





On the sixth day of next month Florida will use the Bryan Primary fair play law for the third time. The previous trials of this law, as applied to second choice votes have not proven entirely satisfactory, as it has not been well understood and, as men are apt to condemn what they cannot readily understand, this really very excellent law has been much vilified.

HOW TO DEAL WITH THE FEE SYSTEM

TO THE VOTERS OF FLORIDA:

What is the trouble with the fee system"

The first trouble is that some county officers are said to receive compensation exceeding that of a United States Schator or the Chief Justice of the United States and we think that in such cases they are paid too much.

The compensation is derived largely from fees paid by individuals, not out of the public treasury but out of their own pockets, for definite services, such as the recording of deeds and service of papers in civil suits.

When the compensation is excessive as a whole, clearly the charges for individual services have been excessive. You have paid too much for the service you received. The common sense conclusion would be that if we were paying too much, the remedy is to pay less. But the remedy proposed by the Wood Bill and all other bills heretofore offered is merely to put the officers on a salary basis and the surplus funds in the treasury. This would leave you to pay the same fees you pay now. That would not help you much, would it, even though your money goes into the treasury instead of into the officer's pocket?

It is wrong to allow the officer to take your money for himself by an excessive charge, and it would still be wrong to allow him to take it though we know that in turn it would be taken away from him. The sensible remedy is to reduce the charge for individual services when the officer is being overpaid. Then you can keep your morey and make the tax dodger replenish the treasury

We ought to do now as was done when money lenders were found to be charging excessive interest. That law did not say "Go on and collect usury and pay the surplus into the treasury." It said "Reduce your rate of interest to a maximum of ten per cent."

The next trouble with the fee system is that it is fundamentally wrong that officers connected with the work of the courts and the administration of justice should be paid by the "piece," at so much per head.

For all services rendered to the public in the administration of justice, officers should be free from the temptation to institute prosecution for the sake of the "costs." The only remedy is to provide a salary compensation for services of this class.

This cannot be done by a blanket act. We must deal with the matter office by office and county by county.


The greatest fault with the Wood Bill is that in providing for a salary basis it was left for the county to pay all deputies and assistants. It empowered the County Commissioners to approve all appointments of such deputies and assistants and to fix their compensation. Such a plan puts every county officer at the mercy of the County Commissioners and makes each office their prey if they should be of the type to use their adayntage.

We usually have honest men for county commissioners; but not always; and, under the proposed system, grafters would be in glover. All of the political crooks in the county would have an incentive to run for County Commissioner. Get three crooks as a majority of your Board and their secret rallying cry would be "Come on, friends; we control the appointments and fix the pay. The County foots the bills, and there are places for all."

Did you ever hear of a political machine or a graft mill that would beat it? The question is not new Nobody has made any recent discovery on the subject. Some of our ablest men have been working on the problem for years. Let us remedy existing evils, but let us do it right. To do it right we should abolish fees that are now payable out of the public treasury, fix reasonable fees for services to the individual, and pay the collectors and assessors a commission, but fix a graduated scale with a maximum limit. To do this we must abandon the idea of a blanket bill and proceed office by office and county by county.



What is the trouble with the fee system?

What is the trouble with the fee system?

The first trouble is that some county officers are said to receive compensation acceeding that of a United States Senator or the Chief Justice of the United States; in dwe think that in such cases they are paid too much.

The compensation is derived largely from fees paid by individuals, not out of the public treasury but out of their own pockets, for definite services, such as the recording of deeds and service of papers in civil suits.

When the compensation is excessive as a whole, clearly the charges for individual services have been excessive. You have paid too much for the service you received. The common sense conclusion would be that if we were paying too much, the remedy is to pay less. But the remedy proposed by the Wood Bill and all other hills heretofore offered is merely to put the officers on a salary basis and the surplus funds in the treasury. This would leave you to pay the same fees you pay now. That would not help you much, would it, even though your money goes into the treasury instead of into the officer's pocket?

It is wrong to allow the officer to take your money for himself by an excessive charge, and it wayld still be wrong to allow him to take it though we know that in turn it would be taken away from him. 
