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Semi slams into van, kills father and son

A father and his 7-year-old son died Thursday after a tractor-trailer carrying scrap wires and cables plowed into their van on U.S. Highway 17/92 in front of Central Florida Regional Hospital.

Edwin Brady, 57, of DeLand was turning west onto 17/92 from North Mangousline Avenue. According to a witness, Brady turned into traffic when the truck, traveling east, was just a few yards from the intersection.

"(The van) was waiting for me to go by," said Joshua Turner of Longwood. Turner was traveling west on 17/92.

"Just as I went by, I saw the van pull out in front of the truck.

He must not have seen it," the scene, leading Turner to speculate the truck driver, Mark Andrew Cooper, 46, of Boynton Beach, did not have time to

brake. "The truck was so close, the driver probably didn't have time to put his foot on the brake," Turner said. "He didn't even have time to turn and try to miss the van."

After hitting the van, the truck jumped the seawall before landing in Lake Monroe. Cooper was able to climb out of the truck and over the seawall.

Emergency personnel arrived on the scene just minutes after the 10:10 a.m. crash.

Brady was airlifted from the crash site to Orlando Regional Medical Center, where he was pronounced dead.

His son, Conner Brady, was restrained in the back of the van, said Sanford spokeswoman Cleo

Police troubled by rising ID theft

You know who you are, but are other people pretending to be you? Sanford police are concerned that identity theft is reaching epidemic proportions, not only locally, but nationwide, because of new, sophisticated technology that allows identity thieves to access personal information. This information may be used to commit fraud or theft.

There was a case of identity theft just this past week in Winter Springs. Police arrested a 21-year-old man Sunday after it was discovered he had stolen his father's drivers license and social security card, and used them to withdraw money from a bank account. The charge was criminal use of ID cards.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) reports identity theft as its number one source of consumer complaints (42 percent of all complaints) in 2001. Although the majority of reports concerned credit card fraud, most of the victims had experienced more than one type

Lending a helping hand

Auto business helps Vigilante jet project

SANFORD — David Martin makes his living repairing wrecked vehicles. That hasn't stopped customers from bringing him an assortment of non-automotive items to revive with a little "body work" and a fresh coat of paint.

With 20 years of experience in the auto-body business, Martin has been asked to restore his share of odd items. He has established himself as a top quality repairman, and very rarely has an open slot available to do such jobs nowadays. However, he recently agreed to take on a job that's a bit out of the norm: repairing the body of a RA-5C Vigilante jet.

"I'm repairing a few pieces for them and have offered to do some painting if needed," said Martin, who is the new owner of Sanford Paint and Body on Country Club Road.

The Sanford Airport Memorial Committee is currently restoring the Vigilante as part of the group's efforts to build a memorial celebrating the U.S. Navy's history at Orlando Sanford International

Airport. The Navy donated the jet, which was scrapped in the California desert. Volunteers are working evenings and weekends to bring the jet back to its former glory, and Martin is aiding in that cause.

"One of the volunteers stopped in here and asked if I could tell them how to fix some of the body parts," Martin said. "I told them I would do it for them for free."

That's been a hallmark of Martin's since he first got into business. The Akron, Ohio, native owned his own shop in the Buckeye State for four years and was always involved

in community projects. "We're a family-owned business," said Martin's wife, Heidi, "and we believe it's important to do things in the community."

David and Heidi purchased Sanford Paint and Body in June and have already put their mark on the 25-year-old business. The lobby has been remodeled, the building spruced up and the Martins are quickly establishing the shop as one of the best in Seminole County.

"We make our name on

Convicted sex offender charged with molestation

A Sanford man, released from prison earlier this year for a sex crime, was arrested Thursday for molesting a 3-year-old girl.

Robert Edward Kesick, 54, is accused of a Sex Offense Against a Child, specifically fondling and molesting a victim less than 12-years old.

A report filed with the sheriff's office stated Kesick opened his pants and had the child touch his genitals.

The incident allegedly happened at the home of an acquaintance, and involved the daughter of a woman staying at the home.

Kesick admits being in the bedroom with the child and using crayons with her. "I was drunk and I don't remember anything. I don't even know how I got home," Kesick is quoted as saying in the report.

According to information from the Department of Corrections, Kesick was released from prison in March 2002 after serving nearly four years for a sex crime that occurred in Indian River County. He is a registered Sex Offender and appears on the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Sex Offender web site.

Downtown's newest restaurant offers a nautical environment with a Key West flair that includes everything from a tiny makeshift beach to an order-up counter straight from the land of Tiki.

avid boaters Bob and Connie Steele are the creators behind the eclectic cafe. The couple from LA, (lower Alabama) combined their love of the sea with their passion for cooking to open their second restaurant.

"We had some friends who lived in the area," Bob said. "When we came down to visit them, we fell in love with the place."

"It's close to the water, and we have always loved the water since we are boaters," Connie added. "It also has the old Southern atmosphere with the Spanish moss hanging from the trees and the downtown. We just really liked it."

So, the couple moved from Alabama to Lake Mary and decided to open the restaurant. With previous experience in the business — the couple owned

Bahama Bob's Sunset Cafe in Mobile Bay, Ala. — it didn't take long for them to decide what they wanted to do with their Sanford endeavor.

Retired from the air conditioning business, Bob is the one who creates the kitchen's specialties.

"The air conditioning business gets in the way of life," he said. "You work seven days a week, and you never have any rest. So, we were looking for something to do and make a moderate living out of it."

The Shipwreck Cafe was the

perfect solution for the couple. Bob enjoys cooking and Connie enjoys taking the orders, helping in the kitchen and meeting customers. Their daughter, Summer, has also joined the family business and makes deliveries throughout the downtown area on her bicycle.

Although the restaurant has only been open for a few weeks, it's already attracted loyal patrons. Their next door neighbor, Iona Brown from Betty's

Confronting stepdad's abuse still necessary years later

DEAR ABBY: Three years ago, my next-to-oldest daughter became angry with me and said, in front of my husband, "George" (her stepfather), that he had sexually abused her when she was small. I was furious that she would accuse him of anything like that. I

..... thought she said it to get back at me. Well, I have recently found out that what she said was true! George also abused my oldest daughter. They are now 34 and 36, and say they have forgiven him because he was drinking during those years.

Abby, I feel terrible for my daughters. I have been married to George for 31 years and would never have believed this in my wildest dreams! I'm sick about it and don't know what to do. My daughters have a good relationship with George now. I don't even want to look at him. Should I confront him? I don't know what good it would do now. Please help.

FEELING NUMB IN INDIANA

DEAR FEELING NUMB: What George did is unforgivable. By all means confront your child-molesting husband, but not until you have first discussed this with a counselor and received some emotional support. Ask your daughters to accompany you in case they have any unresolved issues having to do with the abuse.

Since George has proven he can't be trusted around children, he belongs on a list of sexual offenders so he cannot molest other children with whom he might come in contact. And that includes grandchildren. Please don't wait.

DEAR ABBY: My sister-in-law, Lois, was a loving person, especially to children. At any family gathering, Lois could be found in a corner with the kids, reading stories, playing games or just talking with them. When she died, it was hard on all of us. We tried to protect the kids by not crying in front of them. Sometimes I'd have to run to the bathroom to hide my tears.

One night I woke to hear my oldest son, who was 7 years old, sobbing his heart out. After calming him, I asked what was wrong. He replied, "Mommy, how come nobody cried when Aunt Lois died?"

Sometime later, my daughters, 4 and 5, ended a conversation in their bedroom and came into the kitchen. They told me they figured out why God had let Aunt Lois die: God needed someone in heaven to take care of the babies until they were born.

I learned some important lessons that year — from my children.

DEAR PATRICIA: From the mouths of babes ... Children sometimes exhibit a level of emotional honesty and genuineness from which adults can learn. It is important for children to understand that adults have honest emotions and that showing sadness is not inappropriate. Failing to express these kinds of feelings can cause problems in later life. Books have been written on childhood grieving and are available in bookstores and in local libraries.

Thank you for sharing the important lesson you learned from your children.

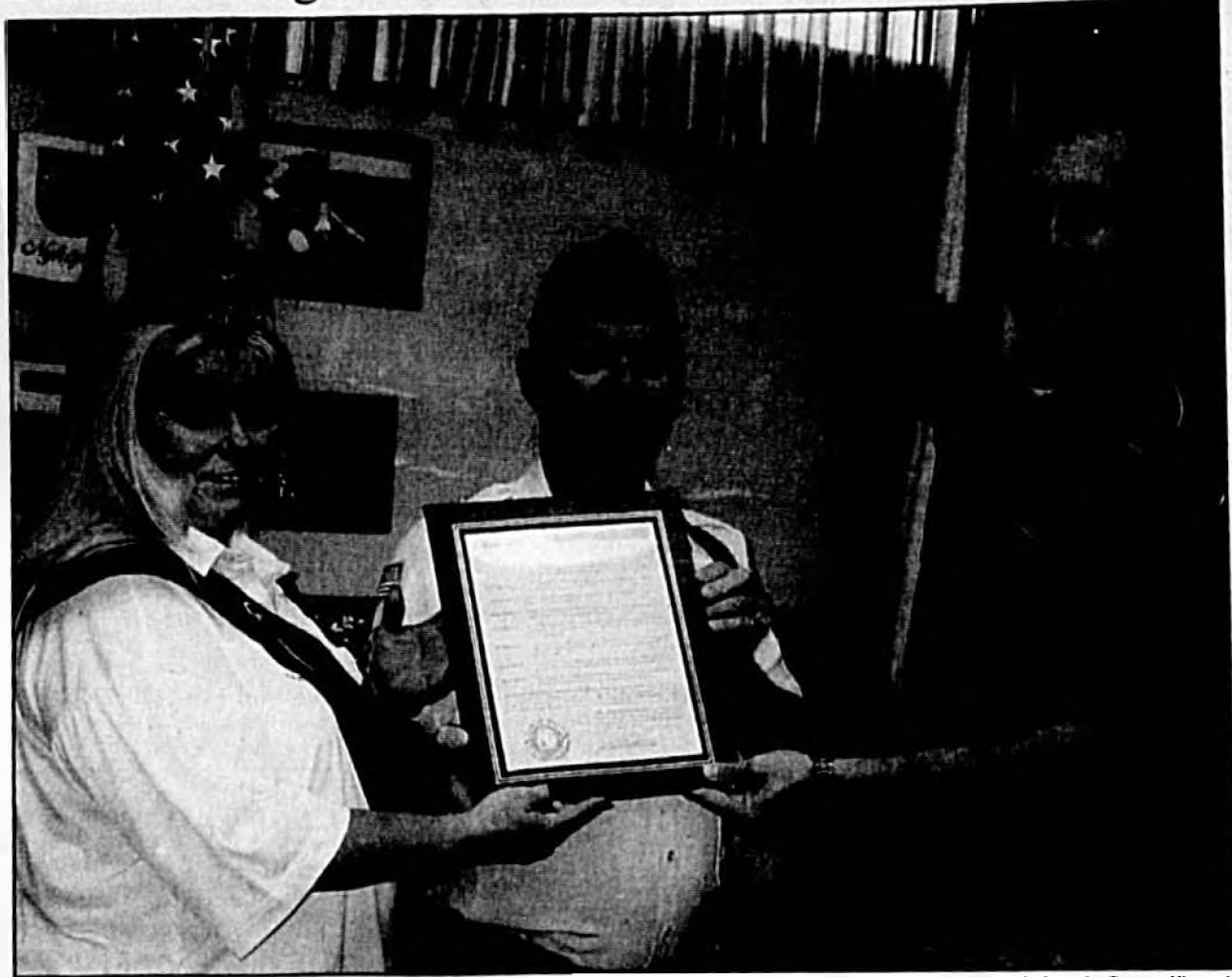

Stolen Vehicle

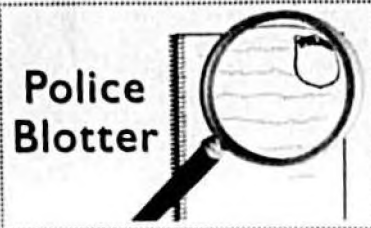

State to close French Avenue for railroad crossing repair

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has announced work will begin Friday, Nov. 8, on rebuilding of a railroad crossing on U.S. Highway 17-92 (French Avenue) in Sanford, in the vicinity of 6th Street.
The work, to be performed by CSX Transportation Inc. crews and subcontractors, will necessitate total closure of French Avenue at the crossing beginning at 8 p.m. Friday, Nov. 8 and continuing until no later than 6 a.m. Monday, Nov. 11.
The rubberized crossing base will be replaced with concrete segments and a single welded section of track spanning the entire four-lane roadway will be installed.
There are actually two rail crossings in the vicinity of 6th Street. The work the weekend of Nov. 8 will be on the northernmost of the two. A second project, rebuilding the southernmost of those crossings will be accomplished the weekend of Nov. 22, beginning at 8 p.m. Friday, and ending by no later than 6 a.m. Monday, Nov. 25.
Except for the 6th Street area closings, the rest of 17-92 will remain open for local traffic up to the rail crossings. The 2001 aver-

age daily traffic along this section of U.S. 17-92 was 33,500 vehicles. A third crossing, in the vicinity of 13th Street, is to be reconstructed after the Christmas/New Year holidays. Variable message signs advising motorists of the impending road closures will be in place at the approaches to the railroad crossings.

Bumping along Central Florida's roads

I often have the feeling while driving through the streets and highways of Sanford and Central Florida that road maintenance is funded by businesses which sell tires or repair shock absorbers. The way some of the potholes exist, one could, and often does, destroy tires and parts of the running gear of a vehicle.

Not only potholes, but manholes. On 25th Street for example, between Park Avenue and Mellonville Avenue, there are 13 manholes in the eastbound lanes. Each one has its edges sticking up at least two to three inches higher than the roadway. It's bump, bump, bump, when driving, unless one attempts to veer way from them. Then it starts to look like reckless driving.

I'm glad CSX and the Department of Transportation are repairing the railroad tracks on French Avenue near Sixth and Thirteenth Streets. Some of them have had openings in the roadway which have proven to be highly dangerous. Again, it's either hit them or veer away, which are both hazardous moves. Hopefully, the finished rail track crossings will result in a smooth roadway, and not go from sunken depressions to another speed-bump type crossing.

On another matter, when they run water or sewer lines under a roadway, they re-pave the holes, only to end up having the pavement either sticking up from the road, or dropping off several inches. After these projects, as well as the manhole installations are completed, apparently no one goes back to see if they are causing problems because of a failure to adhere to the level of the roadway. Most are either bump up or bump down.

I'm surprised no one (at least of late) has filed a suit for damages to some government body, for a collision or injury done as the result of hitting one of these road hazards.

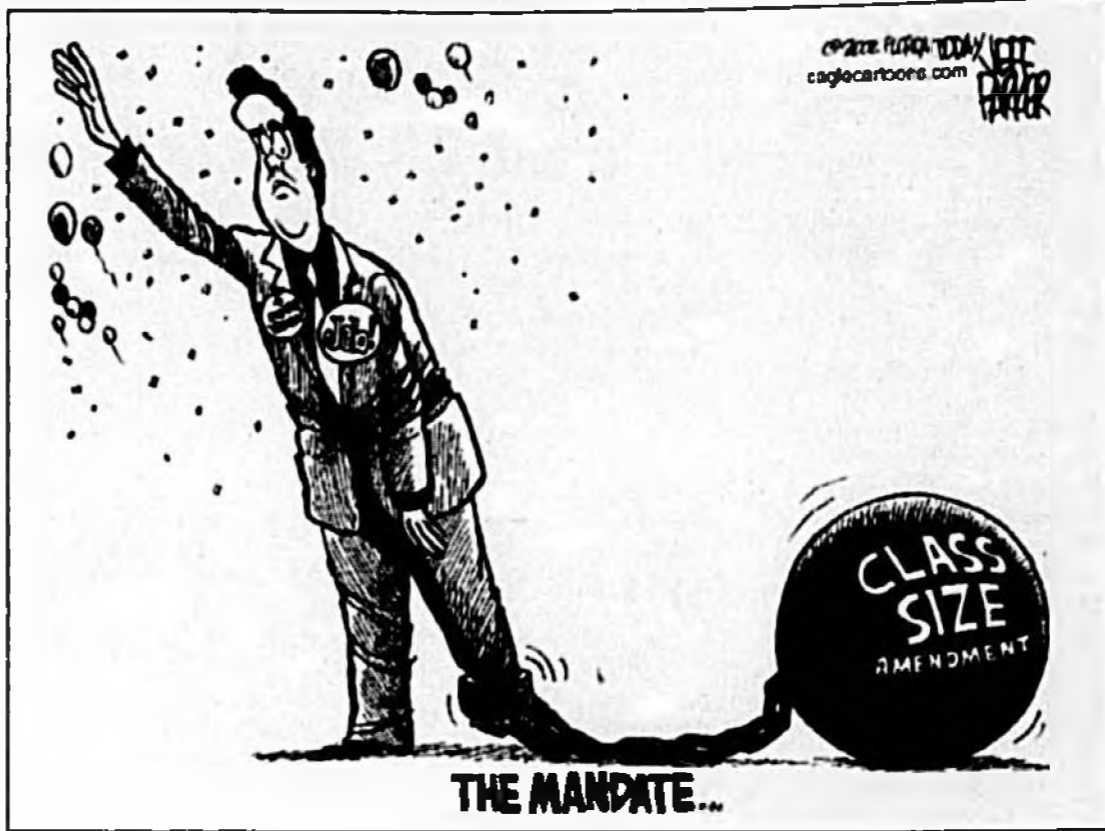
It's bad enough for the average car, but driving an SUV is even more dangerous. Some, which might be more top heavy than others, often rock back and forth or jiggle around the highway.

Recently, they are putting in underground pipes, sewer lines, I suspect, on Celery Avenue just east of Sanford. I'll bet when they are finished, the pavement over the lines will stick up above the roadway level to the point where they almost become a speed bump. And while it is expected they may sink down somewhat over time, no one will go back out there in a few months and inspect what hazards they may be causing.

It's bad enough that heavy rains often produce flooded streets in and around Sanford. But this can be expected, and other than clearing out storm drains, very little can be done to prevent problems caused by heavier-than-usual rainfall.

One more point. Those brick crosswalks in downtown Sanford look beautiful. They are so uneven with the pavement that it is impossible to drive over them without bouncing around. Probably they have been made that way to slow traffic through downtown, but it doesn't feel good when driving over them.

Problems with these manholes, potholes and improper repair-paving should be able to be solved. In the meantime for persons driving in and around Sanford, be sure to check the tires on your vehicle often. Damaged tires are dangerous to you, as well as everyone around you.

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The Way We Were: Doss was one of Sanford's first chiropractor

Here are five additional biographies from the April 29, 1933 edition of the Sanford Herald.

L.T. Doss
Dr. L.T. Doss came to Sanford in February 1933 to begin a chiropractic practice, and had already gained a large patronage. He had studied at the University of Florida, University of Georgia, University of Tennessee and Palmer School of Chiropractic. He was born in Hinson, but moved to Havana, Florida when a small boy. Following high school, he spent his summers in various military camps and, (at this time) was a member of the reserves. He resided at 800 Magnolia Avenue and attended the First Methodist Church. During his leisure hours, he enjoyed watching football and baseball. Dr. Doss maintained his office on the third floor of the First National Bank building.

George McRory
George McRory was a local automobile license inspector for the State Motor Vehicle Commission. In 1926 he was elected to the State Democratic Committee and remained in public office until 1932, also serving one term in the State Legislature. Mr. McRory, born in Monticello, came to Sanford in 1922 and resided with his family at 1118 Magnolia Avenue. He was married to the former Sara McKenzie

and they had three children, George, Jr., Virginia and Mary. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Elks, Shrine, Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and attended Holy Cross Episcopal Church. As a boy, he attended public schools in Monticello and continued his education at the University of Florida. Football was his favorite sport and he was also interested in aviation and military activities. In addition to being a licensed pilot, he was a lieutenant in the Florida National Guard.

Lewis A. Tate
Lewis A. Tate was born in Osteen and lived in this area all his life. He came to Sanford in 1913 and had continued to make his home here, working for the Sanford Fire Department, farming and serving as a conductor for the ACL Railroad. For the past five years, he had represented the Brotherhood of Trainmen. He was a member of Sanford Elks Lodge, Lions Club, and attended the Christian Church. He resided at 109 North Mangustine Avenue. He had attended Osteen schools then continued his education through correspondence schools. He had been a candidate for Constable in two previous elections and had gone into the second primary against Sheriff McClelland in the last election. Mr. Tate's favorite sport was fishing.

Howard Overlin
Howard Overlin came to Sanford in 1920 as the new manager of the Sanford, Oviedo and Geneva division of the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company.

He was born in Evansville, Indiana and attended public schools in that city. In 1911 he began working for the Indiana Bell Telephone Company and had remained there until he was transferred to Illinois. In 1918 he came to Jacksonville to take charge of the company's lines in Camp Johnson during the World War. He remained at the army camp until early 1920 when he was transferred to Sanford. Mr. Overlin and his wife, the former Maude Growe, resided at 113 West 19th Street. He was active in the community as president of the Kiwanis Club, secretary of the Elks Club, president of the Seminole County Safety Council and a member of First Christian Church. His favorite recreations were hunting and fishing.

Gordon Barnett
Gordon Barnett came to Seminole County in 1922 and held the honor of having named the community of Fern Park. He was one of the first to realize the opportunities of the fern industry and to develop that business there. At present he was connected with the Winter Park Ferneries, Inc. He was married to the former Mel Jackson. They resided in Fern Park. He was a member of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and attended First Presbyterian Church of Sanford. He was born in New York City and was educated there and in Philadelphia. He also graduated from Hamilton College, Clinton, N.Y. After college, he was employed by the International Banking Corporation in New York City and was later sent to San Domingo to represent that firm there for nearly three years.

Cohen. After extracting him from the vehicle, the boy was taken across the street to Central Florida Regional Hospital in an effort to stabilize him.

Doctors were unable to improve his condition for the helicopter transport to ORMC's trauma unit, and he died at CFRH.

Cooper, the truck driver, suffered minor injuries, Cohen said. Traffic was rerouted around the crash scene for more than eight hours as workers pulled the truck and its trailer from the lake.

Cohen said the company that owns the truck sent crews to clean the debris and mitigate fuel that was discharged from the truck's tanks. Officials with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection supervised the cleanup.

of identity fraud. It is not uncommon for Sanford police and other area law enforcement agencies to report persons in local stores buying merchandise by using stolen credit cards, and often identifying themselves through stolen ID cards.

This costly and hard-to-fight crime often goes on, possibly for years, without the victim's knowledge. The effects on a consumer's credit and daily life however, can be devastating. Because of damaged credit ratings, victims find it difficult to obtain new credit cards or loans. Collection agencies then hound them to pay for charges they did not make, and they are forced to prove, often without concrete evidence, that they are not responsible for the illegal activities committed in their names.

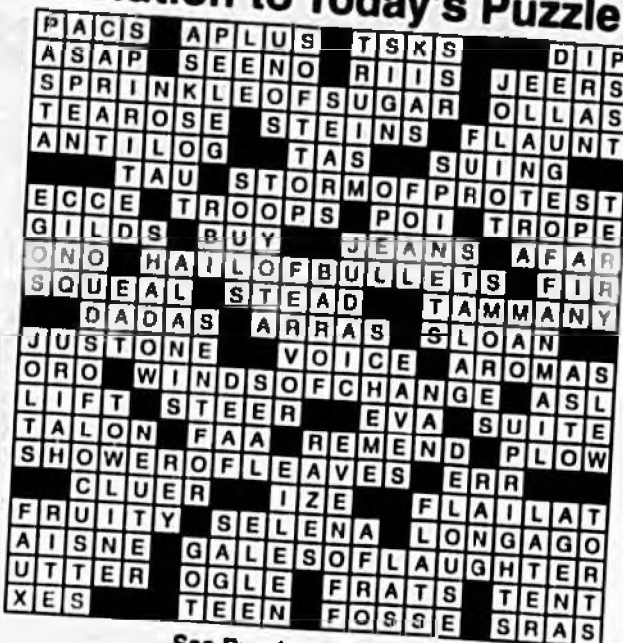
The FTC recommends that consumers exercise caution when giving out personal information such as social security and credit card numbers. Don't put passwords on credit cards or bank accounts, and inspect their credit reports at least once each year.

If victimized, the FTC recommends that consumers contact the fraud departments of each of the three major credit bureaus, contact creditors for any accounts that were opened fraudulently or lamedped with, and file a report with local police.

Consumers can file a complaint and get advice by contacting the FTC's identity theft hotline, toll-free at 1-877-IDTHEFT (438-4338).

against Seminole was one of the best played softball games I have ever been a part of and I have played more games than I care to remember myself," said Lake Brantley head coach Mike Ferrell, a Seminole graduate and former SHS and Oviedo baseball coach who has been one of the best softball players in the country over the past 25 years.

The game also featured a remarkable performance that may coin a new saying, "Bondsian."

For years when anyone did anything spectacular it was referred to as a "Ruthian" effort in honor of Babe Ruth.

But after the numbers Barry Bonds has put up over the past two seasons, "Bondsian effort" may become the new catch phrase.

The effort referred to was a 3-for-3, three home run, seven RBI performance by Seminole's Kara Lively in the Championship Game.

So impressive and intimidating was Lively's game that Ferrell actually walked the Tribe shortstop leading off the bottom of the eighth inning with his team clinging to the one-run lead

"We tried not to walk Lively intentionally but she hit three home runs on some very tough pitches," said Ferrell. "I have never been in any situation (including baseball) where I felt it was best to intentionally walk the potential tying run in extra innings, but I had to walk Lively when she leadoff in the bottom of the 8th.

"That girl hits the softball like Barry Bonds hits baseballs," Lively had hit eight home runs and was 1-for-1 with a home run and an RBI with three intentional walks (AKA Barry Bonds) in the semifinal against Lyman, so the precedent was set.

For the season Lively's stats were unreal: 27-for-44, a .614 average, 34 RBI, a Seminole Athletic Conference record 12 home runs, a .738 On Base percentage, 21 walks (17 intentional), and two doubles.

Nicole Hall had three hits, including a two-run home run, and had three RBI to lead the Patriots to the upset of the top seeded Fighting Seminoles.

Jessie Sadowsky contributed three hits, including a home run, and had three RBI to back the hurling of winning pitcher Nicole Richard (5-3), who came on for starter Jessica Tomaselli.

"The girls worked really hard

this season," said Ferrell. "We came a long way from losing the first game of the season 9-1 to Lake Howell and losing twice to Seminole during the regular season."

The tournament opened on Monday at Seminole with Lake Brantley shutting out Lake Mary, 4-0, Lyman pounding Lake Howell, 10-2, and Oviedo nipping Winter Springs, 6-4.

The tournament then moved over to Lake Brantley on Tuesday and the top two seeds advanced with No. 1 Seminole topping Lyman, 4-1, on the strength of the home run by Lively, and Lake Brantley outscored No. 3 seeded Oviedo, 7-2, behind the pitching of Tomaselli.

"We told our girls to 'play like champions' and they responded to every situation in the championship game," said Ferrell.

"We could have easily folded after Lively's third home run, we could have folded after a run was disallowed after a runner missed second base on Nicole Hall's three-run home run, and we could have folded after Seminole pounded seven consecutive hits in the sixth inning."

"We did not fold because we had 17 girls who were focused

on the same goal. We had 22 hits in the championship game. Our pitcher, Jessica Tomaselli threw strikes and the defense only made one error. The home runs by Hall and Sadowsky were the big hits but we won because of the hitting throughout the entire lineup."

In addition to Sadowsky and Hall, Cassie Mier, Kersten Perry, Zoi Martinez, and Monica Yamauchi also had three hits each for the winners.

"Both teams played great. It was one of those games neither deserved to lose," said Seminole head coach Dave Rogers. "It was a tough game to lose. Brantley played great and hit the crud out of the ball."

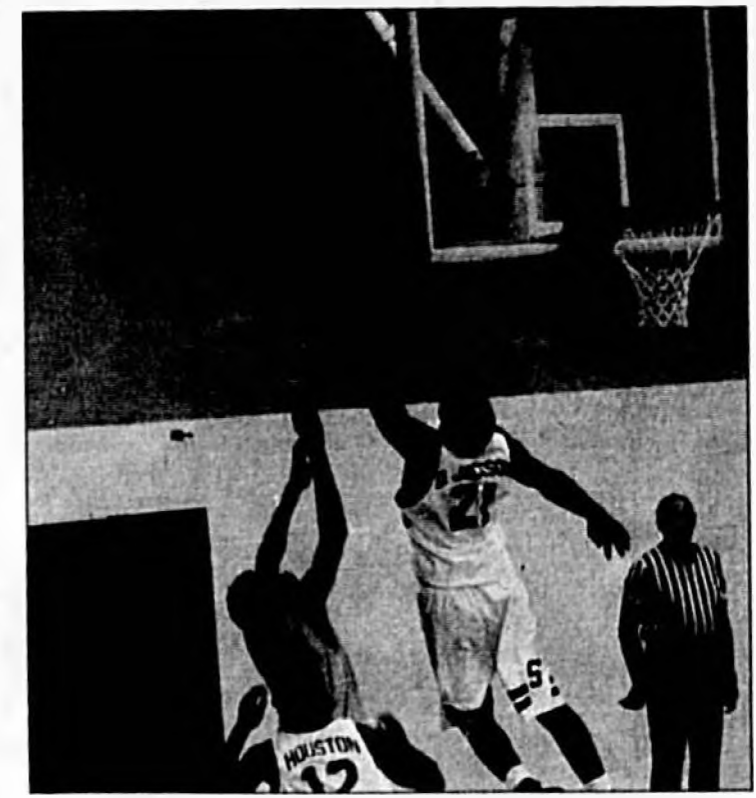

BUFFALO, N.Y. — The Golden Knights put a close to a week worth of practice on Thursday in an effort to ready themselves for a MAC game against Buffalo today (Saturday). The team worked out in helmets and shoulder pads to get a feel for timing and to make any final adjustments to offensive and defensive schemes.

"It was a good week," stated UCF Head Coach Mike Kruczek. "I thought the focus was better. The news that we are still in the hunt for the title helped the players get over the loss a little faster. We still have to take care of our business."

The team is still learning the rigors of playing a conference schedule and know that from here on out every game is critical.

"They (Buffalo) may be a 1-8 team, but they are young,"

added Kruczek. "I think we have seen what happens when people take other teams for granted. I think Marshall may have underestimated Akron last week and lost valuable ground and now they are in a dogfight for the conference race. We have to go up and play this team the way we need to."

This is the second to last road game for UCF who will return home next week to take on Kent State. Kickoff is scheduled for 1 p.m. and can be heard on 740 The Team with Marc Daniels and Gary Parris calling all the action. Jerry O'Neill will again handle the on-field sideline reporting.

OTHER NOTES: Cornerback Asante Samuel was recognized as the Big Stick award winner after practice for a hit on a punt return last week. It is the first time this season for the team captain despite several nominations. Fellow team cap-

tain and last week's winner Elton Patterson presented the award to Samuel.

Sophomore defensive back Marcus Glover suffered an injury to his right shoulder during practice and is being listed as doubtful for Saturday.

UCF is facing a Buffalo squad that has lost seven consecutive games, with their last victory coming on Sept. 7 against Big East opponent Rutgers. Over that span, the Bulls have given up an average of 37.29 points a game, while scoring just 14.57.

Over their last seven games the Golden Knights have won just three and have scored 200 points and are averaging 28.57 points a contest. Defensively however UCF has allowed 198 points or 28.29 points a game. UCF will look to get out of the gate early against the Bulls, which may not be a problem. UCF has scored first in seven out of eight games this season tallying 65 first quarter points. As a team, Buffalo has allowed 85 first-quarter points. Conversely UCF has surrendered 46 first-quarter points, but Buffalo has scored just 16.

The UCF baseball team closes out fall practice with its annual Scout Day Monday at Jay Bergman Field. The event will feature a time 60-yard dash, infield/outfield practice, batting practice and an intersquad scrimmage. Monday's event will begin at 10 a.m. with the 60-yard dash.

UCF will rotate a different pitcher each inning over the nine-inning game.

Scouts from all 30 Major League Baseball teams are invited, as UCF will have 13 players that will be draft eligible after the 2003 season.

Last season, UCF had six players selected in the draft. Over the past five seasons, the Golden Knights have had 28 players drafted or that have played professional baseball.
