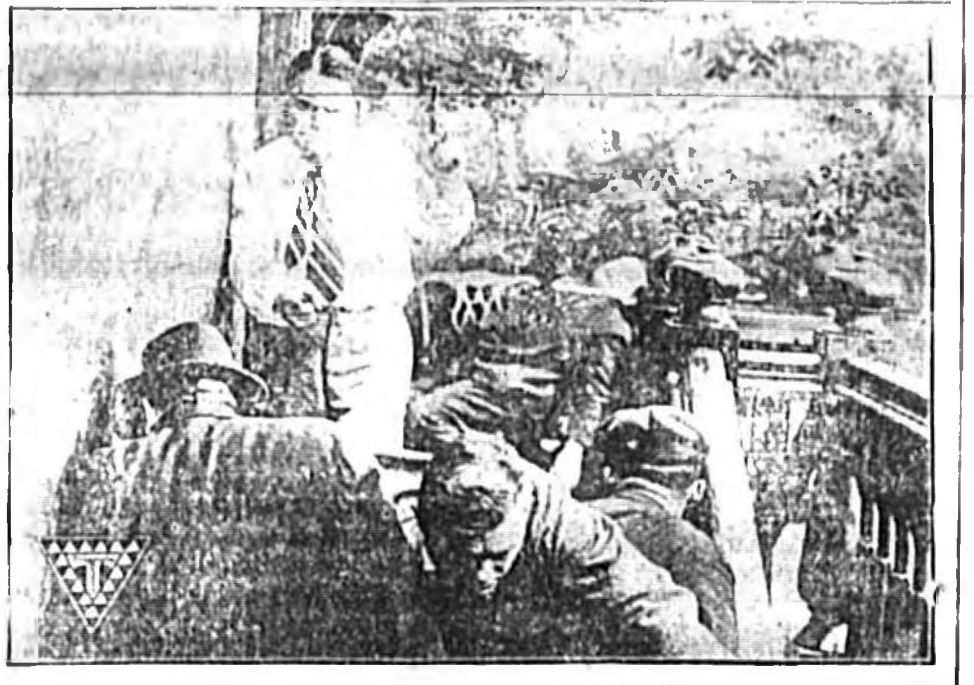

BRICK IS THE THING: Powell Says Northern States Have Discovered This Fact: The Tampa Tribune has the following letter from W. B. Powell, until recently publisher of the Clearwater Sun, who is now enjoying an auto tour through the country:

Near Wheeling, somewhere in West Virginia, July 16, 1918. After traveling 3500 miles, I find that brick and cement are the only two permanent and comfortable roads. Through Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Ohio, over the course we traveled there is not a foot of any other road than brick and cement being constructed. They are tearing up asphalt, tarred rock, macadam, gravel and other and laying 14 to 16-foot brick or cement paving.

The auto traffic is even traveling roads made of tar and rock, while asphalt road are about as good as if they were spread with butter.

I have studied traffic regulations in 2000 cities, towns and villages. The "stop" and "go" semaphore is the correct system. Also "safety zones" in the downtown districts, with pedestals and chains blocking out length of a street for four feet from track, where autos can pass these zones at six miles an hour, six feet from chains, without coming to a halt. Also allowing cars to turn around wherever possible. All "touring cars" do so at owner's risk.

In residential districts autos come to half of street car discharging of taking on passengers, and can turn around in center of road. Speed limit is just what traffic will allow with burden of accident on the driver of auto.

In Detroit and Cleveland and Chicago, where traffic is many times greater than in Tampa, the system solving causes a block or an accident.

MONEY FOR GOOD ROADS

Federal Aid Will Give Florida \$800,000

The Florida good roads department is greatly interested in the federal aid bill, which became a law July 11th, appropriating the sum of \$85,000,000 of federal funds for the construction of rural roads.

Of this sum, \$75,000,000 is to be expended for the construction of rural post roads under cooperative arrangements with the highway departments of the various states, and \$10,000,000 is to be expended in yearly appropriations of \$1,000,000 for roads and trails within the national forests. The act limits the federal government's share in road work in cooperation with the states to 50 per cent of the estimated cost of construction. Federal aid may be extended to the construction of any rural post road, excluding all streets or roads in towns having a population of 2,500 or more except the portions of such streets or roads on which the houses are, on an average more than 200 feet apart.

Five million dollars is made available for expenditure during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, and thereafter the appropriation is increased at the rate of five millions a year until 1921, when the sum provided is twenty-five millions. In addition and appropriation of one million dollars a year for ten years, a total of ten million dollars, is made available for the development of roads and trails in the national forests.

The class of roads to be built and the methods of construction are to be mutually agreed upon by the secretary of agriculture and the state highway departments.

The act provides that after making necessary distinctions for administering its provisions, not to exceed 1 per cent of the appropriation for any fiscal year, the secretary of agriculture, with the approval of the board of each year's appropriation in the following manner:

On each state, the ratio which the area of each state bears to the total area of the United States.

On each state, the ratio which the population of each state bears to the total population of all the states.

On each state, the ratio which the mileage of rural delivery routes and star routes of each state bears to the total mileage of rural delivery routes and star routes of all the states.

Practical statements setting forth the proposed expenditure of any rural post road of each state, as they are to be submitted by the secretary of agriculture and upon approval by the secretary all moneys are to be expended in accordance with the plan of the secretary of agriculture.

Upon completion of the work approved by the secretary, the amount set aside for the project is to be paid to the various states of the Union.

The various states securing aid under the provisions of the act are charged with the making of needed repairs and the preservation of a reasonably smooth surface, considering the type of the road, but are not obligated to make extra heavy repairs or undertake reconstructing them.

After due notice, a state fails to maintain a federally aided road properly, the secretary is required to refuse further aid until the road has been properly repaired at state expense.
