## Possibility Of Natural Gas In Area Creates Considerable Discussion

### Top News In Brief

**JAKARTA, Indonesia**—Indonesia's religious parties united today to reject President Sukarno's efforts to abandon the Western democratic system and install a "guided democracy" with Communist participation.

**WASHINGTON**—Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) warned today the Eisenhower Doctrine could cost U. S. taxpayers billions of dollars. He joined Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.) in urging that the Senate strip the proposed doctrine of economic and military aid provisions.

**WASHINGTON**—The Joint House-Senate Economic Committee urged Congress today to give small businesses some tax relief this year. But the committee supported President Eisenhower's position that this is no time for a general tax cut.

**WASHINGTON**—President Eisenhower and French Premier Guy Mollet agreed today that a solution to the Middle East problems can be achieved by peaceful means. Mr. Eisenhower and the Premier issued a joint communique as Mollet concluded his Washington visit and left for New York.

**CHICAGO**—A Skid Row dishwasher was thrust back into the limelight today on the basis of a teen-aged girl's statement that she had seen his pictures in the wallet of one of the slain Grimes sisters.

**CAIRO**—The rulers of four Arab nations reached agreement Wednesday night on a six-point resolution proclaiming their "positive neutrality" in world affairs between the blocs led by the United States and Russia. The four nations pledged an alliance to work for Israel's "immediate and unconditional withdrawal" behind the armistice lines, but did not threaten action if Israel failed to comply.

### Nixon Will Leave Today On Goodwill Tour Of Africa

**WASHINGTON**—Vice President Richard M. Nixon leaves today on a mission to prove that the smile and handshake of American politics can be as effective in winning friends in Africa as it was in Asia.

Nixon, who departs this afternoon on a 17,815-mile goodwill tour of Africa, plans to spend as much time as possible with the "little" people of the nine nations he will visit.

The vice president used the same person-to-person diplomacy with reported success during his 1953 tour of Asia. He even broke up an anti-American demonstration in Burma by walking up to talk things over with the Communist leaders.

Attractive Pat Nixon, who again will accompany her 44-year-old husband, also plans to repeat her Asian performance by visiting schools, hospitals and libraries to compare notes with local women leaders.

Ruby M. Hollis of Casselberry is reported to have received possible back injuries and severe shock. Patrolman Gene patrol said the ranchwagon struck the Allied Van Lines' semi truck driven by Glen Herndon of Norfolk, Va.

Minor damage was estimated to the left front fender of the ranchwagon but no damage to the van.

Charges have been placed against Mrs. Hollis, said Coffman.

### Committees Named In Effort To Form Fund Drive Here

Representatives from civic organizations and organizations agreeing to participate in a United Fund Drive for Sanford and Seminole County named committees last night in a step toward permanently organizing.

Willis Peacock, of the Florida State Bank, as temporary chairman presided at the meeting with A. B. Peterson Jr. of St. Johns Realty Co. serving as temporary secretary.

Three committees were named but only chairman was appointed at last night's meeting. The committees named were: Nominating Committee, Public Relations Committee with Bill Gramkow as chairman, and a By-Laws Committee.

The group went on record last night, recommending to the permanent organization, that Oct. 1, 1957 be adopted as the kick-off date for the first drive.

It was also recommended to the permanent organization that "We affiliate ourselves with the United Fund Drive."

Peacock will serve as chairman of the new temporary organization until permanent officers are named by the nominating committee.

### Flooding Rivers In Northwest Force Many From Homes

Flooding rivers, fed by melted snow, forced hundreds from their homes in the Northwest, and dangerously high rivers threatened to spill over their banks in other parts of the nation today.

The Red Cross rushed bedding, food, milk and other necessities for some 300 residents of Wilson Creek, Wash., who spent the night in schools, churches and homes of nearby farmers after the town was covered with up to five feet of water.

Although the waters of Crab Creek had receded slightly, the Weather Bureau warned that expected temperatures in the 80s today could cause a fresh deluge.

Railroad traffic was cut off through Wilson Creek because flood waters undermined the approaches to the bridge over the creek. Tracks on both sides of the bridge hung suspended in the air.

### J. Bergman, Hudson Named In Look's Movie Awards

**NEW YORK**—Ingrid Bergman and Rock Hudson were named the best actress and best actor of the year today in Look Magazine's 16th annual movie awards.

Miss Bergman was cited for her performance in "Anastasia" and Hudson for his role in "Giant."

The Look award for the best screenplay went to Tennessee Williams for the controversial "Baby Doll."

Other awards included: Best Supporting Players: Oscar Homolka, "War and Peace," and Marie Windsor, "The Killing." Most Promising Newcomers: Anthony Perkins, "Friendly Persuasion," and Carroll Baker, "Giant," and "Baby Doll."

### Jan M. Wallis Is Killed In Crash

Word has just been received by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Walter of 2605 Sanford Ave. that their grandson, Jan M. Wallis, was killed in the crash in February of an Army Transport plane enroute from Korea to Japan.

Wallis was expected back in the United States early in April and it is believed, according to his grandparents, he was on the start of his homeward journey when the disaster occurred.

Wallis had been in Korea for over a year, having joined the Army shortly after his graduation from Seminole High School in 1955.

## Navy Plans Full Study Of Base Before Decision

### Annual American Legion Fair Will Be Here Mar. 18-23

The American Legion will stage its annual Fair in Seminole County again this year. Commander Lynn Lyon of the Campbell-Lossing Post, said today.

Arrangements have been made to bring the American Legion Fair to Sanford during the week of March 18-23.

Lyon said this morning "We are very fortunate in securing the James E. Straite Show for the midway this year."

"We have been negotiating with the show officials since last November and only within the last few days have we been able to secure one of the largest show organizations in the South for our annual event," Lyon stated.

"Ordinarily we hold our fair during the first week in February," said Lyon, "and the reason we are six weeks late is that the negotiations have taken so much time in order that we might bring to the people of Seminole County a bigger and better fair than ever."

R. Z. Johnson Jr., president of the American Legion Fair Association, said that the Fair will be held at the old fair grounds at the corner of Mellonville and Celery Aves.

All arrangements have been completed said Johnson and "we are ready to go ahead with our plans to stage the annual fair."

Lyon, making the announcement that it will be held this year, expressed hope that, even though the fair is late, the crowds in the history of the local fair will file through the main gate.

### Assembly Cancels Mid-East Session

**UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.**—The United Nations General Assembly canceled its scheduled session on the Middle East again today, awaiting official announcement of developments in Washington.

The 80-nation Parliament called off the debate scheduled for 10:30 a.m. It was the third straight such cancellation. Officials said the assembly "probably" would resume its Middle East discussion this afternoon.

Diplomatic sources said there was a good chance the Americans would not present their measure if Israel agrees to withdraw from Egypt on Washington's assurances alone.

Up to Wednesday night Asian and African countries stood firmly behind their demand for U. N. sanctions against Israel and were demanding to be heard.

But in view of Washington reports of Israeli agreement to withdraw its troops from the Gulf of Aqaba and the Gaza Strip, observers believed the Afro-Asian bloc would hold off a bit longer.

Diplomatic sources said if the Washington talks result in actual Israeli withdrawal, there would be no need for the Arabs to press for sanctions or for the United States to introduce its proposed "middle way" resolution.

However, the assembly still may have to give some direction to Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld on the positioning of the UN Emergency Force after the Israeli troops leave Egypt.

## Government OK's Proposed Roads

**TALLAHASSEE**—The federal government has approved the general routing of six proposed highways in Florida totaling 1,164 miles.

The interstate highway system includes the limited access highway from Daytona to St. Petersburg which will also connect Deland and Sanford by way of a causeway across the St. Johns River.

A portion of the route to be known as 104 is now under study by consulting engineers to determine a route through the Tampa Area. Length of the entire route from the Polk-Osceola line to Daytona Beach is 87.4 miles while the route from St. Petersburg to Polk-Osceola line is 65.7 miles.

From Daytona Beach to St. Petersburg is 153.1 miles.

Location parties are now completing a preliminary survey of the route from Sanford to Daytona Beach, a distance of 33 miles.

The location through Orlando is under way by a firm of consulting engineers and is well underway.

Preparation of plans from State Road 46 west of Sanford to State Road 48 east of Deland, approximately 15 miles in length, has been given to a firm of consultants. The estimated cost for this portion of the project which includes the causeway is \$5,000,000.

However, according to William H. Diehl, no routes will be determined as final until public hearings are held in each community affected.

The roads are to be built under the interstate highway program.

Approvals of specific routing will be made in the future by the local U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, Federal Highway Administrator B. D. Tallamy told the State Road Board Wednesday.

The blanket approval covered all six proposed routes and legs leading into Pensacola and Miami. The Miami route cuts through 36th street across to Miami Beach.

Route 101 will run down the East Coast from the Georgia line through the Jacksonville expressway to the Jacksonville expressway.

### Plane Crashes On Takeoff; 2 Die

**ENID, Okla.**—A twin-engine C45, based at Shaw Air Force Base, S. C., crashed on its takeoff at Vance Air Force Base here at 6:32 a. m. today, killing the pilot and co-pilot and seriously injuring the third member of the crew.

Officials said the plane was taking off from the south to the north and was about 20 feet off the ground when it suddenly veered to the left, crashed and burned.

Names of the victims were not disclosed, pending notification of kin.

### Thomas Reveals Action

**WASHINGTON**—The Navy plans a full study of all details before deciding whether to move its Naval Air Station from Sanford, Navy Secretary Charles S. Thomas has promised.

Thomas informed Senators Spessard L. Holland and George Smathers and Congressman A. S. "Syd" Herlong Jr. their request to retain the station would be given full consideration.

Thomas expects a recommendation from a survey team by June 1.

"Full consideration will be given to such factors as economy, community relations and the feasibility of expanding the existing station at Sanford as well as the recommendations of the survey team," he said.

Thomas said the present Sanford runways cannot handle landing of jet aircraft, and the Navy must decide whether to expand Sanford or relocate the base.

The statements were contained in a letter addressed to Congressman A. S. Herlong Jr. and delivered to Congressman Herlong, Senator Smathers and Senator Holland late yesterday afternoon.

Receipt of the letter came after more than an hour-long conference with the Secretary of the Navy Tuesday afternoon. The Congressional Delegation was accompanied by J. Bralley Odham, Sanford builder and Seminole County Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider.

Krider, in a telephone conversation this morning said that "We have opened up something new and are exploring the feasibility of expanding our present base to both the South and the East."

He stated "We have a conference this morning with Admiral W. V. Davis, Chief of Planning for the Navy since it looks like this is the trend that plans are now taking."

Senator George Smathers, in his conversation with the Secretary of the Navy, seemed to have struck a theme which might be followed when he said "We've got about 17 million dollars invested in the Naval Air Station at Sanford and due to the economy trend now, we should expand the present base to accommodate the bombers."

Krider was extremely enthusiastic about the outcome of meetings and conferences that are now being held in Washington in the all-out effort to keep the Naval Air Station in the Seminole County Area.

The full text of the letter from the Secretary of the Navy Charles S. Thomas to Congressman A. S. Herlong Jr. follows:

### Crew Fixes Plane's Frozen Nose Wheel With Juice, Coffee

**DETROIT**—A crippled airliner carrying 36 anxious persons circled nearby over two cities for hours Wednesday before its crew fixed a frozen nose wheel with orange juice and coffee and brought the big ship in for a perfect landing.

Capt. William Richey, 38, Minneapolis, set the Capital Airlines Constellation down at Willow Run Airport with only a few slight bumps.

Emergency Equipment Ready

Ambulances and fire and police rescue squads, which waited tensely for the large plane to come in, sped out to the taxiing craft but were not needed. None of the 36 passengers, and five crew members was injured.

Many of the passengers came out of the plane smiling and were quickly hustled off to a lounge in the airport terminal. The crew remained aboard the ship to confer with Capital officials.

Richey, a Capital pilot for 11 years, said the plane's nose wheel froze shortly after the four-engine ship took off from Gen. Mitchell Field at Milwaukee with 15 passengers bound for Detroit and the rest for Philadelphia.

Ralph Reid, Capital's director of engineering, blamed the trouble on a "hydraulic leak."

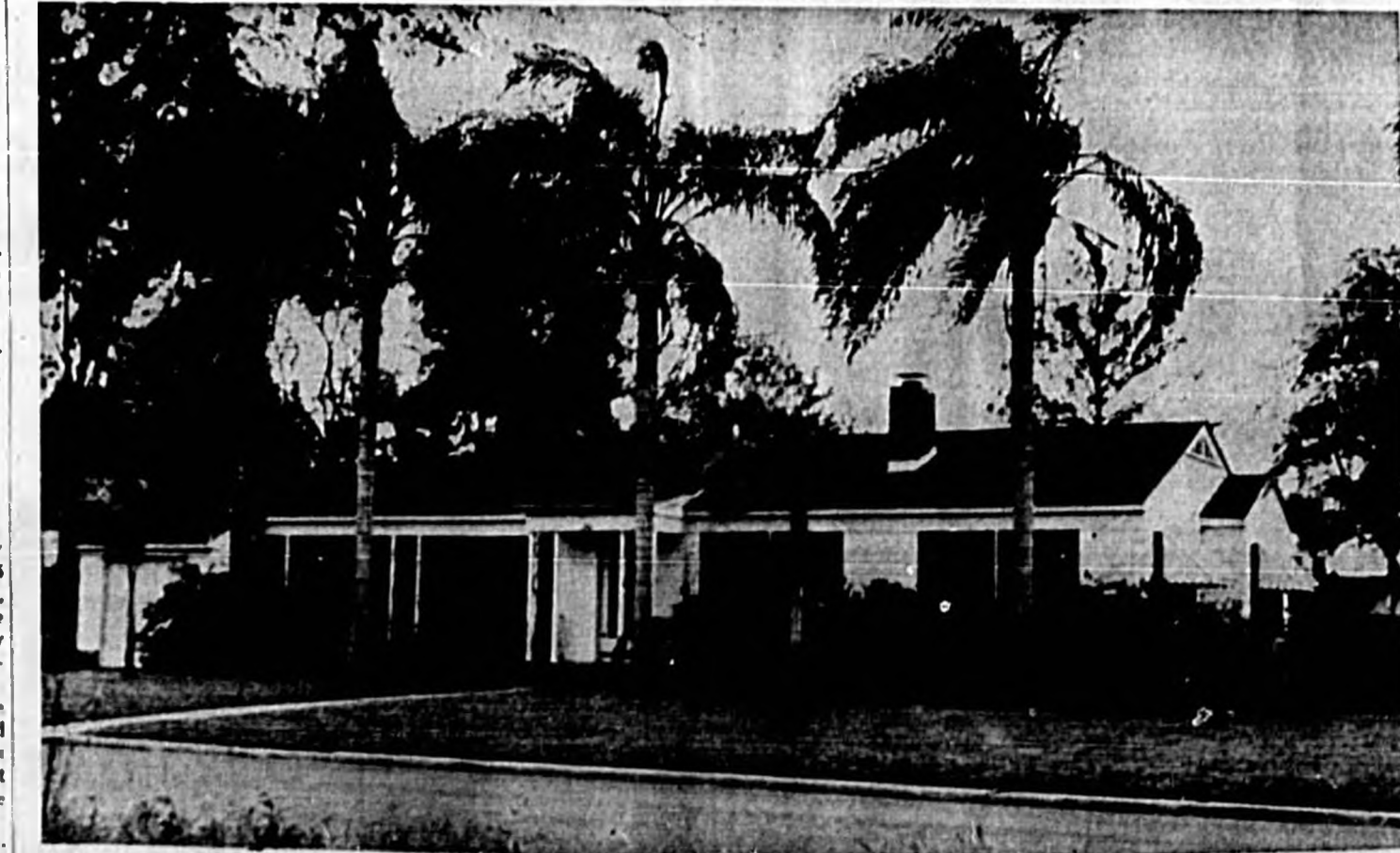

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# Docks, Terminals Project Is Important To City's Industry

The project that will have the greatest effect on Sanford and Seminole County's economic life—next to keeping the Navy within our own community—is the Docks and Terminals project for which a survey was recently completed for the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

It is well to remember that such a project, to cost approximately a half million dollars, will bring industry to Sanford at an unprecedented rate.

Faith in the project, on the part of important businessmen and executives outside of the City of Sanford, is so great that one within the city could not help but realize that the project's importance is of profound significance.

Hundreds of businessmen and citizens within the city of Sanford are aware of the top importance of the docks and terminals—they are aware of the value of such a project to the City—they are also cognizant of the fact that such a project will mean savings of millions of dollars in years to come in freight rates alone.

Good news to most of those who are behind the Docks and Terminals project is the fact that the Board of Sanford City Commissioners . . . in the most part . . . are wholeheartedly in favor of making the project a reality.

As one commissioner put it . . . at Monday night's commission meeting . . . "If we had the Docks and Terminals tomorrow we would be 25 years late."

Somehow that same expression has been reverberating around and around among the forward thinking businessmen of the area—not only here in Sanford—but all over Central Florida.

As W. M. Bostwick, the engineer of Daytona Beach, who made the survey, aptly put it on the frontpiece of the portfolio "Sanford-Seminole County The Wholesale Distributing Center for Central Florida" would be the future of this area.

It is not hard to imagine just what would happen with a project of such wide value throughout the Central Florida area actually in operation. Sanford would begin expanding at a rate yet undetermined. Warehouses, small industry, large industry, shipping houses, brokerage houses and offices, assembly plants, and many other types of businesses would begin booming.

Hardly an inch of ground between French Ave. and the Lake Monroe Bridge, between West First St. and the lakefront would be left. A building or structure would be standing on all of it, utilizing the entire area as a vast industrial region.

Certainly, with such terrific growth in industry, there would come an avalanche of requests for homes and living quarters. Apartment houses would be in demand; hotels would have to expand; motels would be necessary. And in addition there would be a need for more garages, repair shops, bakeries, grocery stores, and every other type of store or retail supply house.

## Fire Coverage

What would you do if fire destroyed your house?

There is a superficially easy answer to that question.

You'd take the insurance money and rebuild. It would be a nuisance, of course, but you wouldn't be out of pocket.

The trouble with this idea is that, in a vast number of cases, it simply isn't true. Legions of homeowners think they are adequately insured against fire and related hazards when they think about the matter at all—but the fact is that their coverage is woefully inadequate.

A simple statistic tells the story. Since the end of the war, governments and other tabulations show, average building costs have just about doubled. That is generally true of practically everything inside the walls of the house—furnishings, clothing, appliances and so on. Yet, according to insurance studies a great many people have unwittingly failed to increase their coverage to compensate if fire strikes, in those cases, there simply won't be enough insurance money to begin to pay for rebuilding.

The remedy for the individual homeowner is to consult with his local professional insurance agent or broker. This man knows values and costs, and he knows just how much insurance each of his clients should carry. And he knows how to fit to fire policy into the total insurance picture.

## Minimum Wage Law

Ever since the federal minimum wage law came into being, certain service enterprises, retailing among them, have been exempted. Periodically efforts have been made to extend the law to retailing, and that is the case again this year.

The reasons for the retail exemption are sound, and nothing has happened to change the situation. For one thing, retailing is a local business, governed by local needs and conditions—including local living costs. It is obvious that a blanket law, covering the great cities and the little towns indiscriminately, cannot be just to all.

For another thing, retailing is a business which can provide jobs and training for marginal workers whose value is very small. If a high federal minimum wage is imposed by law, retailers will have no choice—they will pare that kind of employment to the bone. Then beginners will look in vain for the job which would help them for future positions requiring skills and offering good pay.

It has been proposed that the minimum wage law be extended to cover only the larger retailers, such as the chains. But this begs the issue. For, to repeat, retailing is a 100 per cent local business—and an outlet of the biggest chain must still complete on the local level, and adapt its operations to local conditions in every respect.

Congress, recognizing such facts as these, has always refused to eliminate the retail exemption. In that, it has set an excellent precedent for the present and future.

the body was not in favor of cuts this year.

Even though it hurts, we must get Federal spending down to the point where we can look toward giving our citizens a break through income tax reduction.

My mail is heavy these days with requests for tax relief. Writes a Daytona Beach grocer: "Please, and this is for our great middle classes that are in the 'squeeze', try to get us some tax relief, in our income taxes. We are all wet in sitting down and letting the Federal government keep giving away our tax money by the billions. Surely those who are doing it should know by this time that we can't buy loyalty, friendship or love, with our goods, tax money or sons."

I was astounded before voting that the reduction in the first Office appropriation would not interfere with or stop any of its services. The money voted for the Post Office actually was \$67 million more than was appropriated for the present year. About \$162 million of the increase is for contributions to the civil service retirement and disability fund and the remaining \$45 million is for services above the present level.

Had the House failed to go along with the recommendations of its appropriations committee, it would have been a signal that

Expansion of natural gas lines also will give the state opportunity to share in the wide industrial applications of "inert gas" operations Funk declared. In these, gas is burned under specially controlled conditions to produce an oxygen-free atmosphere. Synthetic some of the newest plants in the textile fibers are being made the Southeast by this method.

Inert gas made with natural gas also is proving valuable in storing dehydrated alfalfa. This new storage technique is credited with preserving nutrition values in the feed much better than ordinary methods. So far it is used mostly in the Midwest, but said Mr. Funk, there is every reason to expect it will grow in other sections, and Florida has a big potential in livestock feed processing.

Among the almost countless applications of natural gas in metal working operations, automatic forging processes are of growing importance. Industrial gas furnaces are vital in this line, Funk explained because of special demands as to speed and uniformity in heating.

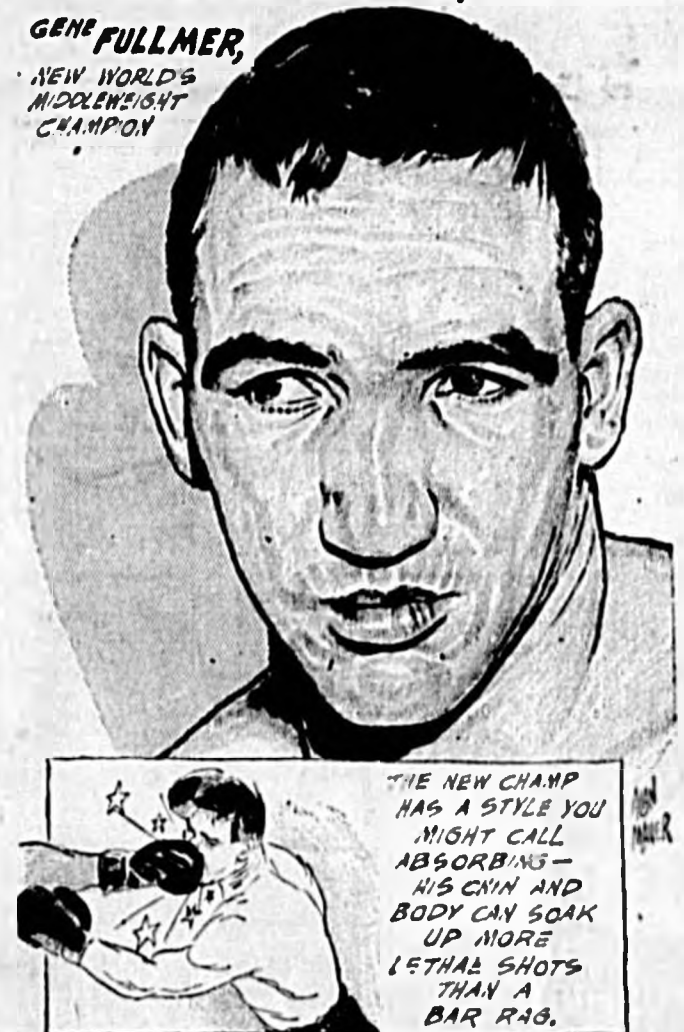

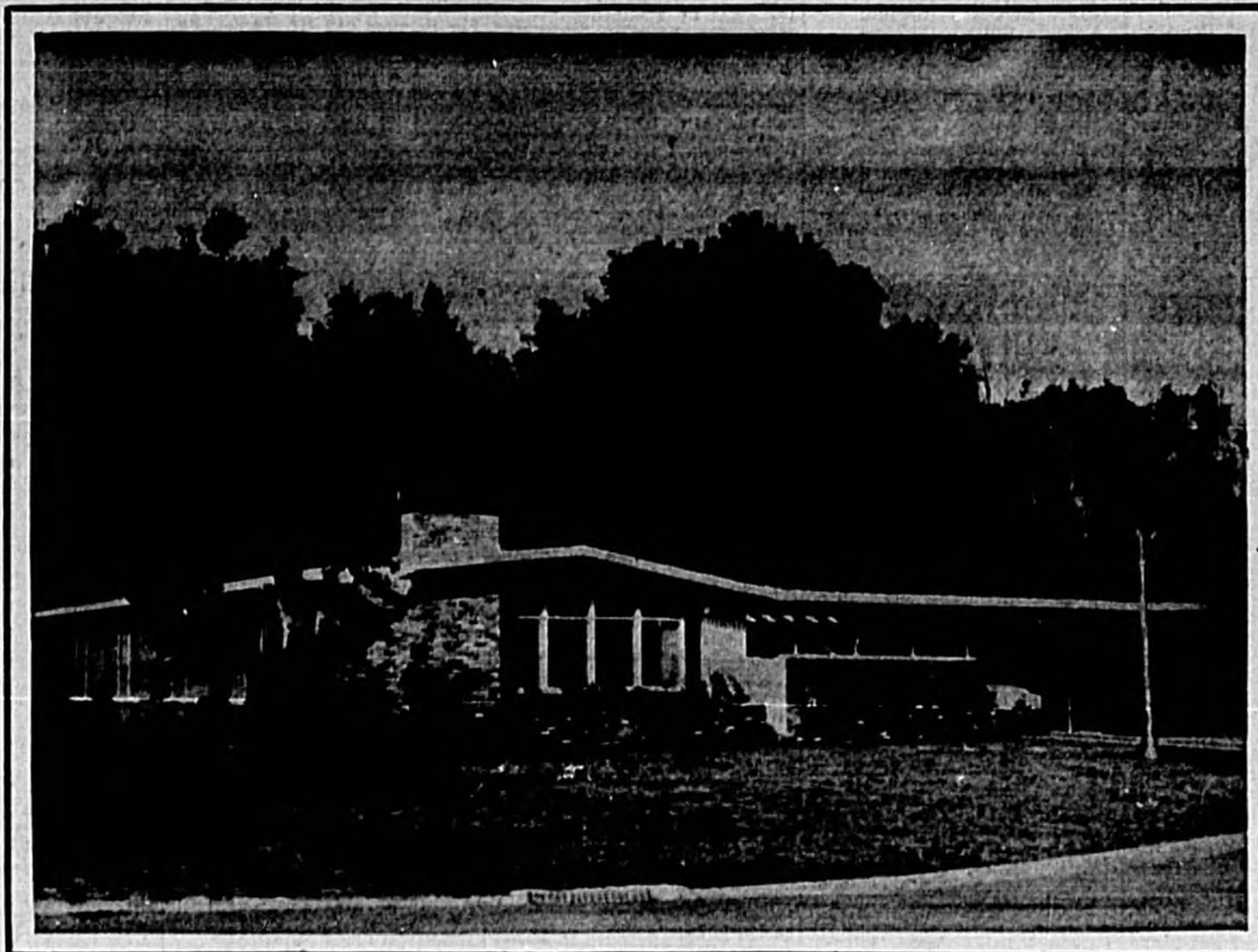

"We'll have the biggest crowd in Sanford on that day in the history of Sanford," Mayor Gatchel remarked as plans for the event were discussed.

President G. Andrew Speer stated that a chairman for the big event will be named at Tuesday night's Jaycee Board of Directors meeting when plans for Navy Appreciation Day will be discussed. The automobile, on which contributions to the "Keep the Navy in Sanford" are now being accepted, will be given away on the night of the gigantic Navy Appreciation Day event.

Tentative plans now call for tickets to be sold to local citizens for a nominal charge and all Navy personnel, their wives and families attending free.

Leaders for the important event slated for the end of this month began immediately to round up all possible help to stage the fish fry and other events that will be included in the Navy Appreciation Day celebration and observance.

WASHINGTON — The Senate internal security subcommittee reported today that the "Communist underground apparatus of Harry Dexter White" brought about Nationalist China's economic destruction.

ROME — Premier Antonio Segni won a shaky vote of confidence today but only sidestepped the issue which threatens to wreck his middle-of-the-road government and possibly turn Italy over to left wing leadership.

MANCHESTER, England — Shaken officials of Britain's atomic energy authority disclosed today that university students raided the top secret Calder Hall atomic center and planted a Communist flag atop the 250-foot chimney of a reactor building.

GEORGETOWN, Mass. — Investigators today studied the possibility that three Florida prisoners two of them Massachusetts residents, may have staged the "amateur" \$10,000 holdup of a branch bank.

WASHINGTON — Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) today proposed a "tough" new elections bill which would make candidates responsible for all funds spent in their behalf. The bill would limit presidential tickets to spending about 12.5 million dollars apiece in the 1960 election.

WASHINGTON — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) said today a proposal by fellow Democrats to strip a \$200 million aid provision from the Eisenhower Doctrine would "embarrass our government and dismay friendly Middle Eastern nations."

## Drive Launched To Stop Future Polio Outbreaks

CHICAGO — Medical authorities today launched a campaign to wipe out the threat of future serious polio outbreaks in the nation.

The attack is aimed against the crippling, death-dealing disease itself and at overcoming public apathy towards the Salk polio vaccine.

The American Medical Assn. has asked all state, county and city medical societies to devote the next two months to vaccinating as many persons as possible between the ages of six months and 40 years.

An AMA spokesman said less than half of the nation's potential polio victims have been inoculated.

If 50 per cent of the remainder can be vaccinated before the start of the polio season, the nation will be well on its way toward ending all but the vestiges of the great crippler, the spokesman said.

Although this was the official starting date for the campaign, mass vaccination programs already were underway in some cities.

## Three Found Dead; Double Murder, Suicide Believed

MEMPHIS — A Nashville man, his estranged wife and their 2-year-old daughter were found shot to death early today in a North Memphis home.

Homicide Inspector W. W. Wilkinson identified the victims as William Davis, 40, a wholesale jobber of sundry items, Mrs. Davis, about 35, and their daughter, Sandra Davis.

Wilkinson called it a case of double murder and suicide. Wilkinson said the Davises separated three weeks ago, and that Mrs. Davis and her daughter came here to stay with Mrs. Davis' sister, Mrs. Billy Cook.

Mr. and Mrs. Cook discovered the bodies when they returned home from California early today.

Police said Davis was slumped over a telephone. A .38-caliber pistol lay nearby.

Mrs. Davis and the little girl, clad in nightclothes, were found on the bedroom floor.
