

Handicapped Laugh At Special Yule Concert

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Some of them laughed though they couldn't see. Others sang though they couldn't hear.

It happened at a one-of-a-kind Christmas concert here Tuesday given for the fifth year in a row by Mrs. Joseph Shouse, vice president of the National Symphony Orchestra Assn.

As a "Christmas present to myself" Mrs. Shouse puts on the annual concert for some 2,600 deaf, blind, crippled or otherwise handicapped youngsters from the capital area.

Some came into the Catholic University gymnasium in wheelchairs, some carried canes tapping the floor ahead of them, some managed to maneuver with only a friendly adult on either side for moral support. So many some came had to sit on the floor.

After the music began, the youngsters acted like kids the world over. "Pop Goes The Weasel" got more handclapping than "Old Handel" and the clash of cymbals in "Carmen" draws squeals.

When it came time for everyone to join in singing Christmas carols, one pig-tailed girl strained to read the words on her program. She couldn't — despite three cataract operations so far — but she sang with a shy smile anyway.

Also singing was a group of teenage boys wearing the khaki outfit of a training center for delinquents.

When National Symphony conductor Howard Mitchell introduced the orchestra's instrumental, one youngster leaned over to steady a palsied friend who wanted to see the bassoon.

Mitchell began explaining that at concert "everyone must be absolutely quiet so everyone can hear."

The tiny little boy in the back couldn't be blamed for violating the rule and crying all the way through the concert.

He could hear all right but he couldn't see what was causing all the noise.

Mrs. Duncan wiped a tear from her cheek and said, "divorce is an admission of failure and defeat."

Mrs. Duncan, who won custody of their daughter, said, "I will stand by every word I have written. I put the children first and did not enter the petition until a week after my daughter's 16th birthday."

Paar Back In New York After Hollywood Trek

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Jack Paar show returned to New York Monday night after refreshing itself with a brief dip in Hollywood's whirlpool.

Even Paar has acknowledged the obvious — that his night-blooming humor hot-house on NBC-TV needed this Western air, for things were getting almost oppressively edgy. The Hollywood venture made it fun again. I think the turning point was the celebrated, or celebrating Mickey Rooney visit.

Before this visit, Paar was in a rut. He seemed able to talk only about his professional, intramural problems and his guests also fell into the rut with him. Cued by Paar, the guests would be called upon to deliver testimonials about how likable a chap is Jack Paar. It all became mighty sticky.

The Rooney blow up, or hiccup, rocked Paar out of this groove and once again his interesting, funny guests were permitted to be interesting and funny and to delve into non-Paar subjects.

Like all Paar viewers, I also have some theories about the man, his show and his success. My theory is summed up in the formula: High saturation publicity equals high spirits for Paar; low saturation publicity equals low spirits. I say this even though Paar makes a big thing out of his contempt for newspaper publicity. Methinks he protests too much.

The longer Paar goes unnoticed, without page one publicity, the more irascible, hypersensitive and demanding he becomes. This tends to make his show a public showcase for the display of Paar's frazzled, naked psyche. Fascinating, of course, but is it entertainment?

Remember the Dody Goodman feud? The difficulties with Walter Winchell, Newsweek, TV Guide and Jimmy Hoffa? All made news and seemed to refresh Paar's spirits for weeks. So it was with the Rooney episode.

Right now, Paar is back in his all's-well-with-the-world mood. I hope it sticks, but history tells

us he'll lose it and again start rattling around from one mood to another. He has demonstrated that he can be extremely clever, witty, gracious and tactful — a master of his business. And he also has demonstrated that he can be indiscreet, tasteless, obsequious, snobbish and, at times, even cruel.

Yet, through it all his show manages to remain fascinating. The thing that bothers me is that sometimes I feel I'm being fascinated for the wrong reasons.

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Ke Asked To Intercede In New School Crisis

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Charles C. Diggs (D-Mich.) has urged that Negro students in Little Rock, Ark., be being split on school and kicked daily. He asked President Eisenhower to intercede personally.
Diggs made his charges in a letter to Eisenhower and to Everett Ruess, president of the Little Rock School Board. He wrote after a visit of several days in Arkansas.
"Things are not as bad in the high schools as they were during the first year of integration in 1957," Diggs said. "However, there is no question that these Negro youngsters are still under severe duress."
Diggs also charged he found evidence of collusion between enforcement officers and segregationists.
Diggs said the five Negro students at Central High School and the three at Hall High School have suffered "indignities no well-bred American parent should have to stand."
In his letter to Eisenhower, Diggs said the "pattern of personal diplomacy" of the President's current overseas tour could be applied to "the grave problem of human relations here in America." He suggested Eisenhower address assemblies at Central and Hall.
"There is no place you have recently visited where the need is greater than here in America," Diggs wrote.

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State Pardon Board Probes Clemency Plea

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The State Pardon Board has asked the further investigation before acting on clemency for a Negro man sentenced to death for raping a white teen-age high school beauty.

The board said Wednesday it would take action in the case of condemned rapist Ralph Williams, 31, of St. Petersburg, after the attorney general checks conflicting dates contained in the records. The investigation probably will not be complete until early next year.

Williams' attorney told the board Wednesday the Negro was a victim of "the double standard of southern justice." He recalled that 10 Negroes have died in the Florida electric chair for raping white women but not a single white man has received the death penalty for the rape of a Negro woman.

Gov. LeRoy Collins pointed out that the so-called "double standard" was a circumstance just as true of the North as the South. Collins recalled a recent survey indicating that no white man anywhere in the nation had ever been put to death for raping a Negro.

Williams admitted sexual relations with the 17-year-old St. Petersburg girl but said it was her idea. The girl testified she never saw Williams until the night he stabbed her with an ice pick and attacked her.

The Pardon Board, at a day-long session, refused to grant clemency to condemned Miami cop-killer Norman J. Mackiewicz despite a friend's plea that Mackiewicz saved his life in World War II.

Joseph Amerin of Memphis, Tenn., told the board Mackiewicz' war experiences upset him to a point where he was not "normal." Mackiewicz was sentenced to die for gunning down an off-duty policeman at Miami Beach in 1937.

A Cabinet member pointed out Mackiewicz had been convicted of robbery before the war. State Comptroller Ray Green said it was "a question of whether his war record wipes out everything else he's done."

The board voted unanimously to spare the life of Gilbert Francis Mead, 32, of Stamford, Conn. Mead was convicted in the double slaying of his estranged wife and lover at Hollywood, Fla., in 1934.

In other action Wednesday, the board refused civil rights to former Levy County Sheriff George T. Robbins, convicted on a moonshine whiskey charge. Robbins has served his term but cannot run for office again until civil rights are restored.

The board denied clemency to George Fabian of Tampa, who has served a year of a four-year sentence on a bolita conviction; refused to free 43-year-old Rose Miller, Miami's "Madam Sherry," from a one-year term for running a house of prostitution; and denied clemency to Jacksonville druggist Musa Bateh, who faces a four-year term for selling drugs excessively to an elderly woman.

Publisher Shot On Tampa Street

TAMPA (UPI) — Bullets from a passing car struck and seriously wounded a Tampa publisher late Wednesday night as he walked in front of his home.

Robert L. Hooper, 41, owner of the Farm Bureau Publishing Co., was hit in the stomach and both arms. Hospital officials listed his condition as serious but said he would recover.

Early today, police arrested two men and a woman for questioning in the shooting.

But Detective Captain Walter Heinrich said he could find no motive for the gangland style attack.

Witnesses said Hooper had just left his home to see his son when an automatic pistol opened up from the car. Hooper fell to the street and the car sped off.

But Heinrich said a neighbor was able to get the license number of the fleeing car. Police traced the vehicle to Henry Goff Jr., 38, a newspaper vendor now on probation after serving five years for fencing a stolen car.

Arrested with Goff were Jan Lillard, 22, a man dressed as a woman, and Von Pease, a woman.

Hooper's wife, Carroll, said she believed the shooting may have involved a business deal.

Three Injured In Auto Mishap

Three persons were injured Tuesday in a collision which threw a Volkswagen 89 feet, landing the car upside down.

Charlotte M. Green, 1901 Summerlin Ave., was slowing down to turn from 25th St. onto Summerlin Ave. when her Volkswagen was hit from behind by a car driven by Arthur D. Hill, 213 E. Fifth St., a Negro, police said. Charlotte Green was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital with neck injuries and cuts on the back of her head. Rosa Belt was taken to the hospital with possible fractures and Alice Hill was brought there for observation. Both Negroes were in Arthur Hill's car. Hill, who suffered stomach bruises was taken to the Sanford Naval Air Station dispensary.

Hill's car skidded 116 feet before the impact and 86 feet after, police said. Hill was charged with reckless driving.

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — Dred moving? Robert Winston, 44, is in the midst of moving a two-bedroom house, bricks, beams and all, from Oakland to Phoenix, Ariz., more than 800 miles away.

What's more, he's making the move by Jeep and trailer.

Winston, an artist and jewelry craftsman built the house himself beginning in 1950. It featured rocks gathered from throughout the United States and some 365 varieties of cactus.

But three years ago heavy rains loosened the hillside and Winston's house began to slide. Each year, the house slid a little more.

So Winston and his wife decided to move to the Camelback Mountain near Phoenix. Winston began dismantling the house, hauling it a trailer-load at a time to Arizona — an 18-hour trip to straight-through driving.

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Guards Accused Of Brutality May Get Aid

RAIFORD (UPI)—State Penal Director H. G. Cochran Jr. looked for ways today to give legal assistance to 11 Raiford prison guards he suspended Wednesday for alleged brutality.

The suspensions followed federal indictments against the guards and three former guards. All 14 are charged with using improper methods to suppress riots in the maximum security section of the state prison in 1958.

Cochran emphasized the suspensions did not mean he had presumed the guilt of any. He said the action was taken without prejudice to the reinstatement of any guard acquitted.

Atty. Gen. Richard Ervin said

in Tallahassee the state usually furnishes attorneys for employees indicted for crimes if the head of the agency involved feels they are innocent. Cochran said he would confer with Ervin about the matter in the immediate future, possibly today.

He said he would continue to study the federal indictments and reports on which the jury acted. The jury charged the guards shackled prisoners, sometimes naked, to their cells for periods up to 10 days with little or no food. Some were battered by streams of water from hoses and abused in other ways, the indictments said.

Two of the 14 guards were

fired after the state investigated the charges of brutality. Another resigned in January.

State Rep. Clarence O. Roberts of Union County, who showed up Wednesday at the big prison to criticize federal investigations, said the case was giving Florida a bad reputation.

"If we let the federal government step in here like this we won't have any guards," Roberts said.

Sox Sign Scout

BOSTON (UPI)—Connie Marrero, former Washington Senators pitcher, has been signed by the Boston Red Sox as scout for the Cuban area.

"The state should back these men 100 per cent," he added. "The state should hire the best lawyers it can to defend them."

Roberts said the indicted guards "wouldn't harm a flea. They are good cracker boys and I know most of them."

North Adds Two

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI)—Quarterback Pete Hall of Marquette, the third leading passer among the major colleges, has been added to the North squad for the annual North-South Shrine football game here Dec. 26. Also named to the North team was John Greener, 230-pound guard from Illinois.

Cochran said the loss of the 11 guards would be a hard blow, but that his department would continue to operate Raiford prison "by the book." He warned prison employes the inmates might be harder to handle because of the indictments.

HAVANA (UPI)—The dean of the Havana Press Assn. refused Wednesday night to intercede for James Buchanan, Miami Herald reporter arrested here last week, hinting he may only be posing as a newsman.

Jose A. Maestri rejected an appeal from Jorge Zayas, U.S.-educated publisher of the opposition newspaper Advance, for aid in arranging Buchanan's release from the cell where he has been held since Thursday.

He said there is an evident link between Buchanan and Austin Young, an American fugitive from Pinar del Rio prison whom the Miami newsman interviewed in a hotel room shortly before he was recaptured.

"There is evidence that many FBI agents or instruments of the worst causes come to Cuba as 'newspapermen'... when their real purpose is to establish contacts with conspirators and other such people," Maestri said in a letter to Zayas.

"Some Americans seem to feel that they possess a freebooter's license authorizing them to commit any offense. The Buchanan case is one more instance of this."

President Osvaldo Dorticos had previously rejected an appeal from the Inter-American Press saying "Cuban authorities cannot tolerate the performance of criminal acts under the cover of newsgathering."

William Cowles, editor of the Spokane Spokesman-Review and president of the IAPA, sent a new message to Dorticos, saying Buchanan "may have committed an error of judgment" but that "it was a humane act and not a crime."

This was a reference to the

fact that Buchanan was bringing medical supplies to Young's hotel room when he was arrested.

Cowles conceded Cuba's right to enforce its laws, but asked Dorticos to specify exactly which law Buchanan had violated "and what penalty is applicable under that law."

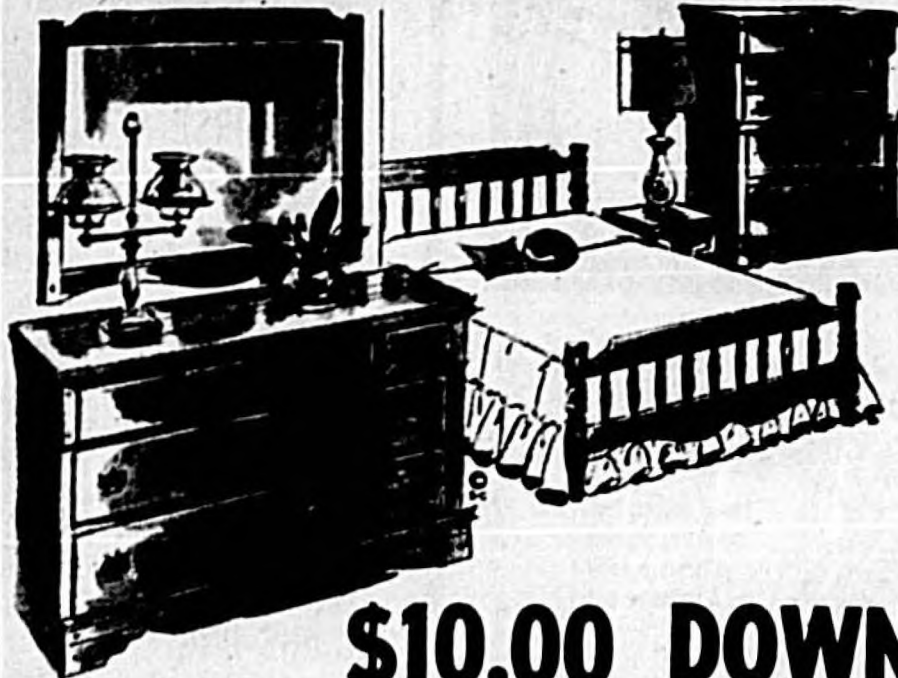
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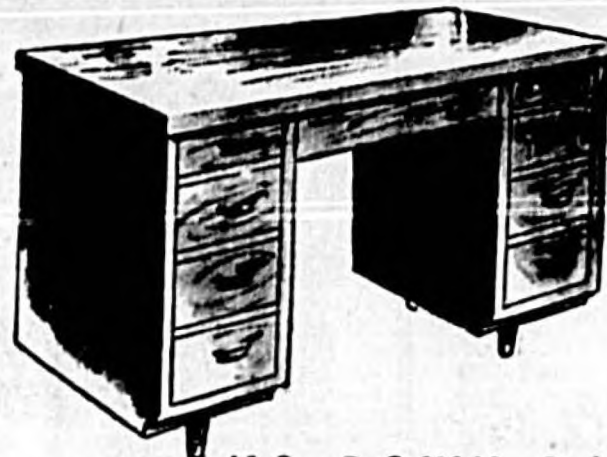


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Children Want Missing Father For Christmas

EAST BRUNSWICK, N. J. (UPI)—Kenneth Brown left the house for work Dec. 4 with a kiss for his wife and a wave to the youngest of his five children. It was like many other such partings. The children missed him, too, especially with Christmas approaching, Kenneth Jr., 10; Susan, 8; Bill, 7; Norman, 5; and Lori, 2, have lost their appetites and have difficulty sleeping.

"Susan is so thin and pale and she just breaks up at the sound of his name and the word 'daddy,'" Mrs. Brown said.

She decided she could keep his disappearance quiet no longer. She told her story to newsmen.

"I hope he'll read something and just call us and talk to the children," she said. "Maybe we can talk to him and make him come home."

She said if he had gone any place she thought he would go to Florida. He liked Daytona Beach and Miami. Her main concern was the children.

"I can't get them to see Santa Claus. They just want to see their daddy," she said.

New Driving Test In The Works

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The American Automobile Association experts to come out soon with a wonderful new way to test drivers. I just took the test and am pretty sure it showed I hate work, like girls, and love money.

What it established about my prospects for long life in event I keep driving I'll never know, unless I get up courage to send in the papers for grading.

To take this test, which is not quite ready for general use, you don't even have to get behind the wheel, although goodness knows AAA isn't opposed to qualifying prospective drivers that way. All you do is put check marks on some forms.

The test takes 10 minutes and is based on what psychologists call a "semantic differential." That last has nothing whatever to do with the big round thing between the back wheels.

The test, devised by Columbia University psychologist James L. Maffelt under a \$100,000 grant

from the AAA's Traffic Safety Foundation, is intended to establish your attitude toward the automobile.

Maffelt and others at work on the safety project developed the test after performing a deep psychological study on 100 teen-aged drivers in Cleveland. Half of these were chronic traffic violators. The other half had good driving records.

It is built around 12 words, or "concepts," as the psychologists call them. It records your associations or impressions about each of these words. One of the words is car. Others, besides work, women and money, include weapon, transportation, and power.

Dr. Maffelt is 39 and has been in the psychology business long enough to know that anybody old enough to drive can figure the "right" answers if simply asked to rate his own concept of a car. The new test, though, can't be faked.

As applied to each of the 12 words (or concepts) you are asked to judge 10 pairs of contradictory adjectives — active or passive, clean or dirty, weak or strong, etc. You do this by putting check marks on a scale between these extremes. That's how I am covered my hidden feelings on work, girls, and money.

Fortunately, the quiz gives you some care much how you rate any one of these items even car. What they do when you're through is link up your check marks with lines and compare the resulting pictures. The picture most nearly resembling the one your check marks make under "car" shows the psychologists which word you associate with the automobile.

The proven bad drivers in Cleveland, for instance, associated cars with weapons or freedom from control of their parents. Even I can see that is bad. Drivers with good records tended to associate autos with transportation or work.

I can't say for sure what all the other possible associations might reveal to the experts. But each concept was picked for a purpose.

Now that I've disclosed some of Dr. Maffelt's secrets, I don't feel guilty at all. Even when you know all this in advance, it won't help a bit if and when you go in for the test.

Because Dr. Maffelt, as a final safeguard, has sneakily refigured the order of the 10 pairs of adjectives as related to each

Miami Board Bans Strippers In City Limits

MIAMI (UPI)—City Hall lowered the shades on Miami strippers and police began work today on a way to keep them covered.

The City Commission decided by unanimous vote to ban strip tease dancing in this South Florida playground.

A new ordinance would make it illegal for any male or female in a public place to disturb or expose the body in a lewd or lascivious manner. Offenders would be subject to a maximum penalty of 60 days in jail and \$500 fine.

The law does not affect the plush nightclubs of Miami Beach, which has a separate government.

The new law was to take effect immediately, but police probably won't be able to enforce it until a method for making it stick can be worked out.

Atmosphere for several Miami nightspots featuring strippers charged the new law was unconstitutional and promised to take their fight to the courts.

Twain Kayfeta, president of the Florida night club owners were "sufficiently" covered by laws already on the city books.

"It very definitely will be a detriment to the tourist trade," he said of the new ordinance.

The problem of strip-teasers is nothing new for city officials. Mayor Robert King High launched a one-man campaign against bare-breasted beauties at the start of the tourist season last year.

One stripper told a city club during one of the earlier city crackdowns that "dressing in itself isn't immoral."

"It's how you act after you are undressed" she said.

Pilot Who Set New World's Speed Mark Says He 'Just Opened Her Up'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—"I just opened her up and decided to take what I could get."

What boyish-looking Air Force Maj. Joseph W. Rogers got was the distinction of flying an airplane faster than any other living man.

"Her" was a sleek F-104 Delta Dart jet interceptor which Rogers piloted through the California skies at a speed of 1,529 miles per hour—more than twice the speed of sound.

The well-built, dark-haired airman gave a graphic description of his Tuesday morning flight to newsmen here Wednesday. Rogers, 35, met reporters after Gen. Thomas D. White, Air Force chief of staff, presented him with his third Distinguished Flying Cross.

Unlike the motorist opening up his car on a straight stretch of highway, Rogers didn't pay much attention to the speed indicator on his instrument panel. He was too busy watching his altimeter.

Rogers, a native of Worthington, Ohio, explained that to qualify for the international speed mark he was allowed to vary only 150 feet above or below his level course eight miles above Edwards Air Force Base.

The decorated Korean war hero also was required to stay within lateral limits of one mile on each side of his 18-kilometer (about 11-mile) course.

"I kept getting messages from the ground as to where I was laterally," Rogers recalled. "But on the altitude matter, I was on my own. I hardly had time to look at other instruments."

Rogers first flew his production-model F-104 east to west over the course at 1,335 miles an hour. He then wheeled around, flashed back west to east at 1,495 miles an hour.

"We had enough," crackled a radio message from the ground. "I knew that referred to the speed," Rogers said. It meant the average of his two passes had set the new world speed mark.

The new mark topped by nearly 30 miles per hour the speed of 1,481 miles an hour claimed Oct. 1 by Russia for its new F-66 delta winged fighter. It was 114 miles an hour faster than the previous official record of 1,404 miles per hour set May 16, 1958, by this country's F-104 Starfighter.

Parents brought gifts of sheets, pillow cases, towels, rugs and other articles for the health clinic and some gave funds for purchase of venetian blinds.

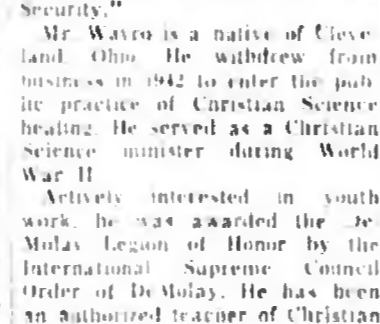

Most roads were cleared of the deep snow which sealed Vaughn, focal point of New Mexico's second worst storm in history. Residents of the area went through more than three of the most harrowing days in local memory after the storm isolated the town Monday.

The helicopter was sent out to direct rescue operations for any families in the countryside in need of assistance.

Most stranded travelers had warm words for Vaughn's population, state police, highway workers, National Guardsmen, and the Air Force.

The pre-winter storm that battered the Southwest early this week spread rain from eastern Texas to the Atlantic Seaboard today.

The vast rain area stretched from Oklahoma and Texas across the lower Mississippi Valley and as far east as Virginia and the Carolinas.

Police Sift Underworld For Touhy's Slayer Clue

CHICAGO (UPI) — Homicide detectives today pored over massive files of Chicago's underworld history and searched the littered basement of a home for clues to the assassins of mobster Roger Touhy.

But the investigation, one of the most intensive in a long line of gangland slaying probes, had revealed little more than that the 61-year-old prohibition beer baron could have been slain by organization mobsters or someone who held a personal grudge.

Federal investigators contended that Touhy and his bodyguard, Walter Miller, 62, were gunned down Wednesday night by the Mafia, international crime organization, to "seal their lips for ever."

But the Chicago police investigation proceeded on the assumption that either hoodlums from Touhy's underworld past or gunman of Chicago's current crime syndicate blasted the pair with shotguns.

Miller, a longtime friend of Touhy and a defense witness at his parole hearings, remained in critical condition at a hospital with a broken pelvis in his legs, buttocks and back.

Investigators' best clue so far was the finding of a basement hideout across the street from the home where Touhy had been living since his parole from prison only 23 days before he was shot.

Police believe the killers kept watch over the home of Mrs. Ethel Alesia, Touhy's sister, for perhaps 10 days, watching Touhy's comings and goings to determine when best to cut him down.

Two gunmen apparently hid out behind the hedge near the Alesia home Wednesday night, police said, and ambushed Touhy and Miller shortly after 10 p. m. as they returned from a business engagement in the loop.
