

BELASCO DIES CLOSING LONG STAGE CAREER

Dean Of American Actors Answers Final Call After 50 Years Before Footlights

TALLAHASSEE, May 14.—The Dining Room at the Girls College was the scene last night of the dinner given to the legislators and the Governor and his cabinet. 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Citrus Exchange Is Largest Member of Clearing House

TAMPA, May 15.—(AP)—The Florida Citrus Exchange directors decided today to withdraw from Florida Citrus Growers Clearing House Association according to a statement made public by the board of directors of the exchange. The decision was announced in a resolution adopted at the weekly meeting of the board, it directed General Manager G. C. Commander to file with Clearing House officials a formal notification of the withdrawal. The action followed presentation by President A. M. Tilden of a resolution adopted by Clearing House board asking the Exchange directors to reconsider their action of two weeks ago. At that time the Exchange announced the Clearing House to reduce the amount retained from citrus growers for expenses and to carry with the Clearing House operating committee. The alternative was withdrawal by the Exchange.

LEGION SEEKS TO FIND CAUSE OF DEPRESSION

Will Petition Hoover To Call Conference To Solve Causes Of Economic Disorders

INDIANAPOLIS, May 15.—(AP)—The national executive committee of the American Legion yesterday directed Ralph T. O'Neill, national commander, to petition President Hoover to call a non-political conference to solve the causes of economic depression.

The report of the legion's national unemployment commission, adopted unanimously, also urged "that such commission analyze the charges that have been freely made in the press that the financial and business leaders failed to recognize the warning signs fully one year ahead of the depression, and failed to sound the warning that may have, in some measures, minimized the depression that followed."

The national commander will petition to ask the president to call together, in a non-political way, representatives of labor, industry, capital and finance, of agriculture and other elements of our national life.

STATE OPERATING EXPENSE TRIPLED IN TWELVE YEARS

Figures Are Based On Records From 1917 Until June 30, 1929

TALLAHASSEE, May 15.—(AP)—Per capita cost of operating the general departments of Florida's state government virtually tripled in 12 years from 1917 to 1929, it is shown in a report on state government costs for the year ending June 30, 1929, issued yesterday by the federal census bureau. It cost Florida \$3.83 for each inhabitant to pay its cost of state government in 1917, while in the fiscal year of 1929 the expense had risen to \$10.71, based on an estimated population in the latter year of 1,407,300.

The much-discussed proposal for an Austro-German customs accord is one of the important matters which will come before the meeting.

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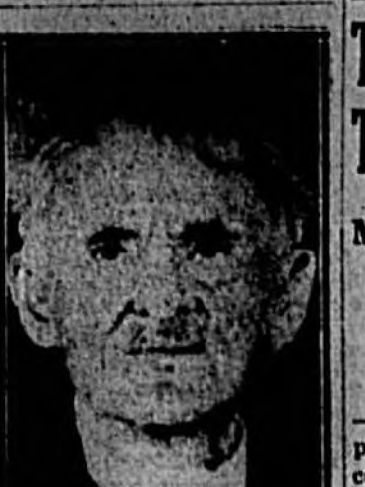
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SCIENTIST DIES

SENATE VOTES TO RAISE GAS TAX 2 CENTS

Money Raised Would Be Handed To Counties Upon Basis Of Later Road Building

TALLAHASSEE, May 15.—(AP)—The Senate today passed 10 to 16 a bill for two cents a gallon additional gasoline tax while the House adopted minor relief meas-

ures. The money raised by the two-cent gasoline tax will be returned to the counties on the basis of money spent in construction of roads later made a part of the state road system.

The six-cent a gallon tax, already in existence, will not be altered by the bill. A companion bill passed by the Senate would give county commissioners authority to transfer money from road funds to other county expenses.
