Son arrested for beating mother

CASSELBERRY — A 37-year-old man was arrested Sunday night and charged with armed robbery, false imprisonment and battery on his 68-year-old mother, who lives in Casselberry.

Scott Cornelius of Edgewood pulled out a handgun inside his mother's 1287 Bridal Drive house on Sunday and demanded money from her, according to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Betty Lou Cornelius told investigators that over the course of four hours her son threatened and slapped her, threatened to

kill himself, and damaged her home.

The incident ended when she hid within her house, and Scott Cornelius left the home, the Sheriff's Office incident report said.

Scott Cornelius, who lives at 5301 Hansel Avenue in Edgewood, is charged with battery on a person 65 years of age or older, kidnapping and false imprisonment, aggravated assault, and robbery with a firearm.

He is being held in the Orange County Jail without bail.

Betty Lou Cornelius said her son has a drug problem and that he has spent a large amount of money he recently inherited on

drugs, according to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office arrest report.

The incident began on Saturday when Betty Lou Cornelius filed a complaint with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office against Scott Cornelius. She alleges that he forged her name on her personal and Social Security checks and cashed them.

Apparently, Scott Cornelius found out that she had reported him, so on Sunday he appeared at her home, investigators said.

He told his mother he was there to repay her for what he had forged. But after he was allowed inside her house, he pulled out a handgun, and demanded money from her.

She said that the first check theft occurred on Oct. 26 when her son stole one of her personal checks from her home. He wrote a check in the amount of \$300 and cashed it at a Nations Bank, the arrest report said.

Betty Lou Cornelius said that the second theft occurred on Oct. 29 when he stole one of her personal checks from her home. Her son wrote a check in the amount of \$200 and cashed it.

The third theft occurred on Nov. 3 when Scott Cornelius stole her monthly Social Security check, forged her signature on the check, and cashed it at a Nations Bank, the report said.

Group hopes to raise awareness of train safety

Many incidents could be avoided if motorists paid attention to warnings

Local as well as national law enforcement organizations are concerned over the large number of crashes caused by vehicles at railroad crossings.

"We call them crashes, rather than accidents, said John McClanahan, media relations officer for the Train Safety Awareness Campaign, describing an "accident" as something which can be avoided.

"Too many times, cars pull up to a red light near a rail crossing, and stop right on the tracks," he said. "This is what we're going to work on during a special blitz on Wednesday, Dec. 8. The focus of this safety campaign will be to educate the public of the proper procedures to follow while stopping at or traveling through a railroad

grade crossing." He continued, "Several crashes and fatalities yearly are a result of vehicles and pedestrians ignoring the safety barriers and procedures set forth at all railroad grade crossings."

McClanahan said in a similar crackdown on the national level, held in April of this year, local officers wrote over 260 violation tickets in just Seminole, Orange and Osceola Counties.

Members of the Seminole County Community Traffic Team include officers from police departments in Sanford, Longwood, Casselberry, Oviedo, Lake Mary, Altamonte Springs and Winter Springs, in addition to the Seminole County Sheriff's Department, Florida Department of Transportation (DOT) Motor Carrier Compliance division, Florida Highway Patrol and CSX Transportation.

As examples of locations where various officers will be concentrated this Wednesday, McClanahan said Longwood will concentrate on State Roads 427 and 434, with Altamonte Springs at SR 436. "Anywhere See Safety, Page 5A

Police investigate homeless deaths

SANFORD - Police are investigating the deaths of two homeless people whose bodies were found within a half-mile of each other along U.S. Highway 17-92 in Sanford on Saturday.

One of the deaths is being considered a homicide, and the other is being investigated as suspicious, said Cleo Cohen, a spokeswoman for the Sanford Police Department.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office and Florida Department of Law Enforcement are also participating in the investigation.

"We don't know if there's a connection between the two or not," said Cohen. "But because they were both homeless, and their bodies were located a half-mile apart, we are investigating whether there is a connection."

The bodies were both found in areas that are known for having homeless camp sites, police See Deaths, Page 5A

Oviedo council plans 'stakeholders' meetings

OVIEDO — Oviedo will hold a 3-hour meeting with 48 members of the community in late January to discuss strategic planning, including ways to improve the city's transportation.

The Oviedo City Council approved the meeting, proposed by the Florida Institute of Government at the University of Central Florida, by a 4-1 vote over the objection of Tom O'Hanlon. A date and place for the meeting has yet to be determined.

Following the meeting with community members, the council will meet in 21 hours of strategic planning

O'Hanlon objected to hold-

ing the meeting with 48 community "stakeholders" because he said that many residents will likely be left out of the process, leaving businesses and developers to dominate the meeting.

"Whenever we do these cross sections across the city, we always seem to have a shortage of people who live in the community," O'Hanlon said. "Most of the citizens who live in this city are too busy to take time out of their lives to take part in a stakeholders meeting."

O'Hanlon also said that choosing 48 people to participate creates the impression that input from other members of the community will not be taken. Councilman Tom See Oviedo, Page 5A

Antique air meet successful

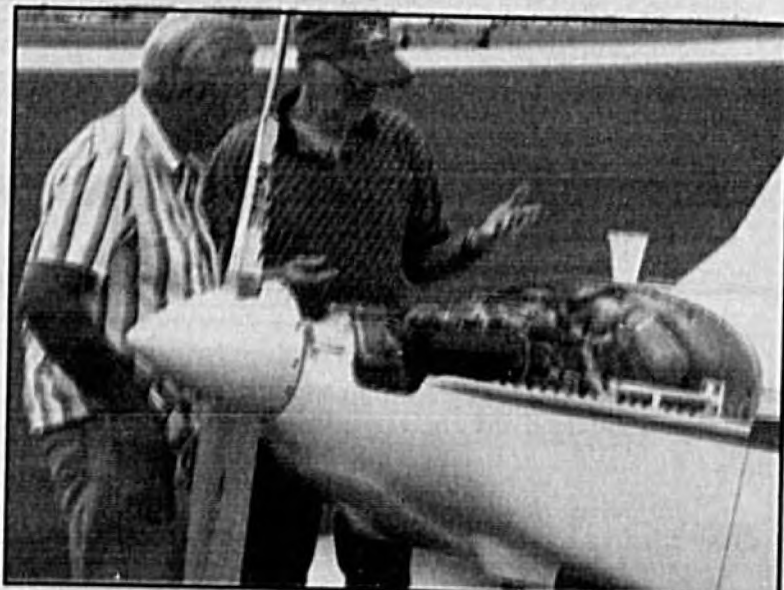

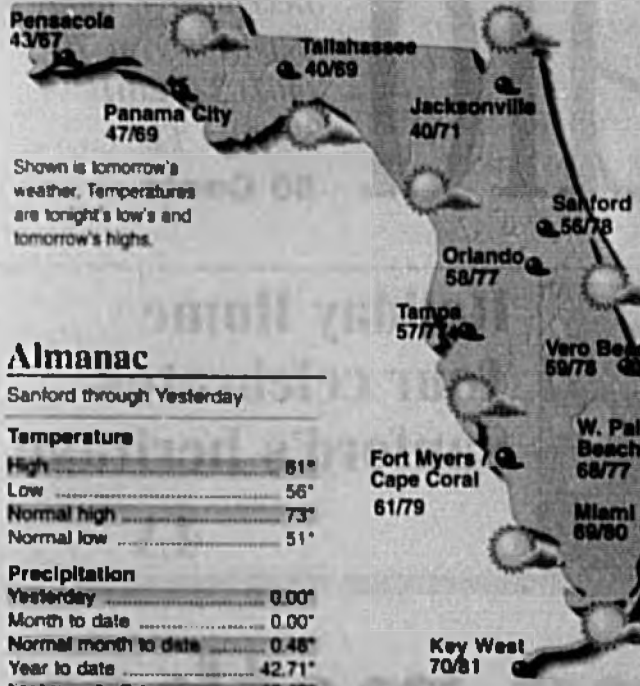
tators were a fully restored Steerman, flown in from the Spruce Creek field in Volusia County, and an ultra light from

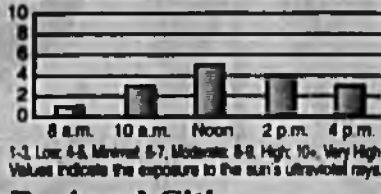

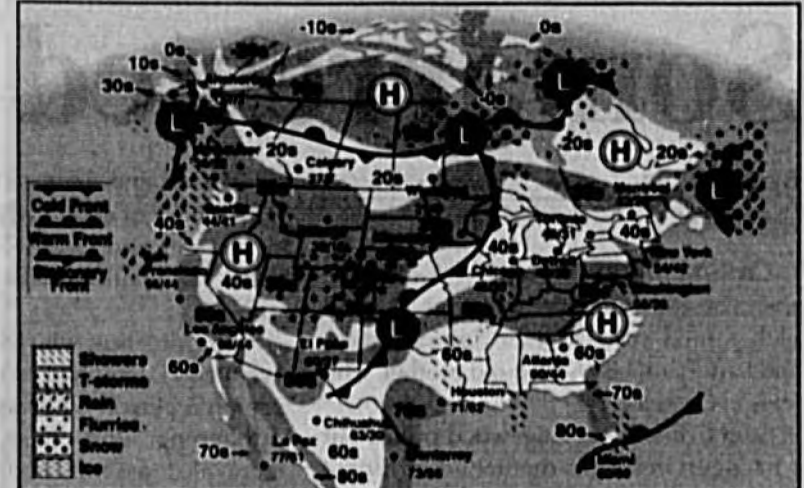

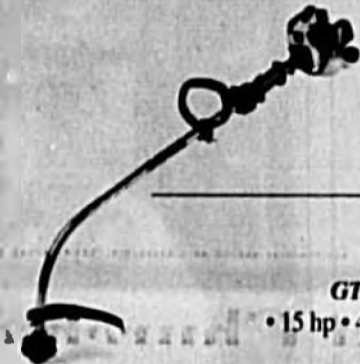

The ever precious life of Ruth Hamilton

Ruth Hamilton was born before there were automobiles or airplanes. Before there was a First World War or a Great Depression. Before radio or television. Before the Atom Bomb or a Man on the Moon. Born a full century before the Internet or Y2K.

If she only lived to be 40, Ruth Hamilton would have been more than grateful.

"That was the longevity way back when," 101-year-old Hamilton said Monday after she had her lunch at The Commons of Lutheran Towers in Orlando.

"Most people didn't live much past 40. They worked hard and lived life to the fullest. Then, they died."

Ruth Hamilton scoffs at being called "old." Life's a thrill to her, especially a life that will soon span three centuries.

"When the clock strikes midnight, Jan. 1, I'm going to write a check for \$1 and put the year 2000 on it," joked Hamilton, a former resident at Bram Towers in Sanford. "I don't know who I'll make it out to. I just want to officially celebrate the fact I'm still here."

Life is a precious gift to Hamilton, who prayerfully welcomes each new day. With nothing to prove, nothing to fret about, Hamilton said that in recent years she was determined to be just a little better than she was to be the day before.

"Nothing — not living or dying — scares me that much," Hamilton said. "As a little girl, I

saw how hard people had to work. Poppa was from Denmark. He had a wood shop in Alta, Iowa. He made a hog feeder that was supposed to make us a lot of money. But it didn't."

Growing up, Ruth dreamed that she would become an actress. She said she still knows all the words to a stage recitation she did at school — "Soul of the Violin." She also recited "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" in Latin. She learned to speak six languages — and became a teacher instead of an actress.

One of her students who wanted to be a newspaper man, became a distinguished editor. Another who wanted to be a football player, became one of the Green Bay Packers. "I would hear from them every year," she said. "But now they're gone."

The love of her life, she says, was a handsome baseball player who became a small town Midwest doctor. She remembers meeting Carter Hamilton on an Iowa ballfield.

"He was tall and very good looking," she said. "The other players liked to razz him because he was a college boy. They were rough guys. "I had been engaged to a first baseman with the Chicago White Sox but he jilted me," Hamilton said. "I was heart-broken. But when I met Carter everything was perfect. Carter could have been a Cleveland Indians pitcher. He had a good fastball and a change-up. But he

didn't have a curve. My Carter didn't have a curve ball."

Carter Hamilton exchanged his baseball gear for a doctor's kit and became a fine physician.

"He always cared for his patients more than making money," Ruth Hamilton said. "He'd go to homes on a horse-drawn wagon. Sometimes, all people could give him was potatoes. They didn't have any money."

The Hamiltons were married 27 years until the doctor died in 1949. He was 51-year-old. Mrs. Hamilton said a prince once offered to marry her but she declined. Carter Hamilton was her one and only love, she told the prince.

Ruth Hamilton's life journey would fill any history book. She has been a teacher, lecturer, radio commentator and served three terms in the New Hampshire House of Representatives.

"I stared on the cold eyes of Adolph Hitler," she said. "I was close enough to — well, forget it. I went to tea with Eleanor Roosevelt. I talked baseball with Chief Bender.

"What I didn't do, I'm happy to say is get involved with all these computers. I've got no use for them. We're too smart to be spending all our energies on computers. We've got intellects and good brains. Life is too precious to allow ourselves to vegetate," Hamilton said.

There's rare joy in Ruth Hamilton's eyes. "I may live to be 200," she said. "Wouldn't that be something?"

Panel to nominate new judge will meet Wednesday

SANFORD — The panel responsible for nominating finalists to replace retired Seminole County Circuit Court Judge Leonard Wood will meet Wednesday, Dec. 8, to conduct interviews of all applicants for the vacant seat.

At least three finalists will be selected before Dec. 11, with the names forwarded to Gov. Jeb Bush for consideration. Bush will then have 60 days in which to make his selection.

Fifteen attorneys, including Seminole County Judge Carmine Bravo, have applied to fill the seat. The job pays \$117,000 per year. Other applicants include John Galluzzo, a Fern Park defense attorney who was among the three finalists the last time there was a circuit judgeship open in Sanford, in March.

Also applying for the position are U.S. Attorney I. Randall Gold and Assistant State Attorney Allen Campbell.

Others vying for the job are Harvey M. Alper, Jack T. Bridges, Jeffrey Duane Deen, Jeanne L. Gold, Sandra K. Ambrose, James M. Miller, James E.C. Perry, Mark H. Randall, Robert Rodriguez, Richard S. Thompson, and James R. Valerino.

The Eighteenth Judicial Circuit Judicial Nominating Commission will meet next Wednesday at the Seminole County Commission Chambers at the Seminole County Services Building in Sanford to conduct the interviews. The interviews are open to the public, but the applicants are requested to remain outside the Commission Chambers except during their interview.

Interviews will be conducted from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Following the interviews, the Commission will deliberate in closed executive session.

Wood, 62, is awaiting trial on a misdemeanor charge of battery. He is accused of striking his wife Julie's face with a newspaper, then grabbing her by the jaw and squeezing it during an argument

over money in July at their Geneva home.

Wood told authorities he did not strike his wife's face or squeeze it. His attorney has entered a plea of not guilty.

In October, Wood announced his retirement on the same day he appeared before a panel of the Judicial Qualifications Commission, the body that investigates alleged wrongdoing by judges.

Deputies questioned Mrs. Wood and took photos of her injuries after his wife was examined at Central Florida Regional Hospital and hospital personnel alerted the Sheriff's Office. Investigators later questioned Wood about the incident at his residence.

According to the Sheriff's Office incident report Wood and his wife became involved in an argument around about money his wife contends the judge is giving his adult children. Julie Wood told police her husband took a swing at her face with a newspaper, just missing, and then grabbed and squeezed her face. Judge Wood told deputies he did swing at his wife with the sports section of the newspaper but did not make contact with her. He denied in the report squeezing his wife's face and told deputies she left their home with no injuries. Neither Wood nor his wife would sign written statements.

The deputies report indicates that Julie Wood had abrasions on the left side of her face and what appeared to be a very small laceration on her left cheek.

The July incident was the third brush with trouble for Judge Wood since 1994. A year ago the Florida Judicial Qualifications Commission recommended that Wood receive a public reprimand by the Florida State Supreme Court for comments he had made in court to attorneys and their clients. Wood received a similar admonishment in 1994 by the chairman of the Judicial Qualifications Commission, charged with investigating complaints against judges.

The body of a 45-year old Native American male was found Saturday morning in a wooded area on the 3600 Block of Orlando Drive (17-92) on Saturday morning, just behind the former location of the Movieland drive-in theater. The death is being investigated as suspicious in nature.

Police have identified the body, but are not releasing his name until after family members have been identified.

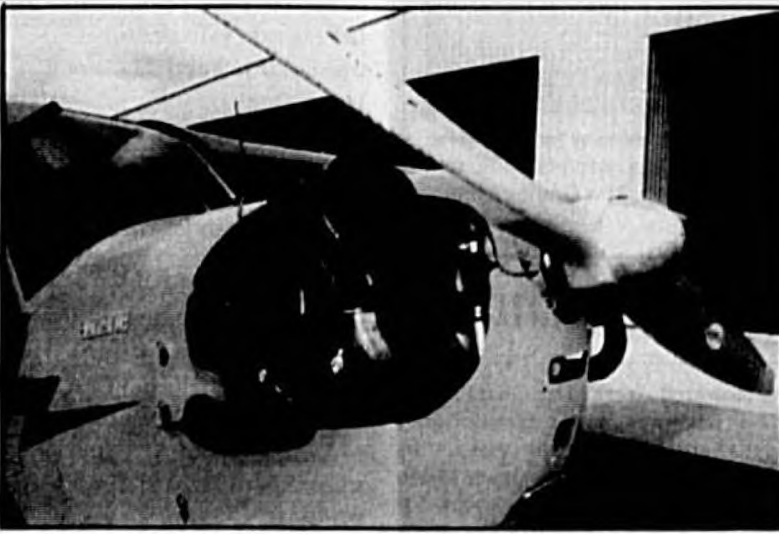

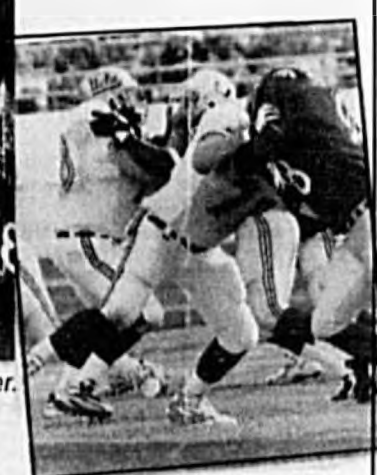

Homemade oven cleaner works like a charm

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: A few years ago you ran a "recipe" to clean an oven. I used it a few times and loved it. It sure beat using those high-fume oven cleaners I used previously. Needless to say, I've misplaced the recipe. Can you repeat it?

JANICE MEAUX, Abbeville, La.

DEAR JANICE: Our pleasure! Set your oven on warm for 20 minutes, then turn it off. Place a small dish of full-strength ammonia on the top shelf and a large pan of boiling water on the bottom shelf. Close the oven door, and leave overnight. In the morning, open the oven door and let the oven air out for a few minutes. Then wash all surfaces with hot, soapy water. The grease and grime will wipe right off. In the future, when there are spills on the floor of the oven, sprinkle them immediately with

table salt. When the oven is cool, wipe with a damp sponge.

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: I wonder if you or your readers could help me out. My husband is extremely fond of a soda (pop) from his childhood, and I would like to purchase some for him. He grew up in Pennsylvania. He said it is simply called White Birch. I'm not sure if it was manufactured in Pennsylvania or if it's still available. He no longer has any relatives in the East, nor do we know anyone from that area.

DEAR KAREN: Birch beer soda is still available here in the East,

but we think it may be a regionally distributed drink. The clear, colorless beverage has a fresh, light, spearminty flavor; the extract is made from bark of the black birch tree. As children, one of our favorite things to do in early spring was to chew on the tree's sweet, sap filled twigs... if you weren't helping your parents make maple syrup, there wasn't a whole lot else to do in mud season.

Tips to growing Christmas Cactus

The Christmas Cactus, contrary to what you may expect, is native to the rain forests, where it can be found hanging on trees. Its pendulous growth makes it ideal for hanging baskets.

The plants does not have leaves but flattened, jointed, green stems that look like leaves with pointed lobes, claw-like in appearance. Because the stem segments resemble crab's legs, the Christmas Cactus is sometimes called Crab Cactus. The flowers are very striking and borne at the tip of the stems, color varies from white through orange to lilac. The fruit is rare but when present it is a red berry.

Culture: Even though this plant is an epiphyte, like many orchids and bromeliads, in Florida it is grown in media containing organic matter. A mixture of perlite and peat moss is often used to grow this plant.

The plants should be watered regularly, but avoid excessive watering. Plants grown in pots need good drainage. Watering is very important during bud and flower formation, too little or too much water will cause the plants to drop their flowers.

Plants are usually fertilized every month with a diluted water-soluble fertilizer. Keep plants quite dry, unfertilized and at a temperature about 55

degrees F during November and December to promote flowering.

Plants can be grown outdoors during the summer but need some shade to protect them from sunburn. They are not cold tolerant and must remain indoors during the winter. Filtered light is best for growth.

Flowering: To induce flowering of these plants, both temper-

ature and length of darkness must be carefully controlled.

If the night temperature is maintained between 50 and 55 degrees F, flower buds will form regardless of day-length. If the night temperature is kept between 55 and 70 degrees F, buds will form if the plants remain for at least 13

continuous hours in complete darkness. If the night temperature is maintained above 70 degrees F, buds will form if the plants remain for at least 15 continuous hours in complete darkness.

Maintain these conditions until flower buds are fully developed, which may take about 6 to 9 weeks. If the plants are not exposed to the above temperature and light requirements, flower buds will not form. Any exposure to light, during this dark period, will interrupt the formation of the flower buds.

After the flower buds are formed plants will flower regardless of light or tempera-

ture conditions. Temperatures above 90 degrees F may cause buds to drop.

Propagation: In spring take cuttings from last year's growth which has not yet become woody, leave them to dry for a few days and later place them on a rooting media. Too much water will cause the stem sections to rot.

Holiday cacti: Two genera of closely related plants, Zygocactus and Schlumbergera and their hybrids are used to name these plants as Christmas Cactus, Thanksgiving Cactus or Easter Cactus. They are known collectively as the Holiday Cacti.

The Christmas Cactus has red, pink, or white flowers or combinations of these colors. The Thanksgiving Cactus has bright orange-red flowers and the Easter Cactus has white flowers. The Easter Cactus has wider and rounder stem segments and the buds take longer to develop, consequently, they will bloom later than the Christmas Cactus.

Pests and diseases: Mealybugs can cause some damage to these plants, they can be controlled with a local application of a soap insecticide or they can be removed with a cotton swab and alcohol. Slugs may also become a problem in the garden.

Win at Bridge

Learn from their errors

Despite what you might feel, all bridge experts make mistakes. And now David Bird has catalogued the biggest in "Famous Bridge Disasters" (Gollancz). In the introduction, he says his intention is "... not... to laugh at their discomfiture (except where it's unavoidable), more to draw instruction from the deals and improve our own standard of play."

Bird gives some Blackwood and Roman Key Card Blackwood disasters, including one deal in which seven international pairs reach seven diamonds with the trump ace unluckily offside. And this example features Bird himself, playing in an intercounty championship in 1988. Two diamonds was the Multi, showing either a weak two-bid in a major or some strong hand. It enjoys great popularity in Britain. Four diamonds was natural, but also expressed a willing-

ness to compete to four of North's major. Four no-trump was regular Blackwood. But at this point, Bird, sitting East, got cold feet about his jump to four clubs. So, he decided not to admit to an ace. However, there was a snag: five clubs showed zero or three aces. Naturally, West assumed the latter and bid seven. Now North asked about the auction. Then, trusting his opponents, he sacrificed in seven diamonds! After Bird doubled more in relief than anything else, South tried to stay calm, but barked, "Pass me my cigarettes, John!" West led the heart king, and the contract went two down.

Deltoid injury is serious

DEAR DR. GOTT: About a year ago, I suffered injury to the nerve of my arm. This has led to a weakness of the deltoid muscle, which became atrophied. Now my arm has dropped down about three-quarters of an inch out of its socket. Other than physical therapy, is there anything that would help my shoulder repair itself?

DEAR READER: The deltoid muscle, on the outer surface of the shoulder, serves primarily to abduct the arm; that is, it enables us to raise the arm away from the body. The deltoid also helps to hold the shoulder in place. A nerve injury to the deltoid is a serious handicap, because atrophy (withering) and weakness almost invariably result. Assuming that the nerve damage is surgically uncorrectable, your best bet is probably physical therapy—a long and arduous process to train other shoulder muscles to compensate for the weak deltoid. Many medical centers have physiatrists, M.D.s who are specially trained in rehabili-

ation; such a resource is worth investigating. As a last resort, an orthopedic surgeon might be able to operate on your shoulder to re-stabilize it. In my view however, a program of physical therapy is your best option. There is nothing else that you (or anyone else) can do to help the shoulder repair itself.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My mother, age 59, recently died an untimely death from congestive heart failure. She was a heavy smoker. Is heart failure inherited?

DEAR READER: When the heart beats ineffectively, excess fluid is trapped in the body and builds up in tissues, causing lung congestion, liver enlargement, ankle and leg edema (swelling), and general water-overload. Most people who die from congestive heart failure succumb because the lung fluid replaces air and they cannot breathe. This serious affliction is not, generally speaking, inherited—although some cardiovascular disorders (such as hypertension and coronary artery disease) may run in families. Any disease affecting the heart can lead to fluid

accumulation, including alcohol damage and malnutrition, as well as the disorders I mentioned. Because cigarette smoking is associated with vascular disease, it could certainly have contributed to your mother's death. In most cases, congestive heart failure is treatable and controllable with certain medicines or, in some instances, with surgery. However, for the therapy to be effective, patients must lose weight, stop smoking, limit salt intake, lower serum cholesterol, and make whatever lifestyle changes are necessary.

Perhaps your mother's death should give other family members the incentive to reduce cardiac risk factors. For example, hypertension—dubbed "the silent killer"—can usually be brought under control before it causes heart damage. Similarly, other risk factors, when addressed early, can usually be modified. If, for instance, your family has an inherited tendency to high cholesterol, prompt and ongoing medical therapy might save other members from premature death. Should this be the case, your mother's demise might well lead to unexpected and positive consequences for the title.

How to cope with illnesses, injuries and emergencies

If you're reading this column, it's safe to assume you are a per-

son concerned about keeping your family healthy and happy. One way to safeguard the well-being of our loved ones is to learn how to recognize a medical emer-

gency and when to seek professional medical attention.

"It's one of the most important things you can do for your family's health," says Gregory L.

Henry, M.D., in the booklet Home Organizer for Medical Emergencies, a Guide from the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP). Dr. Henry, a

former president of ACEP, states: "Qualified emergency physicians, specially trained to care for you and your family, are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Knowing how and when to properly use this valuable resource can help protect you and your family from tragedy."

ACEP's Guide offers the following steps to improve the health, safety and well-being of our families.

Learn to recognize emergencies:

One of the hardest things to do is to tell the difference between a true emergency and a minor problem. While certain symptoms are so alarming that the need for emergency care is obvious, it's the more common illnesses and injuries that sometimes leave us confused. Of course, only a doctor can diagnose medical problems. But we can help protect our family's health by learning to recognize certain symptoms.

According to ACEP, the following are warning signs of medical emergencies:

- Difficulty breathing or shortness of breath.
- Chest or upper abdominal pain or pressure.
- Fainting, sudden dizziness, weakness or change in vision.
- Change in mental status (such as unusual behavior, confusion, difficulty waking).
- Sudden, severe pain anywhere in the body.
- Bleeding that won't stop after 10 minutes of direct pressure.
- Severe or persistent vomiting, coughing up or vomiting blood.
- Suicidal or homicidal feelings.

Talk to your doctor about what to do:

The next time you visit your regular doctor, take a moment and ask her or him what you should do if you think someone in your family needs emergency care.

Above all else, trust your instincts - if you are alarmed by severe symptoms that you believe could be an emergency, it's best to seek care.

Calling an ambulance:

One of the hardest decisions to make is when you should call an ambulance instead of driving to the emergency room. In order to make that determination, ACEP suggests you first run through the following checklist in your head:

- Is the person's condition life-threatening?
 - Could the person's condition worsen on the way to the hospital?
 - Could moving the person cause further injury?
 - Does the person need the skills or equipment of paramedics or emergency technicians?
 - Would distance or traffic conditions cause a delay in getting the person to the hospital?
- If the answer to any of these questions is "yes," or if you are unsure, it's best to call an ambulance. Paramedics and emergency technicians are trained to begin medical treatment on the way to the hospital. This prevents any delay that could occur if the patient is driven to the emergency department. The ambulance can also alert the emergency department to the patient's condition in advance.

If you live in a community with a single emergency number, just dial 9-1-1. If not, keep the numbers of the fire, police and emergency medical services departments near your telephone.

Thanks to ACEP, we all can better prepare ourselves to help our families and loved ones in times of need. FWC meets Dec. 8-9 at Islamorada

OCALA - The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) will meet on December 8-9 at Islamorada. The meeting will convene at 9 a.m. both days at the Cheeca Lodge at mile marker 82 on U.S. 1.

Among the items on Dec. 8, are staff reports concerning the Draw-Lock archery device (which allows a bow to be held mechanically in a drawn position) and consideration of a draft captive wildlife zoning rule.

Other staff reports will include consideration of a rule to restrict importation of certain tortoises that may be linked to diseases affecting wildlife and livestock, and consideration of wildlife issues in the Florida Keys.

The Commission and the agency's executive director will select artwork for the 2000-2001 waterfowl and wild turkey stamps from entries submitted by numerous artists.

Also, the Commission will consider a petition to begin the process of removing the common snook from the list of species of special concern and will select a biological review panel for assessment of the petition for removal of the species from the list.

The second day (Dec. 9) of the meeting will be largely dedicated to marine issues. Also, the Commission will hear a presentation from the City of Oak Hill for repeal of a Commission rule which prohibits the use of seine nets in Volusia County and hear a report concerning the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The FWC will conduct a final public hearing and consider for adoption a proposed rule to establish an April 15-to-October 31 open season for the recreational harvest of red snapper in Gulf of Mexico state waters.

The Commission will also consider recommendations for statewide spotted seatrout regulations to establish 15 inches minimum/20 inches maximum size limits, a five-fish recreational daily bag limit, a November-December closed season statewide, and whether to start the commercial harvest season in May (the current season is June-August).

Additionally, Commissioners will consider a recommendation to increase the vessel limit for black mullet from 50 fish to 100 fish daily if two or more licensed persons are aboard during the period February 1 through June 30 each year.

In other action, the FWC will:

- receive its annual review of the spiny lobster fishery and the lobster trap reduction program,
- consider a recommendation to implement a plan to limit the number of traps in the stone crab fishery,
- consider recommendations on a proposed management plan for horseshoe crabs to establish a permit system for the harvest of the species, and to give special consideration for biomedical and research interests,
- review the proposed Tortugas ecological reserve, and
- consider a request to proceed with rule-making to amend the 1981 Special Ac-
