MEXICANS MAKE RAID ACROSS LINE

KILLED SIX OUT OF NINE AMERICAN SOLDIERS

El Paso, Texas, May 9.—Overnight reports received by General Funston added little to the information regarding the raid by Mexicans Friday night. Later reports indicated that the size of the attacking party was greater than at first believed, some estimates being as high as 300. The raiders attacked the guard of nine men of Troop A of the Fourteenth Cavalry at Glenn Springs just before midnight. The total number of killed was placed at six, three soldiers and three civilians, two of the latter small boys. After continuing their raid to Deermers and Bouquillas, they were reported to have recrossed into Mexico, although some of the military Mexican force was yet on the American side.

Major H. H. Scott, chief of staff of the United States army, in a statement issued here today, said that the raid was a surprise attack on the American troops in Mexico and that the raiders were well armed and had killed six of the nine American soldiers. THE PROMISE OF GERMANY IS ACCEPTED

DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS RESUMED FOR TIME BEING

Washington, D. C., May 9. A note to Germany practically has been completed and probably will go forward to Berlin today. It will be made public soon afterward. It is understood it will be brief, informing Germany that as long as the new instructions to submarine commanders are observed diplomatic relations will be continued, but that the United States cannot allow Germany to dictate its negotiations with Great Britain.

The President was expected to propose communication early today after his conference with Secretary Lansing last night. It is understood officials are so far agreed on the policy to be pursued that it will not be necessary to wait for the cabinet meeting tomorrow.

While the German note has averted off the present at least a break in diplomatic relations, it was said today that the President was not satisfied with the apparent conditions attached to Germany. The United States stands by its demand that Germany cease her attacks on the shipping of international waters.

The President's advisers wanted him to make no reply to the German note until such developments had occurred as to have decided to send the new communication.

Forecast for the Week Beginning Sunday, May 7, 1916

Washington, D. C., May 6, 1916. During the coming week temperatures above the seasonal average are indicated for the Middle Atlantic, South Atlantic and Gulf states, the Middle Plains states and the Great Central Valley. Moderate temperatures are predicted for New York, the New England states and the northern Palms states. The Rocky Mountain and Plateau regions and the Pacific states, temperatures will average below the seasonal normal.

A change to considerably lower temperatures is expected for the Rocky Mountain region and the north Pacific states Tuesday or Wednesday. The weather will be unsettled in these regions.

An extensive area of low pressure over the north western states and the western Canadian Province will advance slowly eastward, reaching the middle west by the middle of the week and the eastern states the latter part of the week. It will cause unsettled weather and local showers during the next several days in the region of the Great Lakes, the extreme upper Mississippi Valley, the north western states and the north Pacific states. By the middle of the week local showers and thunderstorms are probable over the Great Central Valley and the Plains states, and the latter part of the week in the middle Atlantic states and throughout the south. The weather will be generally fair the first half of the week throughout the southern states and the Great Central Valley, and until the latter part of the week in the Atlantic states, although unsettled weather is probable Sunday in the north Atlantic states.

 Apparently, there is not a newspaper in the state that has not rendered itself liable to arrest, conviction and fine for violations of the pet corrupt practices act, section one of which provides that every article pertaining to the campaign of any individual shall be marked "paid advertisement" and signed by the author. It will not suffice that the article bear the word "advertisement," there must be the words "paid advertisement" or it will not count when the vigilant newspaper man is up for contempt of the corruption conscience.

Once in awhile there has been a newspaper in the state that has complied with this ruling but the majority have attempted to satisfy the solicitors by tripling the appellation to the one word. It would also appear that the law covers all advertisements. If a local be written about a trip of one of the candidates and every mention of a candidate is an advertisement in order to keep "within the law" the article would read something like this:

"William Wantohee came over from the county seat yesterday and was gripping his with many of the voters in his race for the peace justiceship. Bill is a nice fellow and has served well the people during his incumbency." Written by A. S. Sistant Reporter. Paid Advertisement. Will bring in crate tomatoes.

In this way there will be no possibility of being arrested and placed in jail till after the primary. All papers should heed the writing upon the wall.—The Palm Beach Post.

Systematic Plan Necessary for Herd Improvement

The man who makes two pounds of meat grow where one grew before will do greater work for the state than the man who multiplies the grass population. Given all the grass the state can grow, it will not produce meat efficiently unless the animal to which it is fed has the capacity for it. The livestock herds must be improved. That means new blood and pure blood. The ability of an animal to use feed efficiently and to make correspondingly cheap gains is in direct proportion to the pure blood in it, if other things are equal.

John M. Scott, animal industrialist at the University of Florida Experiment Station offers the following points for bred and herd improvement: 1. Do not use a single sire or one from a mixture of two or more breeds. 2. Do not use a sire that is no better than the one discarded. 3. Do not select the sire from within the herd. Introduce new blood. 4. Good blood improves the quality of good feed also does its part, but a combination of the two is better and will go a long way toward improving Florida livestock. 5. Do not overwork the summer range. 6. Do not expect livestock to obtain a good living on the open range or among pine trees during winter.

BRYAN PRIMARY LAW AND THE FIRST AND SECOND CHOICE VOTING

On the sixth day of next month Florida will use the Bryan Primary law for the third time. The previous trials of this law, as applied to second choice votes have not proven entirely satisfactory, as it has not been understood and, as men are apt to condemn what they cannot readily understand, this really very excellent law has been much vitiated.

A few points in the law appear to be mystifying to a good many voters and, for the benefit of those who do not fully understand the law and its workings we make the following explanation:

The first of the law has been fulfilled. If you did not register last Saturday or before, you will not be in the coming primary. In addition to registering, however, your 1914 and 1915 poll tax must be paid unless you come of age this year and this tax must be paid with your own money. You must have been in the state a year and in the county six months prior to June 6th to be entitled to vote. You have until May 13th, a week from last Saturday, to pay your poll tax.

After registering and paying the poll tax the greatest mystery of all confronts the would-be voters for we find many who dare not mark their second choice for fear of helping to defeat their first choice. There is no more danger of this under the new law than there was in voting in the second primary under the old law. If you fail to cast a second choice vote you stand in practically the same position that you would under the old system if you refused to vote in the second primary.

Under the old law all but the two high men dropped from the ticket and these two had to enter another campaign against each other, with all the consequent expense, to say nothing of the bitterness often engendered in those second campaigns, and the loss of time both to the candidates and the people.

Under the new law both primaries might be said to be held at the same time; you not only name your choice, but you also vote for the man you would vote for if your favorite candidate was defeated in the first primary and you voted in the second.

To make this a little more clear, let us take a case for example. Smith, Jones, Brown and Hart are running for the same office, Smith being a man of low principles, but one having a certain following that will stick together while none of the others have a grip on a majority of the voters though they may be opposed by 99.99 per cent of the voters, but Smith is the only man that you vote for from the standpoint of principle and if your candidate is defeated you have decided to vote for Brown if under the old law, he would be in the second primary.

Let us suppose there are 2000 votes cast, of which Smith gets 800, Jones 150, Brown 700 and Hart 350.

Under the old law Smith and Brown, being the top men, would go into the second primary, and the friends of Jones and Hart might now decide which of the two to vote for, as their men are no longer in the race, and the two candidates must turn every hook and crank to win the votes of these two low men. If Brown can get Hart's votes, he will win even though he lacked a hundred votes in the first primary, of having as many votes as Smith. This is the law of the second primary, but the law is now changed so that you vote for the man you wish to see elected in the first primary, and the man who gets the most votes in the first primary is elected.

Now let us get back to the new law, and let us suppose that the entire 2000 voters cast their second choice votes, then the tally sheet might look something like this:

The first thing to do is to eliminate Jones and Hart's first choice votes, if they are in excess of the tax that is put on Smith and Brown, since their votes for each of them are equal to the tax for both high men, as that would be equal to the tax. The second primary, now, practically shoot looks like this:

This gives Smith 850 and Brown 750 votes, which is just what they would get at the second primary, providing there was no coercion or unfair play.

Now suppose no one voted the second choice votes, the result would be identical with that in case no one went to the second primary except Smith and Brown, voters for Smith would then get 800 and Brown 700 and the very man you wanted most to defeat would be elected, while in either case your own man would not be helped by your failure to vote a second choice.

We have tried to make this plain in as few words as possible and hope that it may prove a help in carrying out the intention of a much abused but very good law. Sanford Tribune.

BIG EDIFICE RUINED

Great Cathedral at Soissons Wrecked by German Shells.

Teuton Missiles Leave It a Venerable Broken Twelfth Century Monument of Desolation—Town Is Practically Deserted.

By C. INMAN BARNARD.

Paris.—I made a flying visit to Soissons cathedral—or, rather, what is now left of this superb twelfth century edifice. I found the venerable Abbe Landais, vicar of the parish, standing broken-hearted amid the heaps of ruins, now and then seeking with trembling hands for a fragment of the ancient stained glass window given by Blanche de Castille, but now lying shattered in piles of broken masonry, wreckage and dust.

In the roofless nave near three ogival doors, once the pride of Romanesque architecture, Abbe Landais greeted me with these words:

"This is a terrible misfortune. Not a single pane of the beautiful stained glass of the rose windows nor of the side windows remains. It was only last Tuesday that an explosive missile, with its 12 rays forming part of a tympanum of four stained glass, a structure of large divisions, was unharmed, but on Tuesday morning a German projectile smashed to atoms this last relic of the stained glass."

The masterpieces of stained glass art were the crimson and blue portraits of Saint Louis and of Jean d'Arc in kneeling postures. These were demolished this week.

As one approaches Soissons posted notices announce "Road repaired. Proceed only at a walking pace. Make no dust." This reminds the visitors that the Germans are entrenched 700 yards away on the right bank of the River Aisne and the keep up a constant fire on the city and the cathedral and on the ruins of the ancient abbey of Saint Jean des Vignes.

The following letter was sent to a Miami grower from D. C. Gillette, former president of the Tampa Board of Trade and the man who made the wonderful fight for an appropriation to fight the citrus canker:

April 18, 1916

Mr. Geo. S. McClure, Miami, Florida

Dear Mr. McClure—I learned while in Washington last week that one of the Miami papers some time since carried a lengthy editorial on the Florida delegation in Congress, and commented on what was supposed to be a statement made by me to the effect that there was "too much lawyer in Congress." Unfortunately, I did not see the issue of the Miami paper carrying this editorial or I should have corrected it earlier. I wish to say to you that I have never made any such statement that might be so construed, for I have nothing but the deepest respect and admiration for those gentlemen who represent this state at the National Capitol, and I regard their work in behalf of their constituents as most valuable.

I find on investigation that a newspaper published at Deland, some time in December, commented editorially on "Too much Lawyer in Congress," and it was from this editorial that the Miami publication based their views in the subject.

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GIVE ALL TO FRANCE

Rich and Poor Turn Over Hoarded Treasure.

Peddler and Seamstress Lead Great Line of Patriots Bringing Gold to Maintain Nation's Credit and Defense.

Paris.—Since the Bank of France opened special counters in Paris to receive the people's hoarded gold a few days ago the yellow coins have continued to flow in an uninterrupted stream. Depositors exchanged gold for bank notes in the first four days in Paris to the extent of \$1,000,000. No reports from the provinces have been made out.

Capitalists went to the bank in automobiles taking little bags of gold to strengthen the credit of France and help in the national defense. In the early morning hours working men and small employers hurried in on the way to their labor to hand in their jealously preserved savings.

First to respond to the call for more gold were a street lemonade seller who brought two napoleons wrapped in a big rag, and a little seamstress, who proudly gave her solitary coin.

All who take gold to the bank get in return a receipt slip as a souvenir, saving for their country's sake they have parted with their treasure.

In addition to equivalent value in paper money the Bank of France can issue legally three bank bills of \$20 for every \$20 in gold. When Finance Minister Ribot asked the governor of the Bank of France to open special gold-receiving offices in Paris and its provincial branches M. Pallain already had taken steps to this end.

Inquiries in many competent quarters have led to the estimate that gold hoarded by the people in France amounts to \$1,000,000,000. It is now at the disposal of the government.

How the government will use this gold is a matter for future consideration. It may be used to pay the national debt or to help in the national defense.

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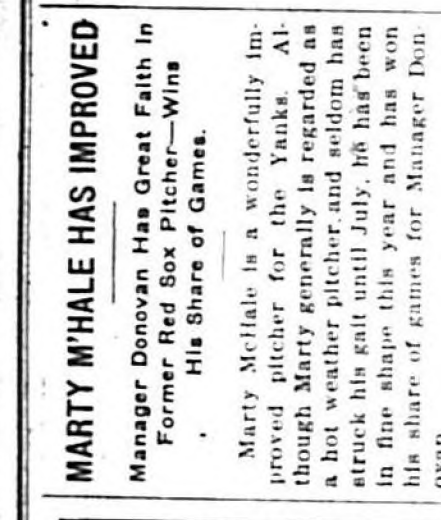
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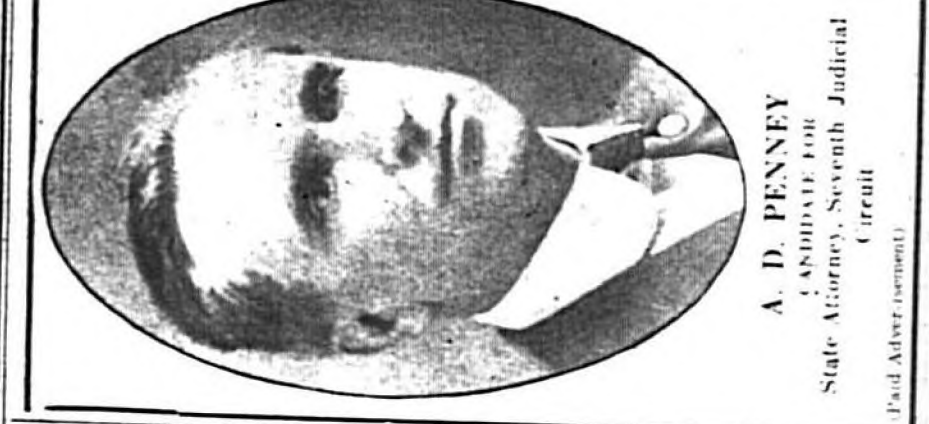

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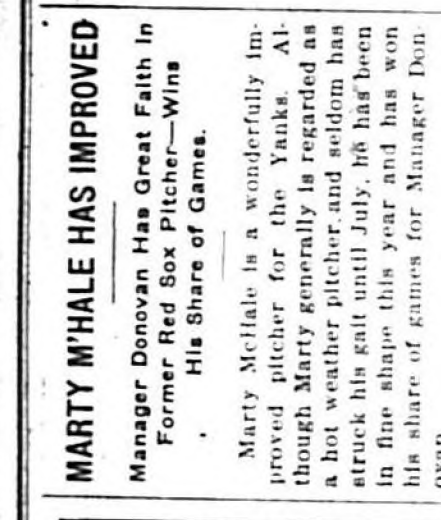
