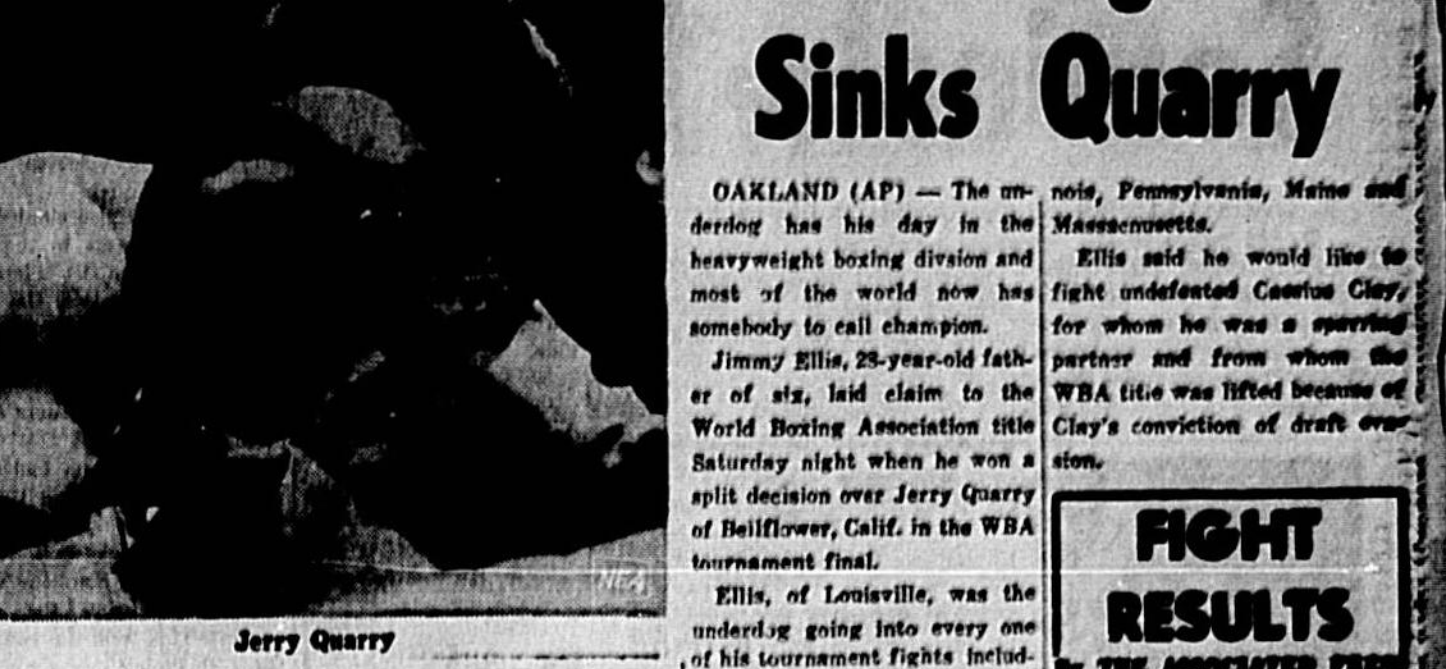

Jail Apt. Will Be Converted

Renovations in the present two-story jail will be accomplished at the same time new floors are added to the facility next year, Sheriff Peter Millot revealed today.

Millot told the Sanford Herald the changes will be made at the least possible cost to the taxpayers to make the entire space functional for the purpose of operating offices.

"Changes already have been made to utilize the old apartment space which used 50 percent of the non-jail space at the sheriff's office. Now structural changes will be made for greater efficiency. The building as it stands is good. Utilization is poor," Millot said.

Additional to the jail which includes some 16,000 square feet, has been estimated to cost some \$40,000.

Structural changes which Millot has suggested to Architect John Burton IV includes removal of the wall between the outer office and the bookkeeper's office to make more work space available in the area which directly serves the public. Extra space created will be used by filing cabinets. Bookkeeper's office will be moved to the area currently occupied by the padded cells. These cells will be moved to the new addition.

"The locker room will become a public waiting area. The chief deputy's office will be turned into a communication center as it was originally intended. These changes will be made as a part of the renovation of the jail," Millot said.

County OKs To Pay But...

Back pay for two suspended Seminole County officials was approved by the Board of County Commissioners today but the county appears headed for the courts on the matter.

On advice of County Attorney Harold Johnson and because of the Board's decision to use a formula of gross receipts of the offices less expenses to determine the amounts due to suspended Pace Justice H. H. Duncan and Constable George Kelsey.

Johnson said that while the formula "seems somewhat equitable" it appears, according to the court precedent and the attorney general's office, to be the only one which can be used.

The county attorney further predicted court action can be expected from the two suspended officials due to the decision. Duncan had previously submitted a bill to the Board for the period of his first suspension totaling \$2,675 for the total fees collected by the office now occupied by Alfred Davis. Kelsey also submitted a bill for \$552.88 but used a formula based on the average earnings of his office during the previous three years.

An effort by Commissioner W. Lawrence Swafford to obtain a declaratory decree from the court to nullify the amount of payment to be given the two men failed.

On the motion to authorize Johnson to notify the two officials to submit bills based on the formula of gross receipts less expenses, both Swafford and Commissioner Robert Parker voted "no."

Both Duncan and Kelsey were reinstated by the Florida Senate and suspended again by the governor within hours of the reinstatement.

Decision To Decide Base Use

Under the General Services Act of 1950, certain benefits are allowable to receivers of government property, once that property has been phased out by federal government.

If the property is used for educational or airport services, land can be given free; if used for public parks and memorials, land could be returned for a 50 per cent allowance; if property is to be used for industrial purposes, then the land must be sold for what is determined as a fair market price.

These facts were made known today by Robert Sheehan, project director with Office of Economic Adjustment, Department of Defense, Washington, in a telephone interview by the Sanford Herald.

Sheehan, who is working on the Sanford Naval Air Station project, confirmed that the current study being made by Bookner Engineering Company of St. Louis, will determine what is best for the NAS property once it is turned over to General Services Administration on July 1.

Sheehan's former service bases around the country have used such property for a combination of educational training, airport and industrial. He added that the base is to be used for commercial enterprises with fees such as hanger, runway, etc., being kept by airport operators.

The study report, Sheehan said, would determine what price, if any, the city of Sanford would have to attempt to recover NAS property, and he added, "Right now, nothing can be done toward deciding what the base is to be used for and this information will not be available until the middle of May or after." This is when the report of the Booker study is to be made public.

Using the base for educational purposes already has been mentioned by local groups, who are lamenting the lack of local skilled labor needed here to fill industrial needs of already existing companies and an anticipation to train labor for other industries wishing to locate in Seminole County.

What makes this all the more interesting is the scheduled May 18 meeting in Sanford of New York and Florida specialists, who will seek a solution to the problem of unskilled workers immigrating to the northern industrial communities. This meeting is set for approximately the same time the Booker study report is to be announced, and will seek ways to facilitate training for unskilled workers who are now flocking to New York and winding up at that state's welfare rolls.

Choice Forms Lagging

Approximately one-fourth of choice forms for 1968-69 school year have been returned to the Board of Public Instruction.

This was revealed today by Thomas L. Ritchey, director of administrative services for school system.

Ritchey cautioned all parents that a child cannot be admitted to any school unless a form has been returned.

A choice form may be signed by a parent or other adult person acting as parent. A student who has reached the age of fifteen at the time of choice, or will enter the ninth or any higher grade, may sign his own choice form.

A choice form must be executed for each student who expects to attend school in this county. No assignment to any school can be made unless a choice is made first.

A choice of school for any student will be new to the school system may be made during the 30-day choice period or at any time before he enrolls in school.

The parent or other adult person acting as parent of every child entering the first grade is required to choose the school his child will attend. Choice forms can be filled out during the spring round-ups as announced by the schools, or parents can fill out the forms at any school in the county or the superintendent's office.

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Robert H. Hall, newly appointed Seminole County judge, met today with Gov. Claude Kirk, who named him to the post last week.

Hall had an early morning appointment and was not available for comment on the session with Kirk.

A Newblanc, Hall, 31, was appointed by Kirk to succeed Karlisle Householder, deceased.

Until his appointment, Hall had been engaged in a private law practice in Sanford.
