. Gold opened in Zurich at \$492.50 an ounce, up from Thursday's close of \$490.50. In London, gold opened at \$487 an ounce against \$486.50.

The dollar, bolstered by high U.S. interest rates, had one of its best weeks in years on European money markets — including topping the 5-franc level in Paris for the first time since October 1978 — and opened higher against major foreign currencies today.

Mrs. Ver Huel had intended to send Andy Cummings, a high-school senior who acted as a Santa messenger for her last Christmas. But Cummings' parents objected to his running around town wearing wings, a tutu and leotards.

So she enlisted two women, Billie Phipps and Patty O'Brien, to act as Cupid while Cummings will do a musketeer costume and deliver messages as Mr. Valentine.

"Ladies would enjoy a message from a musketeer as much as Cupid," Mrs. Ver Huel said.

She plans to expand the idea into a year-round messenger service and is already lining up a leprechaun for St. Patrick's Day and an Easter bunny.

Civic Building For Lake Mary?

The Lake Mary City Council has approved a concept which may wind up giving the community's residents a new civic building.

Thursday night to a query from Councilman Richard Fess, the council tentatively agreed to permit a Community Improvement Association to construct a 4,000-square-foot concrete block structure on a three-acre parkland tract.

The parkland, purchased more than a year ago, is located between Third and Crystal Lake and Alma and Grand Bend Avenue.

The concrete block structure is to have a large meeting room which can be partitioned off into as many as 10 smaller rooms and includes a kitchen and storage.

The costs are to be borne by the association which has been raising funds for the project for many years. Fess said there is about \$7,000 in the fund and many persons are willing to volunteer their services as well.

Fess said the organization may apply for state funding for the structure. The first step, he said, was gaining the blessing of the city. The structure would be given to the city.

City Attorney Gary Massey suggested several items must be accomplished before the council can properly give final approval to the project. He included building plans among those items.

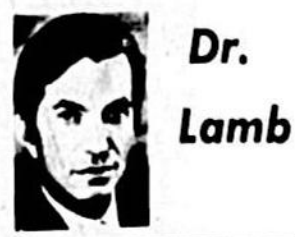
At the same time, Mayor Walter Sorenson was given authorization to look into the possibility of purchasing or leasing the former Chamber of Commerce building on Country Club Drive between Crystal and Lakeview.

Sorenson said there is a possibility the city could lease or purchase the old community building, one of the city's historic structures.

With assistance from City Manager Phil Kules, Sorenson is to determine the costs of bringing the building up to standard either by restoring it or refurbishing it.

In other business the council voted 3-1 with Councilman Ray Cox casting the only negative vote, to recommend that the county commission retain the requirement of a four-fifths positive vote to change its comprehensive land use plan.

Almost Everyone's Heart Skips Beat



DEAR DR. LAMB—I am a 67-year-old man. I take Inderal and Hydrodiuril for high blood pressure. These medicines keep my pressure around 150 over 85. My one worry is that I notice when I am taking my pulse that every 70 to 75 beats my heart stops beating for a beat or two. My heart is strong and steady except for this.

My heart doctor listens but never wants to catch the mis. The electrocardiogram never picks up the missed beats. When my heart stops for one or two beats, will it cause a heart attack in time? I do not drink, never smoked and never use coffee or cola. If you have any information on this, please send it to me so I will be better informed.

DEAR READER—You are doing great. Your blood pressure level for your age group is well controlled. The Inderal you are taking also helps to prevent heart skips.

Now you think your heart stops but that is not likely. You probably have a premature beat that isn't strong enough to pump blood out to your wrist so you feel it as a skipped beat when it is really early. This is explained in greater detail in The Health Letter number 6-12, Heart Irregularities, Skipped Beats, Tachycardias that I am sending you. These are quite common and if we were able to record continuous heart beats on everyone, we would find almost everyone has some. All the astronaut candidates I examined with long-term monitoring had an occasional irregularity that they were totally unaware of.

Their significance has to be judged in each particular case. In the young healthy person, such as the astronaut, they may be of little or no significance. An increased number along with

heart pain may be a complication of an acute heart attack.

The occasional skipped beat such as you experience is not dangerous. They have a habit of occurring when you are quiet at home and like an automobile going to the garage, fall to occur when you get to the doctor's office. That is not the usual.

I'm glad to hear that you are following a good program. We do know as well as smoking cigarettes, drinking alcohol and coffee or tea may aggravate the condition.

The infrequent early beats you now experience probably do not require any treatment. If they were frequent or really bothered you, then there are medicines to control irregularities. Inderal is one of these that works for many cases.

But you are also taking Hydrodiuril, which can wash out potassium as well as sodium. So be sure and eat a reasonable amount of fresh fruit or drink fruit juices every day to keep your potassium level up. A low potassium level can increase the heart's tendency to have irregularities such as you describe.

DEAR DR. LAMB—Recently I had a mammogram done. Everyone seemed to have been so busy that I was left in the X-ray room after the X-rays were completed for about a half hour before the doctor came in. Is there any danger of my being overexposed to harmful rays during that time?

DEAR READER—No. The machine doesn't emit additional rays unless it is turned on. There will not be enough residual rays scattered in the room to pose any problem either.

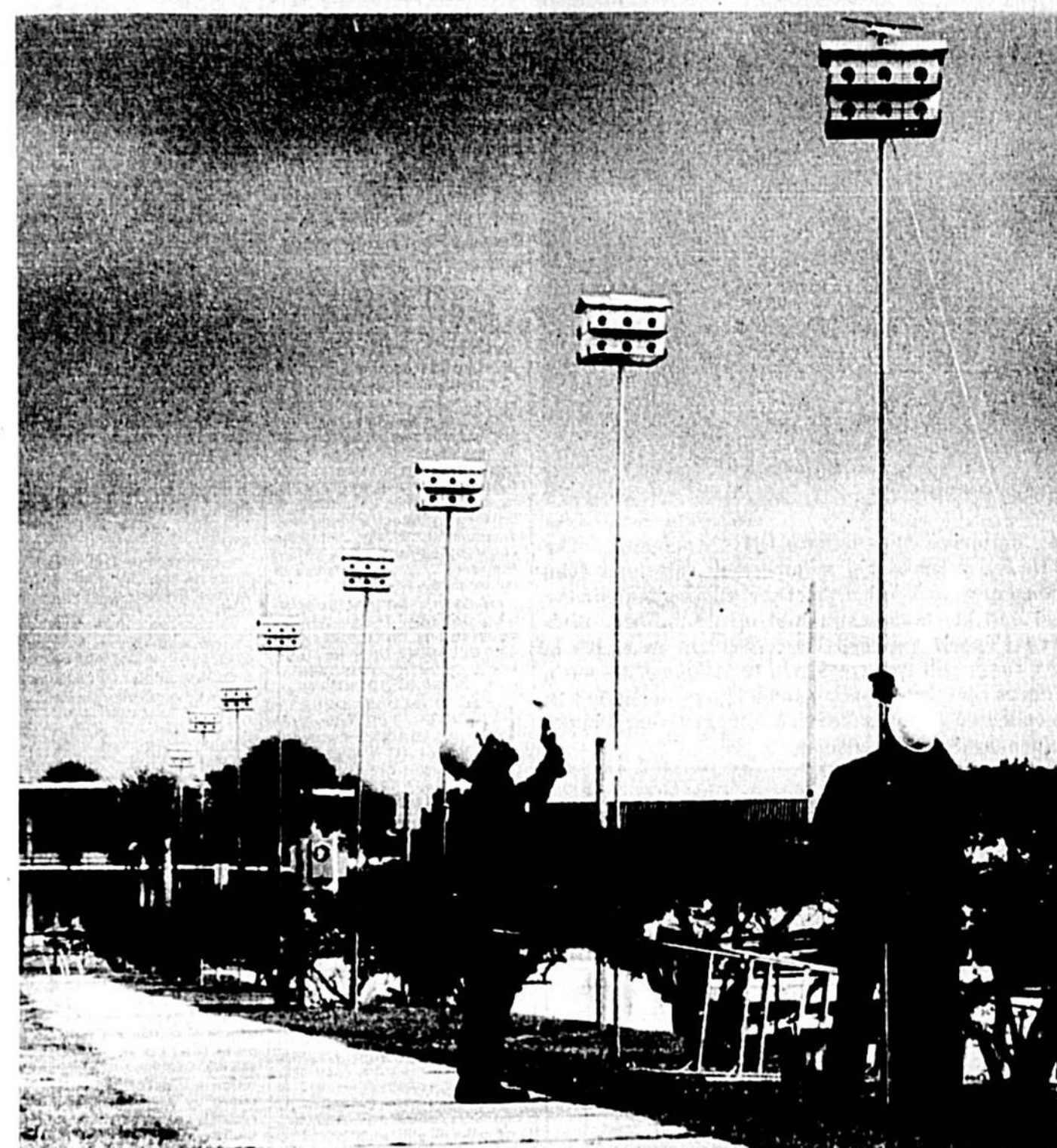

Two Lake Mary Policemen Resign, Citing Low Pay

Chief Benson said today, adding, however, the city council has been as far as it can be in allocating money for department salaries.

Benson said that other police departments in the county are paying better salaries and the Lake Mary officers are well aware of it. Currently the only pay raise a Lake Mary officer can plan on is \$300 after the first year on the job. There is no salary plan for providing other long-term increases after the first year.

"In many departments an officer can look forward to being paid as much as I am — \$13,500 annually — after a few years," Benson said. He added that he is retired from a police position he held for many years in New Jersey and is not seeking a higher salary.

Councilman Ver Olgers reported the Horton and Pringle resignations to fellow councilmen Thursday night.

"They left because they couldn't survive on the money they were paid," said Olgers, the city council's liaison to the police department.

'You're Losing More Than Time'

As interest rates soar through the roof, and inflation forces purchasing power to take up permanent residence in the basement, many people are sadly concluding that owning a home of their own is no longer a viable part of the American Dream.

Hoping to keep the dream from becoming a nightmare, the Mid-Florida Homebuilders Association (MFHA) today announced a 60-day price freeze on all new homes, those under construction as well as those under construction.

In addition, during the next two months the association plans to hold seminars in the Seminole, Orange, and Osceola counties area to help potential homebuyers get the most for their housing dollar.

The freeze, which will run Feb. 14-April 5, will not cover every new house in tri-county area, but only those of association members.

The MFHA is composed of 980 local firms including builders, realtors, mortgage companies, construction materials

MFHA President Michael Ashington-Pickett said the freeze is strictly voluntary, "but I've yet to hear of anyone who isn't going along."

So, despite possible market fluctuations, "prices in this area for the next 60 days will be locked," Ashington-Pickett said. "It will be a good time to buy a house."

But a lot of people haven't been buying which is why the MFHA came up with the freeze idea.

"There's a terrific number of potential homebuyers who, because of prices and interest rates and what inflation is doing to their incomes, were holding back," Ashington-Pickett said, "and I don't blame them."

"But, unfortunately, things aren't going to get much better. If you don't stake your claim now, you may never be in a position to do so," he said. "That's sort of what we mean by our campaign motto: 'You're losing more than time.'"

"Forecasters predict the absolute lowest mortgage rates will go in '81 is maybe 12 percent. They're at 15 percent now (a

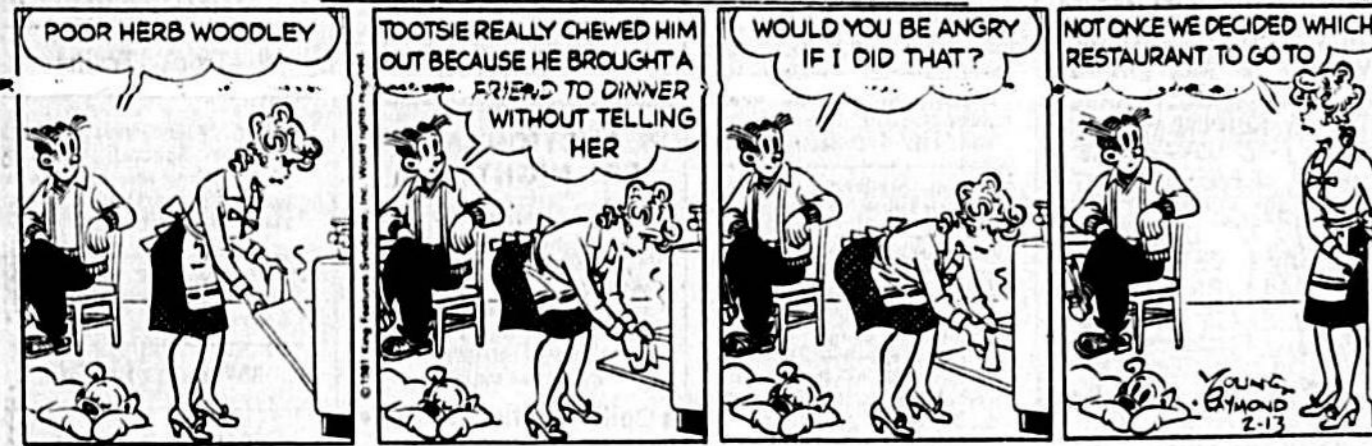
But say you take the MFHA's advice and buy now. What you will find is that the median price of a new one-family home in central Florida is \$87,500, up from \$37,500 in 1976, and \$23,400 in 1970.

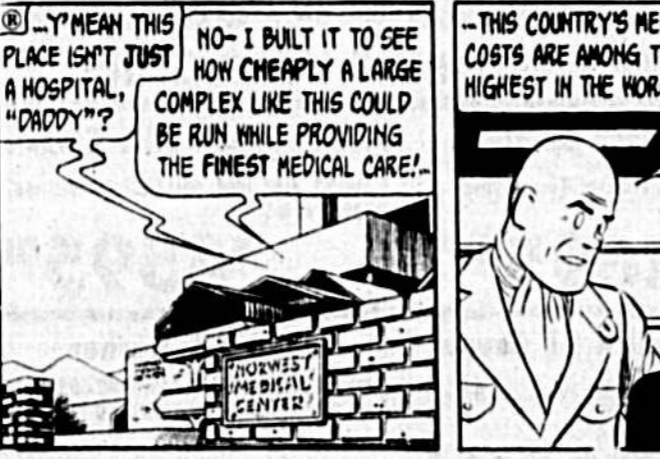

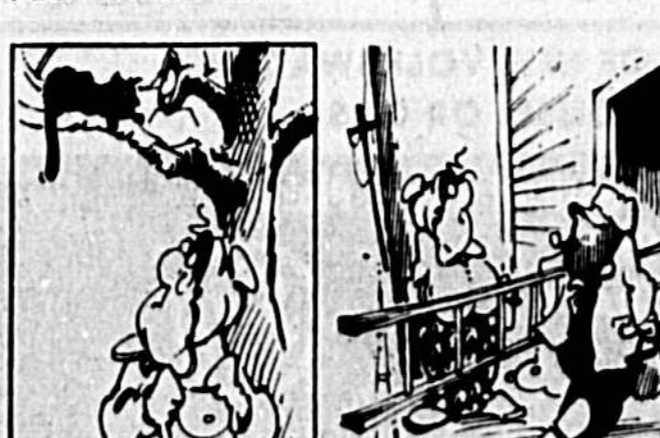

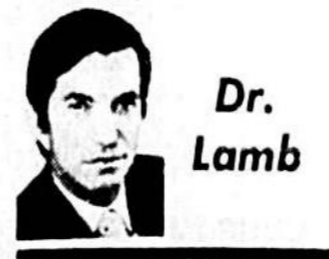

Fad Diets Blamed For Poor Eating

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am the nurse in an all girl's high school and come in contact with students constantly on starvation diets. On many occasions we've had students faint from lack of food. I have called the County Health department, The Dairy Council and several other agencies, but all they can recommend to me are brochures on the four basic foods.



Do you have any flyers, brochures, etc., that I might obtain to counsel these students on the hazards of drastic dieting? I would appreciate any help you can give us.

DEAR READER — The country seems to be plagued by two great ills — obesity and dangerous dieting. In my opinion, the large number of ads promoting fad diets is largely responsible for the dangerous practices such as you are seeing in high school students.

Fainting is a common consequence of many of those diets. Why? Because many low-carbohydrate plans depend on the body's tendency to wash out sodium, and with it, water. This, of course, does absolutely nothing to correct obesity, which is the accumulation of fat, not fluid.

Loss of hair, disturbances in the menstrual cycle, loss of interest in sex by the male and many other problems from such dietary fads are discussed in The Health Letter number 16-2, Dangerous Dieting, which I am sending you. Others who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me, in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y. 10019. This issue should be useful as a handout to youngsters you see who are not on a proper dietary program.

I approve of prevention and control of obesity but it can be done in a slow, sensible way that doesn't endanger one's health. Developing permanent good dietary habits

Since the 10-9-8-7-6-5 of spades were kind enough to drop under dummy's king-queen, Phil had time to knock out the heart and club aces and take 10 tricks for a top score.

It is rare indeed that playing one notrump and making four will be worth a top, but this time it was. No one bid game. Those who played in spades made only three as did all other notrump declarers because they finessed dummy's queen of diamonds in all instances.

Don't Know Ratchet From A Hatchet?

It's not that Jay Gordon has anything against repairmen, for many jobs they are indispensable. But when it comes to many repairs that have to be done around the house, Gordon feels a little information is all it takes for the average homeowner to successfully do the job himself.

To help the average person save the cost of a service charge plus the cost of repairing the item, Gordon offers a Home Fix-It Course through the Leisure Time program at Seminole Community College.

The eight-week course covers classroom theory and offers hands-on experience in areas of plumbing, carpentry, auto mechanics, electricity and appliance repair. "Anything around the house that you can put in your car," Gordon claims, "we can repair."

You may not know the difference between a ratchet and a hatchet, but if you have any special areas of concern, Gordon will help you understand it. The Casselberry resident, who is an auto mechanic, a Shrine clown, and works part-time in a mortuary, will show you how to install new doors or change the locks. He will teach you how to mix and pour concrete, lay carpets, prepare walls for papering, or how to safely change the circuit breakers in your home.

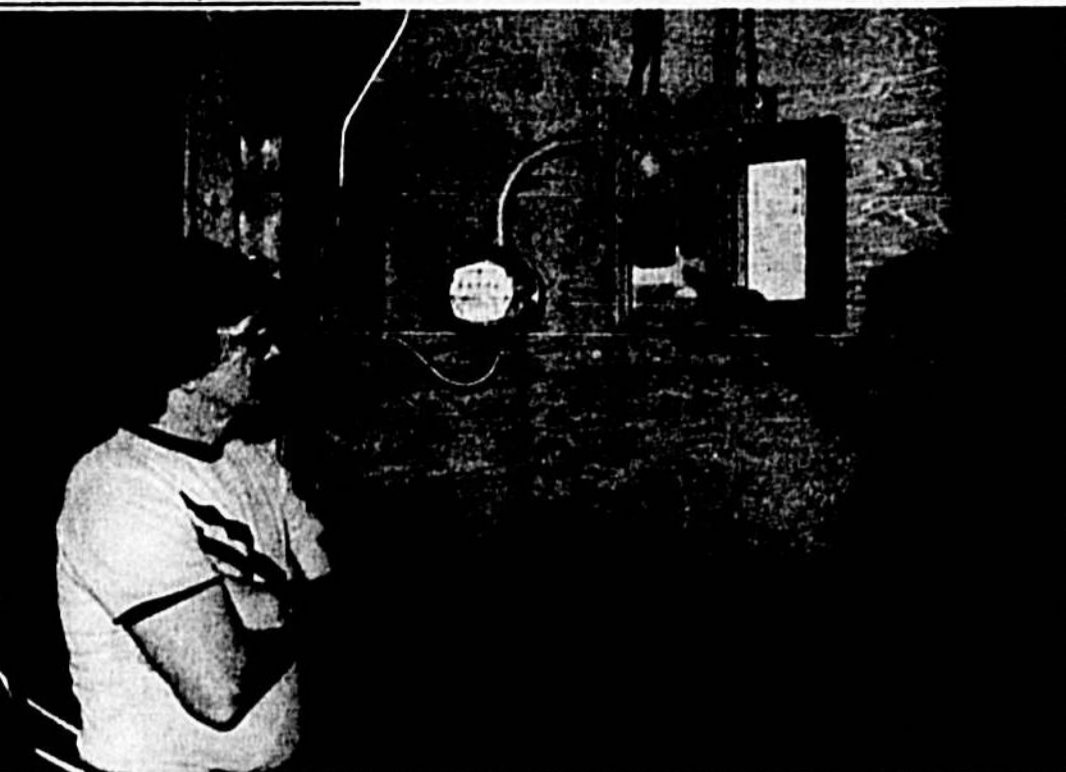
He will show you how to install a timer on your water heater that will help cut your electric bill significantly. He can show you how to operate woodworking tools without losing a finger.

"You know, there are people who'll spend \$4 to \$500 for woodworking tools and then they're scared to death to use them," Gordon said.

Gordon said there are many things the average person could do around the house if he only knew a few little tricks of the trade and had the right tools.

"All the way through it's a relationship piece," Jackson explains. "It's about a high school teacher who's been widowed. She lives with her grandmother. Then, she and one of her senior students (played by Gerard Prendergast) fall in love.

"It's based on the true story of a couple who live, I think, somewhere in upstate New York. They've now been married for five or six years. He's out of college and they're very happy. Some of the incidents which are in the film are, of course, made up, but some are things that really happened to them — like the harassment that the teacher went through.

"It's a lovely love story; I'm so proud of it."

Kate Jackson received a big bonus by appearing in "Thin Ice" — the opportunity to work with screen legend Lillian Gish, who portrays the grand-

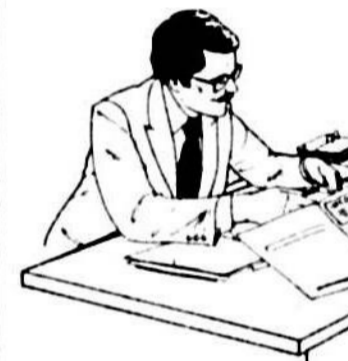
mother in the story. Miss Jackson made sure she was fully informed about her role before beginning her work on the film:

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Balloon Lands In Northern India

Mighty Himalayas Stop 'Jules Verne'—For Now

Two American adventurers trying to float around the world in a giant balloon landed in northern India today in what their spokesman said was probably apprehension over whether they could clear the mighty Himalayas.

They were in "excellent spirits," reported Bob Rice, a meteorologist from a weather station in Bedford, Mass., who spoke to them by radio.

The balloon passed over a corner of southern Iran Friday, but there were no incidents, despite the Islamic regime's refusal to grant overflight clearance.

It left the warm Egyptian desert floor. Air temperature outside the balloon, named after the author of "Around the World in 80 Days," was minus 22 degrees.

Tax Cut Delayed; Price Easing Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Reagan has decided to cut taxes effective this July, instead of retroactive to last month — a move that may disappoint taxpayers but will give him more budget-slasher flexibility.

The Labor Department said Friday producer prices rose by 0.9 percent in January, the biggest monthly rise since August. At that rate, it said, the increase over a 12-month period would be 10.8 percent.

The president met much of Friday with economic advisers and Cabinet members and decided, with little debate, on the July date recommended by Budget Director David Stockman.

Under the Kemp-Roth plan embraced by Reagan, personal income taxes would be reduced by 10 percent for each of the next three years. He hopes this will perk up the economy by boosting Americans' purchasing power.

It said prices of crude materials, those used in making finished products, actually fell 1 percent in January, signaling a possible retail break.

White House press secretary Jim Brady said Reagan agreed on a foreign aid figure of \$6.9 billion, less than the \$8.1 billion proposed by the Carter administration but about \$1 billion more than Stockman had recommended.

Cable TV Franchise Still Open

Seminole Cablevision is to be given another shot at gaining a franchise in Lake Mary.

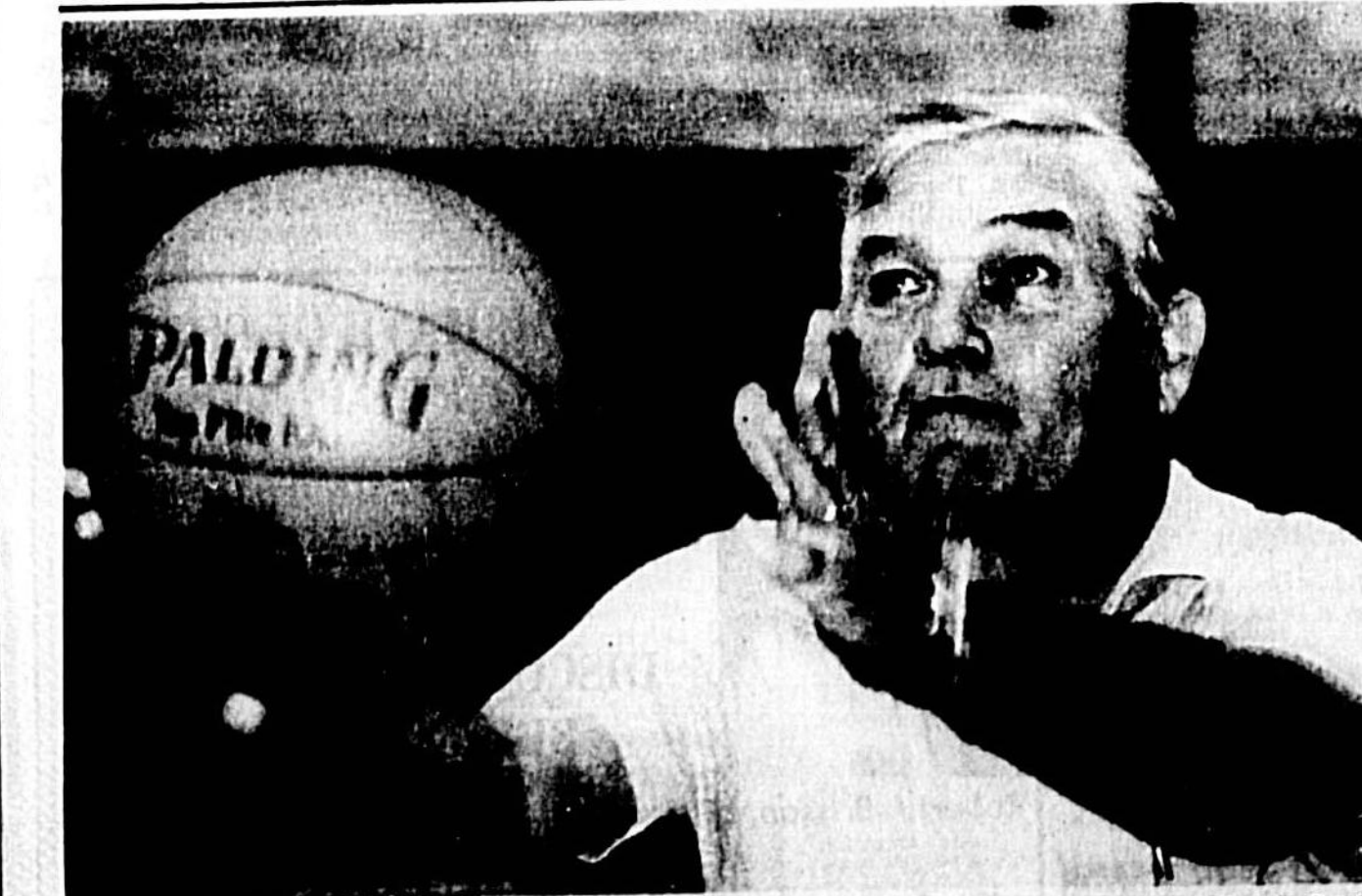

Pfc. Garwood 'Dishonorable,' But Goes Free

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (UPI) — Pfc. Robert R. Garwood, who spent 14 years collaborating with the Viet Cong and the North Vietnamese and another two waiting for the Marines to court-martial him for it, is a free man today.

Garwood, who could have been sentenced to life in prison on his conviction of collaboration with the enemy, instead was merely sentenced to a dishonorable discharge Friday.

The five-man jury of Vietnam veterans who convicted him, decided in just an hour's deliberation the only American turncoat of the Vietnam War should not be sent to prison at all.

Garwood's lawyers readily admitted he collaborated with the Viet Cong and made no attack on witnesses who saw Garwood in jungle prison camps. But they claimed Viet Cong torture drove him insane, and they produced psychiatrists to testify he needs years of treatment to return to normal.

Garwood is charged with attempting to commit sexual abuse by force and with committing and attempting to commit a "lewd and lascivious act." The charges stem from an alleged incident Aug. 7 involving a 7-year-old Jacksonville girl.

She'll Do Commercial For Cause

NEW YORK (UPI) — Valerie Harper has never done a television commercial — but she will, if the price is right. Her price isn't a big paycheck. It's a blow struck by the sponsor in her personal war against hunger — food, perhaps, from the Jolly Green Giant people, trucks in which to carry it from Ford or Chrysler, medicine from Parke-Davis, tools, clothing, soap or seed.

Any such donation to the starving millions in Somalia, on the Horn of Africa, will get the former "Rhoda" into the pitchman's circle on behalf of any producer's product, just as long as the sponsor is willing to make one firm affirmation in her commercial.

"I would want him to say, 'Hunger is an obsolete disease and I know it can be conquered,'" Miss Harper said Tuesday. "I've never done a commercial because I always thought they wouldn't be good for my career, but I'd do commercials for this. I certainly would."

"We've had famine around so long it's like gravity and taxes. We feel it's inevitable, but it's not. We must change our minds and our hearts and our attitudes ... by 1997, hunger will be over."

Friends of the former Rhoda Morgenstern would never recognize her now. Greyhound slender and eyes blazing with mission, she came to New York with Tony Cacciotti — manager, partner in TAL Productions, and No. 1 man in her life — to campaign for a "grassroots" uprising against starvation which she said kills 28 people a minute, worldwide, "and 21 of those are under 5."

No missionary ever preached the gospel with more zeal than she and Cacciotti pack into their appeal for help. Together, they are spiritual arsonists, setting fire to the conscience and building blazes under apathy wherever

they go. In their view, the American people — not just the American government — should be in the trenches for the fight.

"The end of hunger resides in each one of us," Miss Harper said. "When the Somalis are starving in body, we, the human family, are starving in spirit."

Miss Harper's passion for the Somalis was ignited when she and Cacciotti went to Africa to film a documentary on the drought and war-caused famine that grips the nation. They have been pushing the film and carrying their appeal to talk shows and interviews ever since.

"The people are so beautiful, so dignified," said Cacciotti. "They were dying, but they were not begging ... the film is just devastating. I hope to get it on the college circuit and have it syndicated where it can be shown to theater audiences."

He also is in the process of signing up celebrities — Muhammad Ali, Stevie Wonder, Dom Deluise and Vidal Sassoon among them — to do public service commercials aimed at raising consciousness of the problem as well as money.
