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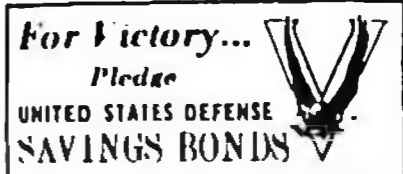

Huge Armada Of 100 U. S. Bombers Blasts At Northern France

Navy Planes Continue Pounding At Japanese Base Of Kiska In Aleutian Islands

In the western air war the biggest armada yet of United States bombers blasted northern France today, apparently in the Boulogne-Calais zone.

Thousands of Canadian soldiers were disclosed to have arrived on the British Isles in another big convoy. They were mostly armored forces. Probably more than 100 bombers were in the U. S. armada blasting at the Japanese Aleutian Islands, dropping 15 tons of bombs on the enemy base at Kiska Tuesday, starting fires in the camp area, damaging a cargo ship in the harbor and strafing a radio station.

The Communiqué also disclosed the loss in the Atlantic of the United States Coast Guard Cutter Mustang formerly the S. B. Corlies of the eastern steamship lines. The vessel had been overdue for some time, is presumed lost and the entire personnel of about 110 is presumed lost.

From the Pacific, the Navy announced last night an aircraft carrier task force, striking violently into the coast of Japan's defense area in the north Borneo island, has damaged an enemy heavy cruiser and four destroyers. The assault was made by the carrier's main battery.

The operation, conducted in the vicinity of the island of Iwo Jima, apparently by surprise, at one of their most vulnerable points, it was carried through without the loss of a man or plane and without damage to any ship.

A Navy communiqué, reporting the action, said that the ships of the task force, including the island area, just south of the island of Bougainville, which is the main Japanese base in the Borneo area. The aircraft carrier was Kaga, and the northern coast of Bougainville, 45 miles north of Shorland.

For several weeks, the command said, enemy ships had been observed concentrating in the Bougainville area.

It appeared significant that the communiqué did not describe any damage inflicted by plane-borne torpedoes. The assumption here was that weather, which the command merely described as "unfavorable," was an aid that the torpedoes either could not get in their work or else results were not observed.

Farmers To Get Assistance In Moving Supplies

The facilities of the 3022 County War Boards of the Department of Agriculture will be used to assist farm truck operators and other operators engaged in hauling farm supplies to and from farms, in filling out applications for Certificates of War Necessity under the Office of Defense Transportation's General Order No. 21, R. Dawson, County Agent, said today and the plan which was announced jointly by ODT and the Department of Agriculture, will make this assistance available three days this month, Oct. 22, 23 and 24.

Under the Certificate of War Necessity order, all commercial motor vehicles are required to carry Certificates of War Necessity after Nov. 15. Approximately 1,500,000 of the more than 5,000,000 vehicles affected by the order are used in the transportation of farm products and farm supplies, the agent revealed.

Joseph B. Eastman, Director of ODT, has explained that the Certificates of War Necessity will govern the miles that may be operated from the central mailing office by the order. Mailing of the applications has been started by the Office of Defense Transportation from its central mailing office in Detroit, Mich. As the mailing is completed in a particular state and counties covered will be announced. Any operator of a commercial vehicle, including a farm truck, who has not received his application blank when the mailing has been announced as finished in his county should apply to the nearest field office of the ODT Division of Motor Transport for forms covering his truck or trucks. 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Nazis Report Invasion Of South Russia

Conflicting Claim Says Armies Advance Slowly In Stalingrad Area

(By Associated Press) German soldiers, grinding slowly forward in an industrial district of Stalingrad but with victory still denied them there, were reported today to have started anew on a wide flanking invasion further south, obviously calculated to cut through the Kalmyck territory to the Volga delta on the Caspian sea.

An Iteva dispatch said the Kalmyck people, the Asiatic descendants of Mongolian nomads who settled in southern Russia, held a war council, heard reports that the Germans were burning and killing in their territory and would resist.

As for Russian own flanking drive northwest of Stalingrad, Iteva said the advance continued in some sectors with German resistance overcome and counter attacks repulsed. In the city itself the Germans by intensified efforts to back their way through to the Volga over ran two streets in a northwestern industrial suburb. A Nazi broadcast indicated troops would be withdrawn from Stalingrad and the city pounded not surrender to heavy siege guns and dive bombers until such tactics met their doom in Leningrad.

Last night Iteva announced that the Soviet government had ordered an attack on the German lines, but that the attack was being steadily from the north west.

Earlier, acknowledging the inability to take Stalingrad, each part of Adolf Hitler's present campaign, Berlin said it no longer was necessary because "strategic objectives" the penetration of the city and the delta to the Volga, already had been achieved.

The Nazi radio said the German proposed to pulverize the rest of Stalingrad with siege guns already in position. It disclosed the new situation as a "strategic change" in the character of the battle.

London reported today that Adolf Hitler might be shifting part of his main attack against Stalingrad to the north in an effort to overrun the Caspian oil fields before winter sets in.

Soviet dispatches reported the Russian army had fallen back from two streets in a Stalingrad suburb but had then struck a charge by 50 German tanks in the main city. The Red army reported earlier it had driven an attack back from the city. The German attack apparently still was being a "strategic change" in the character of the battle.

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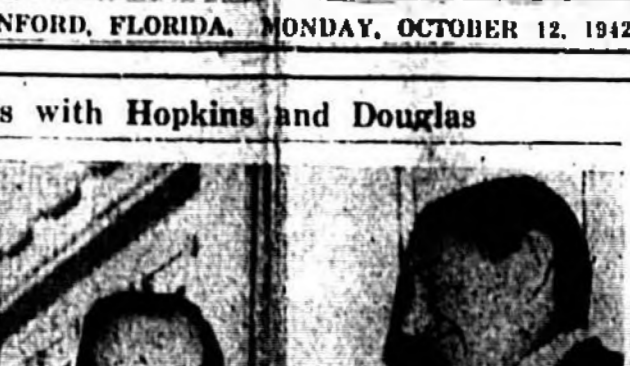
